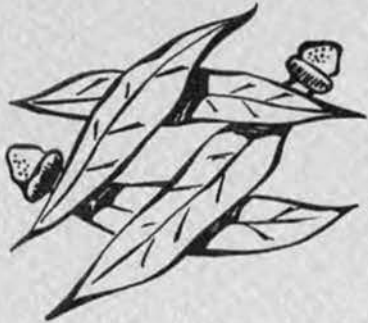
PREFACE

When a large group of men have been placed together to form a trained working unit, such as a Naval Construction Battalion, that group becomes a distinct character with an entity and a being. When over a thousand men train, eat, live, work and "gripe" together day after day for a year, a unity is developed that is little short of amazing in view of the many conflicts of personalities, natural rebellion against restrictions of personal rights and adjustments necessitated by privations from comforts of home and separation from loved ones.

Only a very serious and important cause, as a guiding and inspiring incentive, could bring about such a unit as the 92nd Battalion. However, that unit has passed the year mark in its formation and activities, and its men fully realize the serious importance of the task at hand. It has performed well the assignments thus far given it, and stands ready for whatever is to come in the future, anxious to get the job done. It has had good, sound guidance by a capable Commander, and its self discipline and incentive have given it an enviable reputation.

It is proper and desirable that the men of this unit be given the opportunity of reviewing the past year. The Battalion needs to pause and reflect on the many stages in its development and active life. The purpose of this year book is to present briefly such items as will depict the character of the 92nd Naval Construction Battalion.





In our Skipper, Commander Marvin Y. Neely, are found the characteristics and experience which particularly qualify him for the duty post at the helm of a construction battalion. He served two years in the Army during the First World War and, at the time of his discharge, held the rank of Cap-

tain in the Field Artillery. He started his Navy training at Camp Allen and was Detention Officer and Commander of Replacement Battalions in Camp Peary just prior to the assignment as our Commander.

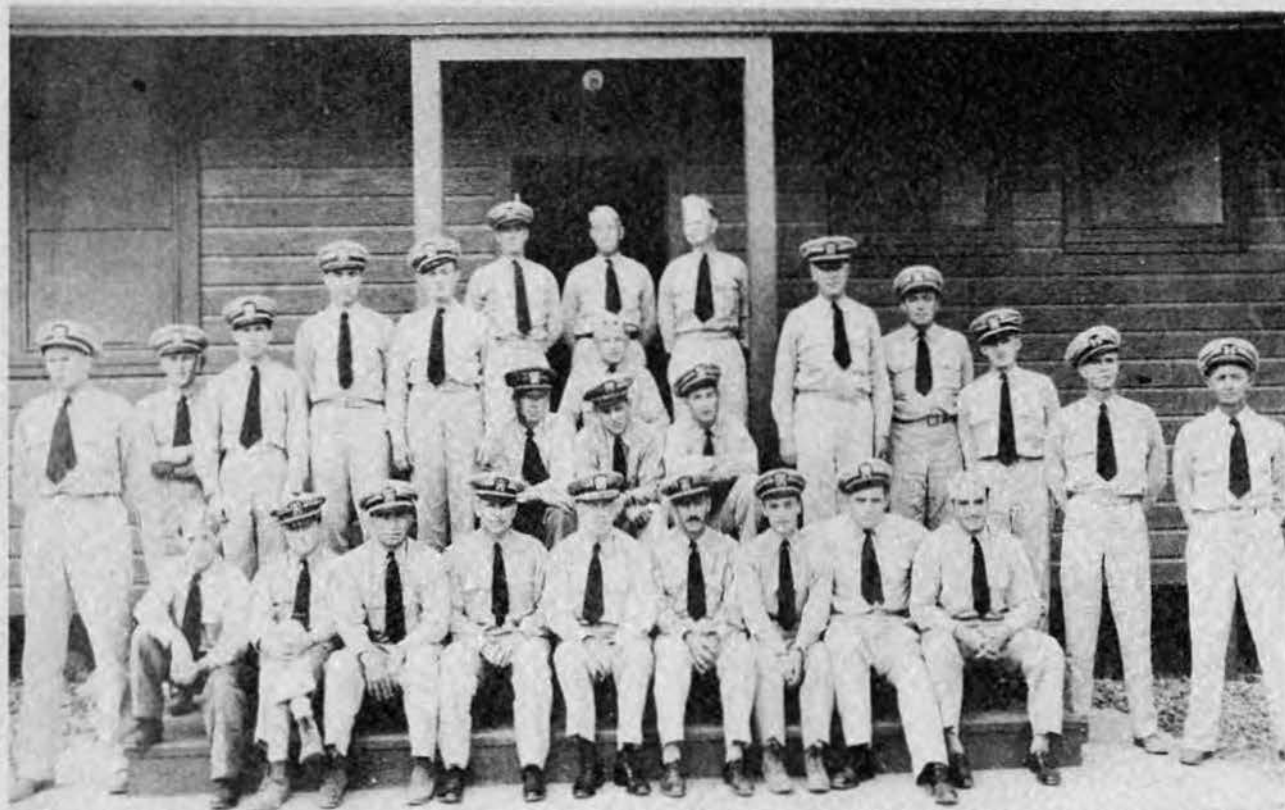
Continually changing as it is, we feel that the group shown here is a good representation of the fine official staff we have had during our first year.

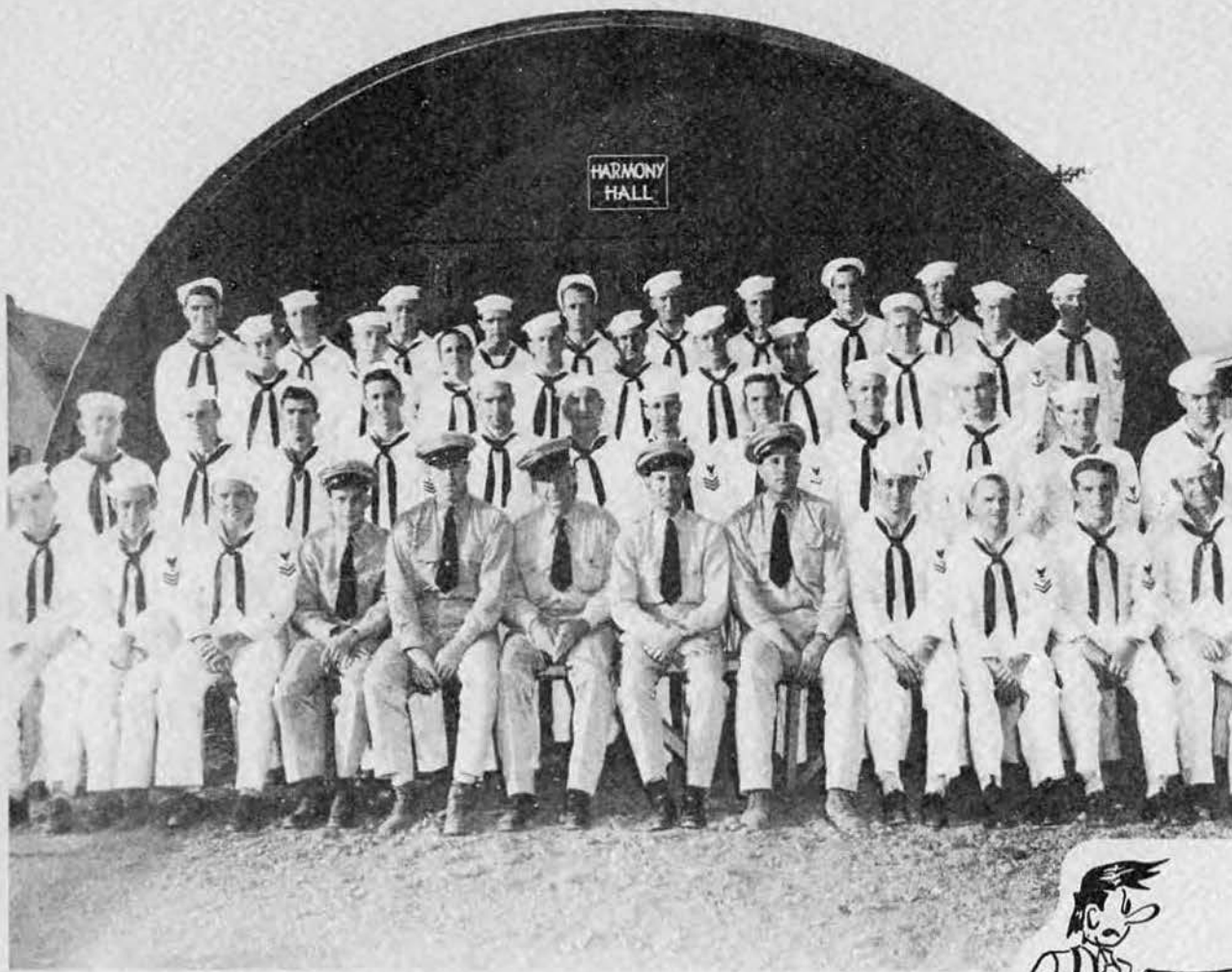

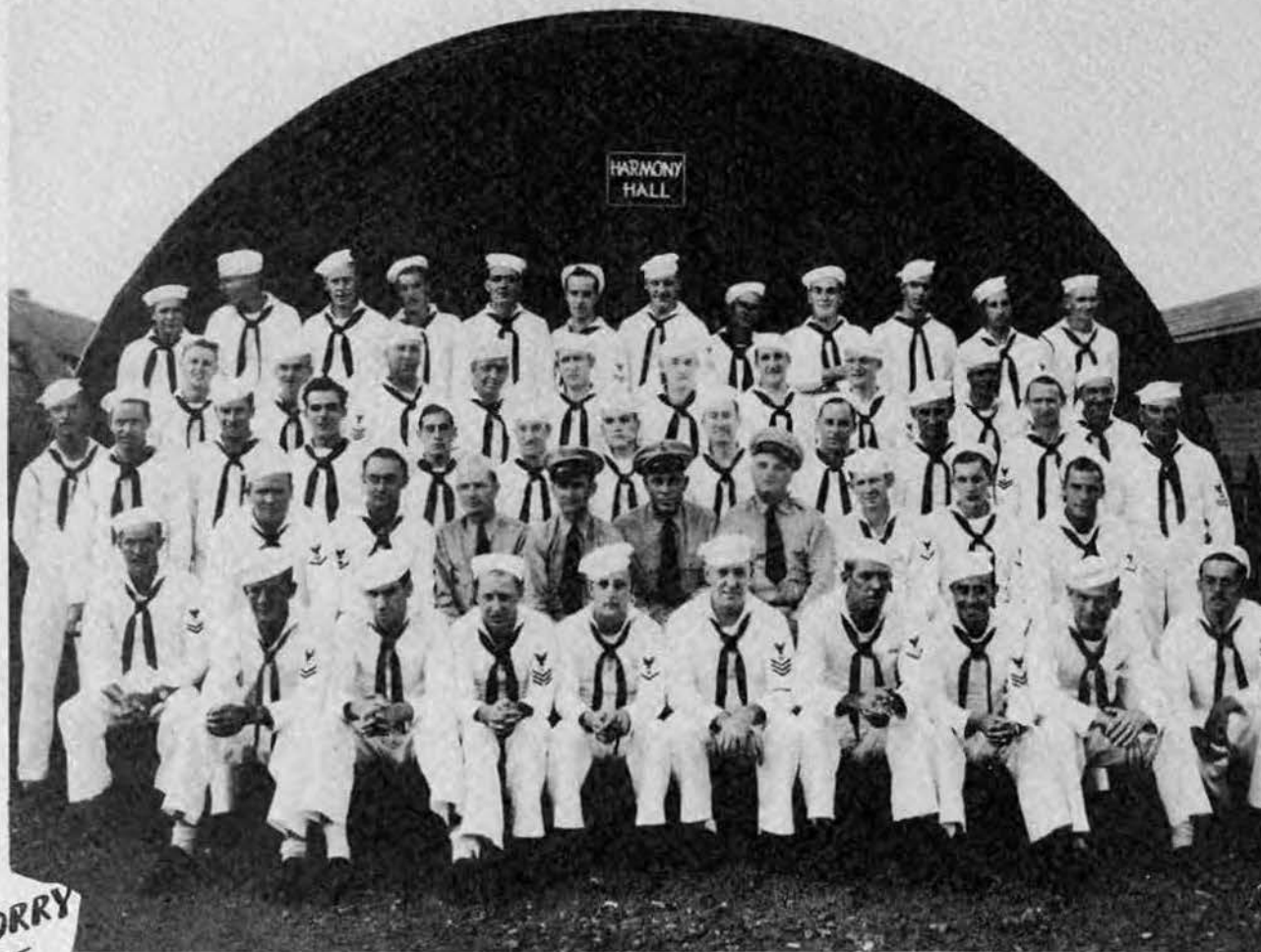

We suddenly realized that we had been in no hurry and that we had not accomplished everything we wanted to, but it was too late for we were in the Navy now!

Not many of us found it easy to fall asleep that last night home.

A million thoughts ran through our minds. "What would it be like? Will I be able to adjust myself to the new life? What about those I leave behind?

