










THE SEVENTY-NINTH UNITED STATES NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION

THE CONSTRUCTION BATTALIONS were formed as the direct outgrowth of the need for building and maintaining Naval Shore establishments for servicing the fighting forces of the Navy and their auxiliaries. At the outbreak of the present war it was found that civilian contractor organizations were unsuited to work outside the continental limits of the U. S., particularly in areas of combat. So the now famous Seabees were originated; first on a limited trial scale, and later increased to their present strength of approximately a quarter million officers and men.

The Seventy-Ninth Battalion was activated about midway of the expansion program, and after training took its place among the battalions serving in the Alaskan Sector. At first we were assigned to an existing Construction Regiment, but were soon detached and assigned to base maintenance with the additional responsibility of completing a construction program. This arrangement gave us a definite work program and placed the responsibility of its prosecution squarely up to the battalion.

A brief discussion of the problems involved in the battalion's functioning and the nature of their solutions is in order. First and foremost the battalion's internal organization had to be set up to function smoothly in order that the job at hand could receive maximum manpower and effort. Fortunately most of the groundwork of organization had been accomplished before arriving at the advanced base. However, there was still the problem of placing the proper men in the proper assignments. The organization for continued military training had to be set up, and the training program fitted in to work assignments in such a manner as to permit maximum training and minimum of conflict with the work. Also various activities necessary for the internal functioning of the battalion had to be organized and developed. In all of these activities, the Officer-in-Charge has delegated responsibility and authority freely and has been rewarded by excellent results. Almost without exception the personnel of the battalion has shown a willingness to undertake any and all jobs with a determined spirit and have exhibited the necessary skill and knowledge to successfully accomplish the end in view. Rewards for the energy and efficiency of the individual men have been made in the form of advancements in rating. These necessarily had to be within a specific allowance and some deserving advancements could not be given.

The Officer-in-Charge is confident that the general average of the 79th Battalion, measured by ability, conscientious devotion to duty and the successful prosecution of the work assignment, is among the highest in all the Seabee organization. It is realized that this is a very broad statement, especially when one considers the very high standard set by many other battalions. We have reason to be proud that we have served with a degree of efficiency that upholds the high regard in which the construction battalions are held by the forces afloat and by other branches of the armed services.

The art work, photography and text which appear in the following pages are contributions of which we are proud, and which we feel certain will serve to keep alive the spirit of the 79th Battalion long after we have been mustered out of the service. We are deeply appreciative of the fact that this history has been made possible through the vision, interest and sincere efforts of our Officer-in-Charge and those who assisted him.



THE OFFICER OF THE DAY in a construction battalion is the Assistant to the Executive Officer. It is his duty to carry on the battalion functions in the absence of the Commanding Officer and the Executive Officer. It is also his duty to provide for the safety and security of battalion personnel, which is done through the battalion Master-at-Arms force and the Fire Watch. He makes a daily inspection of the galleys and living quarters of the men.

The Officer of the Day must keep a log of the activities of the Battalion and must record all information pertinent thereto. His office personnel is on duty twenty-four hours a day. Lt. F. X. Carlin was O.O.D. for approximately the first three months of our tour of duty. He was relieved by Lt. (jg) W. R. Kramer, who continued for the next eight months until relieved by Warrant Officer J. W. Cox.

MEDICAL



PROBABLY EVERYONE has heard the expression, "The first hundred years are the hardest." The Medical Department of the 79th can bear out that statement. The amount of equipment we had at the first was inadequate. Our first job was to start "borrowing" to accumulate enough medical supplies and equipment to set up the first "sick bay." Instruments were obtained from all over. In fact one was even "borrowed" from as far away as Washington, D. C. The department finally got enough things together to begin some real work.

The officers and corpsmen worked diligently and consistently for as much as eighteen hours a day for approximately six weeks during the "cat fever" epidemic at Camp Bradford. All throughout boot training, officers and corpsmen constantly guarded the health of the men. The officers of the department cannot express too emphatically their appreciation for the work of these pharmacist mates.

The record of the Medical Department is one of which we are proud. Throughout our tour of duty there have not been any deaths in the battalion. The department has never been "too busy" to take care of the most minor ailment of any man, and many times has made many suggestions and recommendations for improvement of eating and living conditions to further benefit the health of officers and men.

