A Man and His Ship by Steven Ujifusa 9/12, 12:00

At the peak of his power, William Francis Gibbs was considered America's best naval architect. His quest to build the finest, fastest, most beautiful ocean liner of his time, the S.S. *United States*, was a topic of national fascination. When completed in 1952, the ship was hailed as a masterpiece at a time when "made in America" meant the best.

William Francis Gibbs was driven, relentless, and committed to excellence. He loved his ship, and he devoted himself to making it the epitome of luxury travel during the triumphant post-World War II era. Biographer Steven Ujifusa describes the way Gibbs worked and how his vision transformed an industry. *A Man and His Ship* is a tale of ingenuity and enterprise, a truly remarkable journey on land and sea.

Nazi Film Propaganda and the 1936 Olympia Film by Ian Garden 9/25, 12:00

Based upon Garden's book, *The Third Reich's Celluloid War: The Nazi Propaganda Machine in Film & TV*, this lecture exposes the myths surrounding the propaganda films produced during the Third Reich. One, that the Nazis were infallible masters in the use of film propaganda. Two, that everything the Nazis said was a lie. Three, that only the Riefenstahl documentaries are significant to the modern viewer.

Including an objective analysis of all the key films produced by the Nazi regime and a wealth of film stills, Ian C. Garden takes the reader on a journey through the Nazi film propaganda machine.

Invasion of Sandy Bay by Anita Sanchez 9/27, 12:00

A young boy plays a key role when the War of 1812 comes to his Massachusetts coastal fishing village. The little town of Sandy Bay, Massachusetts, was the site of one of the wildest invasions in U.S. history, when the might of the British Empire came up against hardheaded New England townsmen. *The Invasion of Sandy Bay*, based on eyewitness accounts of actual events, tells the tale - through the eyes of a twelve-year-old boy - of what happened on the night when the British put too much gunpowder in one of their cannons. The hilarious - and true - events of the topsy-turvy invasion are set against the backdrop of the dangerous lives of the fishermen.



Pride of Baltimore II 9/20 – 9/21, 1– 4 p.m.

Pride of Baltimore II, a reproduction of a privateer from the War of 1812 era, will be visiting the Washington Navy Yard on Thursday, September 20 and Friday, September 21. It will be on public display as part of the bicentennial commemoration of the war. The ship and its crew seek to educate the public as to how privateer vessels were able to assist in securing victory on the seas during the War of 1812.

The ship will be open for tours by Navy Yard personnel from 10:00-Noon.

Public visiting hours will be 1:00-4:00 on September 20-21.

Non-DoD CAC Holders can visit the ship via the SE Riverwalk. Visitors interested in also visiting the museum should enter the Navy Yard at the 11th and O St. SE gate.
