





















































COMMANDING OFFICER

From a small Maintenance Unit to the largest Construction Battalion since World War II, all in 6 months. It happened that way because we were tasked with one of the highest priority missions in support of Vietnamization—Dependent Shelter Construction. At our peak, we've had 15 Naval Construction Action Teams (NAVCATS) deployed simultaneously throughout Military Regions 2, 3, and 4 (formerly corps), not to mention our deployed maintenance or training detachments and teams on one time minor construction jobs. We responded quickly and with a quality product. Our reward was the recognition and confidence by higher authority that we could get the job done. Accordingly when CBMU301, our sister unit, left country in September, 1970, we were given additional tasking for Dependent Shelter Construction in the first Military Region. Our sphere of influence now extends from the DMZ to Phu Quoc Island off the coast of the southernmost reaches of RVN.

Helping to administer and manage a Battalion of 1200 men, with nearly 30 detachments or teams deployed throughout all the Republic of Vietnam is, to say the least, a most challenging experience. What makes it worthwhile is having an important mission and having in the unit the finest men in Seabee greens to ensure the success of that mission. From the block layers, to the men in the shops to the Headquarters-type personnel, I extend to you my sincerest "Well Done". To those of you who have left the unit—I wish you every success in the future—to those of us who still have time remaining with the unit we're left with the continuing challenge of our Battalion Creed: "The man who says it can't be done usually finds himself being interrupted by a CBMU 302 Seabee doing it. Carry on!"

LOOKING BACK... CBMU 302 officially became part of the Pacific Fleet on 31 March 1967 along with its sister unit CBMU 301, the first of their kind since the Korean War. LT M. H. Harper, CEC, USN, assumed command. The official commissioning ceremony of CBMU 301 and 302 was held on 7 April 1967 at Port Hueneme with Radm. Eli T. Reich acting as Commissioning Officer. Shortly thereafter, LT Harper departed for temporary duty with Commander Construction Battalion, Pacific and Naval Support Activity Saigon to plan the expected deployment of the unit to Vietnam. While awaiting deployment orders during June and July the Unit embarked upon a program of accelerated military training at Conejo Grade and Camp Pendleton, California. On 1 July LT M. H. Harper was promoted to Lieutenant Commander.

On August 12 COMCBPAC directed deployment of fifty men from CBMU 302 to the Naval Support Activity Detachment located at Cam Ranh Bay in the II Corps Tactical Zone. LTJG B. B. Emory, CEC, USN, Officer-in-Charge, departed with an advance party of fifty men on 16 August 1967. Their arrival on the nineteenth gave them the distinction of being the first Seabee Command to be deployed in II, III, and IV CTZ, and also the first Seabee Command to provide support for seagoing Navy Units and their advanced bases.

Prior to the dependent shelter project, CBMU 302's detachments were mainly for maintenance of U.S. and VN Naval Units here in II, III, and IV Corps. The Dependent Shelter project has quadrupled our unit size. Maintenance had varied from minor support of Naval base facilities to major construction, such as a PCF Overhead structure at NSF.

The Dependent Shelter program became the Battalion's main project in September of 1969.

In the vanguard of the Dependent Shelter program are the CBMU 302 Naval Construction Action Teams (NAVCAT), of which there are fifteen deployed simultaneously throughout the Republic of Vietnam. They consist of a large nucleus of Seabees with an augment of Seamen, Airmen, and Firemen, working side by side to build dependent shelters or to produce concrete block and latterite brick.

Major concrete block plants are located at Saigon by NAVCAT 18, and at Cam Ranh by NAVCAT 16. Not only are these plants supplying the product of CBMU 202 they are the primary source of the basic building material used by other hattalions now beginning to enter the the needs of CBMU 302, they are the primary source of the basic building material used by other battalions now beginning to enter the dependent shelter project.

In July of 1969, Mobile Team 30213 was established and deployed to install utilities in the medical building at VNNTC at Cam Ranh. Team 30213 was established and deployed to assemble five NLP barges at Naval Support Activity Detachment, Cat Lo. 30214 was established and deployed to erect bunkered platforms at the ATSB Tuyen Nhon. 30215 was established and deployed to fulfill the requirement for electrical rehabilitation and improvements on Navy assets in the Saigon area. 30216 was established to assist the new VN Navy to develop a light construction capability to improve their self-sufficiency for construction in remote locations with emphasis

on the use of locally available material.