Our Doctors have not singled out any one man for praise, but have extended credit to all for their work. The men of the Battalion are proud to serve with them and we know that they are one of the finest Medical units ever assembled.



PERSONNEL




On the 28th day of January, 1943, the Personnel Office of the 79th Battalion was organized and assigned to the tremendous task of setting up records for the entire battalion. Quoting from the Gunnery Instructions of the Navy: "Of far greater importance to officers than the material or tools committed to their charge is the personnel with which they are concerned." The direct responsibility for the handling of personnel records is that of the Executive Officer, who through the medium of the Personnel Officer, will see they are properly and accurately kept.

Under the direction of Lt. (jg) Joseph P. Demeter, Personnel Officer, the crew of Chief Yoeman H. C. Doty, Chief Yoeman Robert P. Barnes, Maurice Settle, Benjamin Hansen, Kenneth Kamberg, Roy Kamberg, Thomas Prenderville, Philip Meysman, Paul Duty, Earl Adams, and Robert Favre, began work. All had completed courses in the Yoeman Training School at Camp Bradford, Virginia, under the tutorship of Chief Doty, then instructor of the school, and were hand picked for the new assignment. The aim of the department is to maintain an organization that will operate smoothly and efficiently regardless of conditions. A very definite attempt was made to standardize the procedure in all departments as much as possible toward the end that every man in the department would be able to familiarize himself with all of the many and varied details of departmental operation-even though the individual himself was perhaps confined to the proper execution of minor details in his section. The maintaining of the records for the individual is the major function of this office. In this connection, twelve separate records are maintained continuously for each man. At any time he can secure any information desired about his service life. Allowances for dependents, insurance, longevity, reratings, liberty and leaves are all handled. No small function is the handling of the mast actions and courts and boards details, and the related furnishing of legal advice to the battalion personnel as needed.

Upon arrival at Island "X" the department faced the task of assignment of the personnel to the various projects. This again required the maintenance of voluminous and up-to-the-minute records of each man. The cooperation of the department heads and the men themselves made this a pleasant task.

With typical Seabee ingenuity Roy Kamberg and Paul Duty repaired and brought into service a discarded mimeograph machine. This plant did a rushing business throughout the day dispensing all kinds of departmental memoranda, orders, forms, invitations, and records for the entire base, not to mention the daily PLAN OF THE DAY and the popular weekly publication—THE MAINTAINER. The staff of these publications was largely made up of yoemen from the Personnel Office. Through the medium of the MAINTAINER, the folks at home were kept informed of our activities.

THE SUPPLY DEPARTMENT furnishes the men with their clothing, tools, meals and money. As each of these items affects the every day living of all the men, it is no wonder that the morale and work output of the battalion depends to a large extent on how well the Supply Department functions.

In the case of our battalion the "Can Do" motto was carried out in every respect. The "supply" branch of the department often worked day and night obtaining and issuing the tools and the foul weather gear that was so necessary in the North. It was a long pull from stocks of unknown material on a beach to an orderly warehouse, but the Supply Department took it in stride.

The Commissary branch is justly proud of the fact that regardless of conditions, members of the 79th Battalion never missed a meal. They also should be proud of the quality of food served, and the many free extras given the men such as Sunday night hamburgers, popcorn, candy, etc. It can be safely said that very few, if any, CB Battalions received better food than the 79th.

The Disbursing Office had its share of difficulties among them, paying \$80,000.00 on each pay day, and trying to help the men with their financial and domestic problems. However, here again the "Can Do" spirit prevailed, and an efficient business organization soon developed with many satisfied customers. In fact, twice a month the Disbursing Office was the most popular place in the Battalion.

All members of the Supply Department deserve a vote of thanks for their help in making these accomplishments possible. The officers in charge of the Supply Department are Lt. (jg) Melvin L. Levin, Lt. (jg) Tom Hannan, Ensign Harvey L. Hensel and Ensign Henry L. Kimelman. Competent assistance was given by Chiefs Callinan, Allen and Sliman.



MILITARY ORDNANCE

THE DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY TRAINING AND ORDNANCE has had a profound influence upon every man in the Battalion. It is
through the efforts of this department that the
Battalion personnel received advanced training.
This was accomplished in several ways. Squad
and Platoon discipline and teamwork were developed by platoon drill competition and frequent close order drill periods. Extended order
maneuvers were practiced by the companies of
the battalion in coordination with various Army
units of that area.

