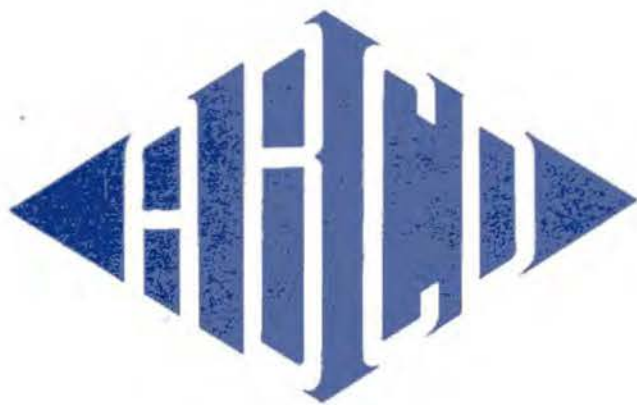

LIEUTENANT WILLIAM W. OLMSTEAD, 28, is a graduate of Dartmouth, where he received his BA degree in 1938. The same year he enjoyed a tour of Europe, travelling a part of the time by bicycle through several of the old world countries. After this leisurely educational jaunt he returned to college and, following a year's post-graduate work, received his degree in civil engineering. In college, he participated in track and basketball and became a member of Zeta Psi fraternity. He spent the next two years, after leaving school, in the engineering department of the Atlantic Mutual Marine Insurance Company in New York City.

While in Europe, Lieutenant Olmstead's observations had led him to anticipate America's entry into the war, so in August, 1940, he entered the Naval service with the rank of ensign and was called to active duty in February, 1941. His first assignment included that of Resident Officer-in-Charge of construction of the Naval Air Station, Willow Grove, Pa., followed by a tour of duty as Resident Officer-in-Charge of construction at the Aviation Supply Depot in Philadelphia. In June, 1942, he was advanced to the rank of junior grade lieutenant and received his commission of full lieutenant in December of the same year.

Lieutenant Olmstead had been assigned directly to his first duty without the customary officers' indoctrination and military training course. In the Fall of 1943 he received this training at Camp Peary, Va., followed by a tour of duty at Camp Allen, Va., and Davisville, R. I. Early in 1944 he became a member of a Navy draft assigned to Manus, in which he and Lieutenant Commander Zerbe were the only Civil Engineering Corps officers. In July, as the only officer whose service designation was USN instead of the familiar USNR, the Lieutenant became Executive Officer of ABCD. A few months later he succeeded Lieutenant Commander Thrapp as Commanding Officer of our unit.

Lieutenant Olmstead's home is in Long Island, New York, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frederick W. Olmstead, now reside.

LIEUTENANT WALTER W. FLEMING, 48, Executive Officer, is a graduate of Ohio State University, where he received his C.E. degree in 1917. He is a member of Triangle engineering fraternity and played varsity soccer while in college.

Although specializing in bridge design and construction, the Lieutenant has engaged in some building and road work throughout Ohio. His background also includes the post of Assistant Chief Engineer of Bridges in the State of Ohio.

Lieutenant Fleming went on active duty with the Seabees in February, 1943, and took his officers' training at Camp Peary, Va. A tour of duty in the Office for Construction Procurement in Cleveland, was followed by a course of instruction in the Navy stevedore school in New York City; temporary assignment to Advance Base Depot at Port Hueneme, Calif., and finally officer-in-charge of Casual Draft 2424, arriving in the Admiralties late in September, 1944. His duties with ABCD included temporary assignment to the posts of construction officer, issuing officer in materials and inventory office, and his present activity.

The Lieutenant is a veteran of World War I, in which he served in the field artillery as a private. He is a Mason, a Kiwanian, and a member of the American Legion. His pet hobby is amateur photography. A son, Walter H. Fleming, is a captain in the Army. Lieutenant Fleming's home is in Columbus, O., where his wife, Marvel, now resides.

LIEUTENANT COMMANDER HARRISON F. THRAPP, is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin. He taught topographical engineering for three years, to help defray expenses, and received his BS CE degree in 1932. He was a member of the varsity rifle team and enjoys membership in Chi Epsilon Honorary Civil Engineering and Lambda Chi Alpha fraternities. Following graduation he took a summer jaunt to the Black Hills of South Dakota where a gold rush was in progress. He found little gold and returned to college for a year's post graduate work.

Upon termination of his schooling, Commander Thrapp was engaged by the Tennessee Valley Authority as Assistant Hydraulic Engineer, working on the Norris and Chickamauga Dams in Tennessee, and the Wheeler Dam in Alabama. In 1936 he was commissioned junior grade lieutenant in the Naval Reserve on inactive status, and, shortly after, became associated with the Standard Oil Company of Indiana as design engineer on refinery construction. In June, 1940, he asked for a year's leave of absence for the purpose of going on active duty in the Navy and has experienced a continuous and varied service career ever since.

The Commander's first assignment was to the Naval base in Guantanamo, Cuba, where he was assigned Public Works Officer with a force of nearly a thousand Cuban, Chinese, and Spanish workmen. He learned to speak and write Spanish while at Guantanamo and other lesser bases in the Bahamas, Jamaica, and Haiti, and still maintains a correspondence in that language with a few of his former co-workers. In August, 1941, he was advanced to the rank of full lieutenant. Returning to the States late in November, 1942, he was temporarily assigned to the Bureau of Yards and Docks in Washington, D. C., followed by nearly a year and one-half at ABD, Port Hueneme, Calif., as outfitting officer for construction battalions going overseas. In May, 1943, while still at Hueneme, he received his commission as Lieutenant Commander.

Early in 1944, Lieutenant Commander Thrapp embarked for overseas, reporting at ABCD at Noumea, New Caledonia. His stay there was short, however, and as officer-in-charge of an ABCD about to have its inception in the Admiralties, he made the initial landing with this new unit on Manus, April 3, while the enemy was still but a short distance back in the jungle. Although temporarily detached for duty with the Fourth Brigade, when the Commander returned to his post in ABCD, the organization grew to a huge, efficient unit under his guidance. It was with a feeling of deep regret on the part of the officers and men under his command that he received orders to move up into the Philippine area to establish a new ABCD in March, 1945.

Lieutenant Commander Thrapp's home is in West Chicago, Ill., where his wife, Carolyn, now resides. A younger brother, Second Lieutenant Hilton W. Thrapp, has served the Army in North Africa, Sicily, Normandy, and Holland, as glider and transport pilot in the Troop Carrying Command, receiving the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, for conspicuous bravery. Another young brother, Second Lieutenant Dan L. Thrapp, of journalistic and scientific research fame, is in Burma with the Quartermasters' Corps in a pack-mule outfit.

In civilian life the Commander enjoyed skiing, golf, and hunting, entailing canoe portage trips into the woods of Northern Wisconsin.