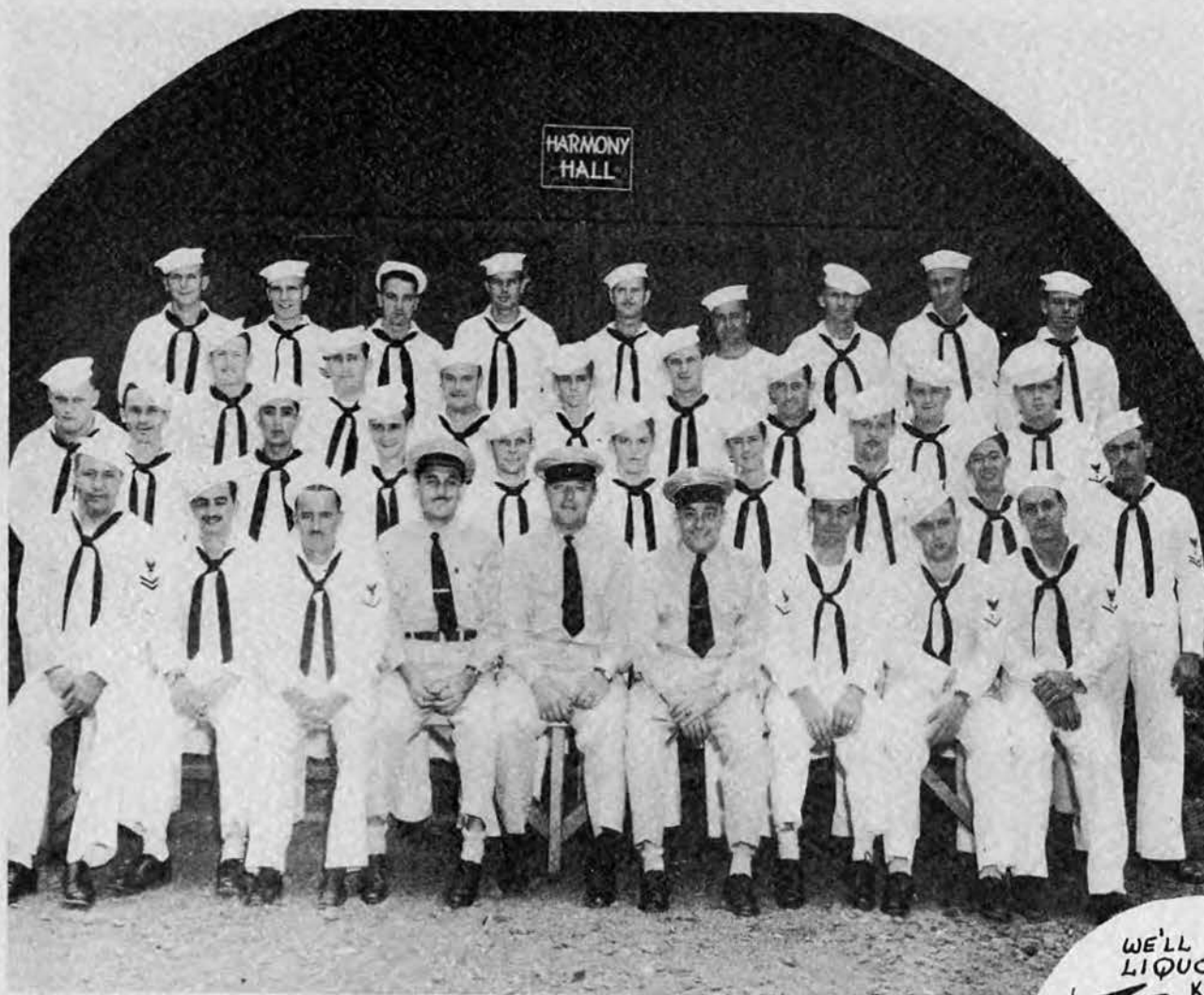
What lies ahead?" We all agreed that war was not one of man's pleasant pastimes, but the job had to be done and we were determined that it would not fail because of us.

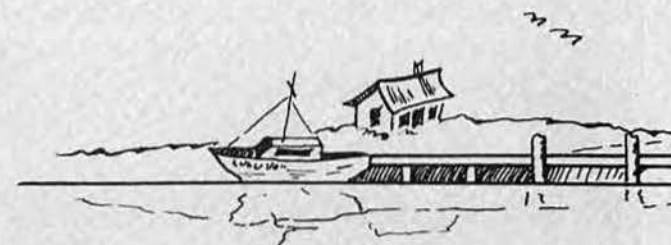
Is it true that they give you a square needle in the seat of your pants? No two answers were alike and we were more confused than ever. On the long train ride to camp we bolstered our waning courage with whatever liquid refreshments we could get our hands on, and when we reached our destination and a gruff voice queried, "Any of you guys have any liquor?" A chorus of voices answered, "Yeah, inside of us!" The Chief glared at us and for a minute we thought he was going to find out whether or not we had.

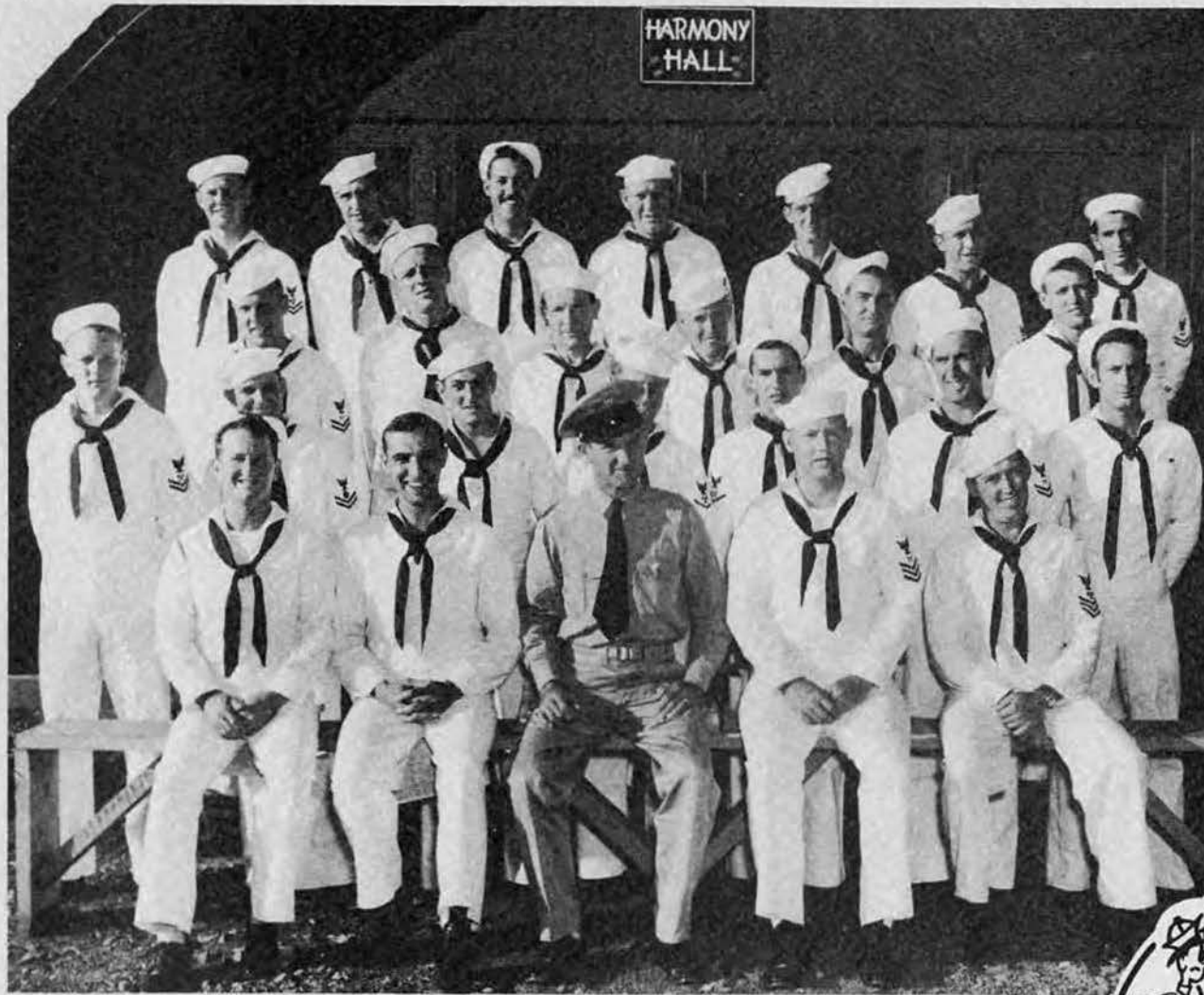
From every corner of the country men came to the great training station for Construction Battalions of the Navy, Camp Peary—the alma mater of many Sea-bees. The Ninety-Second Battalion was planned and formed long before most of us even heard of Peary. We came to give life and a healthy body to the Cause but we could not do this immediately. We had much to

learn during our "indoctrination", or "boot training" as the Navy calls it. What we call it would be censored. We never moved so fast in our lives as we did those first few days at Peary. Medical examinations, GI issues, GI haircut, a million papers to sign (we still don't know what most of them were), and muster, muster, muster! We met our "pusher" whose unenviable job was to take this raw, crude, bunch of recruits and mold them into a co-ordinated, military unit. We welcomed him as we would an oasis in the desert. He was a veteran — he had been

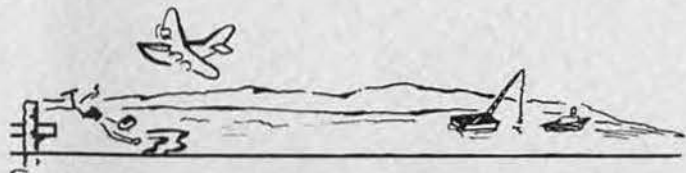




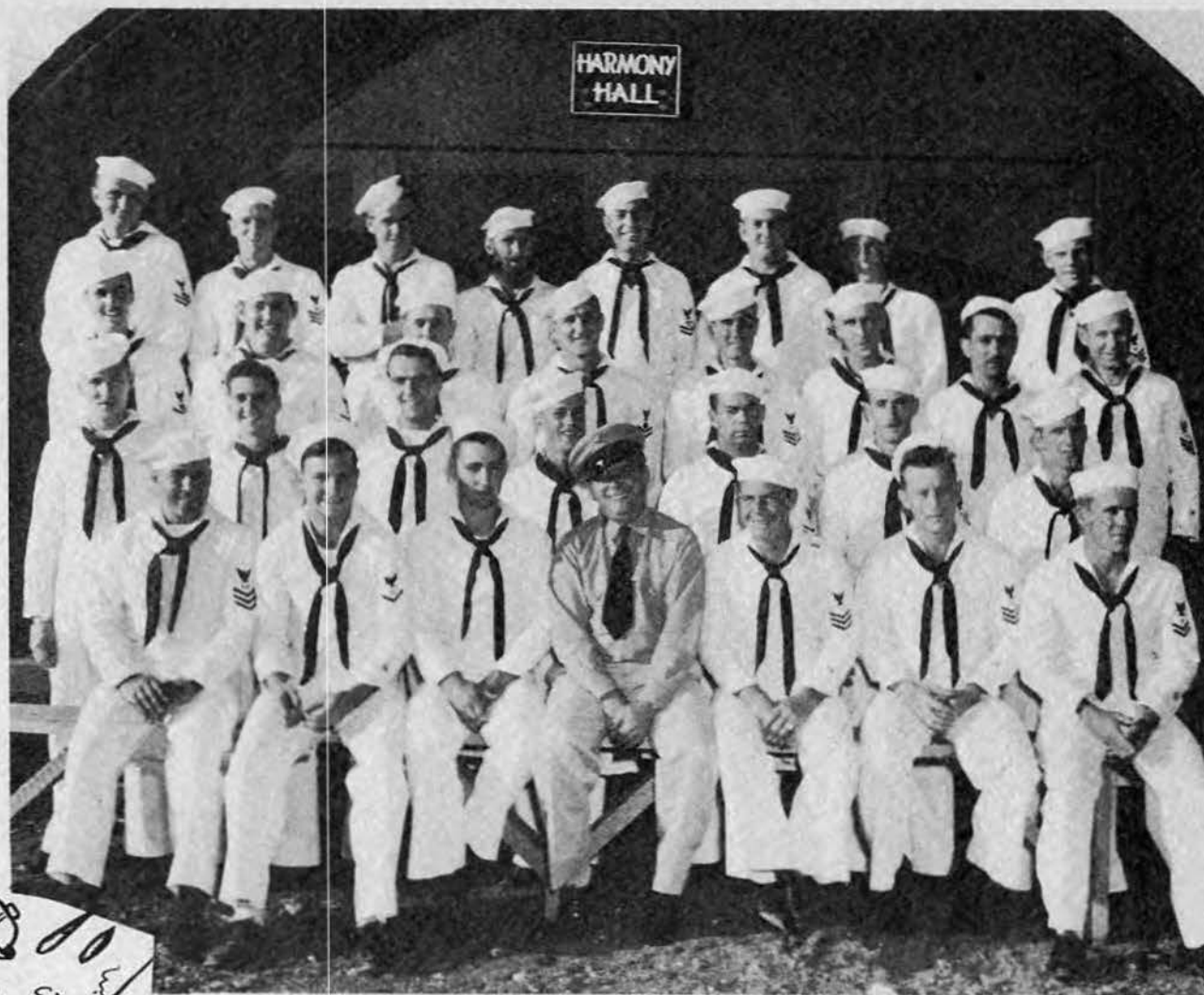

through it all and there were many questions we wanted answered. When do we get liberty? What about those shots? How about promotions? When do we get paid? These and countless other questions were fired at him in rapid succession. Our hearts sank down to our shoes (where fortunately there was plenty of extra space) when we were informed, "No liberty until your 'boot training' is over." It was a sad bunch that "hit the sack" those first nights in boot camp. Right face! Left face! Column right, March! It was sheer accident if two men moved in the same direction and such accidents seldom occurred.

