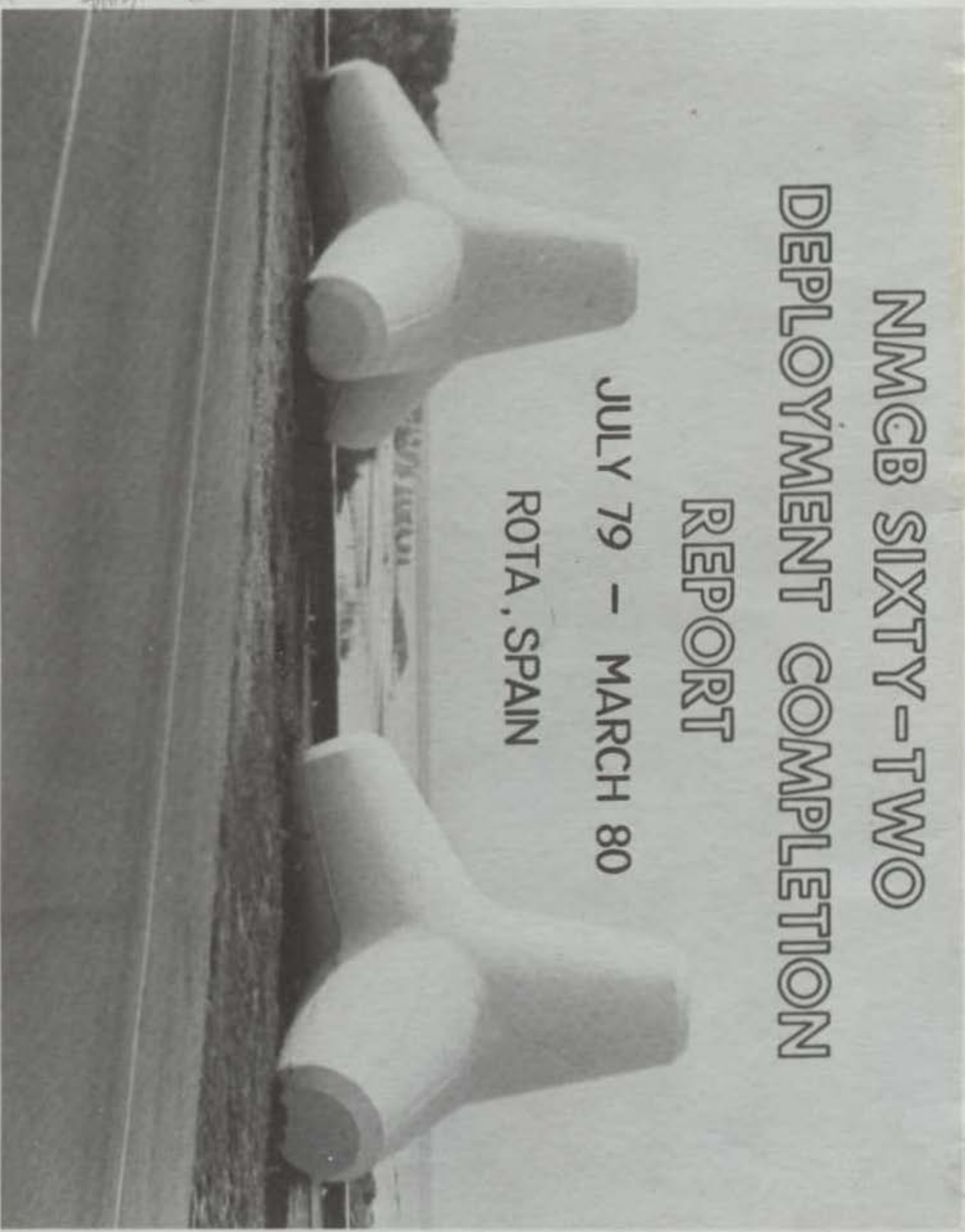

1. ADMINISTRATION CLERICAL SUPPORT FOR DEPARTMENTS AND COMPANIES: An improvement in administration and records keeping, was achieved by assigning a full time Yeoman to S-3 Department, ALFA Company and BRAVO Company. See enclosure (4) page 4-4.
2. CAREER COUNSELING: Career Counseling during Rota Deployment was highly successful. Interviews were held in the office and through the periodic refresher training of retention team members an excellent retention program was maintained. Results for retention of first term: 33%, second term: 94%, career and beyond: 93%. See enclosure (4) page 4-4.
3. CHAPLAINS OFFICE: The chaplains office provided a command worship program, counseling, the family involvement program, civic action program in conjunction with operations, and a camp library. See enclosure (4) page 4-4. The civic action program is further covered in enclosure (6) page 6-83.
4. CHIEF MASTER AT ARMS: The CMAA maintained good order and discipline, battalion watch bill, reactionary force assignments and camp security. The Battalion Investigator set up random canine inspections to control illicit drugs. See enclosure (4) page 4-5.

#### TRAINING

15. EXTENSIVE TRAINING PROGRAM: The battalion put together a comprehensive training program, both in preparation for and during deployment, including formal training, Special Construction Battalion Training (SCBT), combat skills training, human goals and drug/alcohol abuse education, general military training, physical fitness training and technical training. See enclosure (5) page 5-3.

#### OPERATIONS

16. SAFETY: The battalion conducted an extensive safety program emphasized with continual awareness, and chain of command follow ups. See enclosure (6) page 6-13.

17. PROJECT EXECUTION AND MANAGEMENT: The comprehensive battalion construction management system sensed the needs and assisted project managers as well as detail OIC's. The battalion accomplished 28805 mandays (35568 MD including Diego Garcia) in completing or exceeding it's tasking on 43 of 63 assigned projects at the six sites under the OPCON of the main body. Through a "solution oriented" approach to problem and an emphasis on rapid response to questions, good progress was made throughout the deployment. At three of the six sites (one of those being Rota) the tasking was completed without any punchlist items remaining, and the 31.7% direct labor exceeded CBLANTS goal by over 4000 mandays. The mini-computer was used to assist managers. See enclosure (6) page 6-15.