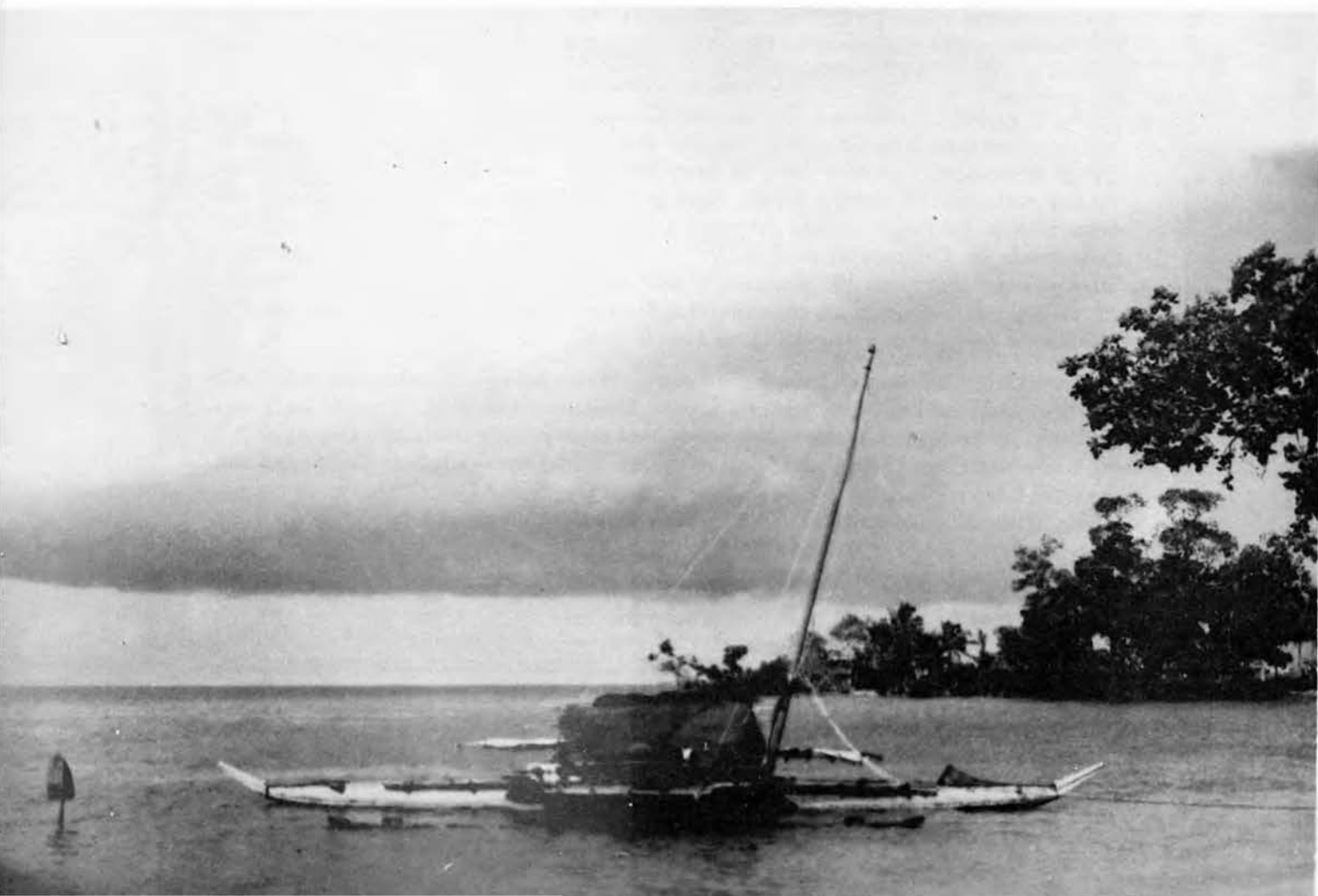

LIEUTENANT CLIFFORD M. CRESWELL, 38, Senior Medical Officer of ABCD, has both a BS and MD degree from the University of Iowa, where he graduated in 1932. His period of internship at the General Hospital in Rochester, N. Y., was followed by two years' practice as a country doctor with special attention to surgery, at Strawberry Point, Ia. In the next nine years he built a successful practice in Kenosha, Wis., his home town. During this time he was a commissioned officer in the Army Reserve Corps.

Dr. Creswell went on active Naval duty in January, 1942. He spent a little over a year at the armed forces' induction center at Toledo, O., and a four-month period in the same capacity at Columbus. This was followed by assignment to Camp Parks, Calif., for a tour of overseas' duty. He left the States with Casual Draft 2424, arriving in the Admiralties with that contingent.

The Doctor is a member of Phi Sigma medical fraternity, an Elk, and a former member of Strawberry Point Lions Club. His civilian diversions included golf, bowling, hunting and fishing. Although his home is in Kenosha, his wife, Dorothy, and two children, Marcia Ann, 6, and Clifford M. Jr., 3, are living in Pasadena, Calif., while he is overseas.

CHAPLAIN WILLIAM A. HULICK, 27, became attached to ABCD after our unit had been overseas thirteen months without a spiritual advisor. His early education was had at Mt. Pleasant Vocational High School in Hickory, Pa. In 1940 he graduated from Washington and Jefferson College in Washington, Pa., with a BA degree. He then entered San Francisco Theological Seminary at San Anselmo, Calif., where he received his BD degree in the Spring of 1943. A few months before his graduation from the seminary he was commissioned an ensign in the Naval Reserve on inactive status. Following graduation he was ordained by the Washington, Pa., Presbytery, Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.

Upon reporting for active duty in the Navy in June, 1943, the Chaplain was advanced to the rank of junior grade lieutenant. He attended the Navy Chaplain's School at William and Mary College at Williamsburg, Va., and after finishing this indoctrination course, reported to the Navy Yard at Charleston, S. C., as Assistant Yard Chaplain. He went overseas in May, 1944, and became chaplain of Nineteenth Special Naval Construction Battalion, a colored unit, stationed in New Guinea. In September he received the rank of full lieutenant. Chaplain Hulick was assigned to Manus in February, 1945, where he assumed his duties with Boat Pool Fifteen. A short time later the Receiving Station and weekly services at Harbor Entrance Control Post became added assignments to his already crowded program. In May, headquartering at ABCD, he became actively engaged as our chaplain and welfare and recreation officer, widening the scope of these activities though still administering to the other units.

Chaplain Hulick's wife, Florence, resides in Washington, Pa., where she holds the post of secretary in Third Presbyterian Church. She is a vocalist, an organ student, choir leader, and is active in youth work. The Chaplain has two brothers in the service: John C., a second class storekeeper in an ABCD in the Southwest Pacific; and Elmer P., third class radioman, serving aboard a Navy craft somewhere in the Pacific.

Chaplain Hulick's post-war plans are as yet indefinite, although he anticipates a promising career with his own parish somewhere in the mid-West.

LIEUTENANT ROY A. STAMM, 33, Materials Officer, is from Albuquerque, N. M., where his wife, Roberta, resides. He is a graduate of the University of New Mexico, receiving his degree in civil engineering in 1932, as the youngest man in his class. He played varsity tennis, and as a member of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity engaged in intra-mural track and baseball.

After graduation Lieutenant Stamm was employed by the Indian Irrigation and Soil Conservation Services as an irrigation and construction engineer and worked on the Navajo Reservation in Arizona, New Mexico, and Utah. After three and one-half years of government service he entered business in Albuquerque as junior partner in a general contracting firm, specializing in commercial work. He was active in passing a contractors' and builders' licensing law for the State of New Mexico, and after passage of the law in 1938, became Registrar on the Contractors' Licensing Board. In 1939 he became a speculative builder and subdivider in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, and successfully developed several subdivisions. In June, 1942, he was married and the following month entered the Naval service as junior grade lieutenant.

Lieutenant Stamm was sworn in at the Office of Procurement in Los Angeles, and went directly to Port Hueneme, Calif., without the customary officers' indoctrination course or eight weeks' "boot" training. He remained at Hueneme for two years in charge of export buildings and building equipment, with the co-lateral duty of assistant to the shipping officer. He was advanced to his present rank in May, 1943, and August, 1944, joined Casual Draft 2424, accompanying that contingent to the Admiralties as executive officer.

Lieutenant Stamm is licensed to fly light planes and is a hunting and fishing enthusiast, often back-packing and camping in the mountains of New Mexico. His father, Roy A. Stamm, Sr., an authority on fishing and hunting in the Southern Rockies, has written a book on the subject and is a regular contributor to outdoor magazines. One brother, Lieutenant Robert J. Stamm, is hull officer aboard a Naval repair ship, and a second brother, William R. Stamm, has worked with the Army Engineers in Honolulu for the past three years.

LIEUTENANT JAMES J. MENNIS is twenty-four years old. His home is in Jackson Heights, Long Island, New York City, N. Y., where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank D. Mennis, reside. He attended Manhattan College in New York City, graduating in 1940 with a Bachelor of Civil Engineering degree in structural engineering. He participated in football, basketball, and track during his college years and worked for various contractors during summer vacations. A Beta Sigma man, he served as president of his fraternity in his senior year at college.