It seemed hopeless and we were certain



that we would never be able to execute a military movement in unison. But drill we did, day in and day out, and, slowly but surely, we observed a seeming impossibility turn into an accomplished fact. We were slowly developing into the best physical condition we ever experienced. And we needed all the strength we could muster for the strenuous program arranged for us. Reveille at 0500. Why, that was always the middle of the night for most of us! Guard Duty — we'd just like to lay our hands on the guy that thought up that one! "K.P.", a duty at "pots and pans" until one's finger tips shriveled — we experienced the reason why veterans called out

derisively, "You'll be so-ahry," as we marched towards the chow halls for they well knew that we would soon have to work for what we ate. Thank the stars for the guy who invented lectures. At least they provided an opportunity for a few hours rest. The days passed by with drill, guard duty, "K.P.", and work such as the "Wainwright" details in the swamps of Peary (who will ever forget these details?). We were kept busy getting "indoctrinated" during the day and doing our washing, letter writing and other chores during the evenings. It was not long before it was announced that we were to play a



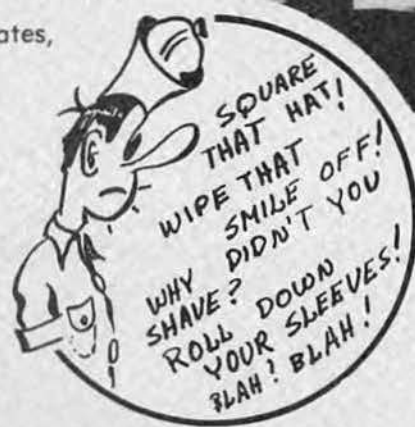
game called "bag inspection."

The game was to be played with an officer and a pusher on one side and the entire platoon on the other. It seemed to us, at the time, that the odds were overwhelmingly in our favor, but we were soon to learn differently. We grew slightly suspicious at the preliminaries when a chart was hung up which indicated how each article of clothing was to be rolled and its proper position on the bunk. The inspection soon confirmed our suspicions.

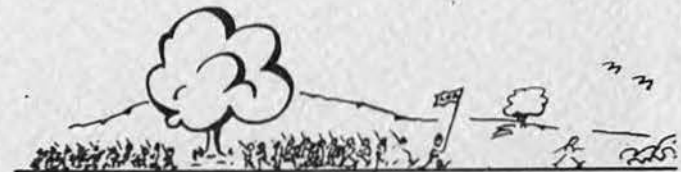
The last week of our "boot" finally rolled around and there was a note of excitement in the air. Dress uniforms were carefully adjusted and altered and we hesitatingly asked our mates,

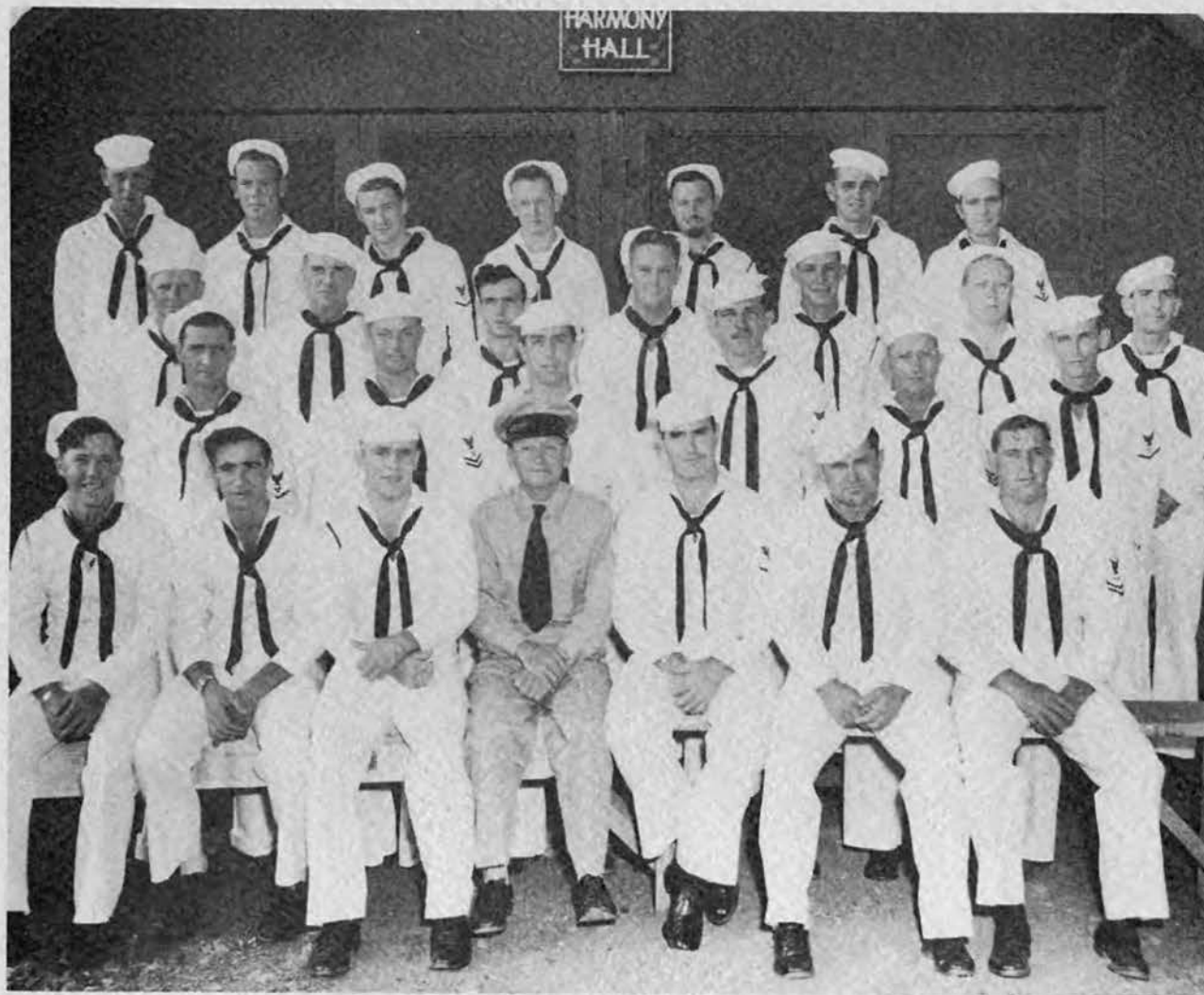
"How does it look?"

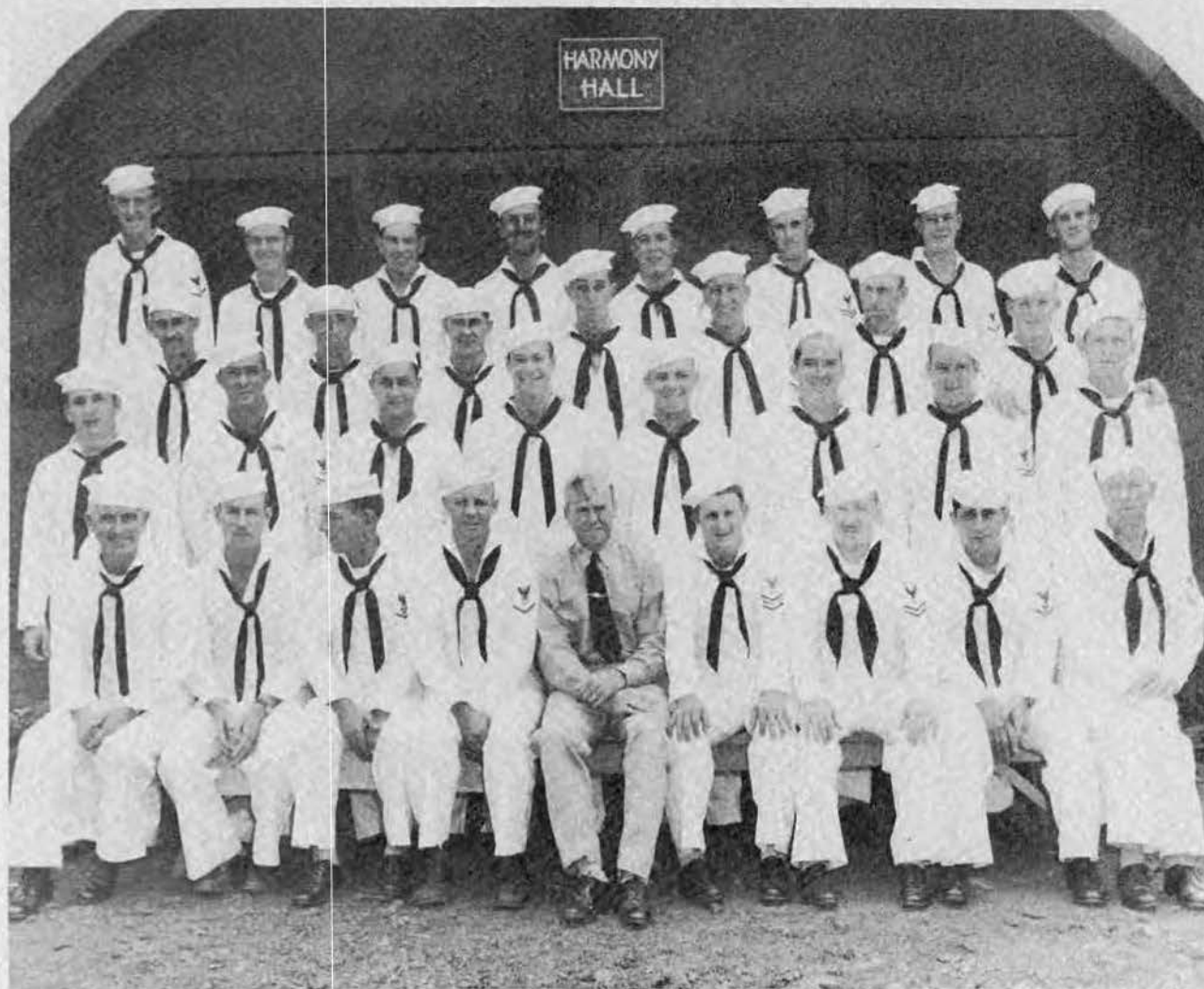

feeling proud of this uniform. That last week took a long time to pass, but pass it did and off we went on our first liberty. Most of us to Richmond and the rest to their nearby homes. We self-consciously strutted about in our brand new uniforms saluting everyone from a chief to a gaudily dressed apartment house doorman. We frantically tried to crowd a few weeks' activity into two short days and some of us darn near succeeded. Some tried to make Chicago on a 62 and this resulted in their receiving first hand knowledge of the proceedings of Captain's Mast. We reluctantly trod our way back to

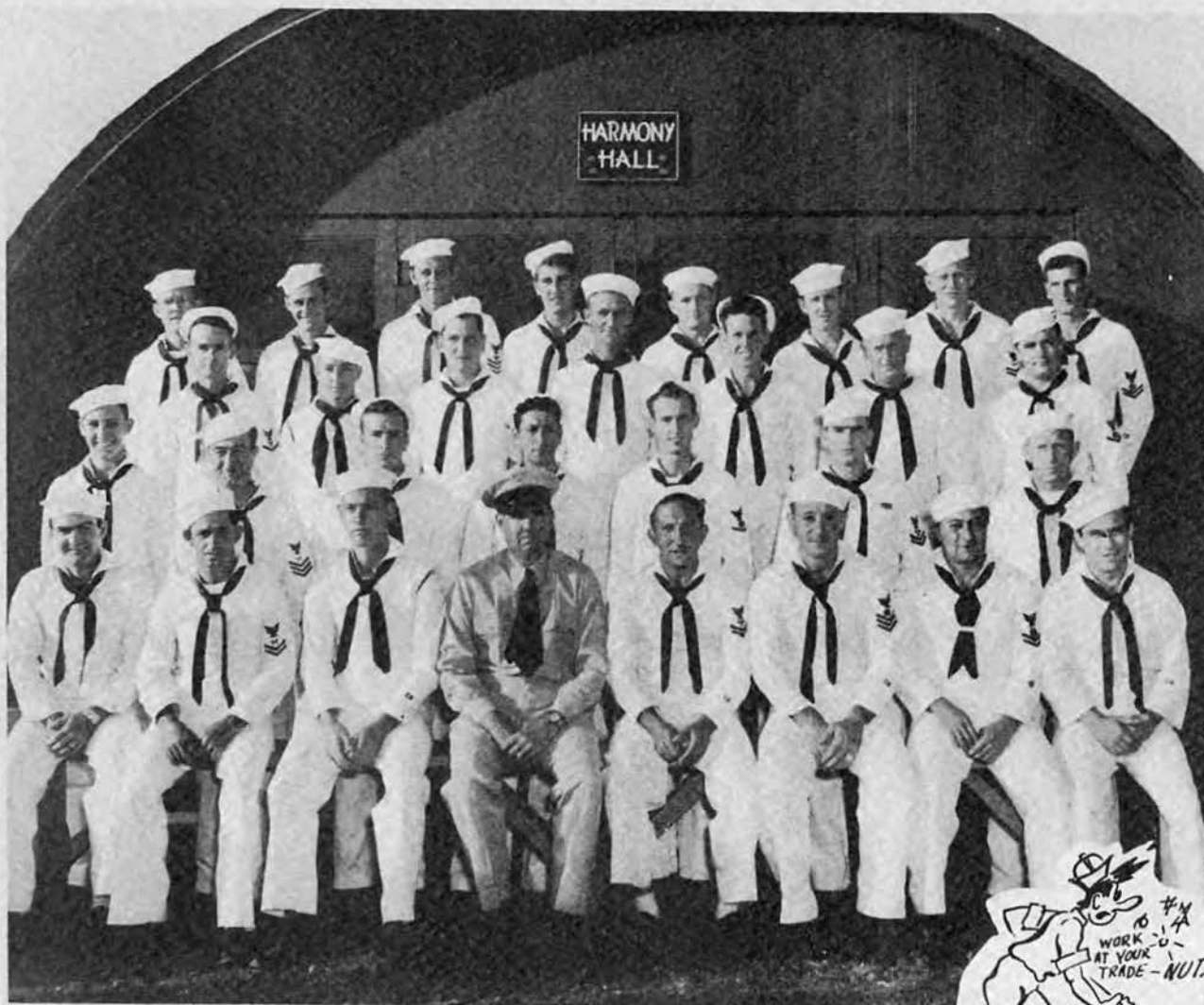


camp—that is, those of us who could; the rest straggled in. On Sunday, May 23, 1943, the main body of men arrived in Area A-5 to join the few earlier arrivals and the blueprint of the 92nd Battalion came to life. There came a period of temporary organization while awaiting the arrival of our Skipper. On May 31, 1943, Commander (then Lieutenant Commander) Marvin Y. Neely arrived to assume charge and the Battalion was ready to set sail as a unit. Scuttlebut flowed freely as to the location of our advance training base. Men who lived on the East Coast were hoping for an East Coast base, but they received no sym-

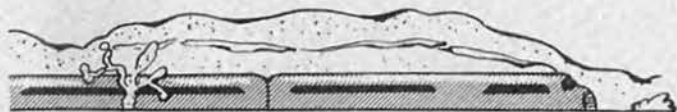

pathy from those who resided in the West. The mystery was soon solved when it was announced that we were to take our advance training at Camp Endicott, Davisville, Rhode Island. The Easterners were a happy bunch that day. The thoughts of frequent visits home was not hard to take and provided some pleasant dreams. But how were they to know that frequent liberties had no place in an intensive military training program?