The operation and function of various weapons were thoroughly taught each man. Instruction periods were held for men in the special weapons section of each company until they became proficient in the operation and the use of these weapons. Every man made an attempt on the range to qualify for special medals. A large number made the grade and were awarded medals. One-half day each week was devoted to Military Training and provisions were made for almost every man to participate. The percentage of men taking military training each week averaged over 95%. This is believed to be a record in itself.



CHAPLAIN

THE SEABEES are proud to be known as "fighting builders," because they can fight while they build while they fight. Do you know that within the pages of the Old Testament there is a story of some men of old who were striking counterparts of the Seabees?

These men were the fighting builders who under Nehemiah rebuilt the walls of Jerusalem in 450 B. C. When we read the story we find these amazing words:

"They who built on the wall, and they who bore burdens... every one with one of his hands wrought in the work, and with the other hand held a weapon. For the builders, every one had his sword girded by his side, and so built." (Nehemiah 4:17-18.)

The story of how this handful of faithful men overcame tremendous opposition and restored Jerusalem to something of its ancient power and glory is one of the most thrilling epochs of the Old Testament. One hundred fifty years before, Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon had beseiged the city and captured it, seizing the gold, silver, and precious stones of the Temple, taking many of the people captive, and leaving much of the city and walls blackened ruins. Nehemiah, a cup-bearer in the court of Artaxerxes, obtained authority and materials from his master to rebuild the walls and in general restore the fortifications of the city.

Having obtained permission to return to Jerusalem, Nehemiah took a party of men and made a night survey of the walls of the city. The next day he called a mass meeting of the citizens of Judah and told them of his plans. The reaction was immediate and encouraging. They said, "Let us rise up and build." And we are told that they strengthened their hands for this good work.

Almost immediately opposition arose from the surrounding tribes, who were jealous and fearful of Jerusalem and did not want her to return to her former position of power and importance. The leaders of these tribes, Sanballat, Tobiah, and Geshem determined to oppose the work in every possible way. Their first weapon was ridicule. Sanballat called his men together and made a speech, laughing at the men of Judah and their plans, and saying that even if they were able to build anything, a fox could leap against it and cause it to fall down. Nehemiah was a man of prayer, and he called upon God to protect the builders and confound

the efforts of the enemy.

The next opposition took the form of a meeting and conspiracy to fight against the builders. Nehemiah again prayed to his God, but also looked to see that his "powder was kept dry." He set up a security watch to keep tabs on the enemy twenty-four hours a day. He was determined not to be caught short—"too late with too little."

Then there arose opposition from within. A "fifth column" of defeatists and pessimists within Judah began to complain that their strength was not equal to the task of lifting the stones for the wall. They pointed out that there was too much rubbish cluttering up the area, and were ready to give up the great work. These "termites within the gates" further pointed out that Sanballat and his allies were planning to make a surprise attack upon them while they worked and kill them all. Nehemiah immediately ordered the men to get their swords and spears and bows and have them handy at the scene of operations.

The final attempt of Sanballat and his forces took this form. They called upon Nehemiah to come out of the city and meet with them in one of the villages of the plain, hinting that they desired to work out some sort of "non-aggresion pact." Wise Nehemiah suspected that it might be a desperate try to kidnap him and thus block the final work on the wall, and he sent the tribesmen this message, "I am doing a great work, so that I cannot come down; why should the work cease while I leave it and come down to you?" Then the enemy threatened to send word to Artaxerxes that Nehemiah was starting an insurrection against him with his rebuilding of the fortifications of Jerusalem. This and other threats proved to be without power to stop the fighting builders, and after fifty-two days the repairs to the wall were finished. The enemy "perceived that this work was wrought of . . . God" and were ready to admit defeat.

These men had a job to do. It seemed that all the forces of hell and earth were determined to stop them. On their side they had a few discouraged builders, a dynamic leader, and above all, a great God. Nehemiah's prayers are among the most gripping and beautiful recorded in the Old Testament. When the final victory was won he was careful to give the glory to God. It is such a spirit as this that will make for a speedier defeat of our enemies in the present war, for a just and righteous peace, and for a better world.