Shortly after the outbreak of the war, Lieutenant Mennis returned to the States from Newfoundland, where he had been engaged in Naval base construction work as a civilian. In April, 1942, he received his commission in the Seabees as ensign. Then followed fourteen months in Maine as officer-in-charge for several Navy projects, including industrial buildings, shipways, piers, earthmoving, and dredging. He received his promotion to junior grade lieutenant in May, 1943, and soon after, left the States for Dutch Harbor, Alaska. He spent nine months there attached to a floating drydock, engaged in repairing destroyers, submarines, and other small Naval craft. His duty necessitated many hours of deep-sea diving, in which he is qualified.

From the Aleutians the Lieutenant was assigned to the staff of the Commander of the Third Fleet, headquartered in Noumea, New Caledonia, working on base construction planning, principally concerning the Admiralty Islands. In April, 1944, Lieutenant Mennis was assigned to ABCD at Manus, and in July of the same year, became a full lieutenant.

As yard superintendent for ABCD, the Lieutenant, assisted by four other officers, headed the largest department in the organization.

LIEUTENANT GLENN E. THISTLETHWAITE, ABCD dentist, is twenty-five years old. His early education included attendance at Thomas Jefferson High School in Richmond, Va., where he was student body president in his senior year. In 1943 he received his DDS degree from Northwestern University. He is a member of Alpha Delta Phi and Delta Sigma Delta fraternities, and in the latter, a dental fraternity, he served as president during his last year in college.

An athlete of no mean ability, Dr. Thistlethwaite specialized in the pole vault, reaching a school record height of fourteen feet. In competition with Cornelius Warmerdam, world's all-time champion, he placed second, clearing the bar at 13' 6". The doctor gained further laurels when he placed third at the National Collegiate track meet in Los Angeles in 1939. Dr. Thistlethwaite's father, Glenn F. Thistlethwaite, has been football coach at Northwestern University, University of Wisconsin, and Richmond University, with an average score of eight winning games out of every ten played for the past thirty-three years.

Following his graduation from college, Dr. Thistlethwaite served as resident oral surgeon at Cook County Hospital in Chicago for nearly a year and entered the Naval service as junior grade lieutenant in October, 1943. He received his officers' indoctrination training at Great Lakes Naval Training Station and remained there on duty for the next fifteen months. He was advanced to the rank of full lieutenant in February, 1945, and was assigned to our unit in April.

Dr. Thistlethwaite has two brothers, Robert and Richard, who are serving in the Army. His wife, Mildred, whom he married in his junior year in college, together with their tiny son, Glenn E. Jr., aged ten months, are making their home in Chicago for the duration. Following the war, the doctor contemplates establishing his practice in South Bend, Ind.

He is a graduate of Purdue University where he received his BS CE degree in 1931. While in college he played some varsity football and was a member of Sigma Pi fraternity. Following graduation he was Assistant Engineer of Construction in the Indiana State Highway Commission.

The Lieutenant's tour of Seabee duty began in October, 1943. After several months in the States, including assignments to Camp Peary, Va., Camp Le Jeune, N. C., Camp Parks and Port Hueneme, Calif., he was sent to the Admiralties in Casual Draft 2424, arriving at Manus late in September, 1944. Here he was assigned to ABCD as Assistant Yard Superintendent. He was advanced to his present rank in March, 1945.

LIEUTENANT (jg) DWIGHT ROUDEBUSH, ABCD Personnel Officer, is from Carrollton, Ohio, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Roudebush, reside. He is thirty-five years old.

Following graduation from high school in 1928, Lieutenant Roudebush attended Ohio State University for two years. After that he engaged in miscellaneous activities including two years of teaching all grades in a rural school; an engineer with Civil Works Administration; U. S. Geological Survey; and other engineering and construction projects until re-entry in Ohio State University in 1941, majoring in engineering. He received his BCE degree in March, 1943, and went on active duty with the Seabees as ensign in June of the same year. After the customary period of officers' training at Camp Peary, Va., he was assigned to Station Force there as Assistant Military Training Officer. This was followed by a trip to Camp Endicott, R.I., and later an assignment to the Twenty-second Naval Construction Battalion at Camp Parks, Calif. When that organization was broken up the Lieutenant took the course in ABD training at Port Hueneeme, Calif. Returning to Camp Parks he was advanced to his present rank in September, 1944, and departed for the Admiralties in Casual Draft 2424 four days later. His co-lateral duty in ABCD is that of Censoring Officer.

In civilian life, when he found the time, Lieutenant Roudebush dabbled in hunting and fishing, golf, ice skating and skiing.

Following graduation and until commissioned an ensign in the Naval Reserve in March, 1943, he was associated with the American Bridge Company in Trenton, N. J., and in Ambridge, Pa. After his indoctrination period at Camp Peary, Va., he was assigned to Station Force and engaged in training chief petty officers during the next four months. This was followed by an assignment to Camp Le Jeune, N. C., where he assisted in the program for training Seabees to accompany Marines on invasion missions. In February, 1944, after a short stay at Camp Endicott, R.I., he reported to the Twelfth Naval Construction Battalion at Camp Parks, Calif., and when that unit was decommissioned, took the officers' ABD procedure course at Port Hueneeme, Calif. In July, 1944, he was advanced to his present rank. Reporting back at Camp Parks, the Lieutenant was assigned to Casual Draft 2424, arriving in the Admiralties late in September, 1944.

Possessed of diversified interests, Lieutenant Kelsall does pen-and-ink sketches, landscape oil paintings, carving, and woodcraft; and he holds a design patent on a sugar spoon for which there are possibilities for production after the war. He has other patents pending, one being an improved design of canoe. Other civilian diversions include dancing, hiking, golf, tennis, hunting, and fishing.

He received his letters in track, tennis, and basketball, and was captain of the latter team in his senior year.

Mr. Hall attended Hardin Junior College in Wichita Falls, Tex., for two years, and was student body vice-president during that time. This was followed by a year at Texas University, then V-12 Navy schooling at Tulane University in New Orleans, majoring in midshipman's training in Navy supply. ENSIGN OSCAR W. LANE, 22, disbursing officer for ABCD, received his prep schooling at Agusta Military Academy in Fort Defiance, Va., followed by three and one-half years at the University of North Carolina, where he majored in business administration. He went on active duty in the Naval Reserve in July, 1943, as a V-12 officer candidate at the U. of N.C., and received his commission in October of the same year. After military training at Camp Allen, Va., he took a specialized course in Navy supply at Harvard University and added training at the Advanced Base supply school at Norfolk, Va. His first assignment was to a Naval draft assembling at San Bruno, Calif., for overseas duty. This unit was broken up, however, and he reported to Camp Parks for re-assignment. Through a mistake in orders he missed 2424 Casual Draft's sailing by one day and arrived in the Admiralties a month after the original contingent.

Ensign Lane was active in prep school sports, participating in varsity football, golf, tennis and track, in which he specialized in the broad jump, hundred yard dash, and discus throw. He is a Phi Gamma Delta and other members of his fraternity included Paul Severn and George Barkley of All-American football fame.

CHIEF CARPENTER GARVIS M. CLECKLER was born in Anniston, Ala., in 1904. His home is in Pryor, Okla., where his wife, Anna Jane, and three children, Jane, 7; Stewart, 4; and Barbara, 2, now live. His education included attendance at Anniston Military Academy and several other colleges throughout the Southern States where he played varsity baseball and football.

Mr. Cleckler has worked as a co-ordinating engineer with the Army Engineers, holding the position of general superintendent of construction, and on several private jobs, including ten to twenty story buildings as general superintendent and estimator. Early in the war he held similar positions at two different two million-dollar projects for the Du Pont de Nemours Powder Company.