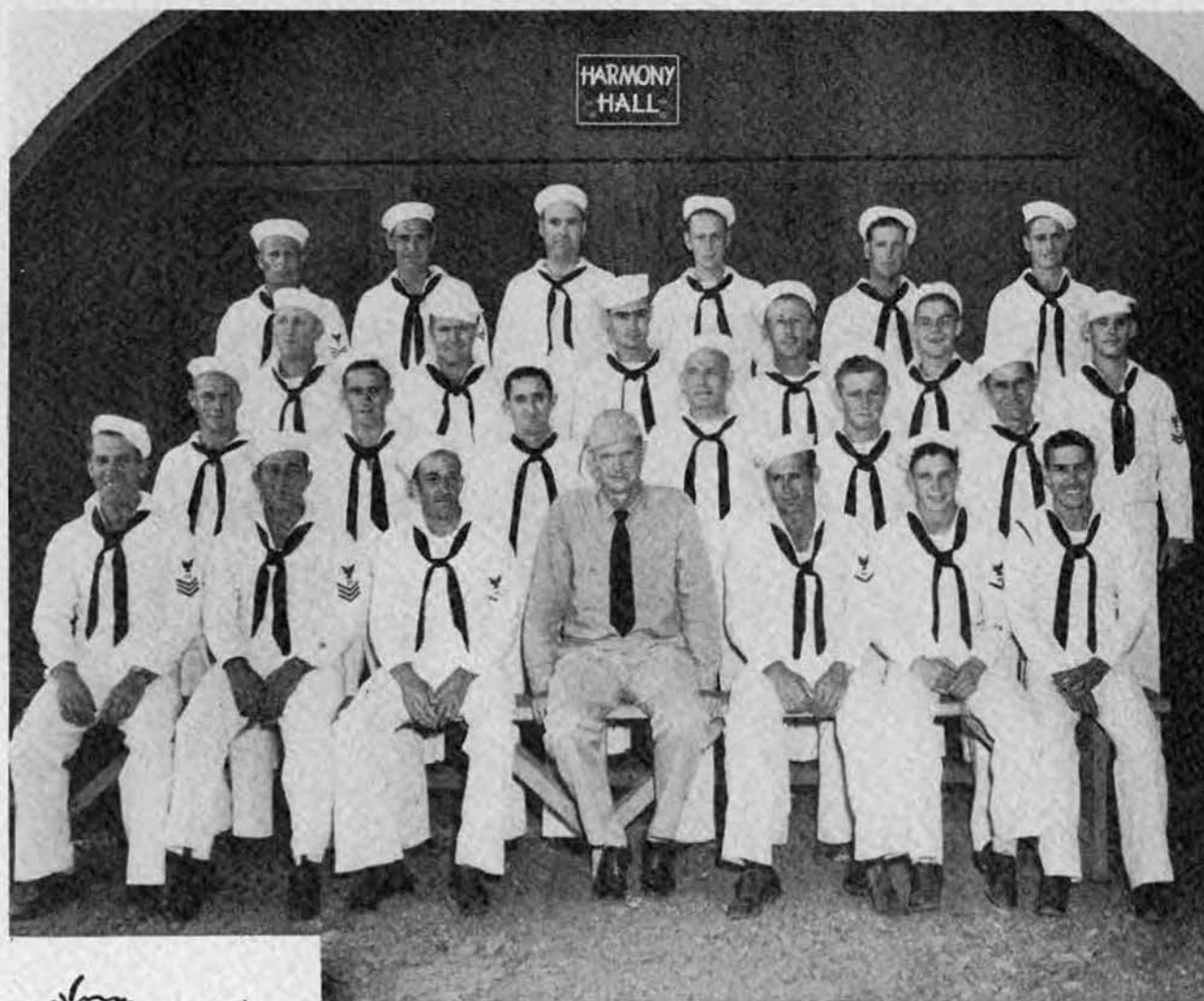
On the afternoon of June 2, 1943, we left the site of our boot training. We took with us a few pleasant memories but suspect that they look better in retrospect than they did in actuality. After seventeen weary hours, we arrived at Camp Endicott at 0710 on the morning of June 3rd. Our first favorable impressions were confirmed when we reached the area assigned to us. Airy barracks and paved streets; no more mud or dust. Lockers in which to keep our gear and a beer hall

and theatre nearby. We could hardly believe it! We had begun to think that we would have to forego those luxuries for the duration but here they were. The unfavorable liberty situation was the one sour note, but there was always the "hill."

Little time was lost before we plunged into our military training program. First aid courses, foxhole digging, obstacle courses, judo instructions — nothing was left undone that might be of some help to us if we should ever come face to face with the enemy. Some went to school in order to understand how to cope with the technical problems which might arise on Island "X".

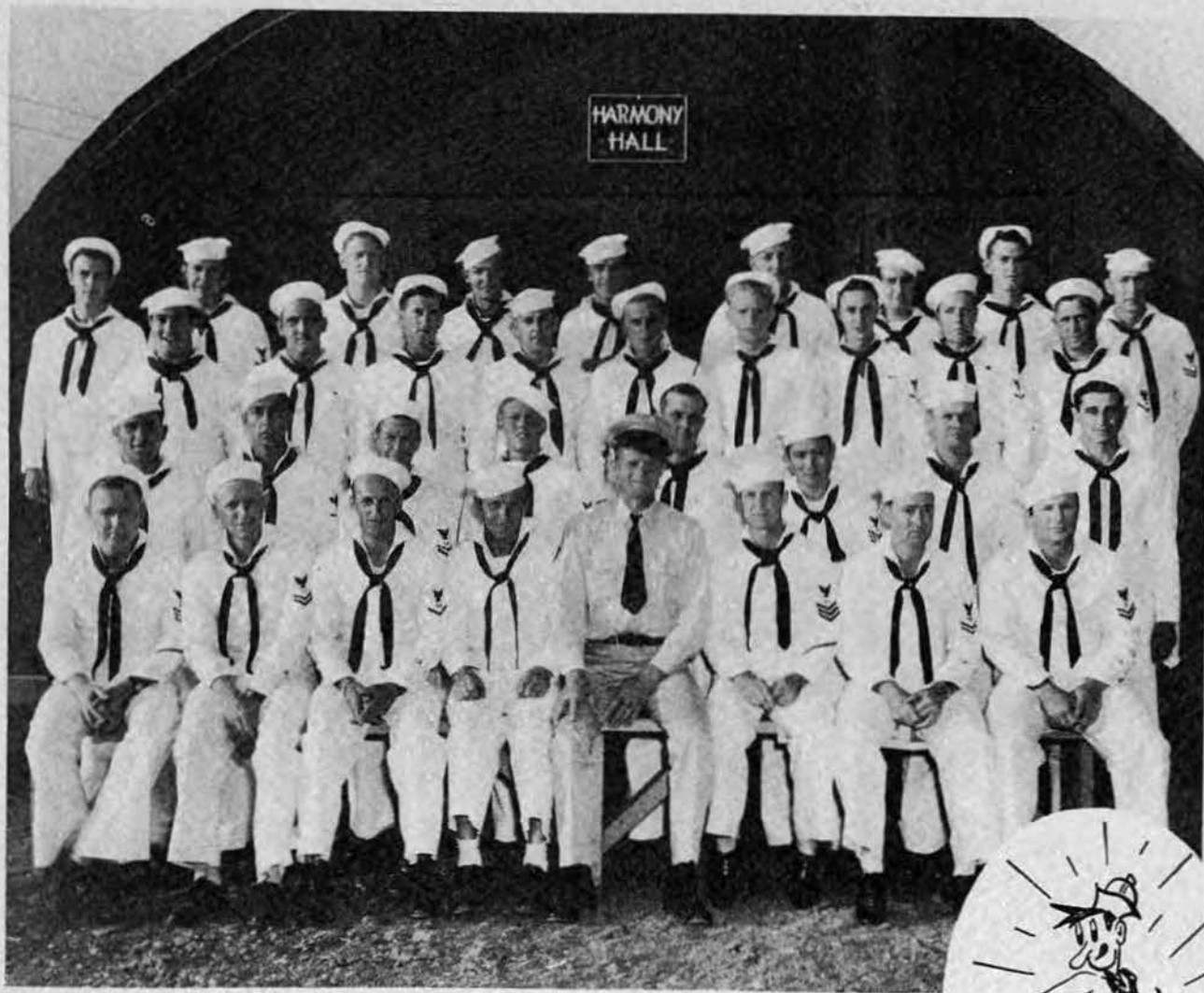
Every fourth day we had liberty and who will ever forget Providence, Boston or New York? Chaplain was the busiest officer on the Base listening to the many sad tales of woe presented by the men in their efforts to get a little extra liberty. For those of us who had our homes in the East,

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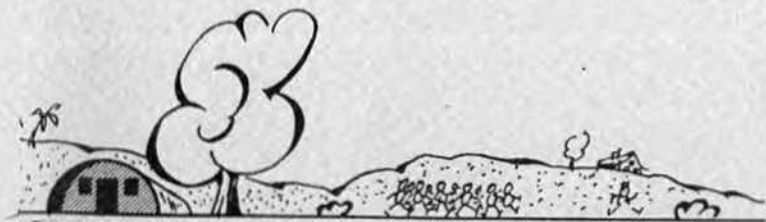

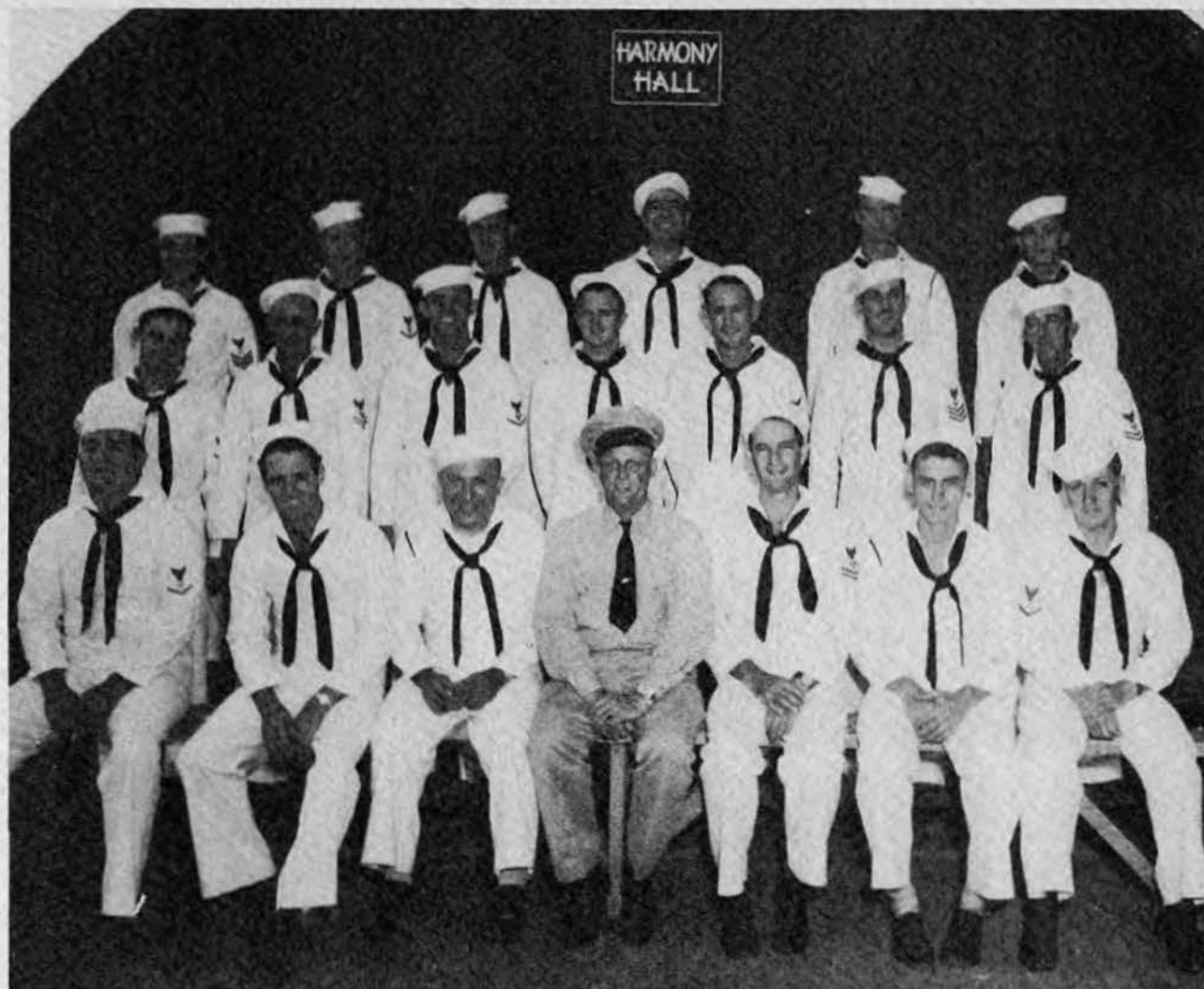


the prospect of our ten day embarkation leave which was scheduled to start on July 14 provided many a glowing thought; it was to be the pot of gold at the end of our training.

