1969 CHRONOLOGY

1. 28 MARCH - 10 JULY Detachment 18 involving 3 pilots and 4 crewmen deployed for 4 months aboard the USS Wasp (CVS-18) in the North Atlantic.
2. 29 MARCH - 20 APRIL VRC-40 provided logistic support to 4 carriers at the same time. During this period, the squadron flew 308 missions carrying over 880 passengers, over 29,800 pounds of mail and nearly 48,000 pounds of cargo.
3. 3 JULY VRC-40 Change of Command. Commander C. WITHERS relieved Commander M. M. JOHNSTON.
4. 1-6 SEPTEMBER Record of 6 carriers supported at one time by VRC-40. In a 6 day period, the squadron transported over 200 passengers along with 23,000 pounds of mail and cargo.
5. 2 SEPTEMBER - 5 DECEMBER Detachment 10 involving 3 pilots and 4 crewmen deployed for 3 months aboard the USS Yorktown in the North Atlantic/European Area.
6. 7 SEPTEMBER The ruler of Bahrain, His Highness Shaikh Issa Bin Sulman Al Khalifah was transported from the USS Independence (CVA-62) to the Naval Air Facility, Washington.
7. 10 SEPTEMBER - 8 OCTOBER Detachment 62 involving 2 pilots and 3 crewmen were embarked on the USS Independence for a NATO cruise.
8. 1 OCTOBER Annual Inspection of RPS Distributed Publications by Commander, Fleet Air Norfolk, Grade: Outstanding.
9. 8 OCTOBER VRC-40 initiated a delivery using ADDS (Air Deployment Delivery System). This "first" constituted dropping a needed part to the USS Hugh Purvis (DD-709) while 250 miles at sea.
10. 8 OCTOBER - 24 DECEMBER VRC-40 furnished a total of 4 Plane Commanders to Vietnam for COD support to 7th fleet carriers in South East Asia.
11. 24 OCTOBER ENS. Bonnie McCulloch reported into VRC-40, marking the first time the squadron has had a wave on board.

BASIC NARRATIVE

COMMAND ORGANIZATION AND RELATIONS

a. Fleet Tactical Support Squadron Forty (VRC-40) was commissioned on 1 July 1960, and assigned the mission of providing logistical support to the Navy's Atlantic Fleet. VRC-40 is presently home based at the Naval Air Station, Norfolk, Virginia, and functions under the operational control of Commander Naval Air Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, and the administrative control of Commander Fleet Air Norfolk. Commander C. Withers, relieved Commander M.M. Johnston on 3 July 1969.

b. VRC-40 is assigned seven (7) C-1A aircraft with 35 officers and 164 enlisted men. Thirty-two (32) officers are pilots and twenty-seven (27) men are designated aircrewmembers. The squadron is assigned the responsibility of maintaining approximately three (3) additional pool aircraft as replacements for Atlantic Fleet Carrier C-1A's.

c. VRC-40 is the only squadron in the Atlantic Fleet that carries out the unusual task of Carrier-Onboard-Delivery (COD) operations and paratroop operations for Navy Sea Air Land (SEAL) Teams and Marine Special Recon Forces (Pathfinders). Additionally, air gunspotting services are provided for Forward Air Controller training and weapons loading exercises are conducted on a quarterly basis at NAS, Guantanamo Bay and NAS Roosevelt Roads. One organization frequently transported along the East Coast is the Atlantic Fleet Combat Camera Group.

COD operations consist of transporting passengers, mail and high priority cargo to and from aircraft carriers operating at sea. The in-port time for some ships has been reduced by flying urgently needed parts and supplies to them on a timely basis. Some of our country's leading businessmen, government and military leaders, as well as foreign dignitaries, have flown with VRC-40; however, the majority of our passengers are naval personnel. Some of the many noteworthy personnel transported in 1969 were the Ruler of Bahrain, the Asst. Sec. of Defense, Dr. Selin, VAdm. P. Masterton, and VAdm. R. L. Townsend. In addition, VRC-40 is required, from time to time, to transport urgently needed personnel, equipment, and supplies to ports along the Eastern Seaboard and occasionally to different islands in the Caribbean area. The command also maintains a weapons replenishment capability for ships at sea.

OPERATIONS

a. VRC-40 differs from the majority of aviation commands in that it rarely deploys as a unit. However, we do assist various operations with one or two plane detachments. Throughout 1969, VRC-40 aircraft deployed 47 times to assist in operations along the Atlantic coast, the Caribbean area, South America and Northern Europe. The majority of these were COD (Carrier-Onboard-Delivery) detachments in support of Atlantic Fleet carriers. In performing this, our primary mission, VRC-40 operated out of ports along the Eastern Seaboard and in the Caribbean area for one and two week periods.

Our longest detachment of the year involved three pilots and four crewmen who were deployed for four months aboard the USS WASP (CVS-18) in the North Atlantic/European Area. VRC-40 supplied COD support to Seventh Fleet carriers in South East Asia during 1969 by sending four plane commanders to Vietnam for periods of 30 to 45 days.

SPECIAL TOPICS

a. Since its commissioning in 1960, VRC-40 has transported 4,306,812 pounds of cargo and mail with 68,989 passengers in 57,269 hours of flight time. With the addition of 6145 flight hours and 975 carrier landings in 1969, VRC-40 passed the mark of 11,500 arrested carrier landings.

CONCLUSIONS

a. VRC-40 has once again in 1969 accomplished its motto of "Service to the Fleet with Safety, Dependability and Courtesy".