August saw the small-scale pilot project, initiated at NSAD Ben Luc, adopt a ferro-cement dome concept for use in the shelter project. At the Naval Support Facility a new 20' x 40' forklift accessible armory was begun. 30206 returned from its deployment to Newport and Nha Be. 30211 returned to CRB from An Thoi. 30217 deployed to Newport to erect a pre-engineered building for covered storage; It measured 50' x 200'. 30218 deployed to Cat Lo to assemble two 3' x 6' NLP barges, 30213 returned to CRB from VNNTC upon mission completion, as did 30214 from Tuyen Nhon. On the 16th of August, command of the Battalion passed from LCDR H. W. Filbry to LCDR H. H. Harrell. The Cam Ranh Bay dependent shelter project was begun with three Southeast Asia Huts and two experimental models at 302 headquarters. Two teams, 30215 and 30210 returned to CRB from Saigon and Nha Be respectively upon completion of their missions.

During September, team 30218, after completing two 3'x 6' NLP barges, two 3'x 4' NLP tugs, and eight of twelve 2'x 5' NLP barges, was tasked with another six 2' x 5' NLP barges. 30220 began construction of VN dependent shelters at VNNTC with NAF personnel. 30217 returned from Newport upon mission completion, and 30219 was deployed to Qui Nhon as supervisors and advisors to the VN Navy.

During November, team 30218 at Cat Lo completed its deployment after constructing 16 NLP barges of varying configurations. 30222 was deployed to construct and begin operation of a concrete block plant at NAF, for use in the dependent shelter program. 30221 deployed to Dong Tam to rehabilitate structures for the Naval Advisors.

On 4 November, a detail of men from CBMU 302 made possible a significant increase in goodwill between the civilian population of Cam Ranh Village and U.S. forces in the area, by recovering the remains of a whale for interment in Cam Ranh Village's Whale

Temple. The whale is a sign of good fortune in fishing villages. (See page 112 for details on the whale capture).

On 27 November, 30216 at Ben Luc began production of latterite cement bricks for use on their dependent shelter project. On 17 December, team 30227 deployed on 12 hours notice to NSAD Binh Thuy to cap aircraft revetments for dust control. 30225 deployed to Vung Tau on 21 December to fence in an ammunition storage area and provide security lighting. Enemy action increased in December at our detachments. Detail Delta at My Tho received 5 mortar rounds and several rockets on the second, and 2 more mortar rounds on the

sixth. On the sixth, Detail Golf at NAF took one rocket. Detail Charlie at Cat Lo took 8 mortar rounds on the fifteenth and five days later Detail Delta took several rockets.

On 14 December, team 30223 deployed to VNNTC, Nha Trang, to install a laundry facility. 30224 deployed to NSAD Binh Thuy to construct a 40' x 96'

Pasco building.

On 31 December 30226 deployed to Thu Doc to begin construction of 200 units of dependent shelters for the VN marines. On January fourth, Detail Juliett at Dong Tam commissioned the Public Works training school. On the thirteenth, team 30231 deployed to Nha Be to test the unit's first organic barge mounted flash desalinization unit. On the nineteenth, Delta Company was formed to organize the dependent shelter projects. On the 21st of January, Details Alfa, Charlie, Delta, Echo, Foxtrot, and India were disestablished and transferred to NSA Saigon, and on the 23rd, 30232 was deployed to An Thoi and tasked with 197 units.

Details Delta and Juliett at Dong Tam were the object of many rocket and mortar attacks during December and January. On the 28th of December, Detail Delta took 10 rockets, followed by 12 mortar rounds on the 19th of January. Detail Juliett took 7 mortar rounds on the 27th and 7 more on the 24th.

On the 29th of December, team

30228 deployed to Dong Tam to rehabilitate 2 Public Works Training School buildings. Team 30230 went to Dong Tam to build Dependent shelters, and team 30229 deployed to Vinh Gia.

On the 30th of January, representatives of Cam Ranh Village formally presented a scroll and plaque to the command, commemo-

rating the assistance rendered in transporting the whale remains for the village in November 1969.

Team 30261 at Hon Khoi was the first of our detachments to be supplied by overland convoy, being just north of Nha Trang. During February, 98 PCS personnel were received from NSA Da Nang and CBMU 301 for use on the dependent shelter project. Enemy action during January and February began at Thu Doc, where 6 rounds small arms fire were taken on the 27th of January. Dong Tam took 6 mortar rounds on the 29th, and 4 more on the 14th of February and began again on the 25th with 7 mortar rounds, while on the 18th our Headquarters took 3 rounds. 30225 returned to CRB as did 30229 upon mission completion. Team 30228 merged with 30230 at

Dong Tam. 30234 deployed to Tinh Bien to construct base facilities, and 30235 began work on the YR-9 berthing ship.