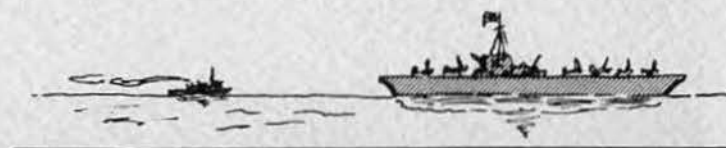
In the meantime we still had plenty to learn and, with no let-up, our intensive schedule was followed. We became better acquainted with each other and with our officers. Our stay at Camp Endicott was marked by many highlights. On June 12, 1943, in an impressive ceremony at the Parade Grounds, we were officially commissioned as a Battalion. Spic and span in our white dress uniforms we proudly marched in review before high ranking naval officers. Those who were fortunate enough to have members of their families among the guests were well aware that this was a day that would long remain in their memories. On June 19th, we packed our gear and prepared to spend a week on the

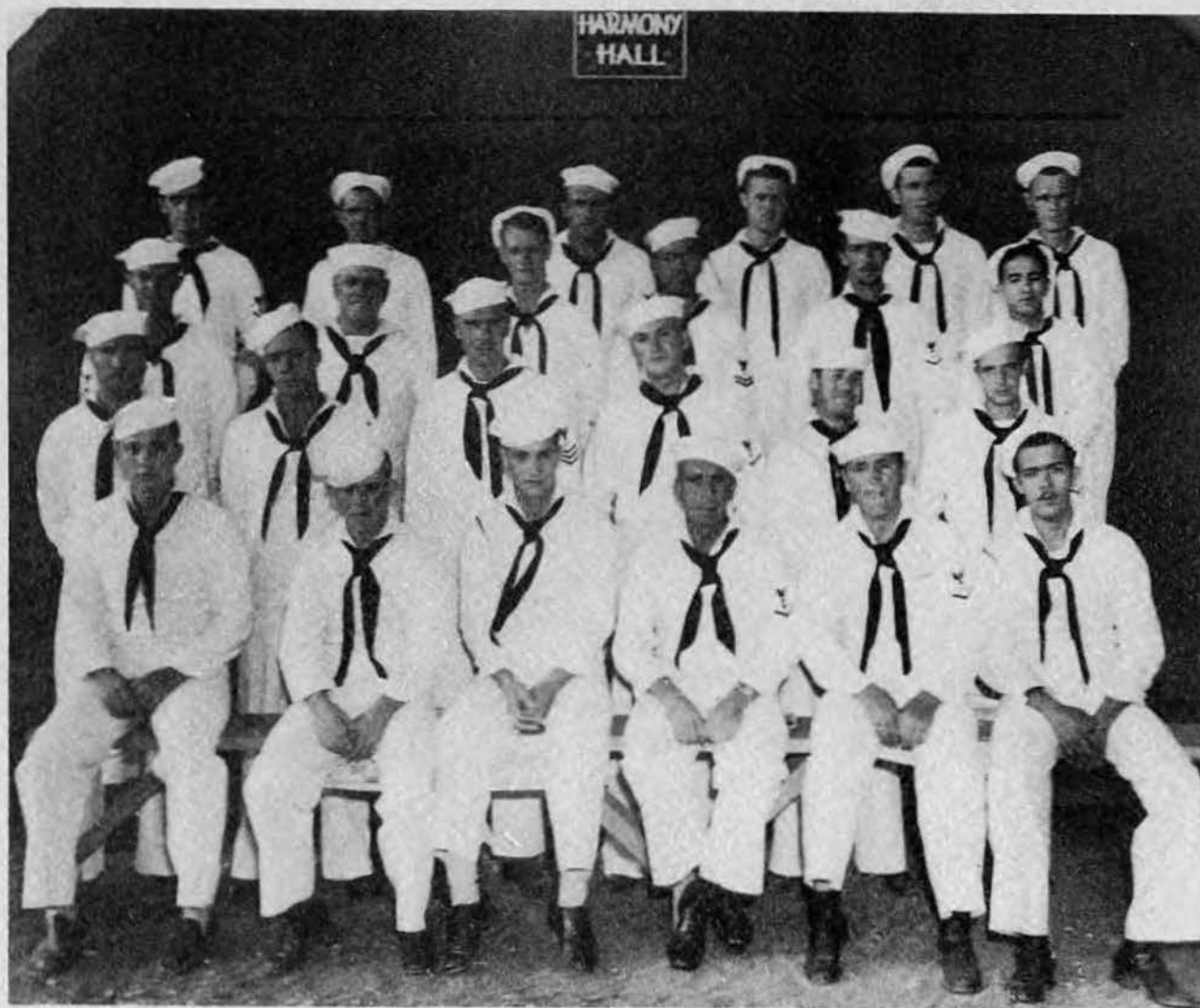
firing range at Sun Valley, Rhode Island. A five mile hike in the blistering sun and an announcement that there would be no liberty was a poor way to start a pleasant week, but the hike was soon forgotten and, with the discovery by the "liberty hounds" of a few well beaten paths, the liberty situation was solved. We settled down to the business of learning how to shoot and many who had never held a rifle proved inherent ability as marksmen.

Upon our return from Sun Valley, we resumed our training. Finally it came—our long awaited ten day leave! Transportation was arranged, gear was stowed away and last minute attempts to replenish weak pocketbooks by

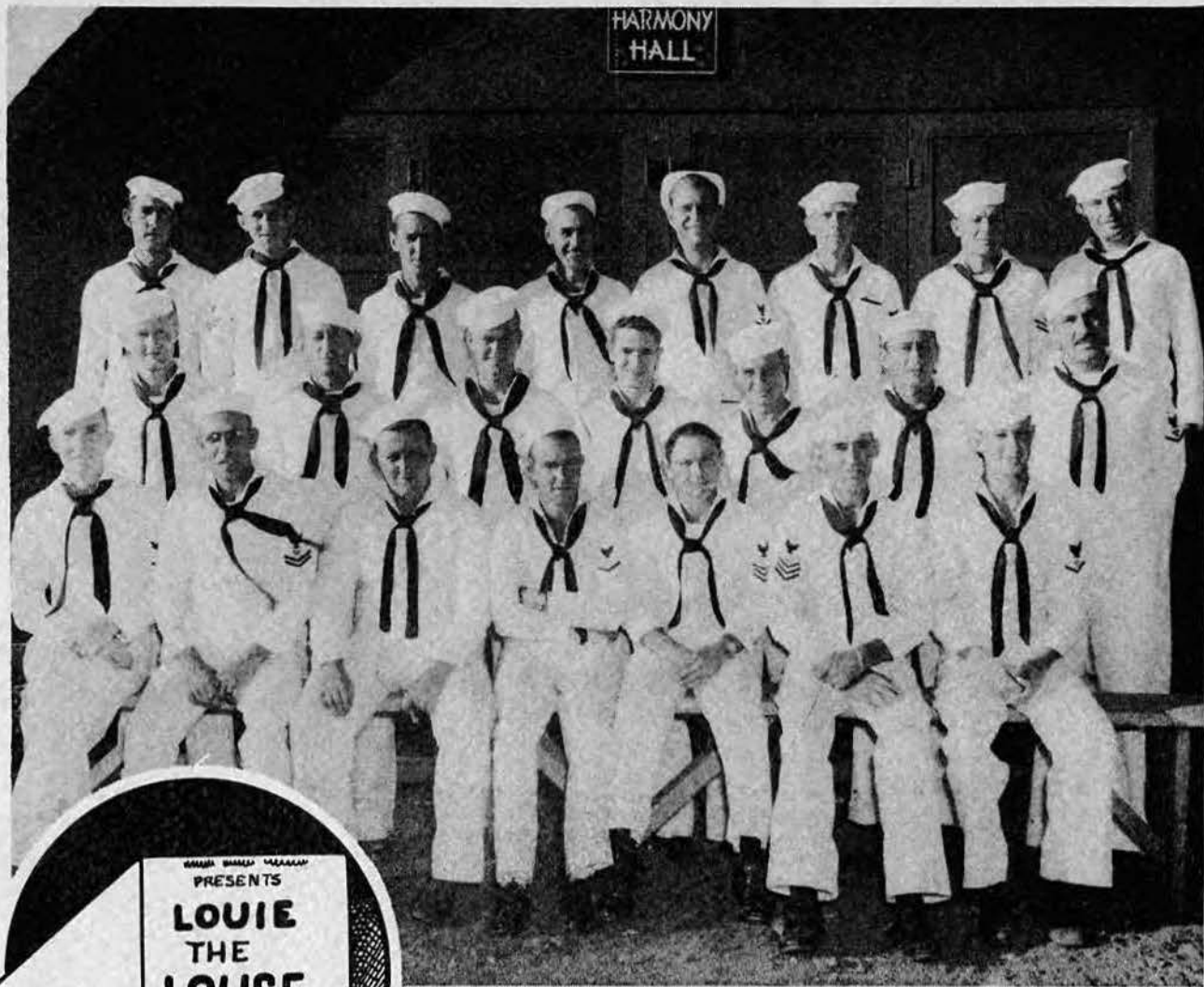

games of chance were made. With our leave papers in our hands and with an understanding sympathy for the "West Coast-ers", we took off for our homes with the avowed intent that these next ten days would not soon be forgotten. Thus ended our first period as a Battalion.

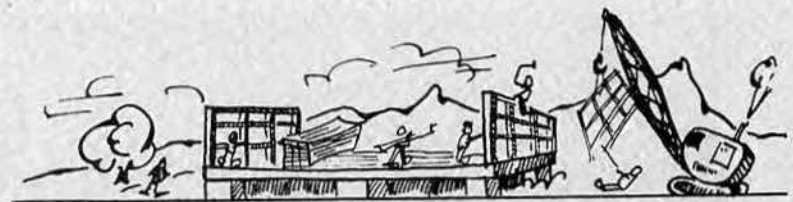
Upon our return, we were told that within a few days we would leave for our Advance Base Depot which was to be Camp Parks, California. On the evening of July 29, 1943, we silently listened to the blessings bestowed upon us by the Camp Chaplain and then boarded the train which was to take us one step nearer to our

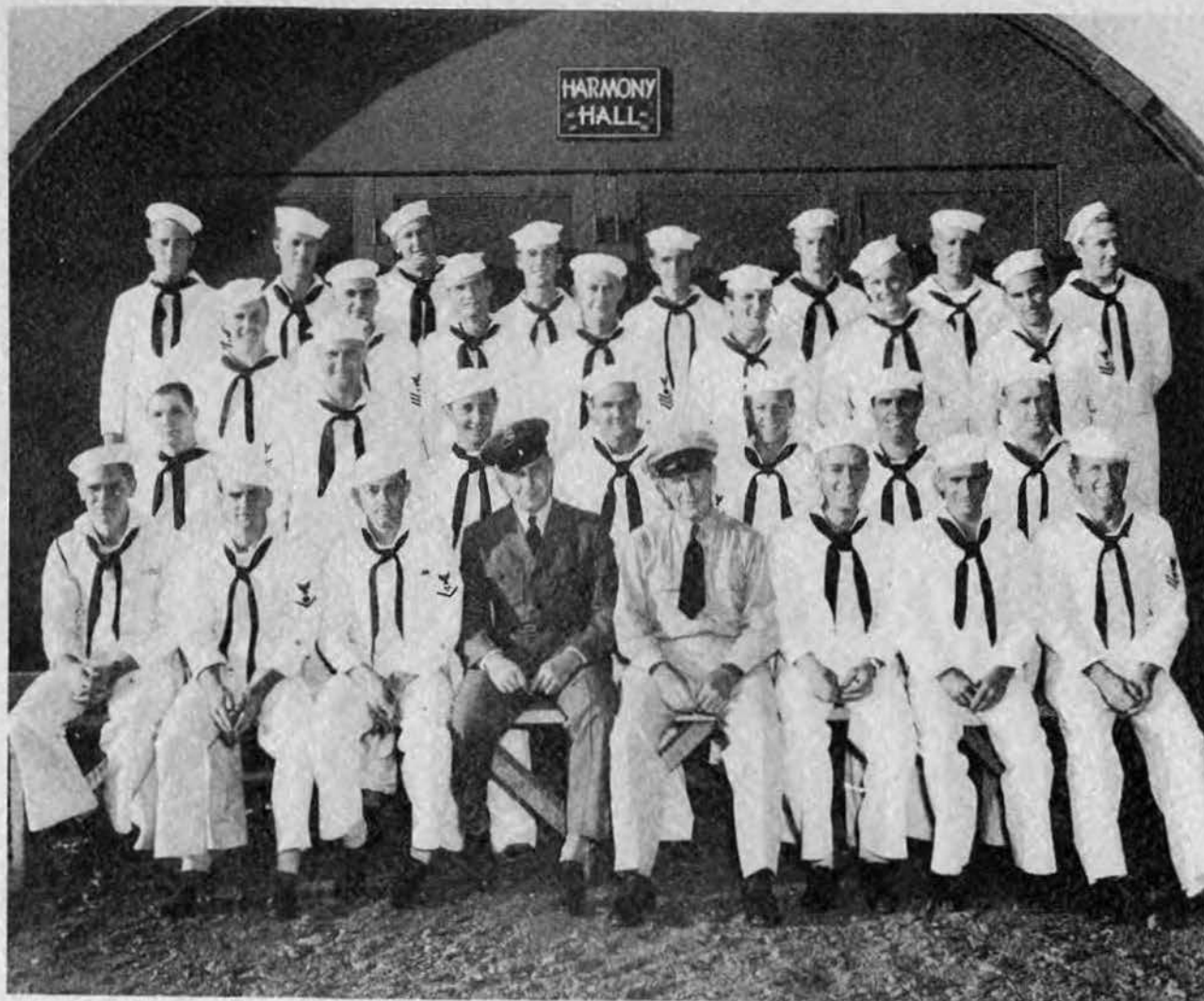


ultimate job. The trip was comfortable and interesting and we enjoyed every minute of it (this, of course, does not include the guards who do not care if they ever take a train ride again). We spent two days travelling all over the State of New York and the Texans will concede that perhaps their State is not the largest or that perhaps we were going in circles. When we reached the mid-west, our destination was changed and we were told that it would be Camp Rousseau, Port Hueneme, California. With only one thing, the California sunshine, missing, we arrived at Port Hueneme on the morning of August 4. The Californians passed the lack of sunshine off as a freak of nature. The men who lived on the West Coast were living proof of the old adage that, "He who laughs last, laughs best." Therefore, the Easterners cultured the memories of their leave while the Westerners were enjoying their

ten days of freedom from military routine.