Chief Carpenter Cleckler enlisted in the Navy in May, 1942, as Chief Carpenter's Mate, later taking a lateral rate of Chief Gunner's Mate. He first reported at Great Lakes Naval Training Station, and without the customary "boot" training, was sent to Camp Allen, Va., where he was put in charge of a draft of men leaving to open the then new ABD at Gulfport, Miss. At Gulfport he was Chief in Charge of Station Force, and was appointed to the rank of Carpenter in June, 1943. Preface to our history . . .

When a draft of six hundred and three Seabees and their 10 officers left Camp Parks in California, on September 5, 1944, they wondered why there were so few dozer men, or carpenters, or steam-fitters in the crowd. This was an outfit of crane operators and storekeepers, for the most part, a large number of whom had been overseas before with base-building battalions on islands scattered from the Aleutians to the South Pacific. Included too, were men who had been many months on Stateside duty as well as recruit seamen only a short time out of "boot" camp. This was not the familiar Seabee unit with the usual complement of building artisans and heavy equipment specialists and everyone was mystified. Scuttlebutt said: "This draft is either battalion replacements or a base maintenance unit." The customary Naval secrecy enshrouded the assignment and it wasn't until the end of a twenty-one day sea voyage that the men learned of their destination and mission. Today no one from Casual Draft 2424 is sorry he became a part of the unit he has since grown to be proud of.



With the aid of fifteen men borrowed from the Seventy-eighth Seabee Battalion, a strip was blasted through the coral reefs, permitting the LCMs to beach their cargoes in the mud near Lorengau. Although Lieutenant Commander Thrapp was slated to be officer-in-charge of the unit, he was detached almost immediately upon landing and began a period of temporary duty as materials officer with the Fourth Brigade on Los Negros. The remaining two men, Carpenter Hutchinson and Chief Smith, supervised the unloading of ships and kept things humming as best they could until Lieutenant James J. Mennis arrived from Noumea, New Caledonia, April 27, bringing the first contingent of eight chief petty officers and six petty officers. After some investigation and a conference, Salesia Plantation—a long narrow strip of cocoanut grove lying between the dense jungle and the lagoon—was selected to be the future site of ABCD.

Our Pioneers Arrive . . .

Advance Base Construction Depot, Navy 3205, landed on Manus Island in the Admiralties on April 3, 1944, but not as the flourishing ABCD we knew a few months later. The initial landing was made by Lieutenant Commander Harrison F. Thrapp, Chief Carpenter Joseph B. Hutchinson, and Chief Storekeeper George E. Smith. Patrols were still ferreting out the enemy a few hundred yards back in the jungle and the newly arrived depot men lived aboard ship the first few days and carried side arms when they went ashore.

In Seeadler (Sea Eagle) Harbor three full shiploads and portions of other ships had immense cargoes for the depot. Base Hospital Fifteen had to be built in a hurry to care for the wounded; Momote air strip on Los Negros Island and quarters for personnel had high priority and several other projects on the base were demanding materials: all to be routed through ABCD.

Work Begins . . .

"Our first official job," said Lieutenant Mennis, "was to construct a three by seven pontoon barge aboard a Liberty ship in the harbor for ferrying personnel and emergency cargo ashore. Lieutenant E. R. Foley from the Forty-sixth Seabees was temporarily assigned to ABCD as officer-in-charge, and with this nucleus of an organization things really began to move."

The first living quarters for these pioneers were tents at Salesia Beach in a clearing formerly used as Japanese officers' country. They lived there until the end of August, when they moved into huts in "OID Area" on Coral boulevard. "We lived like kings," recalled Chief Smith. "We dug a water hole on the beach and used a small purification unit for safety. A "reefer" was put into operation and we cooked over an open fire. Our menu included steak, real eggs, and real potatoes. There was no master-at-arms, no muster, and we worked from five in the morning until ten or twelve hours later.

"The first heavy equipment brought ashore at Lornegau had to be moved to our new yard at Salesia and trucks, cranes, and dozers bogged down time and again on the trip. We crossed creeks on crudely built bridges of coconut logs which we constructed as we went along."

"Our first jetty was built at Salesia in mid-April," continued Lieutenant Mennis. "It was a rough affair and could only be used at high tide. Ten ships were now in Seeadler Harbor laden with cargoes of desperately needed materials to be routed through the depot for the many Seabee projects springing up on the island. There were two and one-half shiploads of cement along and everyone had to work hard to keep things moving." It wasn't unusual in those early days to find Lieutenant Mennis operating a crane or sacking cement, and materials arrived so fast thousands of tons had to be dumped in the mud and muck in small clearings among the coconut trees. These inadequate storage areas were cleared of trees and undergrowth in strips of one hundred-foot widths as fast as the Seabee battalion charged with this project could proceed, and still materials arrived so fast big disorderly piles made their appearance in scattered sections all over the yard. "In May, June, and July of 1944, some thirty thousand tons of equipment and building materials were received and eighteen thousand tons were issued; all without proper storage facilities," said Lieutenant Mennis.

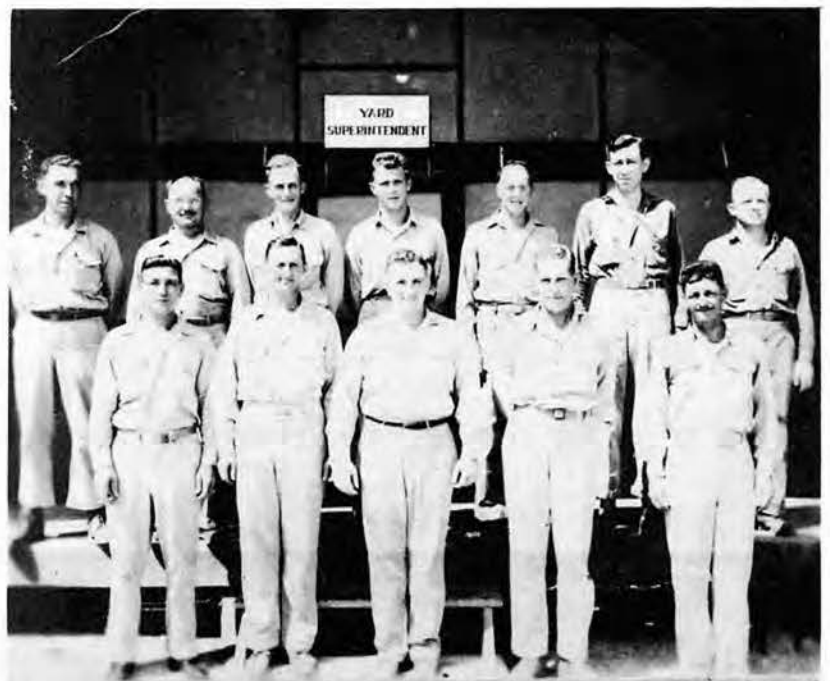

Help Wanted . . .

Early in May, the small band of men engaged in the gigantic task of moving mountains of stock was strengthened by sixty men and chiefs drafted from Seabee units on the island. Then followed experiments in manpower. In June two hundred Negroes, stevedores from the Twenty-first Special Seabee Battalion, were loaned to ABCD. The arrangement had many shortcomings and these men were replaced within three weeks by a Navy base work company of two hundred-fifty other colored laborers fresh from the States, and still the arrangement wasn't satisfactory. They remained, however, until September 26, when the U.S.S. General Mark L. Hershey dropped anchor in Seadler Harbor with Casual Draft 2424 aboard. By now the depot was functioning rather smoothly although still painfully lacking in warehouse and outdoor storage space.

An Annex is Born . . .

Late in May it was found necessary to send Lieutenant Mennis and Chief Storekeeper Herbert F. Carroll, one of the original eight chiefs, across the lagoon to Los Negros to establish a yard to relieve the bottleneck of congestion at Salesia Plantation. This ABCD annex also answered the purpose of supplying materials for urgently needed Seabee projects on Los Negros. In mid-June these men were relieved by Lieutenant Andrew M. Newman, borrowed from the Seventy-first Seabees, where he had been acting Executive Officer of that unit on Pitiyulu Island. He was assigned to ABCD as officer-in-charge of the new Annex.