18. PROJECT PLANNING: All project planning was accomplished by project superintendants and crew leaders assigned to specific projects in home port. The planning phase generated numerous requests for additional tools, materials and equipment which proved vital to the success of the deployment. See enclosure (6) page 6-16.



19. **QUALITY CONTROL:** Quality control aggressively enforced plans and specifications within all levels of the battalion. Operating with an attitude of not only enforcing but instructing while inspecting paid valuable dividends as the deployment continued and the quality of rework was minimized. See enclosure (6) page 6-16.

20. **PLANNING AND ESTIMATING:** Planning and estimating provided support to the companies and liasoned with MLO. Vigorous management of the addon material process was one of the keys to the many "no punchlist" completions at Rota and the detail sites. See encl (6) page 6-16.

21. **ENGINEERING:** Engineering provided technical assistance in the areas of design, surveying, materials testing, and drafting. The engineering section frequently accomplished approved add on designs to existing projects in order to expedite the construction. In addition they performed a number of designs for camp upgrade projects at Rota and Sigonella. See enclosure (6) page 6-17.

#### SUPPLY AND LOGISTICS

22. **SUPPLY AND LOGISTICS: Readiness.** In view of the current world situation, the readiness posture for the resident battalion is considered excellent. Part II warehouse is stowed in an outstanding manner. Floor plans and bay markers reflect where SG's are located. Condition of material is unknown. In the event of a mount-out, the resident battalion will have to obtain 10K low profile forklifts capable of handling 4632 pallets. These can be obtained from the Air Terminal and are absolutely necessary to move the Air Det out. NBC gear stock has been inventoried. Items layout beyond expiration date were ordered under priority 05. Some items have been received. "B" ration stocks were also rotated and new rations are on board and in the Part II warehouse. Items listed on the Master Availability List that are either CEEI or APA material have been requested from 20TH NCR for shipment to bring the Part II up to allowance. See enclosure (7) page 7-5.

23. **ENLISTED DINING FACILITY:** The battalion initiated major equipment procurements in conjunction with a COMCBLANT initiated renovation program. See enclosure (7) page 7-6.