WELFARE

THE WELFARE DEPARTMENT under the direction of Lt. (jg) G. C. Thomas and Chief A. M. Axelson has been most active. Mr. Thomas and Chief Axelson have provided the men of the Seventy-ninth with every form of recreation possible. There have been baseball, football, and basketball leagues. Track meets, boxing, wrestling, weight-lifting, ice skating, skiing, ping-pong, horse shoes, pool and handball have been enjoyed. When the weather did not permit outside sports the men were given Platoon beer parties with steak dinners. Bingo games were organized. Cards, chess, checkers and many other indoor games were always on hand. Special dances were held during the holiday seasons. Forty Christmas trees with decorations were provided for Christmas. Radios for each barrack deck or night watch were also provided. With the help of Chief Allen free hamburgers and popcorn were furnished the men weekly. All types of reading matter were purchased weekly and placed in the library. It is felt that this department did a wonderful job in keeping high the morale of the Seventy Niners during this tour of duty.

EACH CONSTRUCTION BATTALION has a Headquarters Company, which is comprised of approximately 176 men. This total includes storekeepers, yoemen, hospital corpsmen, mail clerks, barbers, cook and bakers, officers' cooks and stewards, cobblers, and other ratings to balance the battalion complement. This company forms the nucleus of the battalion maintenance personnel. The yoemen keep the personnel records; the storekeepers handle the pay accounts, supply and commissary records; the corpsmen work in Sick Bay. Headquarters Company was organized on 1 February 1943 under the command of Lt. Francis X. Carlin. Warrant Officer Frederick M. Stellhorn served as Executive Officer. Stanley Gorski acted as Company Clerk from the date of the company's activation until October 1943, and was replaced by Herbert Mycroft.

This company has contributed largely to the athletic accomplishments of the battalion. Alexander Barrett proved to be king pin of the bowling alleys. Kistler led the baseball team to many victories by pitching 4.0 ball. The two Kambergs, Ashcroft, Grossi, Courson, and Disimone are star basketball players, and Santagato finished near the top in the billiard tournament. Chief Murphy, the only seagoing chief in the battalion, had the distinction of being chosen skipper of a 60 foot tug and supervised the sailing of this vessel to the states. Norman Taylor accompanied the chief on the voyage.

This article would not be complete without a mention of the two mail clerks. Trovillo Gallagher and Joe (Tex) Ashworth. These men from the first recognized the importance of good mail service and they have unfailingly given it to the men of the 79th. Headquarters Company can well be proud of its personnel and can rest assured that it is doing a good job in helping to make the 79th Battalion one of the best.



N THE FIRST DAY of February, 1943, some 220 men varying in age from 17 to 50 years and representing approximately thirty-five trades and professions, were brought together from thirty-eight states to form Company "A" of the 79th Battalion. The first officer to command this unit was Lieut. E. T. Jones, who became Executive Officer of the Battalion before we left Camp Bradford. Following in command came Lieut. M. W. Hourigan, to remain only a short time. He was relieved by Lieut. Frank J. Sharpe who commanded the company until November, 1943. At that time he assumed the duties of Military Officer and Lieut. D. J. Pipal became Company Commander. Assisting in the administration and guidance of Company "A" have been Lt. (jg) G. C. Thomas and Ensign H. A. Hart. The enlisted personnel have not fared badly in regards to promotions. One Chief Petty Officer was appointed to the rank of Warrant Officer and a number of our Chiefs have been granted permanent appointments.

Approximately sixty per cent of the enlisted personnel have received advancements in rating, seven of such advancements being to the rating of Chief Petty Officer. In carrying out the various work assignments on this base the men have, in nearly all instances, applied the experience and ability gained in their civilian trades. Quite a number of men, however, have, through diligent application to their assignments become adept at trades in which they have had no previous experience. Company "A" can claim its share of the honors in matters of athletics, having been well represented on the football, baseball and basketball teams that were entered by the battalion in the base leagues.

The majority of the "keglers" in the past winter's tournament and in the current Bowling Sweepstakes will also be found on the muster roll of Company "A." In spite of the inborn trait of the American construction worker to resist regimentation, the morale and cooperative spirit of this company has always been tops.