"When I went to Los Negros," said Lieutenant Newman, "I found that thousands of tons of materials had been hastily lightered ashore on landing craft. This was not surprising since the critical transportation problems which accompany any war could be solved in part by emptying the ships' holds as rapidly as possible. It was our job to receive and store the stuff in a hurry." The Annex was assigned a Naval base work company of two hundred-fifty Negroes to tackle the big job that lay ahead. "We did have a site where clearing the coconut trees and jungle undergrowth progressed easily enough," continued the Lieutenant, "but we were compelled to operate in receiving and routing materials to the many projects in course of construction, while the yard was being built."



The Annex problems were similar to those the parent unit on Manus was undergoing. Late in December, having fulfilled its purpose, the branch yard folded, the remaining stores were shipped over to Salesia Beach, and Lieutenant Newman, with a record of having lived up to "can do" under great handicaps, returned to his own organization which in the meantime had moved up to the Philippine area.



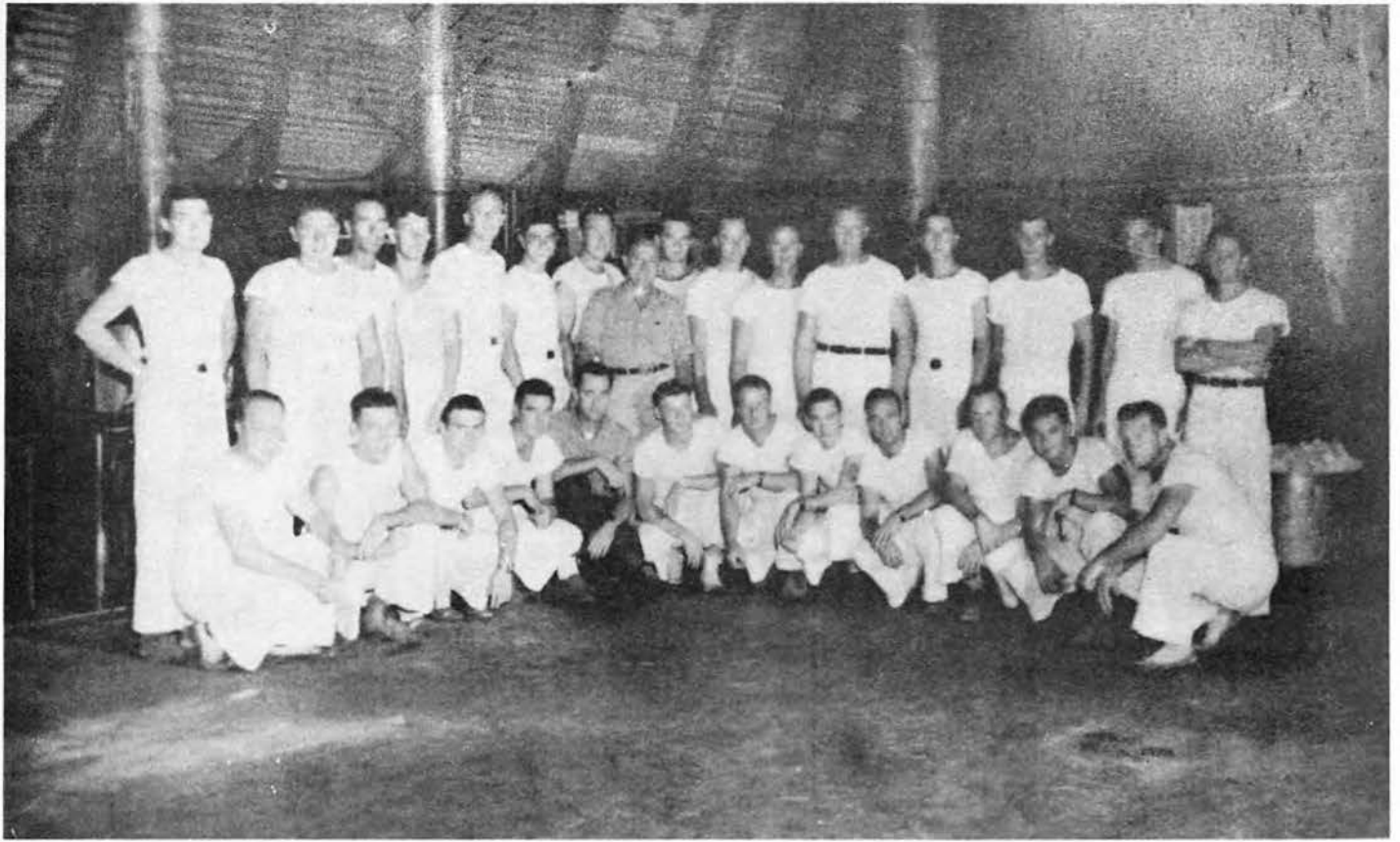

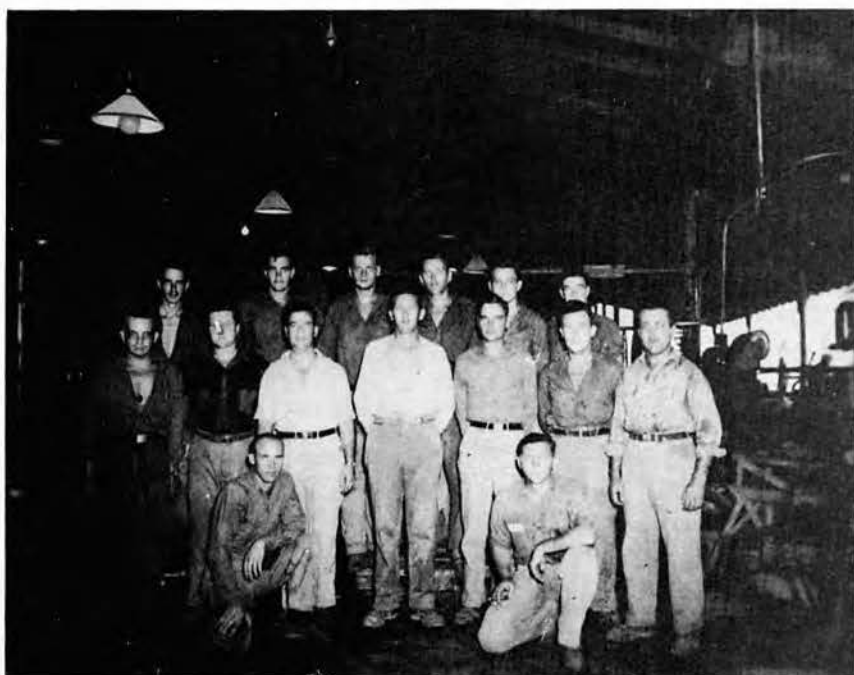

We Became of Age . . .

The month of December, 1944, found ABCD operating smoothly with eighteen warehouses bulging with huge deposits of materials and with outdoor plots overflowing. The depot was now at its zenith as an efficient construction supply unit, receiving, storing, and shipping everything needed in building bases, from a keg of nails with a hammer to go with it, right on up through an inventory including cement, lumber, and piling; Quonset huts, mess halls, and warehouses; jeeps, trucks, tractors, and graders; cranes, generators, and "reefers," with the objective of being in a position to meet any demand made upon it. Orders were being filled to be flown or shipped, from the smallest article on ABCD's list of 5,370 different items on up to outfitting entire battalions at a single shipment. It was with a feeling of satisfaction that we viewed whole convoys of trucks, jeeps, and other rolling stock, pass out through Gate No. 1 on their way to Nabu or Murzin docks where waiting cargo ships took the load aboard. When arriving cargo needed to be unloaded quickly—and things did always have to move fast—truck drivers, crane crews, checkers, and warehousemen sweated and worked long hours until the

Manpower Problems Arise . . .

