

TRAINING SUMMARY

INTRODUCTION

MCB SEVEN pursued an imaginative series of training cycles designed to improve Combat Readiness, Unit Integrity, and Productive Effort. Included in these series were the following: Military Training, Command Military Readiness Inspections, Technical Training, Leadership Training, and the Personnel Readiness Capability Program. As a means of creating interest, the training results were used as a basis for incentive points for Color Company Competition, a program that continues both in homeport and on deployment.

Training conducted during the deployment is outlined in subsequent paragraphs. Due to the continuing tactical situation, command interest, and the competitive and responsive spirit of the instructors assigned, the overall training program significantly contributed to a high state of readiness in all phases applicable to an MCB. The success was due in part to the efforts expended during the preceeding homeport period whereby lesson plans were obtained or developed from such sources as the TWENTY-FIRST Naval Construction Regiment, NAVSCON, and various sources at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

II. MILITARY TRAINING

A. Military Training was presented in phase with our deployment schedule taking into consideration various important events and gearing the training to provide preparation for such events. Each series of lectures was specifically geared to the current tactical situation or necessity/priority of teaching particular subject matter. Instructors were carefully chosen for each topic and given adequate time to prepare themselves. Sunday mornings were utilized for these one hour lectures with one subject presented on a particular Sunday to each company. A quiz was administered following each class and points counted for Color Company Competition. The Military Training subjects presented were as follows:

- (11) Job Safety
- (12) Leadership
- (13) Field Fortifications (14) Advance Base Structures
- (15) Military Justice
- (16) Disaster Control
- (17) Uniform Service Health Benefits
- (18) Oral Hygiene (19) Military Customs
- (20) Career Information

B. COMMAND MILITARY READINESS INSPECTIONS (CMRI)

In addition to normal inspections conducted by squad leaders, platoon leaders, and Company Commanders, a series of Command Military Readiness Inspections were conducted by the S-2 Department. Points were awarded for Color Company Competition. Areas of interest for these inspections were: personnel, 782 gear, personal and crew served weapons, military knowledge (i.e. sight dope, chain of command).

TASK ORGANIZATION:

U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion SEVEN

(Herein known as the Battalion)

1. SITUATION. In accordance with reference (a), the Battalion is undergoing a homeport training and organizational period. As part of this training, the Battalion will deploy a Provisional Rifle/Weapons Company of approximately 180 men to Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, under the following conditions:

- 2. MISSION. Pursuant to reference (a), the Battalion is to deploy a Provisional Rifle/Weapons Company of approximately 180 men to Camp Lejeune in conjunction with general military training and the use of crew-served weapons.
- 3. EXECUTION. When directed on or about 15 August 1969, the Provisional Rifle/Weapons Company will depart Davisville, Rhode Island, and deploy to Camp Lejeune for approximately two weeks. While in training and during transit, the company will maintain the same readiness condition as MCB SEVEN.

4. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS

- a. Standard operational procedures, set forth by reference (b) will be followed.
 - b. Leave will be administered in accordance with reference (c).
- c. The company will utilize Annexes A, B, and C of reference (d) while it is under the OPCON of the OiC of MCB SIX Provisional Rifle/Weapons Company.