On the 26th of February the first VN family moved into its shelter at NAVCAT 2. Detail Golf at NAF took 12 rockets on the 7th of March and again on the 12th; VNNTC was hit by four mortar rounds on the 10th while Dong Tam also took incoming rounds. Teams

30223, 30234, 30219 returned to base camp upon mission completion.

Team 30265 was deployed to Nha Trang for dependent shelter construction, as was 30262 to Binh Ba. On the 14th of March, LCDR Myron B. Sherman became XO of 302, relieving Lt. Paul F. Jacobs; and the initial draft of NAVCAT non-rated personnel were received.

On the 15th of April, graduating ceremonies for Base Maintenance Training School at Detail Juliett, Dong Tam. Special awards and

graduation certificates were presented to VN trainees. On the 31st of March the headquarters repelled a suspected sapper while at Dong Tam the next night, 13 rounds of mortar fire were taken, and fourteen more on the fifth and seven more on the 16th. Detail Golf at NAF

took 50 rockets and mortar rounds, and sustained a sapper attack on the eighth.

On the 19th of May, 30235 completed the assigned construction and returned to base camp. Three days later 30268 was deployed to An Khan to construct VNN dependent shelters. On the 20th, C and D companies were rearranged so that C Company covered all of our II CTZ operations and D Company our III, and IV CTZ Operations. Team 30238 was subjected to a sapper attack and a barrage of 18 mortar rounds. 30230 took 120 mortar rounds, suffering damage to a tool room.

Team 30229 deployed to Ben Luc to fabricate an AMMI Dry Dock. 30261 completed assigned construction and returned to base

camp, being the first dependent shelter project completed.

During June, NAF came under rocket and mortar and a sapper attack on the 4th and 10th. Detail Juliet at Dong Tam also became the object of mortar and sapper attacks on the 6th and 10th. VNNTC was hit by rocket fire. On the 28th, 30216 at Ben Luc repelled a grenade attack by exchanging fire with the enemy.


Today one finds 302 Seabees still maintaining and

performing minor construction projects.

The shelter program consumes much energy, but CBMU 302's contribution towards the turnover of U.S. assets has several other aspects. One of these is in connection with the Protein Project operated by Coastal Task Force 115. Pigs, chickens, and ducks are being raised on an increasing scale in order to supplement the diet of Vietnamese sailors. The barns, pens, and pond were engineered and

built by CBMU 302.
CBMU 302's NAVCATs have been progressing at an unbelievable rate in spite of a determined enemy. We build, we fight, we get the job done.

Charlie Company came into being in September of 1969. Its original mission was directing the activities of all maintenance unit detachments and mobile construction teams in II, III, and IV Corps.

The first Company Commander was LTJG K. L. Alexander. The next was LTJG E. B. Rucker who retained this position until the Battalion was reorganized in May. Under LT F. A. Seymour, Charlie adopted its present mission of directing all mobile construction in II Corps, including the NAVCATs, the NAF Block Plant, and the remaining maintenance dets at Nha Trang, Qui Nhon and NAF. LTJG T. M. Kearns is presently in charge of Charlie Company and is ably assisted by a crew of expediters and yeomen who reside topside in the twin Charlie/Delta Company offices.

The men of Charlie Company have completed projects over a range of 300 miles in the Republic of Vietnam. At many different remote sites, teams as well as maintenance detachments deployed to accomplish tasks which required the Seabees to use their military as well as their professional skills and earned them many nights in the bunkers and citations from COMNAVSUPPACT Saigon.

Working in more civilized areas of the Republic, Charlie Company teams have built a chapel for the Naval Air Facility at Cam Ranh Bay, provided new office space for NAVFORV in Saigon, constructed the block plants at both sites, and completely rehabilitated a yr-9 repair ship into berthing spaces for Vietnamese Naval Personnel.

Charlie Company at present is deeply involved in providing 870 dependent shelters for the Vietnamese Navy at Hon Khoi, Qui Nhon, Nha Trang, Binh Ba, NAF Cam Ranh Bay, and NSF Cam Ranh Bay.

Delta Company came into existence as the result of the Battalion's increased effort in the field of dependent shelter construction for the Vietnamese Navy. The first Company Commander was LTJG K. L. Alexander, who helped formulate the present dependent shelter program in January of 1970, while still serving in Charlie Company. At the onset Delta Company was in charge of all dependent shelter construction in 2, 3, and 4 Military Regions, which included sites which stretched from Hon Khoi in the far north of 2MR to An Thoi which is on Phu Quoc Island in the gulf of Siam.


