



The Naval Support Activity, DaNang, (NAVSUPPACT, DNG), a unit of the Service Force, Pacific Fleet and Naval Forces, Vietnam was established on October 15, 1965 to support the Third Marine Amphibious Force (III MAF).

The Navy's largest overseas Shore Command supports some 140,000 Free World Fighting Forces, including 80,000 U.S. Marines in I Corps, the five northern provinces of South Vietnam.

The command has grown from not much more than an anchorage to a bustling deep draft sea port handling a total of one million tons of cargo every three months. Sixty percent is retained in DaNang while forty percent is shipped up and down the 200 miles of coast.

On October 15, 1966, the Thong Nhat Deep Water Piers complex was officially dedicated. The two piers, 90 by 60 feet, plus a special De Long Pier, more than doubled the cargo capacity.


One of the world's largest warehouses is at NAVSUPPACT, DaNang. It grew from six butler buildings in mud and sand to an 18 8-unit butler building complex with more than 570,000 square feet of covered storage. Five reefer banks with 110,000 square feet grew to 13 reefer banks with more than 350,000 square feet of area. In addition, there is more than 500,000 square feet of hard-surface open storage at NAVSUPPACT, DaNang's Covered Storage.

From an original 1,412 officers and men, NAVSUPPACT has grown to a force of 8,000 Navy personnel and more than 3,000 Vietnamese civilian employees.

The Command's operations have expanded to include detachments at Dong Ha/Cua Viet, Phu Bai/Hue/Tan My, and the largest detachment of 1,000 Navy personnel in Chu Lai, a port with one sixth the capacity of DaNang.

Camp Tien Sha provides messing and berthing facilities at the foot of Monkey Mountain for more than 4,000 personnel. A total of 1,600 live on three barracks ships in DaNang harbor.
























































Paul L. Lacy, Jr. Rear Admiral United States Navy Paul Lindsay Lacy, Jr., born in Dallas, Texas on August 2, 1920, entered the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland in 1939.

Graduating and being commissioned an Ensign in June 1942, RADM LACY was assigned to USS CLEVELAND. Upon completing his tour in USS CLEVELAND, he attended Submarine School and upon completion in April 1944 was assigned as gunnery officer of USS SEA CAT (SS-399). While assigned to SEA CAT, RADM LACY participated in four war patrols and received the Navy Commendation Medal.

Leaving SEA CAT in June 1946, RADM LACY attended Post Graduate School at the Naval Academy and the University of California at Los Angeles where he was awarded a Master of Science in Applied Physics in June 1949. The following month he reported to USS BAYA(SS-318) to serve as Executive Officer, after which he served as Division Engineer on the Staff of Commander Submarine Division 51 at San Diego, California until October 1950. He was then assigned to USS ENTEMEDOR (SS-340) to serve as Executive Officer for thirteen months, and as Commanding Officer for two months.

In March 1952, RADM LACY was assigned to the Naval Torpedo Station, Keyport, Washington, where he served as Proof and Inspection Officer. From April to August 1954, he was in charge of recommissioning USS GUITARRO (SS-363), being prepared for delivery to the Turkish Navy.

Following this assignment, RADM LACY commanded USS PICKEREL (SS-524) for two years. In September 1956 he was ordered to the Research and

Development Division, Bureau of Ordnance. In July 1958, RADM LACY reported for instruction at the Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, after which he received nuclear propulsion training.

In July 1960, RADM LACY reported as Prospective Commanding Officer of USS ETHAN ALLEN (SSBN-608) and, upon commissioning, assumed command of the BLUE CREW. While serving in this capacity, RADM LACY was awarded a Gold Star in lieu of a second Navy Commendation Medal. In June 1964, he reported as Head of the Plans and Programs Branch, Special Projects Office, and in June 1965 became Deputy Director of that Office, which has overall management responsibilities for the Polaris Program.

In June 1966 he was selected for Rear Admiral, and on February 5, 1967, RADM LACY relieved RADM Thomas R. Weschler as Commander, U. S. Naval Support Activity, DaNang, Republic of Vietnam, the Navy's largest overseas shore-based command.

In addition to the Navy Commendation Medal with Gold Star and the Navy Unit Commendation Ribbon, Rear Admiral LACY has received the American Defense Service Medal; American Campaign Medal; European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal; World War II Victory Medal; China Service Medal; National Defense Service Medal; and the Philippine Liberation Ribbon.

He is married to the former Katherine Maile Kerley of Honolulu, Hawaii, and they have four children.





