84th NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION

The 84th Naval Construction Battalion was formed at the Naval Construction Training Center, Davisville, Rhode Island on January 11, 1943. The new Seabees were under the charge of the Senior Medical Officer until their commissioning on February 10, when Lt. Cdr. Chester M. Schrepferman, CEC USNR, assumed command. Their seniority at Camp Endicott was given official recognition when they were selected to lead the review for Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox on April 4, when Camp Endicott was formally dedicated.

Departing Davisville April 21, 1943 they proceeded via Camp Parks, California, then Camp Rousseau at Hueneme, California, to their overseas missions. The battalion, numbering 28 officers, 33 chiefs and 1023 enlisted men, embarked May 31 on the S. S. Young America without escort or convoy for Australia. The ship reached Brisbane June 18, and the newly arrived battalion moved into Camp Seabee.

Within days, however, ~~the~~ separation was ordered that kept the battalion divided for nearly a year. Companies B and D, under Lt. Lee Wilson, CEC V(S), as officer in charge, remained at Brisbane (with a further diversion to Darwin for an officer and 44 men). Companies A and C and the main part of Headquarters Company embarked June 30 for Milne Bay, New Guinea. Company "D" rejoined the Battalion at Milne Bay on September 12, but Company B remained in Australia for the duration of the main body's stay in New Guinea. The group in Australia completed the construction of Camp Seabee and commenced work on a U. S. Naval Mine Depot at Mt. Coot-Tha; a Merchant Marine Anti-Aircraft Station at Wellington Point; a Naval Supply Warehouse, barracks and Mess hall at the Perry Park Project, and Mobile Hospital No. 9 in Brisbane.

Meanwhile, the main body of 20 officers and 559 men under Lt. Cdr. Schrepferman, arrived at Milne Bay July 7, 1943 and established themselves a temporary camp at Gamadodo. They were occupied with un-

loading and building a permanent camp until July 24, and the crew came ashore July 25. It was not until September 1 that their permanent camp was fully completed.

However this did not deter them from their main mission of construction. A detachment of eleven men under Lt. C. D. Miller was sent to Samarai Island, 35 miles down-bay to build a small PBY base. The Seabees at Milne Bay were assigned to construction of a Naval Supply Depot with a 40 by 500 foot wharf, two cold storage warehouses, four frame warehouses, twenty five 40 by 100 foot huts and a 20 by 48 administration building, a camp for depot personnel and four 20 by 50 foot ammunition magazines. In addition the battalion was charged with constructing a 200 bed hospital with 3,000 man recuperation center at Hilimoi Mission.

Initially they were delayed by torrential rains and the necessity of completing their own camp. When possible, the men worked on a 6-day, nine-hour shift schedule. They were further hampered in their main job by being called on to supply personnel and equipment for stevedoring

operations. In spite of this, the commander reported reasonable progress in September on construction of the supply depot as well as completion of approximately 20 miles of two-way traffic roads, with 20 feet between shoulders. Three warehouses were completed, one barracks was near completion and 200 acres of dense jungle cleared and drained for storage of supply depot materials. Also the PBY Base at Samarai was completed.

Company D, having rejoined the main body on September 12, 1943, were sent to Ladava Mission to establish a campsite at Naval Base Headquarters, for which they constructed a 150 man barracks, improved some roads and altered some native huts. They departed to Hilimoi Mission on October 24 to work on the hospital project there.

After being relieved of all stevedoring operations in November, the main group at Milne Bay were able to complete a vital water pipeline and storage tanks totaling 15,000 gallon capacity as well as the Naval

Base projects. The base, expanded to include a staging area an extended row of the wharf to 864 feet, and an Advance Base Construction Depot, was started officially on December 1, 1943 and completed by daily average of 800 men on March 24, 1944. Also on December 1, Company D was relieved of the hospital construction assignment. These men were put into the main Base assignment, so that by January all elements of the Milne Bay group of the 84th Battalion were working on the Base project at Gamadodo. At Brisbane, a detachment of Company "B" dismantled the Mine Assembly Depot for shipment to Darwin to be reassembled, while the bulk of the company worked on a 1000-bed hospital in Brisbane.

With the completion of the Navy Base at Gamadodo, the Milne Bay elements of the battalion were ordered to return to Australia. On March 24, 1944, 715 men and 20 officers departed to Brisbane, arriving March 31. The rear echelon, after loading out the equipment, departed April 11 and arrived in Brisbane April 17. Cdr. Schrepferman was relieved as Officer in Charge by Lt. Cdr. Roger F. Neal, CEC V(S) on May 22.

After rest and rehabilitation, the battalion was variously employed on hospital construction and deployment of detachments to small scale

projects on Thursday Island, Townsville, Sydney and other points.

The next advance employment of the 84th Seabees commenced with their embarkation August 16 from Sydney, via Townsville where they picked up the detachment there, to Gamadodo, Milne Bay, New Guinea, where they staged for shipment to Morotai, Netherlands East Indies. With the men aboard the USAT Evangeline and the equipment on the U. S. S. S.K. Barlow and four LSTs battalion departed Gamadodo September 23 and arrived at Morotai September 27, 1944.