During the latter part of February 1970, LT F. A. Seymour arrived and assumed the duties of Delta Company Commander, assisted by ENS John Roy. At this time we had seven construction sites at Hon Khoi, Naval Support Facility at Cam Ranh Bay, Thu Doc, Ben Luc, Dong Tam and An Thoi. As the program grew and sites were added at Qui Nhon, Nha Trang, Binh Ba Island, Cuu Long Rach Dua, and An Khanh, it became apparent that with the majority of the sites lying in 3 and 4 MR a revision in the Battalion structure was in order. With this thought carried into fruition, Delta Company was reorganized around 15 May to have operational control of only those dependent shelter sites in 3 and 4 MR. Along with the revision came the transferring of the title of Delta Company Commander to our representative in Saigon, LT M. A. Barratta. LT Barratta had been functioning as the 302 liaison officer for all our activities in the Delta region, both dependent shelters and minor construction. This placed Delta Company in charge of seven building sites, one concrete block plant and a project at NAVFORV headquarters involved in construction of new office spaces. The company then expanded further to include a roving force of mechanics with headquarters at the Saigon Block Plant who went to all the job sites in 3 and 4 MR to repair our construction equipment or provide repair parts if the need existed. Also a crew of Transit Mix operators was assigned to the Block Plant to provide the service of carrying freshly-batched concrete to the sites in and around Saigon. All these personnel were supported by an Assistant Company Commander in Saigon, CWO4 R. E. Fenstermaker, a representative in Cam Ranh Bay, ENS T. A. Johnson and several storekeepers in the Saigon office.

At the peak of our deployments to 3 and 4 MR, Delta Company personnel numbered around 350 members, both group VIII and a sizable influx of SN, FN, and AN rates. The infusion of these SN, FN, and AN's into the dependent shelter program brought about a new title for our dependent shelter teams. In order to promote a greater feeling of esprit de corps, Vice Admiral Zumwalt, then Commander of Naval Forces, Vietnam, coined the acronym NAVCAT—Naval Construction Action Team. The NAVCAT program is basically the mission of Delta Company at this time and will remain so until the Battalion's task of providing dependent shelters for the personnel of the Vietnamese Navy is com-

pleted.

The United States Seabees have performed a thousand and one impossible feats in the past 27 years of traditional "Can Do" firsts, and to keep up the pace, November brought our own CBMU 302, here in Cam Ranh Bay, a classic escapade.

On the beach just north of the Naval Communication Stations Receiver Site near here, in the middle of a monsoon rain with heavy winds and pounding surf, a whale was washed ashore on November 4th. To the Americans here the whale was nothing more than a big fish which we estimated at 6 tons, nearly 40 feet long, and dead approximately 2 weeks. Not too many of us got excited while driving by, but when the Vietnamese saw it it was big news!

For many hundreds of years and very strongly to this day, the Vietnamese people have been loyal to many rituals, religions and types of worship which we find somewhat difficult to comprehend.

Traditionally, Vietnamese have been fishermen, and many different types of worship belong to fishermen alone. Among these is the worship of the whale which is quite interesting for those eager to understand different cultures.

When Commander Mack, senior advisor to the VNNTC, and Commander Hopp, Commanding Officer of the VNNTC, heard of the dead whale from the enthusiastic people of Cam Ranh Village, they immediately realized the importance and the need to rescue the whale from the threatening surf and get it to the village itself. Commander Mack immediately started looking for help, and ultimately realized this was work for the Seabees, so he called up our XO and CO for assistance in transporting the whale 8 miles to the village. When our CO recovered from the shock of the request ("We've got to move a whale tonight, can you help?") he reacted immediately and the whole project went into full swing.

One dozer, two dumps, two payloaders and other emergency equipment were all sent to the site. In the meantime about 40 Cam Ranh Village men and a few Seabees were

already there ahead of the equipment, fighting the stormy beach trying to lash ropes around the whale to keep it from being swept out. It was lost once but returned. Headlights from the road above were used to provide light. Luckily no one was hurt. The odds were indeed great and personal danger was a constant threat. The determination the Vietnamese had for the rescue of the whale was simply fantastic.

When the equipment arrived, all the Seabees pitched in and valiantly, with the work led mainly by Senior Chief Kingren, managed to save the whale and place it in the trucks. It was too heavy and large to be lifted into a truck with the equipment we had, so with the permission of the Village Chief we cut it in half with a bulldozer and even then it was quite a task. The equipment operators' outstanding performance together with the quick men in the sand pushed the operation steadily through.

The two whale trucks were decorated with red silk over the cab to set off the occasion even more. With the two decorated trucks in the lead and about 60 people behind in various vehicles the procession looked rather unique and was perhaps the first of its kind in history.

The smell from the carcass was abominable, but with all the enthusiasm and determination of the sea-faring mob it mattered little how great the stench was.