Having drafted a sizable number of men from construction battalions on the island earlier in its operations, ABCD was under a constant threat of having to pay back, rating for rating, the men received. On December 2, three battalions, under orders to move on up, dipped into the depot's muster and claimed one hundred-three of our men. This affected every department, especially yard operations, and necessitated a certain amount of reorganization, but ABCD was equal to the demand and kept receiving, storing, and shipping huge stocks of materials without letup. It was fully two months before Stateside and receiving ship allotments of men replaced the workers the man-thirsty battalions had taken from the depot. Lieutenant Commander Thrapp re-joined our organization in mid-November, 1944, with his original assignment as officer-in-charge. Associated with him as executive officer was Lieutenant William W. Olmstead, and their command included fifteen fellow officers, about forty chief petty officers, and nearly six hundred-fifty men of lesser ratings.

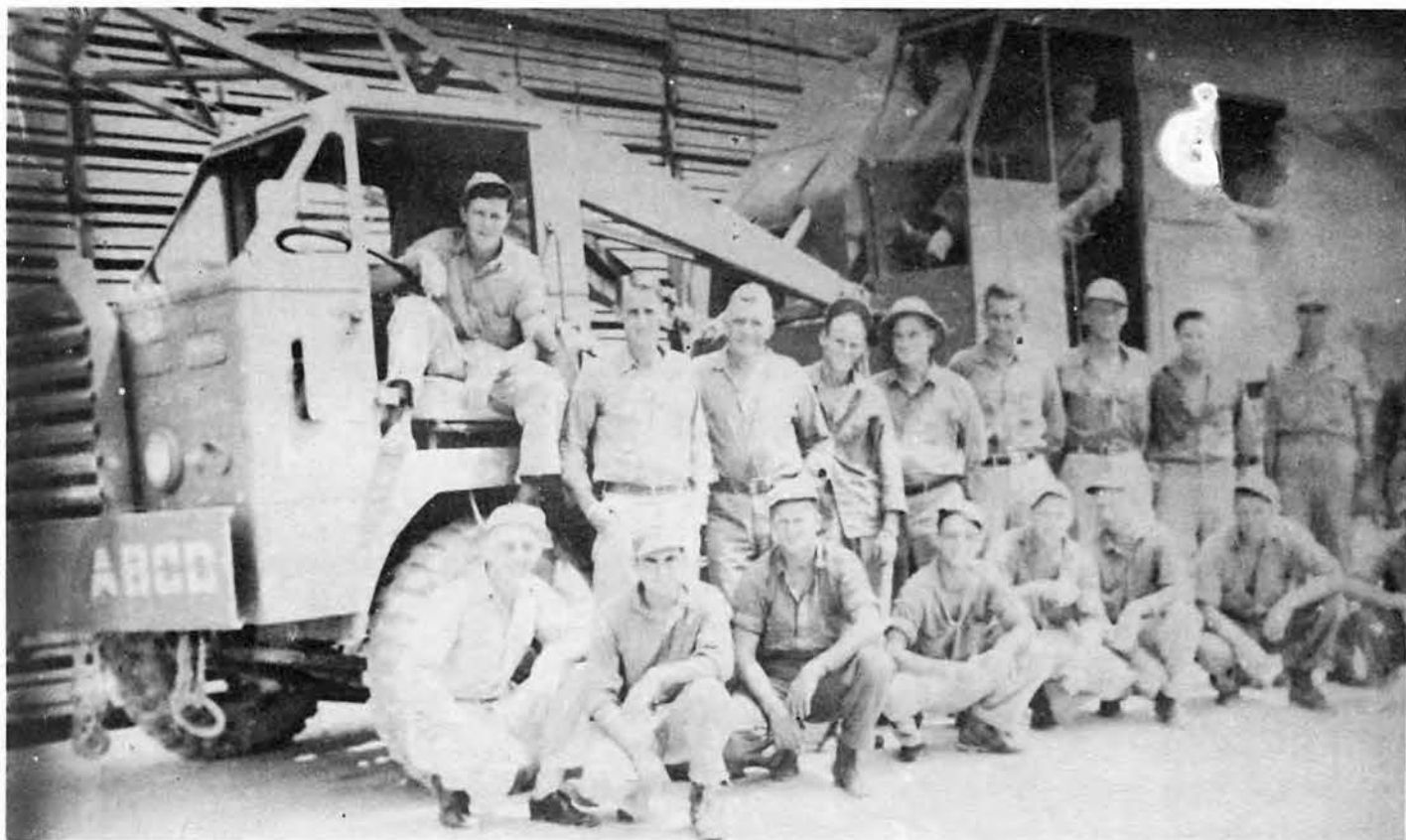

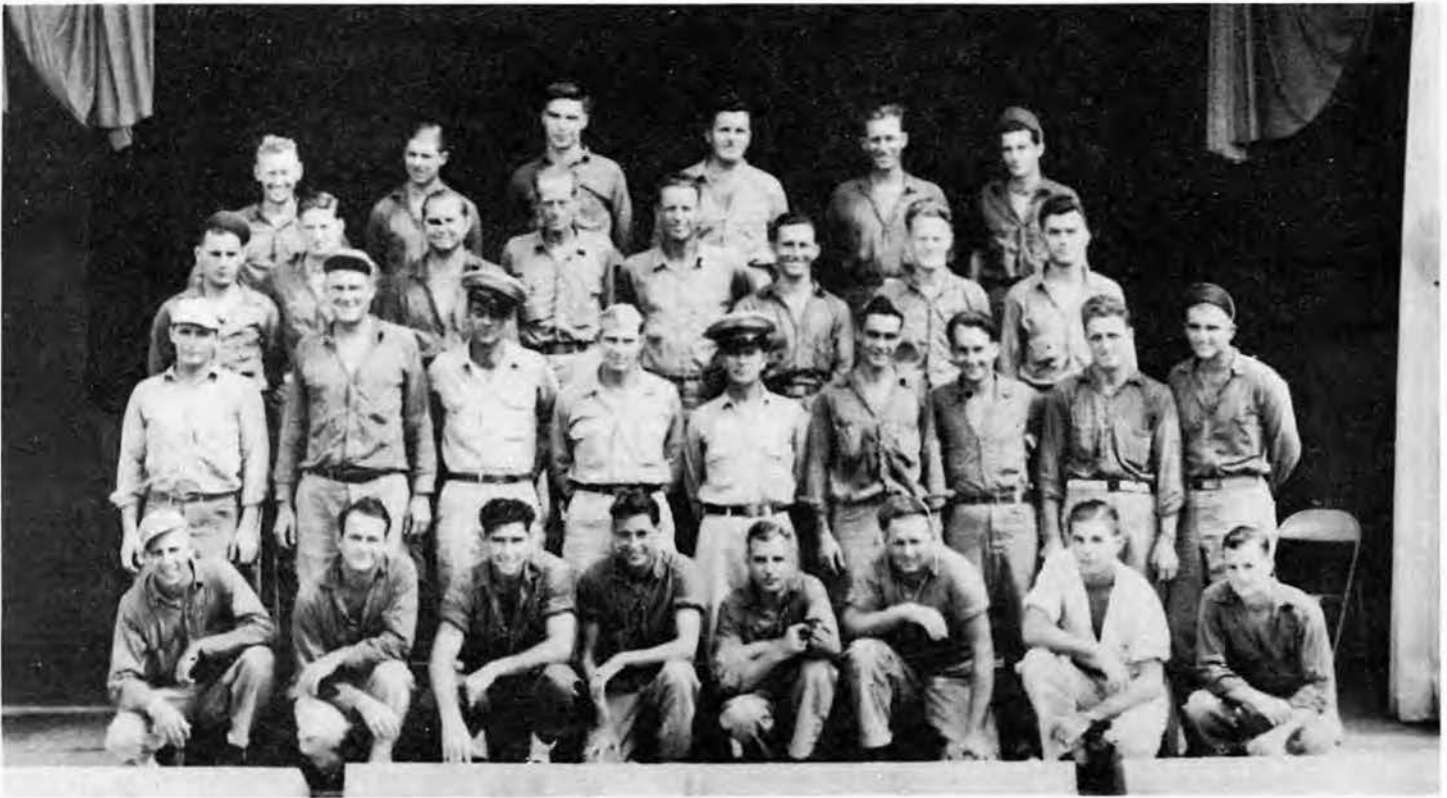

Yard Operations is Largest Department . . .