At Gamadodo, they had also assembled ten pontoon sections for a 431 foot long wharf to be constructed at Morotai. Six 3 by 12 sections were carried by three 6 by 18 pontoon barges with the fourth 6 by 18 pontoon barge carrying 125 piles of 55 to 70 foot length. The four loaded barges were towed approximately 1700 miles and installation was completed for the Liberty ship dock at Morotai on October 8, 1944.

The battalion, on its arrival at Morotai on September 27, D-day plus 12, landed without difficulty, with the cooperation of U.S. Army

personnel.

Their basic mission was the construction of a Navy Base with administration buildings, Port Director facilities, a visual station operating base, fourteen storage facilities including warehouses and refrigerated structures, a Landing Craft Unit Base, a dispensary, two camps with 154 tents and allied facilities, a Malaria Control unit, a fire protection unit, a pontoon jetty, a radio station operating base, an internal communication system and a Radio Direction Finder Station -- all for an advanced base for Commander, Service Forces, Seventh Fleet.

Additionally, the Island Commander designated the 84th Construction Battalion to be responsible for operating and maintaining the Gila Peninsula Water System, maintaining primary roads on the peninsula, rebuilding Route 4, erecting water storage tanks at the 174th Army Station Hospital, assisting Army engineers on hospital utilities operation and construction, and operating a sand coral pit.

On top of these pressing assignments, the battalion had to build its own camp and was incorporated into the defense plans of the Gila Peninsula as a supporting unit in case of ground or water borne action. By December they had 125 men posted to permanent perimeter guard duty in order to enable the balance of the battalion No.# to complete their construction obligations. In addition, seven gun crews armed with 20 m.m. anti-aircraft weapons and 50 cal. machine guns were assigned to the anti-aircraft defense system. One of these crews, on October 31, 1944, achieved, the distinction of shooting down a Japanese plane, a feat confirmed by the nearby army gun command, which through a controlled - fire procedure was able to determine the source of the effective hits.

Another significant function of the Battalion was operation of a sawmill. This unit cut 600,000 board feet of lumber for use in completing the Navy Base and other projects.

The Navy Base was near completion and a significant proportion of the other projects were well along by November 20, except for a Navy Base Hospital which had been added to the original plans.

Construction progress was noteworthy in the conditions of almost constant combat and air alerts. They went on 173 red alerts between September 27 and February 20, 1945, a situation contributing to extreme fatigue and one fatality from falling flak.

Their efforts were recognized with letters of commendation from commanders of Army, Navy and transport units. Major General C. P. Hall, Commander, Headquarters 11th Corps, U. S. Army, commended the battalion for "exceptionally meritorious performance of duty in the operations against the enemy."

In a letter of appreciation, dated November 13, 1944, for the six-man anti-aircraft gun crew that downed the enemy airplane, Lt. Col. Alfred W. Kahl, Commanding Headquarters, 383 AAA Automatic Weapon Battalion, Coast Artillery Corps, U. S. Army, cited their "active

assistance for successful defense of the landing beaches and dock installations of the Morotai area on the morning of October 31, 1944."

A letter dated December 17, 1944 from Capt. William J. Keegan, Commanding Officer "Pangeo", 167th Infantry, United States Army, commended the battalion for "superior work in constructing a two mile road in clearing vast areas for our perimeter."

A commendation, dated December 21, from Commander, Service Force, Seventh Fleet, cited the crew of the 20 m. m. anti-aircraft gun for its feat.

Assistance to the 33rd Infantry Division in its landing on Morotai was cited in a letter of appreciation from Maj. Gen. P. W. Clarkson, Commanding.

By December, the men of the 84th were alerted to the fact that they were to continue in the onslaught against the reeling forces of Japan. As their construction projects were completed in January, they prepared themselves and their machines for movement. On February 24,

they were relieved of their remaining duties on Morotai by CEMU 565, and departed on February 28, 1945.

The next stop was Puerto Princesa, Palawan, P. I., where the 84th Construction Battalion landed March 12, 1945. After completing a permanent camp and a 2,000 man mess hall for the battalion and for incoming flight crews, the men turned to their principal assignments; construction of two Acorn Units (one for land planes and one for seaplanes) a Naval Headquarters Unit, and a Port Directors unit. In addition they cleared 63 acres, graded and finished the surface for taxiway and hardstands; of an aircorps base they operated a coral pit and hauled coral; built Naval Advanced Base Unit 9 to 80% completion in two weeks; blasted and moved 19,000 cubic yards of earth for the seaplane ramp and hardstand; and assembled two pontoon piers for unloading Acorn component units.

To these assignments was added the duty of operating a large brig. In April and June their underwater teams removed, repaired and replaced screws from LSMs.

By July, Lt. Gen. P. L. Kichelberger, Commanding General, 8th Army, had cited the Battalion for outstanding performance in completing 10,200 feet of taxiway and 1,889,500 square feet of parking area at the Puerto Princesa Airfield. The Acorn Seaplane unit was near completion and the Naval Headquarters entirely completed.

But the battalion commander was feeling the pinch of an acute manpower shortage due to rotation, rehabilitation leaves and hospitalization of the men. Notwithstanding, this he reported 100% completion of the Acorn Seaplane Base in August. Orders issued in that month authorized the battalion to prepare for disestablishment. Seventy-five men with less than 18 months service were transferred to CBMU 546, while the remainder of the men completed other work. On September 10, 1945 the battalion secured from all jobs and its members prepared for the trip home.