Upon arrival at the village gate at 0200, all the village was fully awake and lining the sides of the streets in honor to the precious cargo. All of the sights were colorful indeed. Drums, horns, and singing accompanied the jubilant people. They all bowed in reverence and were deeply honored. Incense was burned and the whole affair was very orderly.



The trucks were skillfully driven down the winding narrow paths of the village to a carefully prepared burial place for the whale. The area immediately in front of the existing temple to Ong (whale) was chosen. After the carcass was placed on the ground it was incensed and stared at by the interested people for quite some time in the heavy rain.

Before the small group of Seabees left the village and the whale, some of us became quite attached. The elders and chief invited us into the temple. We were greatly intrigued and honored with the experience. Appreciation for our assistance was very sincerely expressed by the village priest, on behalf of his people. You see, now that Cam Ranh Village has the body of the whale, which they will prepare and venerate with their age old rituals, the village will now receive great honor and good fortune.

Three days later on the 7th of November, the village chief arranged for the village to give a feast for the men who rescued the whale to show their appreciation

for our work.

The feast took place on the patio in front of the temple to Ong Nam Hai (The Whale Spirit of the Fishermen). We were greatly honored and taken care of, throughout the whole affair. Fifty feet away the whale was buried in a mound of sand about 6 feet high and braced on the sides with boards. The carcass will remain there for two years until it is time to dig up the clean bones for a place in their temple. Flags decorated the burial ground and frequently women would go up and offer incense or pray. We were fed roast pig prepared in different ways which was sacrificed that morning in the temple. The food was delicious.

We did not hear any music at that time in the afternoon. The veneration ceremony only takes place at certain times in the day. We all were proud to witness such an event and indeed gained much from the experience.

Most important, Ong Nam Hai did promote good luck and successful times just as he was supposed to. For if the whale was never washed ashore to begin with, the Vietnamese and the particular group of Americans here in Cam Ranh Bay would never have been as mutually understood as they are now.

The respect the Vietnamese of every fishing village in Vietnam have for the whale is especially unique in all respects. To begin with, just as every country has its legends and fables so also does Vietnam. Legends of how the whale has rescued shipwrecked fishermen are still told very vividly to this day. An old fisherman in Vietnam could tell you of many of his own adventures with the creatures of the sea. The Vietnamese fishermen have strong beliefs in taboos, legends and spirits of the sea.

To these people, the sea is a kingdom. The whale is the king and is always escorted by sharks, octopi, lobster and many warriors on all sides to defend against any attack. The mountain people or casual fishermen, would call a whale "Ca Voi" or simply Elephant Fish. To the people who respect the worship of the whale, it is "Ca Ong Voi" or Sir Elephant Fish. To the fishermen who worship and respect the mighty mammal, the whale is more emphatically "Ong Nam Hai".

There are still many fishermen who when going on their fishing outing, carry incense, and offerings to be sacrificed if a whale is sighted.

When and if he is sighted, they immediately bow in reverence and offer incense.

It is interesting to note that these people have a great trust for Ong's assistance in times of distress. Even though they deeply respect the whale, they believe he has a duty to save them. If a person drowns, a nearby Ong who failed to come to the rescue will be killed by his warriors and they will seek a new Ong.

The first man to sight a dead whale either floating in the sea or washed up on shore has great honor bestowed on him. He immediately rushes back to tell the news and people come in hordes to save it. He is now called Son of the Fish. While at the village we saw him dressed in white and wearing a turban. The celebration for the people lasts as long as the money does. It is a rare occasion in any village in Vietnam. In fact, Cam Ranh now has its first whale ever since the village was formed nearly 100 years ago.

Cam Ranh Village is now a true fishing village, because of its having its own Ong. Before it had a temple, but the bones were borrowed from another village. Ong has often caused very serious disputes between villages, because of conflict over who is the real son of the fish. Up north, a whale was sighted floating at sea a few years ago. Fishermen attached ropes and towed it to shore to the mouth of a river which led to their village. While advancing up the river, they came upon a bridge. Rather than take the 2 minutes required to pass under the bridge, they took the whale many miles overland to an unobstructed river, so that no human being would have the authority to surpass Ong by walking above him.

The worship of the spirit in Ong is one of Vietnam's customs, and a large part of their culture are such customs. The Dragon to some is a symbol of power, the Unicorn one of Bravery, the Tortoise for Long Life, the Phoenix for freedom. The Vietnamese have different beliefs which must be respected as part of their culture. Next time your girl slaps on some of that expensive perfume, mention that you spent a year with people who worship, risk their life for, but would never touch the source of that exotic by-product.