As yard superintendent Lieutenant Mennis headed the largest and most complex of all ABCD's departments. His was the task of supervising the storage and movement in and out of the yard, everything stocked by the depot. Three assistant yard superintendents, a transportation and heavy equipment officer and over four hundred-fifty enlisted men worked under the Lieutenant's direction. Yard operations' personnel included warehousemen, checkers, crane crews, dozer men, truck drivers, and beachmasters. The transportation division covered a broad field of operations with a rigging loft for heavy equipment and waterfront activities; a machine, welding, and blacksmith shop, capable of making needed repairs and when necessary, turning out any spare parts not stocked on the island; a garage, grease rack, and tire shop; and a parts room for heavy equipment and automotive repairs. Rolling stock and heavy equipment overflowed allotted clearings and jeeps, trucks, graders, carry-alls, dozers, cranes, and powered shovels were parked along roadways in the yard and outlying areas. Every piece of this new equipment had to be serviced while in the custody of ABCD before orders were filled. At one period early in 1945, approximately twenty-five hundred pieces of this material were stored in and around the depot and every item needed a certain amount of checking over before being sent out. A fleet of ABCD trucks working twenty-four hours daily moved materials received or shipped from our jetties. Cargo from the docks and LST beaches, or cargo taken to ships from our yard was handled by outside stevedore battalions. Quietly and efficiently yard operations worked around the clock, a perpetual beehive of activity.

WHITE COLLAR DIVISION IMPORTANT TOO

Allied to yard operations was Lieutenant Stamm's inventory and materials' office. He had the job of keeping ABCD stock piles at a safe level through requisitions to fleet headquarters, regardless of demands made upon the yard for every type of materials. He supervised the issuing of all materials to advance Seabee units and was assisted by Lieutenant Boyden who authorized the supplying of materials for local construction needs. Practically all the paper work relative to ABCD's huge inventory was handled in Lieutenant Stamm's office.

WE ALSO BUILD

Lieutenant Fleming as construction officer had many projects under way in the yard and in our camp area. Seabee carpenters, electricians, plumbers, and painters buzzed everywhere and left creditable evidences of their activities in their wake. Drawing upon his civilian experience as a bridge builder, Lieutenant Fleming supervised the construction of our "Brooklyn Bridge" spanning Tie-et River. A hobby shop, "rec" hall, and beer garden made their appearance, and the final building triumph was our new theatre. A Pathe newsreel and Warner Brothers' "The Very Thought of You" gave us the first movies. In the following months many USO troupers, in addition to nightly movies and local talent, periodically staged clever live shows for our entertainment. No longer was it necessary for us to thumb rides to the hospital area or down to the main base to enjoy an evening of morale uplift.

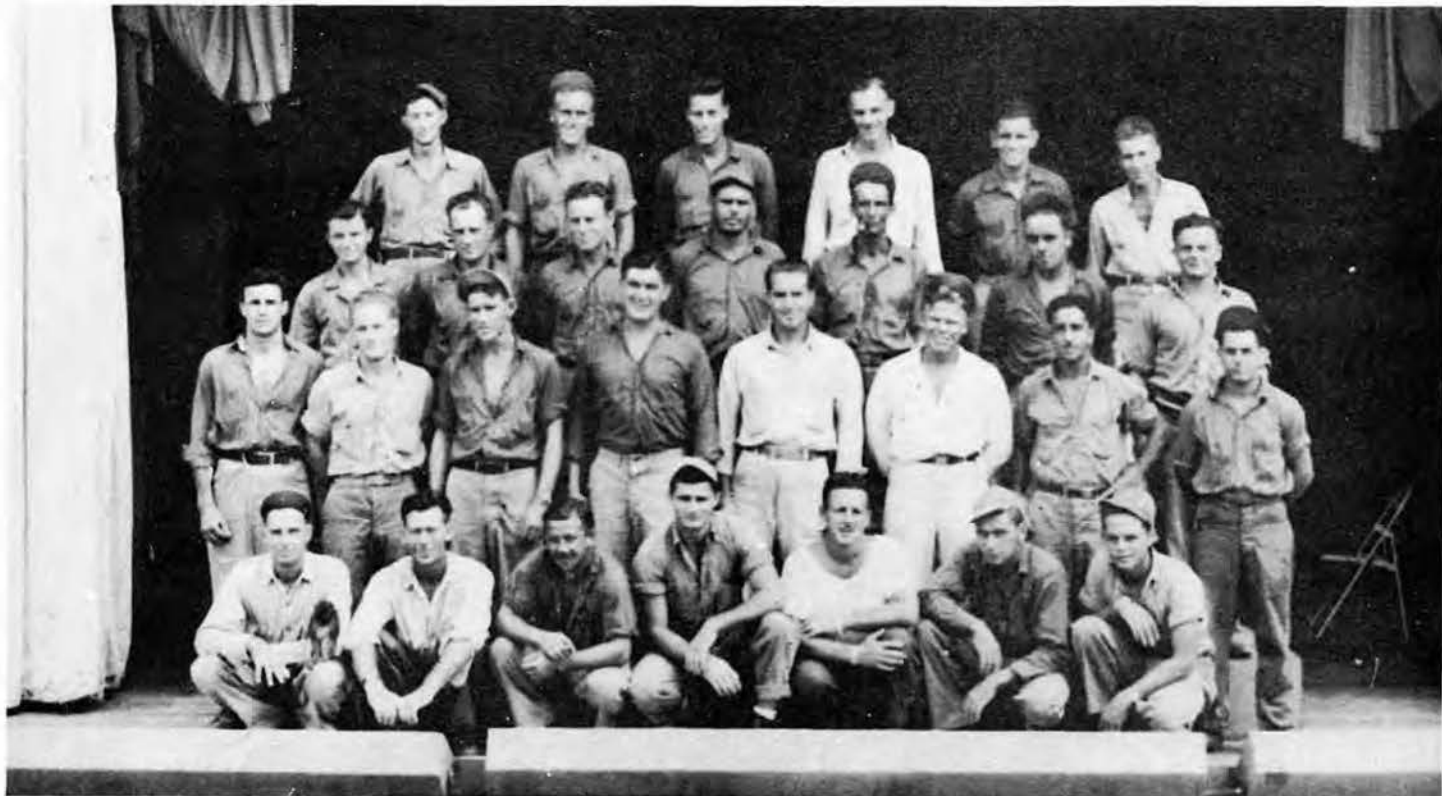
WE CONTRIBUTE A FEW INVADERS

In the Philippines the enemy lost Leyte, Samar, and Mindoro in the last three months of 1944. January 9, 1945, was D-Day for Luzon and ABCD was called upon for skilled crane men and mechanics to accompany the invasion forces and handle ammunition and supplies on the beach. Fifteen of our men were assigned to this mission. In recounting their experiences, chief machinists' mate Lewis W. Barco, who was in charge of the draft, said: "We left Manus with our men and cranes scattered throughout our slow-moving convoy on seven different ships. I was aboard the U.S.S. Zeilen, an assault transport, the former President Jackson. It took us nine days to reach Luzon and on the way we saw one of our destroyers bag an enemy sub attempting to attack our ships. When we arrived at Lingayen Gulf we went in with the first wave of landing troops on D-Day plus two."