Were it possible to obtain the opinion of each individual in the company, it is sincerely believed that the associations with one another and with the balance of the Battalion will be treasured down through the years.

COMPANY "D" of the 79th Battalion was formed on the drill fields of Camp Bradford, Virginia, in February, 1943. Under the guiding hands of Lt. W. W. Shoemaker, Company Commander, and his officers, Lt. (jg) S. J. Canonico, Ensign F. A. Dieter and Warrant Officer E. J. Haberacker, the first few months of shaking down were successfully completed and Company "D", as well as the rest of the battalion shoved off for overseas duty.

Once situated on the new base and squared away, the right man began to be assigned to the right job. Lt. Shoemaker took over the Public Works Engineering Department and in a short while had things really humming. Lt. (jg) Canonico, after a short term of duty in the Public Works Maintenance Shops, was appointed as Officer in Charge of a maintenance and construction detachment sent to another smaller base. Ensign Dieter was assigned as Transportation Officer and later was transferred to the Navy Garage. His talents and experience were given better use when he was re-assigned and placed in charge of the Power and Water System on this base. Warrant Officer Haberacker was placed in the Construction Department and, with a crew composed mainly of men from Company "D" were sent to practically every project in existence.

These men applied themselves to the work in progress so diligently that, after one year overseas, more than 150 individual promotions had been earned and granted in a company of slightly over 200 men. R. J. MacDonald, senior Chief Petty Officer, was promoted to Warrant rank and later assigned to another outgoing detachment. F. A. Stone took over his duties as Senior Chief. While establishing their reputation on the various projects, the men in Company "D" did not forget the athletic and educational side of the picture. In addition, large numbers of the men signed up for the various classes and instruction groups available to the personnel on this base.





THIS RESUME of the battalion's history will not be a detailed account of camp life, nor will paragraphs be devoted to training, navy chow, cold barracks, quenset huts, or early morning muster. Most of the families and friends who will read this publication will have heard about these things time and again from the men of the 79th, will have read of them many times in other publications, and will have seen pictures of them on the screen. Instead, it will be a simple travelogue; for every service organization that trains in the States and is then shipped to foreign countries for duty certainly becomes familiar with the word "travel."

HE MAJORITY of the personnel of the 79th Battalion left the security of their homes and their families during the Christmas Season of 1942. Instead of the usual Christmas Spirit which pervaded homes throughout the world, these men were met with a totally different existence; bleak weather, gloomy living quarters, service clothing, hard work, strict regimentation, different food, different routines, and homesickness were their lot for the first weeks of their service. For those who have not experienced this transition, it is quite a task to adapt one's self to service life and become acclimated to the changes which the service demands, especially at a season of the year which is synonymous with good cheer and happy associations.

★ All of us had our "boot" training in Virginia, a state rich in the lore and traditions of liberty. Camp Allen, Camp Bradford, and Camp Peary were the three Seabee Training Centers in Virginia. Most of the 79er's trained at Allen or Bradford. We didn't see the beautiful part of Virginia, which is natural, for large military reserves cannot always be established where the scenic attractions are best. Yet we did learn of the stately beauty of the pines, the particular blue of Chesapeake Bay, the deliciousness of Blue Point oysters, and many of us experienced that brand of hospitality for which the Tidewater section is renowned. We left Camp Bradford on March 11, 1943 and began our trek which has brought us to the Alaskan Sector. We traveled two days and nights enroute to Gulfport, Mississippi, and arrived there on the 13th of March. The order to take our nine-day leave came unexpectedly and the men living on the East Coast and Mid-West left the next day for their long awaited visits home. Our nine days at home, seeing our families again; marveling at the growth of our babies, eating food cooked to perfection, wrestling with ration points and worshipping in our churches were enjoyed more than anyone can realize. However, Uncle Sam couldn't wait long and we were back in Mississippi on the 24th of March ready to go again.

★ The short training period in Mississippi was climaxed by a thirty-mile hike, which is a lot of walking in any war, but sore feet, sore backs, and the democratic feeling of being just "sore" didn't phase us in the least. It seems that each training camp in America is situated in the choice historic spots, and certainly the most colorful. Gulfport is a beautiful little town, clean and well planned, and flanked by the exotic Gulf of Mexico. Pass Christian drew many 79ers on liberty, and although New Orleans was some miles away, the more intrepid individuals ventured over and were enchanted by its old world beauty. We particularly enjoyed the weather in the deep South after the continual battle with the elements in Virginia. But this sojourn was short-lived for the orders came to move again, and we hied ourselves westward.