Living conditions at Camp Rousseau were good; liberty was plentiful and the neighboring towns and cities provided excellent stamping grounds for the "liberty hounds." The training was light (all right! all right! it seems that way now), and we all looked forward to moving on to our Island "X" Days and weeks passed by and the Easterners were beginning to say "cain't" for "can't" and "I'm fixin'" for "I intend." The scuttlebut flowed freely as to our next destination and there was hardly a place on the globe for

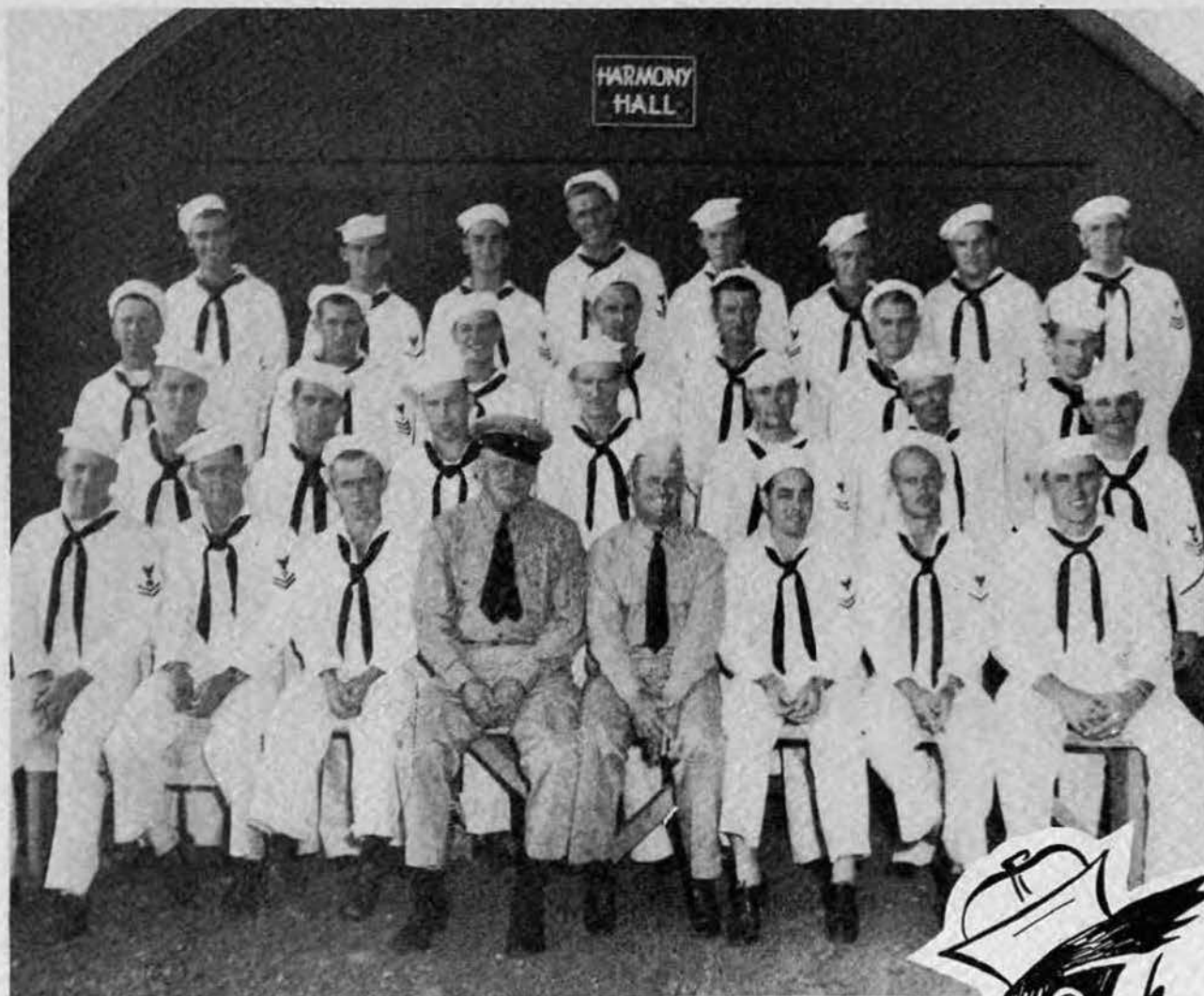


which we were not headed. In the meantime, we had become attached to Hollywood, Ventura, Los Angeles and other surrounding places (some of the attachments were for more animate things), and there were times when we were not certain that we wanted to leave too soon. Then, a sudden indication that our days in the States were numbered was realized when "B" Company was ordered to go ahead of the remainder of the Battalion. A hasty celebration was arranged and, with the band's music and the good wishes of their mates ringing in their ears, they shoved off. At least, we thought, we would soon know our future destination from letters we would receive from our friends of "B" Company. Their letters did reach us—riddled as if by machine gun fire. Not a word passed the sharp eyes of the censors and the mystery remained as deep as ever.

9 DAYS
ALL OVER



We continued going about our daily duties and waiting for the eventful day when we would join our mates. Several changes took place in our "happy family." Four officers who had been with us since our formation were recalled to other duty and new ones joined us. Our Skipper received a promotion to "Commander" and our Executive Officer, Lieutenant Morris K. Voedisch, was promoted to "Lieutenant Commander". The officers and the men received this news of promotions with enthusiasm. This was a good outfit and we took pride in it. There was unity and fraternity among the officers and men. When some of our less fortunate mates lost all their gear as a result of a fire in their hut, the rest of us took part in a "Field Day" and generously contributed towards a fund to replace the gear. The spirit was good and we knew that, no matter where we went, we could depend on each other.

Many of us were returning from a week-end liberty when the word got around that we were "secured." It was still scuttlebut until we were told that our Commander would address us, then we knew that the day had arrived. His opening words "This is it, men!" have become famous. You could have heard a pin drop in the area. We were to leave that night. We were informed that first class transportation was not available and we would have to make the trip to our ship as best we could. The remainder of the day was spent packing our gear and writing letters home. This was the day we had been looking forward to since first we came to Camp Peary. There was a note of sobriety in the air and most of us felt that we were embarking on a real adventure. At about 0200, September 28, 1943, we tumbled into buses and trucks (mostly trucks) and it was a sad looking lot of Uncle Sam's Seabees that got into a mile long

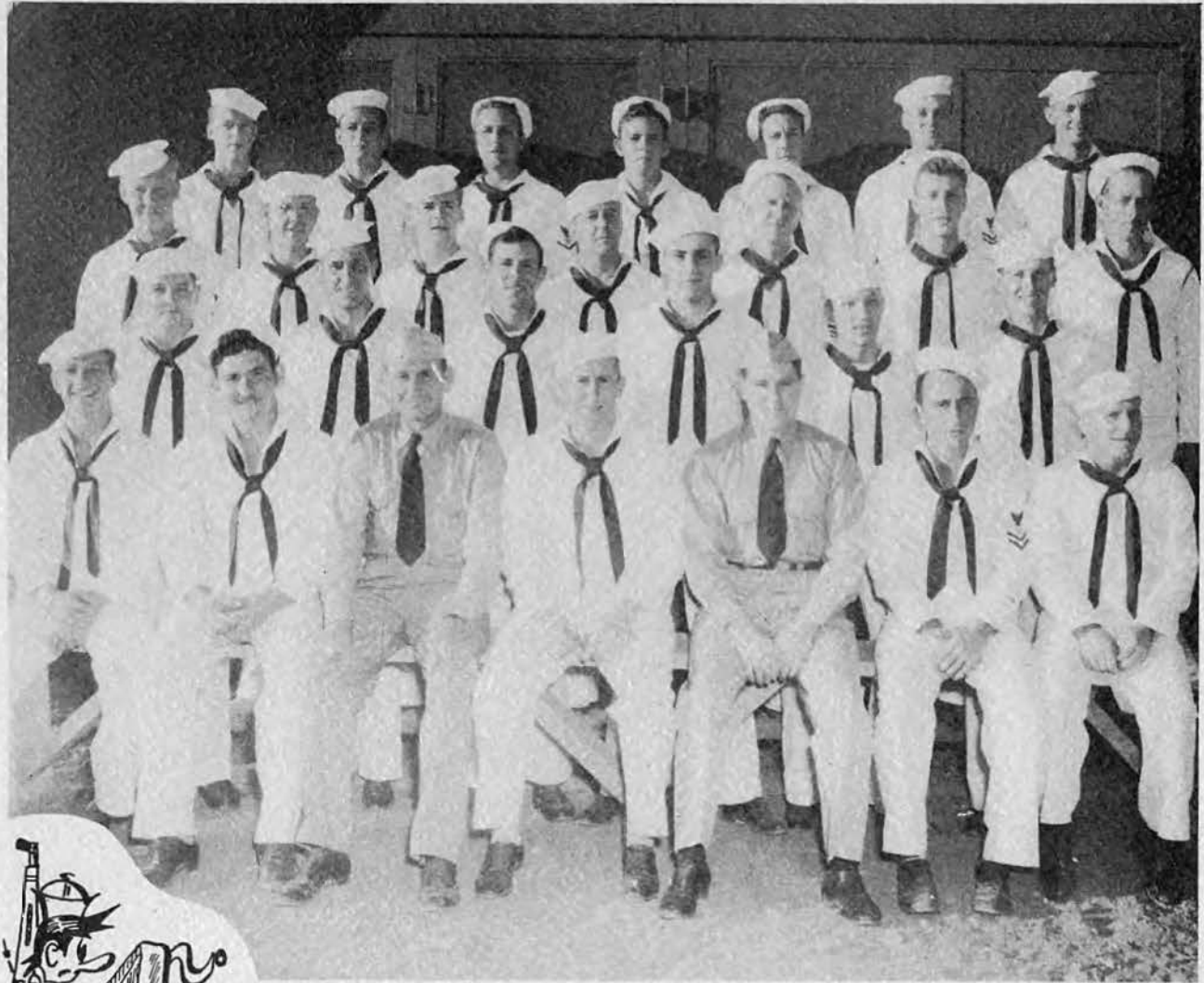


chow line at San Diego the following morning. We continued on to North Island and, in the late afternoon, we boarded the ship, an aircraft carrier, which was to take us to our Island "X". It was not long before we realized that any rest or sleep would have to wait until we would, once again, arrive ashore. However, we did manage to get some relaxation and most of us learned enough to keep away from the loud speaker which was apt to page us at any moment for an assignment to a work detail. At last, we know where we were headed for—at least where our first stop was to be—Ha-