William Russell JOHNSON was born at Long Eddy, New York on March 7, 1920 son of Catherine (McTeague) JOHNSON and the late George F. JOHNSON. Captain JOHNSON was graduated from the Long Eddy High School in 1935, enlisted in the U. S. Navy in October 1937 and first served on the Battleship NEW YORK where he was nominated for and successfully passed the academic examination as a Fleet appointee to the U. S. Naval Academy. Because of defective vision he was physically disqualified and returned to sea, serving on board the Light Cruiser HELENA and the Aircraft Carrier RANGER before and during the early part of World War II in the Atlantic and Mediterranean Theaters.

While serving as a Chief Fire Controlman instructing at the U.S. Naval Gun Factory, Captain JOHNSON received a direct commission as an Ensign, U.S. Navy and was ordered to the precommissioning detail of the Destroyer PUTNAM as Fire Control Officer. After commissioning, the PUTNAM took part in the invasions of Iwo Jima and Okinawa serving in escort, radar picket, and fire support roles. Later, she was part of a covering force for the occupation of Southern Honshu, during which time Captain JOHNSON became Gunnery Officer. He next served as Senior Instructor of the Atlantic Fleet Afloat Gunnery officers school on the Destroyers BORIE and WARRINGTON. In September 1948 he attended Columbia University where he majored in mathematics. In July 1950, with the opening of the Korean Conflict, he returned to sea as the Prospective Operations Officer in the precommissioning detail of the Escort Destroyer CON-WAY, an Atlantic Fleet Destroyer, which was temporarily deployed to the Seventh Fleet where she served in escort, picket, and fire support roles off the east and west coasts of Korea. In July 1952 Captain JOHNSON was ordered to post graduate school instruction in Ordnance (Special Physics)—two years of instruction at the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, California and one year at the University of California, Berkeley (Bevatron Research Group). During this period he earned the Bachelor of Science (Physics) and Master of Science (Physics) degrees.


In July 1955 Captain JOHNSON reported to the Radar Picket Destroyer MYLES C. FOX as Executive Officer and Navigator, serving in the Atlantic and Mediterranean waters until May 1957 when he was ordered as Commanding Officer of Radar Picket Destroyer Escort VANDIVER which was primarily assigned as a unit of the Atlantic early warning network. From August 1958 to June 1959 Captain JOHNSON was a student at Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island (Command and Staff course). Upon completion of the course, he remained on the staff as an instructor in operational planning until July 1961 when he reported to the Bath Iron Works as Prospective Commanding Officer of the Guided Missile Destroyer SELLERS. Upon commissioning, the SELLERS was assigned to the Atlantic Fleet and participated in the Cuban Quarantine. After being relieved in May 1963 he reported to the Guided Missile Cruiser GALVESTON, serving as Executive Officer during operations in the Western Pacific and off the West coast. Next, he was ordered to the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations on the staff of Vice Admiral MARTELL, Director of Anti-Submarine Warfare Programs, as Head of Surface Branch, Technical Division. After two years in the assignment, Captain JOHNSON was next a student at the National War College, Fort Leslie J. McNair, Washington, D. C. With the completion of this course of instruction, he was ordered to duty as Chief of Staff and Aide to Rear Admiral LACY, Commander, U. S. Naval Support Activity, DaNang, Republic of Vietnam.

Captain JOHNSON is married to the former Virginia Venemon of Paterson, New Jersey. They have three sons: William Russell, Jr., David Allen and Scott Lee. During his present tour of duty in Vietnam, his family is living at their home in McLean, Virginia.







NAVSUPPACT, DANANG is responsible for Civic Action in the city of DaNang, the second largest in Vietnam with a population of 275,000 living in more than 130 hamlets. DaNang and its harbor comprise an area equal to that of the District of Columbia. Working through the Mayor of DaNang, the Navy operates nine Village Assistance Teams (VAT) living and working with the people, 28 self-help projects, a technical training school for refugees, and assistance to two hospitals. NAVSUPPACT DANANG Doctors and Hospital Corpsmen treat more than 4,000 Viet-Namese each week Namese each week.

The 1,000 man Security Division is charged with base security, road patrol, fire protection, investigation and intelligence. As an aid to security, 28 sentry dogs are used.





SUPPLY & FISCAL


The Supply Division is responsible for the movement, storage and stock control of cargo. They carried more than 38,000 line items in July of 1966 and by May of 1967, it was more than 83,000. Stock control processed more than 3,000 receipts in August of 1966 and in May of 1967, they processed more than 23,000. Fiscal Section manages funds spent by all divisions which in fiscal 1967 was \$40.7 million, and supervise the payroll close to one half million dollars every two weeks. Freight Terminal Section handles the offloading of cargo from ships and port clearance. The Fuel Section provides comprehensive support for I Corps. A total of 30-million gallons a month is consumed of diesel, aviation gas, motor gas, and JP-4 (Jet) fuels.