★ On March 30th we left Mississippi bound for the West Coast. Pullmans this time, and four days of nothing to do but watch the passing scene, dream, write letters, eat, and do guard duty on the train. For those of us who had not traveled to any extent, this trip was a revelation. We saw the lush beauty of Louisiana's bayou country, the plains and blue hills of Texas, herds of cattle, an antelope here and there, the torrid beauty of the desert, Indians selling souvenirs, and the beautiful towns and irrigated land of Arizona. And then California. So beautiful it all but hurt your eyes to look at it. The mixture of modern architecture blended with the hacienda motif; the orange and lemon groves; the gaily dressed people; the palm trees and wide avenues. The cities of Hollywood, Los Angeles, Ventura, Oxnard, Santa Barbara, Santa Monica, Fullerton, Alhambra and Compton, became well known to us and we learned that the South is not only the part of the United States where hospitality is a by-word. We were astonished and humbled at the scope of the war industry, and the omnipresence of soldiers, sailors and marines gave us an idea of the amount of manpower involved in this undertaking. On the 4th of April the men from the West Coast received their nine-day leaves, returning to camp on the 13th.

★ On April 18, 1943, Lieutenant Commander Alec T. Brown, CEC V(S) USNR, assumed command of the battalion. Lt. Comdr. Brown, through his quiet efficiency and thoughtfulness, has the respect of every man in the 79th. It was through his efforts that the conveniences we later enjoyed on Island "X" were made possible.







★ Fate did not intend for us to bask long in this paradise, and after a month in Port Hueneme (Camp Rousseau) we left for Seattle, our port of embarkation. On this two day and night trip we passed through some of the most beautiful country in the United States—Northern California, Oregon and Washington. The variations astonished all of us, little towns built on the sides of mountains, the sunrise over Mt. Shasta; the level farm lands; mile after mile of timber; the fruit country, and the realization that this was a part of our United States.

★ We arrived at our port of embarkation and proceeded directly to the pier. Then followed endless periods of checking gear, mustering, and just waiting. Finally we boarded the ship. The voyage was uneventful—the usual sea seasickness was common but some of the more fortunate came through unscathed. We still trained and worked. K. P. duty, abandon ship drill, guard duty, clerical records to be maintained and the inevitable waiting in chow line. Sleeping four deep in the hold will be remembered always. We made it, however, and the morning of our fifth day out we spied the snow-capped peaks of our Island "X" looming in the distance.


None of us knew what to expect, and what a surprise it was to discover that our assignment meant to be stationed at a modern advance base equipped with many conveniences. It didn't take long for the news to spread that a small town was just a stone's throw from the base. The village is crudely constructed, with mud ankle deep, but it is picturesque, combining the modern with the sourdough effect. The village is a typical example of the profound influence military personnel has on sparsely settled areas. Many civilians are drawn from the States to the village and many of them are becoming wealthy. Almost any article desired could be purchased and it was a treat to see the very charming girls behind the counters dispensing pillow covers, moccasins, AND STEAKS.

* There are many interesting things to see in this particular part of the North.


The most spectacular event is the salmon run. This is an annual migration of the salmon from salt water to their home streams. There are myraids of streams and each stream is milling with fighting,

struggling fish, each prepared to reach his native haunts or die. The scenery is something upon which books have been written. Alaska is a country of extremes, and it is inconceivable that the rugged Winter scenes could be replaced by the green vista which Spring heralds. The prolific fireweed is the most common flower and it tints the mountains with red, sprinkled with the hues of wild roses, violets, wild iris and many other flowers.

★ Space and security do not permit a complete review of this battalion's activities. Much work has been done and the record speaks for itself. Every man in this unit typifies America at its best. The men come from all parts of the country but have welded themselves into an organization with a common purpose. Victory will be ours through the efforts these men put forth. The most menial job becomes magnified many times during a crisis. The men of the 79th will meet all obstacles and overcome them, as will all men of the service.




The 79th disembarking May 10, 1943 on "ISLAND X."