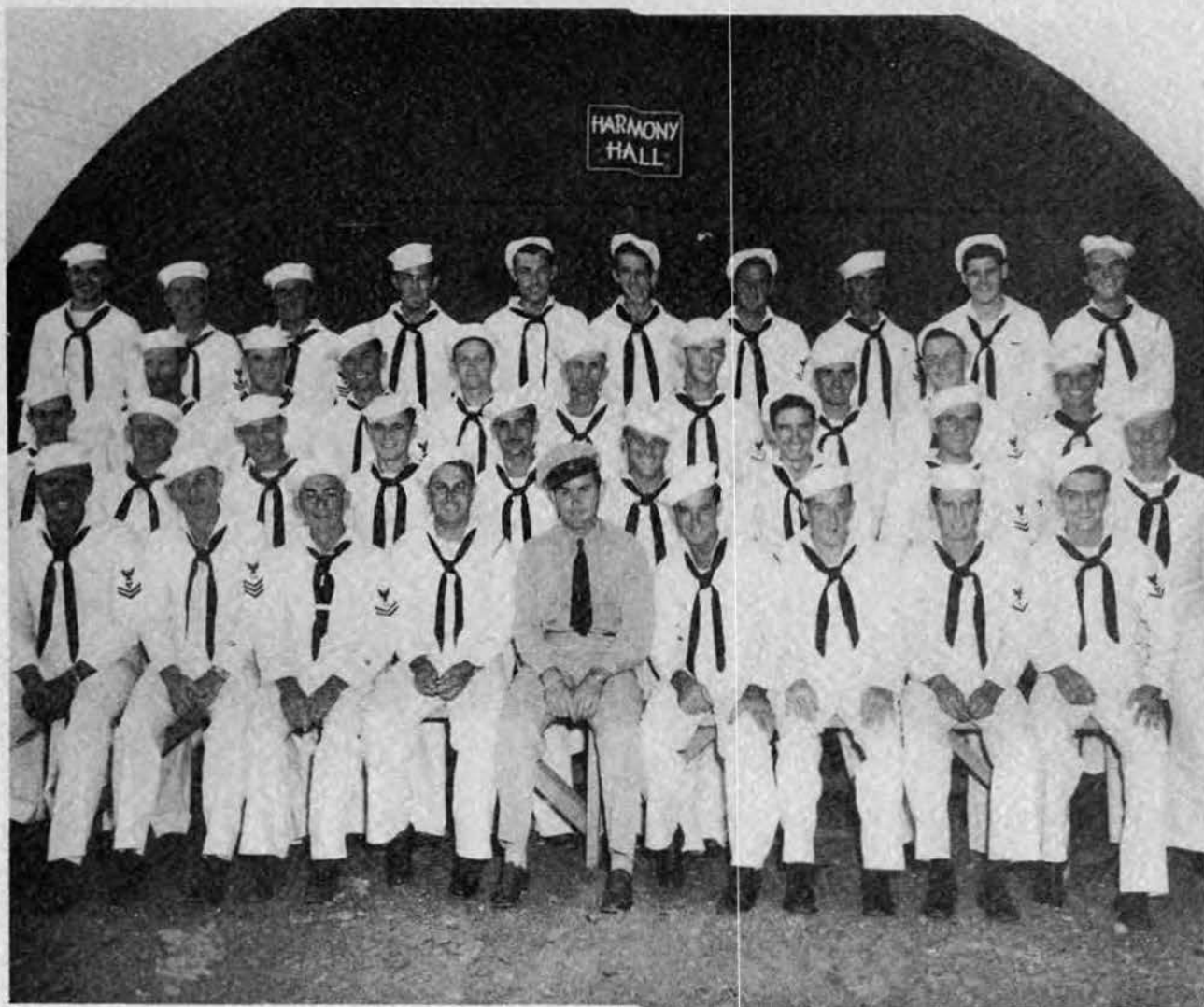
waii, the place many of us had hoped to see and now we were going to visit it as a guest of Uncle Sam. On the morning of October 2, the Island of Oahu came into view but, as we passed Waikiki Beach, we were disappointed at the absence of the famous hula girls. Had not we seen them in the movies? One of the mates was very helpful, he explained, "They don't come out until evening." We went ashore at Pearl Harbor, the place of the original treachery of this War and the reason why we were here. We felt closer to the war than we had ever realized before. We were met at the pier by "B" Company and we were all very happy to meet our old shipmates and to know that the Battalion was again a complete family.

We were assigned quarters in the Aiea Naval Receiving Barracks and were given the day off to get ourselves squared away. We immediately began to question



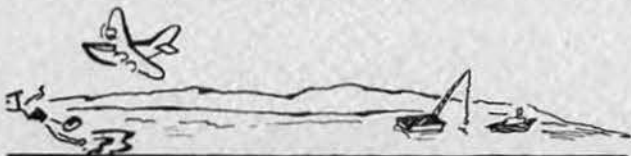

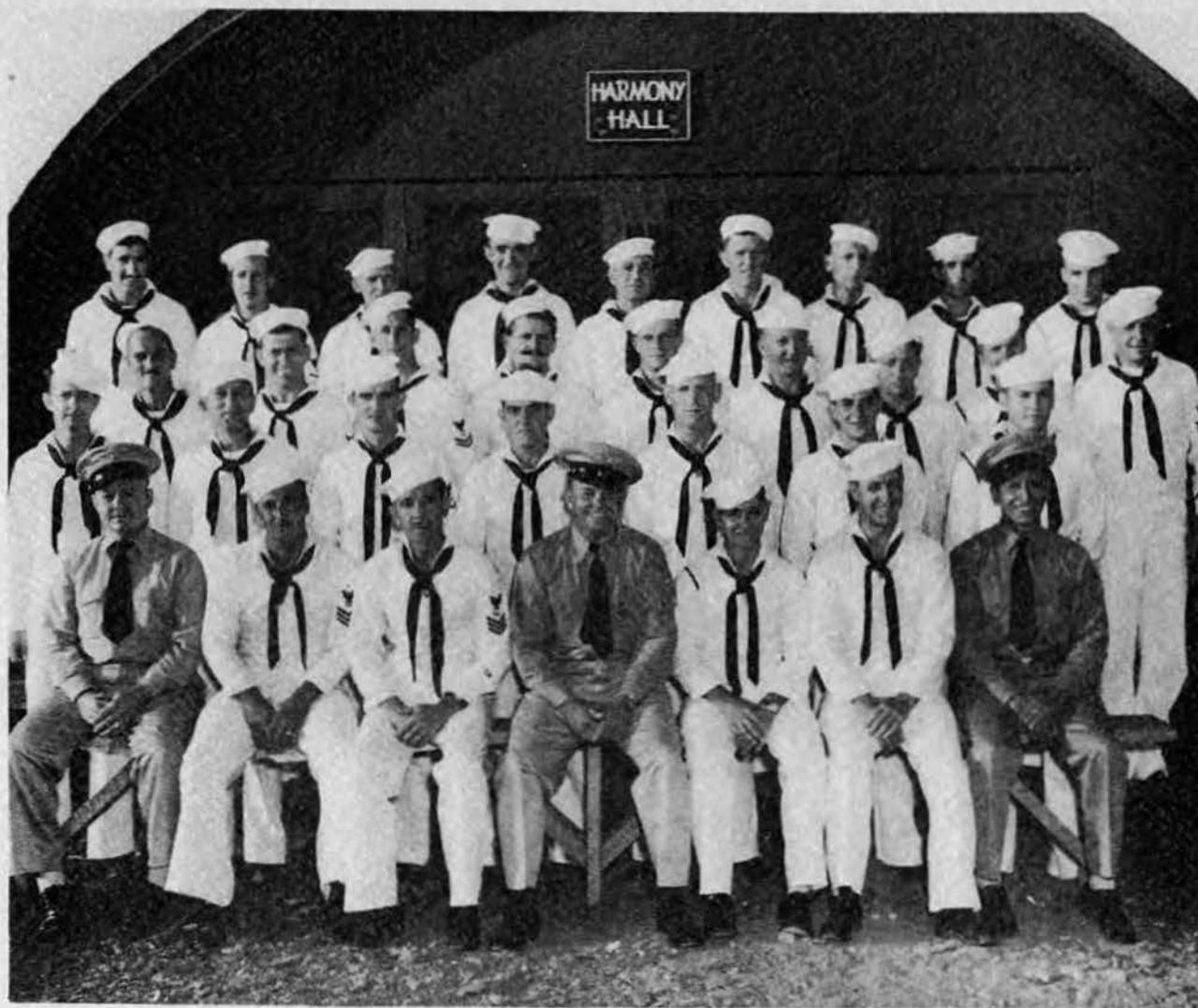

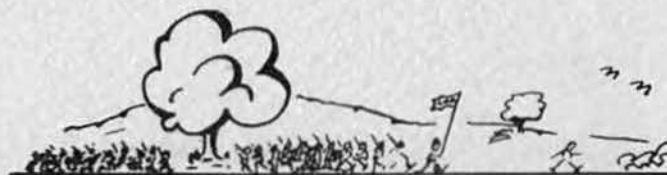
those who had been here for some time. What kind of liberty town is Honolulu? How is the chow? Is there anything to drink in town? How about the hula girls? We expected to be here but a short time and we were going to change the face of the town—just wait and see! The next day we were granted liberty and we wasted no time in getting started. Now we were to see for ourselves the wonderous sights that we had heard so much about — the waving palm trees, melodious music, lovely women and the beautiful beach at Waikiki.



Great was our disappointment when we found the city of Honolulu flowing over with service men instead of hula girls. These girls had joined the army of workers in war activities and hammers and motors had taken the place of the melodious music and the rhythm of the dance. The beautiful beach at Waikiki was disfigured by the barbed wire entanglements which were built for the defense of Oahu. However, we soon adjusted ourselves to the realization that this was no longer a vacation land but a great base for the purpose of prosecuting

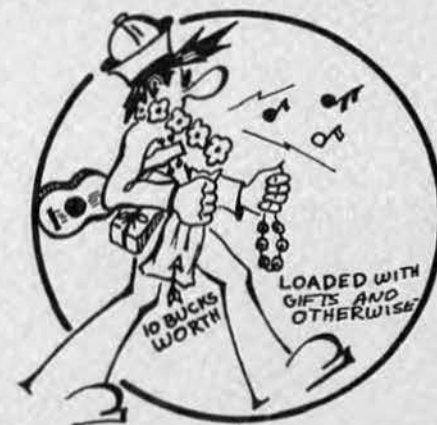

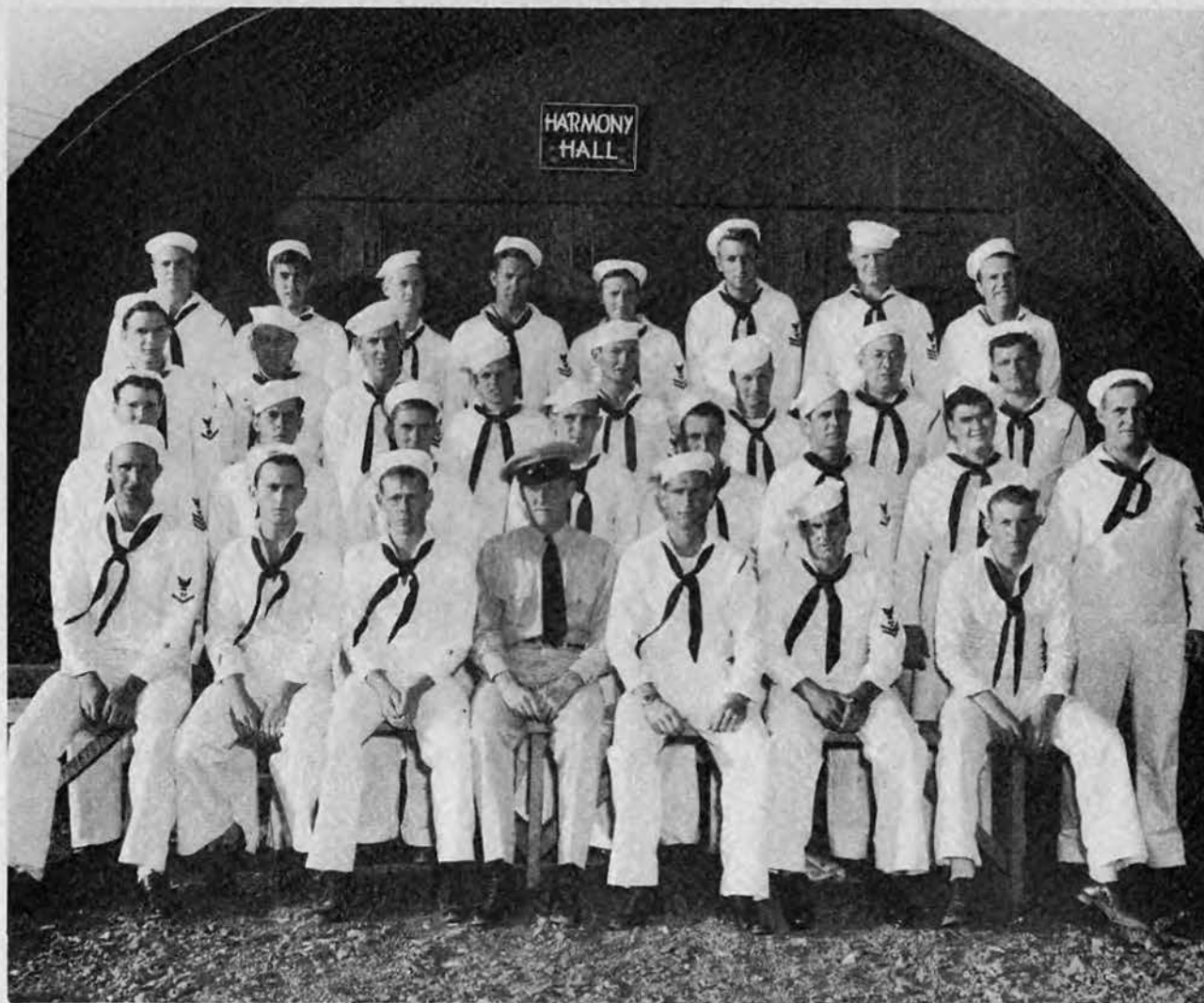
the war and so we prepared to go to work.