INVADERS UNDER FIRE

"All the time we were working there was continuous gunfire a short distance back from our beach," continued the Chief. "One of our destroyers just off shore kept up a steady bombardment at enemy gun emplacements further inland, firing nearly directly over our heads. Enemy guns concealed in a low range of mountains in back of the beach adjoining ours, found the range and shelled that part of the beach so heavily the work party had to suspend unloading operations temporarily. The guns were finally silenced, however, and the men returned to their unloading jobs. We had a deadline of three days in which to unload the ammunition and supplies, and did the job in thirty hours." While in Lingayen Gulf the Zeilen took aboard about sixty wounded men from a destroyer which had been bombed.

"As our convoy left the battle area," said Chief Barco, "an enemy plane crashed our ship with a surprise attack. Eleven men were killed, three were missing, and thirty-five were wounded. The men killed were buried at sea and there were now about one hundred men in sick bay. Although neither the plane nor its bomb exploded, it did burst into flame. The fire was soon extinguished but several men were badly burned and the ship was seriously damaged where the plane struck."

INVASION MEN RETURN

After the crash, the Zeilen, escorted by a single destroyer, pulled out of the convoy and headed for Manus with seven ABCD men aboard. The other eight men were in other ships in the convoy and were taken to Leyte. From there they flew to Manus, arriving a few days after the men aboard the Zeilen had made port. Chief Barco and Chief Bosuns' Mate Homer J. Fidler were recommended for the Purple Heart for injuries received in the plane crash.

A CHANGE IN LEADERSHIP

The first few months of 1945 saw campaigns of rapid re-conquest in the Pacific war theatre to the Northwest of our base. With the Philippines as the new center of Naval activity, almost overnight our harbor lost the fleet together with large convoys of cargo ships. A new ABCD in the Philippines became a necessity as a supply depot for construction battalions in the new area. Lieutenant Commander Thrapp was chosen to direct this new unit and early in March he received his orders to report to Samar Island for duty. Our organization had reached a peak in smooth performance under his leadership and it was with a feeling of deep regret on the part of all hands that his transfer had been ordered. In his farewell statement he said in part: "I am grateful for the way you all have met our schedules and for the contribution each one of you has made in helping me maintain an efficient unit. I sincerely hope to see most of you again before very long." Lieutenant Olinstead, who up to that time had been our executive officer, succeeded Commander Thrapp and Lieutenant Fleming became our new executive officer.

LSTs AT OUR OWN BEACH

LST ships were a familiar sight in Seadler Harbor and were responsible for transporting countless tons of cargo to and from our base. For the first year of ABCD's operations these ships beached some two miles west of our yard. This necessitated long hauls to and from the loading point and to remedy this a special jetty was built out into the bay from the edge of our storage yard.

LST 993, only recently transferred from European waters where it had taken an exciting part in the Normandy and other invasions, was the first ship to use this new landing. In no time at all, materials from our yard and warehouses were trucked over the ramp, through the ship's yawning bow, and into the hold. Rolling stock, heavy equipment, Quonset huts, galley gear, and other miscellaneous cargo was ABCD's initial contribution to another invasion force then forming.

SOME PURPLE HEARTS AWARDED

On April 5, 1945, a brief, appropriate ceremony was held in our camp area for the purpose of presenting Purple Heart Medals to the men in ABCD who had been injured while participating in the Lingayen Gulf action on Luzon Island. In making the awards our commanding officer, Lieutenant Olmstead, gave the following address: "A Purple Heart Award is usually regarded as a purely personal decoration made to an individual. However, I know that I am expressing the desires of Chief Barco and Chief Fidler when I ask that these two awards be regarded as a tribute to all the men from this command who took part in the Lingayen Gulf Amphibious Operation."

Nearly thirty "old men" left ABCD in June when Navy policy permitted enlisted personnel, forty-two years of age and above, to apply for discharge. Then rumors began flying when nearly half our organization was assigned to NSD as stevedores, unloading food supplies from "reefer" ships berthed in familiar Seadler Harbor . . . Followed those few tense days when everyone wondered how the Depot was going to function with such limited personnel. Operate it did, however, as it always had—receiving, storing, and shipping its thousands of tons of materials to those many four-lettered code bases up ahead until one night late in June, 1945, following the newscast at the theatre, the Skipper stepped before the mike and said: "This is it, fellows, and it isn't scuttlebutt. We are moving up!" Advance Base Construction Depot had braved the monotony of a Southwest Pacific island for fourteen homesick months. The day had finally arrived. Farewell, Manus! It could have been so much worse

FRANCIS J. MURPHY

Francis ("Pop") J. Murphy, 46, second class machinists' mate, died peacefully in his sleep from a heart ailment, early on the morning of November 15, 1944. His home was at 221 Center avenue, Pitcairn, Pa., where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William S. Murphy, now live.

Murphy enlisted in the Navy in October, 1942. He had an overseas' tour of duty of sixteen months with the Forty-fifth Naval Construction Battalion in the Aleutians, and, after his Stateside leave was assigned to Casual Draft 2424, arriving in the Admiralties late in September, 1944.

"Pop," who worked in the ABCD garage battery shop, is best remembered by his ready wit and good-natured manner. An unusually pleasant personality was the outgrowth of his many years in vaudeville as a professional banjo player. His bunkmates never failed to enjoy his skillful playing on the violin he had brought overseas, or hearing the songs and music of his own composition.

Last rites for Francis Murphy were conducted by Father John C. Knott, Catholic Chaplain, on November 16, in St. John's by the Sea Lorengau Memorial Chapel. Military graveside rituals in Lorengau Allied Forces' Cemetery followed the Memorial Requiem Mass.

ARMAND V. SASSO

Armand V. Sasso, 19, first class seaman, whose sudden death from poisoning on February 19, 1945, came as a great shock to his many buddies in ABCD, was from New Haven, Conn., where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sasso, now reside. The Catholic Chaplain was in attendance at his bedside during his last moments.

Armand attended high school in New Haven prior to his enlistment in the Navy in April, 1944. His hobbies were, tinkering with midget racing cars and building and flying gas motored model aeroplanes. While with ABCD he proved himself to be an energetic and capable worker at his chosen skill of auto mechanic and earned the respect of his superiors and fellow mates at the garage where he was very popular and well-liked. His immediate superior, Chief Robert W. Williams, made the comment: "Armand was above reproach in every way and his passing is a real loss to the department; we all miss him greatly." An older brother, Ray, serving aboard a cargo vessel in the Naval armed guard, paid him a visit while in the Admiralties, only a few short weeks before Armand's death.

Quiet but impressive funeral services were conducted in St. John's by the Sea Lorengau Memorial Chapel February 20, under the supervision of Father Alexius T. Urban, USNR, a Catholic Chaplain. The Memorial Requiem Mass was followed by the customary graveside military honors in the Lorengau Allied Forces' Cemetery adjoining the chapel.

KENNETH E. DUVALL

Kenneth E. Duvall, coxwain, was twenty-two years of age when his untimely death was caused by an accident while he was on a swimming party April 25, 1945. He went on active duty in the Navy in October, 1942, and spent sixteen months in the Aleutians with the Thirty-eighth Naval Construction Battalion, prior to his assignment to ABCD at Manus. He worked as a rigger on a crane crew and made many friends by his quiet and unassuming manner.

Duvall's home was at 743 East 78th Street, Los Angeles, Calif., where his mother, Mrs. Bertha Lisowski, resides. A brother, Harry, serving aboard a mine sweeper, visited Kenneth while the former's ship was in Seeadler Harbor only a short time before Kenneth's death.

Lieutenant Joseph T. Howard, a Protestant chaplain, conducted the last rites on April 27, with eight of Kenneth Duvall's hut mates acting as pall bearers. Obsequies were held at St. John's by the Sea Lorengau Memorial Chapel and interment was made in the Allied Forces Cemetery Number Two, Finschafen, New Guinea.