Our first assignment was a project already begun by "B" Company and, at that time was simply called "McGrew Point." Part of the complement was assigned to this job and the rest of the men were put to work at the Ewa Marine Air Station. This job was soon completed and the entire Battalion fell in to finish the McGrew Point job, a mobile hospital complete in every detail. It was amazing to see the men turn a rough, bare plot of ground into a Quonset Hut City with wards, surgeries, recreation halls, chow halls, heads, and administration

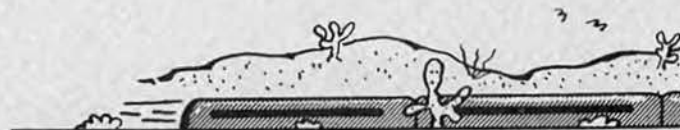


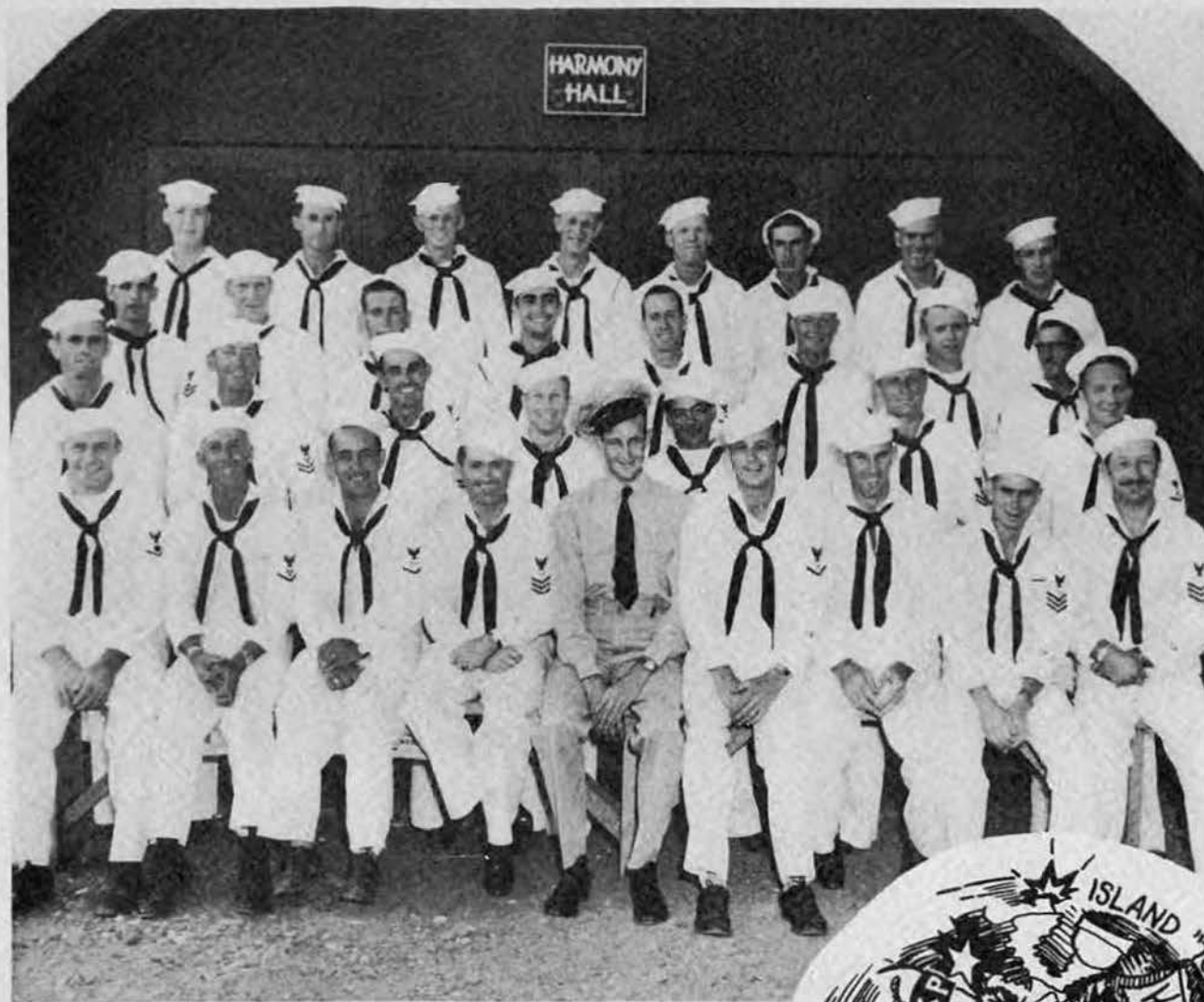
buildings. The letters of commendation which we received upon the completion of this job bore testimony of an assignment well done. We had better skip over the preparation for our next job—most of the men are certain that there were easier ways of earning a living than by cutting sugar cane. But, when the cane was cleared, there appeared, as if by magic, a Tent City which was to house thousands of Marines. During this job came the rainy season and some of us haven't dried out yet.

In the meantime we became better acquainted with Hawaii. It was not the Island described to

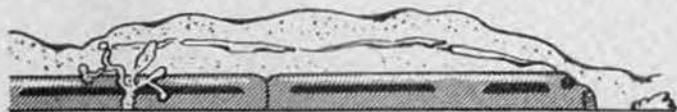

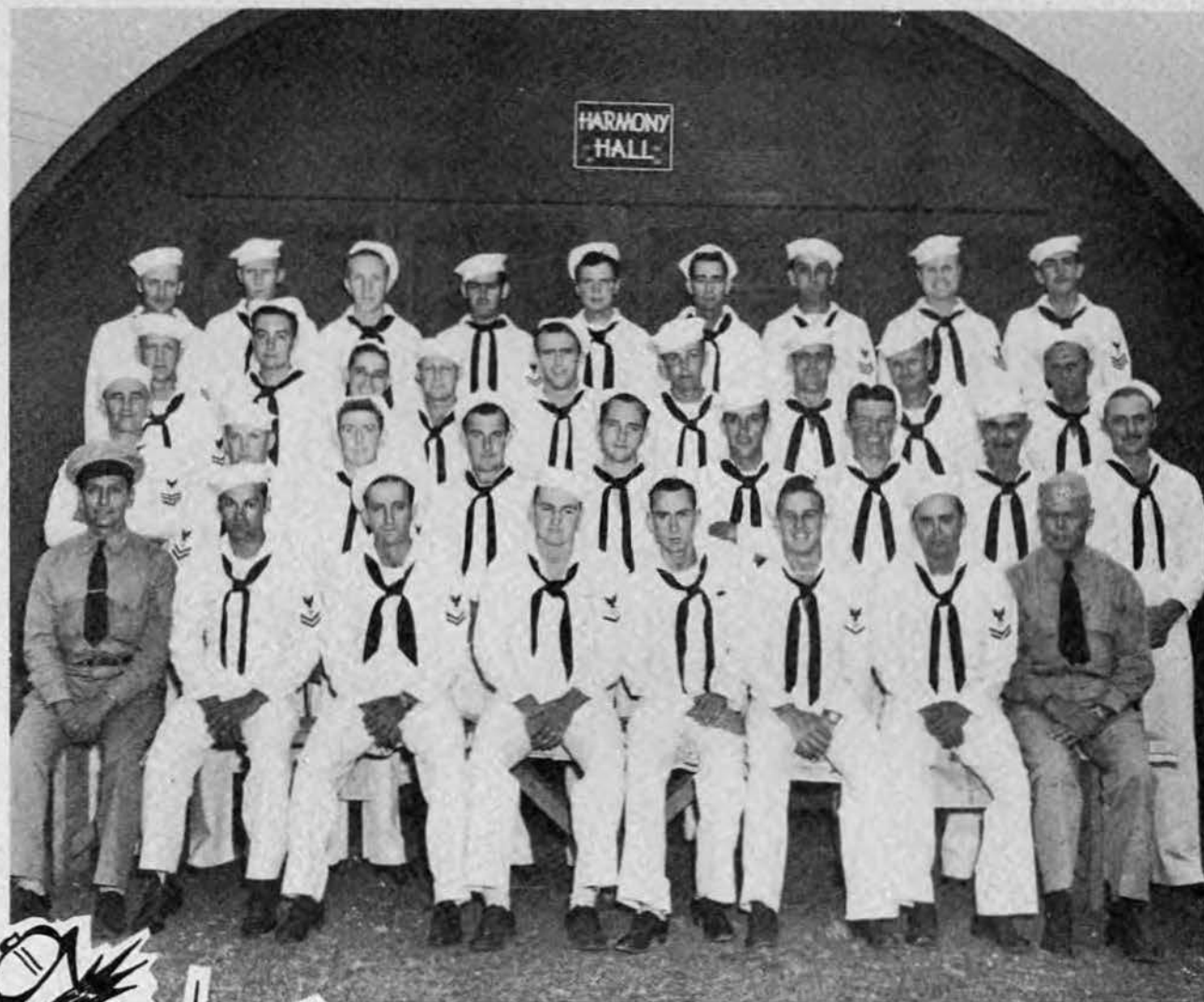
us in poetry and song and in the Chamber of Commerce circulars, but these were wartime conditions and allowances had to be made. Where the effects of the War had not left its scars, the beauties of the island could be experienced. Beer was always available as well as island brew, if you dared to drink the island beverage which might incite the thoughts of the drinker to attempt to swim home. Our first Christmas was spent away from home and we all hoped that it would also be the last.

One hundred of our mates were sent to the Island of Kauai for a few weeks which were stretched into three months, but they had an enjoyable stay and many of them were sorry to leave that beautiful island.

Then came the biggest job of all. A large Seabee Camp to be built at Moanalua Ridge. Thousands of Seabees who were to occupy it were already on their

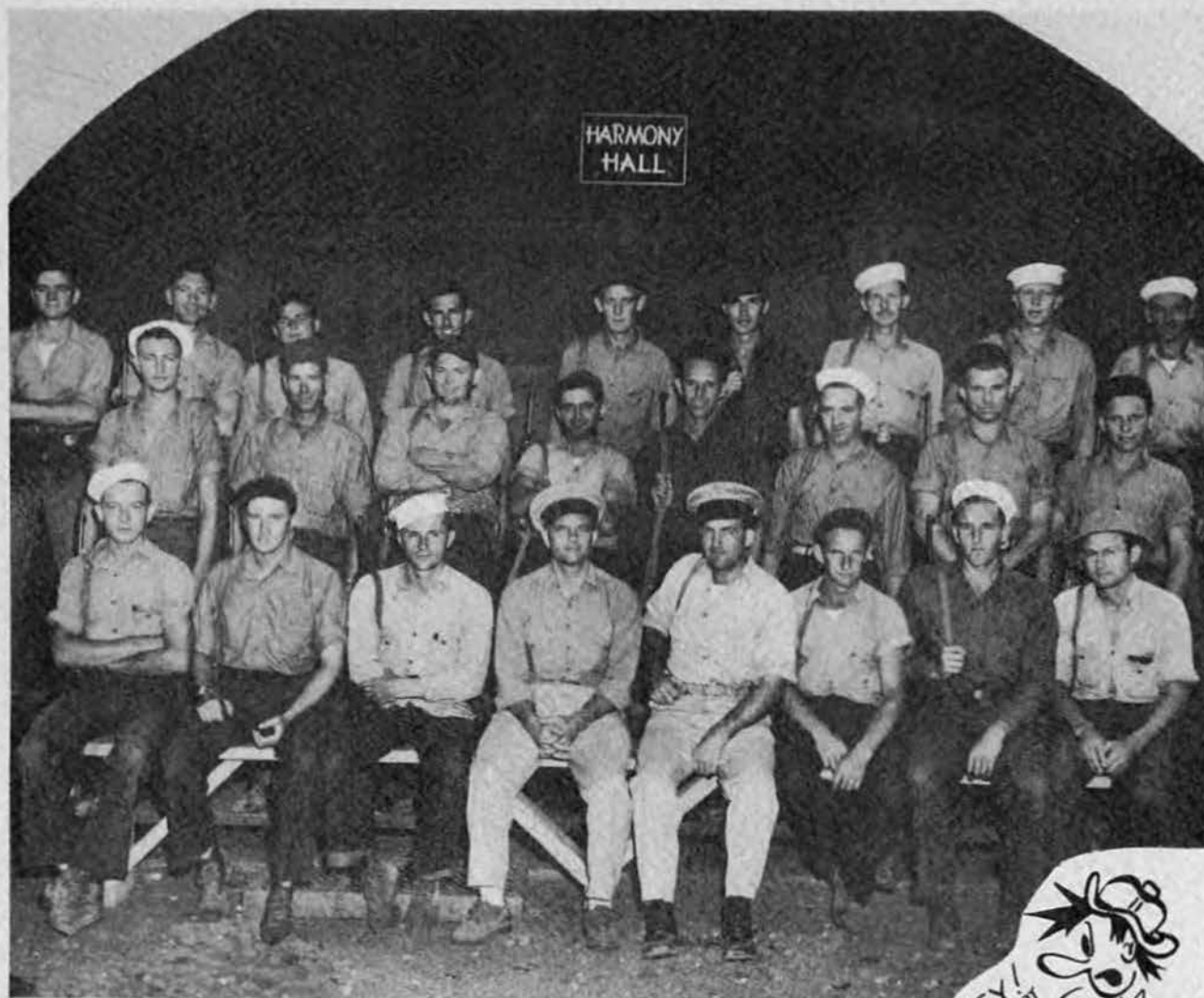
way and we had to build a place for them to live when they got here. This was a big order and so the Battalion was split up into two shifts and the work was carried out on a twenty-four hour basis. The men worked ten hours a day, seven days a week. There was not a complaint to be heard.

The double deck barracks and heads and chow halls went up as if by magic. Each man pitched in and did his job and when the first contingent of Seabees arrived, a comfortable place to live was waiting for them. This job will always remain as a monument to the ability, perseverance and spirit of each and every one of our mates. Until now we thought that we had a pretty good outfit. Now we were sure of it! There was nothing that these men were called upon to do that they could not accomplish. It gave us a feeling of security.

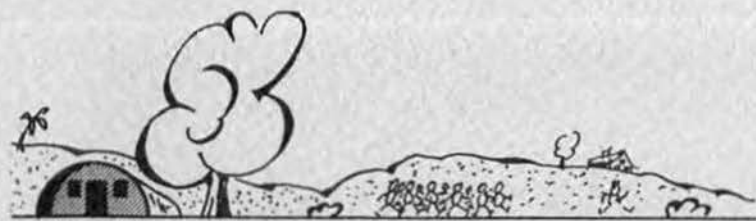

During our stay in Hawaii, many of our old mates left us and many new ones took their places. The spirit of the Battalion was excellent. Nothing was left undone to make the men as happy as possible.

In the near future we will have another job to do and we have a hunch that this is going to be the biggest and most important of all. We are going to get closer to the enemy and show him what little chance he has against men, far past the service age, who will leave the comfort and safety of

their homes and join their younger brothers to crush the Axis. Our first year together has been one of the high spots of our lives. There have been rough spots, yes, many, but man's true metal is brought out by adversity. We have discovered, with deep satisfaction, that we can "take it." There is no way of knowing what lies ahead, but whatever it is we are ready for it—as individuals and as a unit. We look ahead to the future with our heads high and with a firm resolve that, when the test comes, we shall not be found wanting.