#### EQUIPMENT

24. **EQUIPMENT MANAGEMENT PROGRAM:** An efficient and highly effective equipment management program was established for the 324 piece suit of organic and augment equipment at Rota, and the augment allowance at dets Sigonella, Nea Makri, and Souda Bay. This program was evaluated by COMCBLANT DET Gulfport's CESE representative's visit as the "best he had seen in his tenure in the NCF." See enclosure (8) page 8-6.



25. LIVE STORAGE: The live storage inventory was increased at the beginning of the deployment and a complete reorganization of the live storage staging established. The efforts of the live storage crew were complimented as "outstanding" during the final CESE visit. See enclosure (8) page 8-7.

26. FIRST ECHELON MAINTENANCE: The commanding officer's personal interest in monitoring first echelon maintenance through weekly vehicle inspections led to a greater awareness of operator responsibilities, assisting the total maintenance effort. See enclosure (8) page 8-6.

#### CAMP MAINTENANCE

27. CAMP MAINTENANCE: The camp maintenance organization worked diligently to provide responsive and effective facility maintenance during the Rota deployment. 3300 mandays of labor were utilized in this effort. The shops performed alterations and repairs to numerous facilities to enhance their function. Some of the major alteration and repair projects included replacement of the galley's four chill box refrigeration units, complete repair of three BEQ gang heads, installation of water softners at the galley, BEQ Utility House, and BOQ, and placement of a three ply bituminous cover in the gutters at the ALFA Company Warehouse. The Maintenance Control Division improved the management of shop load planning and record keeping during the deployment. The Division began filing completed work requests in the building history file and organizing the utility system equipment files. Additionally, the Division organized the "as built" drawing of the camp facilities and Utilities. The Division also developed a supply inventory catalog which list materials and parts in alphabetical order along with stock number. See enclosure (9) page 9-3. #### SPECIAL OPERATIONS

28. MOUNT-OUT: The Battalion conducted exercise "Cocked Crown" a full Battalion mount-out with Air Det. Both the Air Det and Air Echelon were staged on the NAVSTA Rota towway and two chalks of the Air Det were airlifted by C141 aircraft for a short period. All Sea Echelon equipment was staged at the NAVSTA Pier. The exercise was completed on schedule. See enclosure (10) page 10-3.

30. DISASTER RECOVERY FONTAROSSA AIRPORT CATANIA ITALY: Heavy rains caused flooding at Fontarossa Airport. See enclosure (10) page 10-6.

31. FOREST FIRE NEA MAKRI GREECE: A forest fire threatened dwellings near NCS Nea Makri, and a fire break was partially cut. See enclosure (10) page 10-5.

1. LESSONS LEARNED

A. PROBLEM/TASK: Electrical support for Operations Department and Alfa Company, and BRAVO Company.

DISCUSSION: The full-time services of a Yeoman were requested for assignment to the Operations Department because of the many and varied tasks. Alfa Company had a Yeoman assigned to assist in the office during the deployment. During the mid-part of the deployment another Yeoman was assigned to BRAVO Company to assist in the record keeping and office to receive an occupational

ADMINISTRATION

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: Battalion deploying to SOA should ensure they have the full complement of Yeoman and Seaman in order to ensure full support of electrical tasks. Time must be allocated to properly train these personnel in their duties in support of operational functions.

ENCLOSURE (4)

B. PROBLEM/TASK: Copy/reproduction facilities

DISCUSSION: Copying and reproduction facilities were satisfactory. An excessive amount of reproduction is done with no thought to cost savings. I.e., a memo is produced for dissemination. Along with posting on bulletin boards and reading at quarters a copy for each man is run off. Standard YFM forms are continually reproduced instead of submitting a requisition through supply system. To properly control, a man would have to be assigned full time to do copying but ensure compliance with proper office procedures in using the copying machine and to run the machine.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: One person should attend appropriate school/instruction and be assigned as a permanent operator. An offset printing machine should be purchased as Camp equipment and/or as battalion equipment to produce more economical and higher quality copies of instruction, notices, POP's etc. This would reduce the cost of reproduction, copying by 50% or more over a deployment cycle.

## ADMINISTRATION

### 1. LESSONS LEARNED:

A. PROBLEM/ITEM: Clerical support for Operations Department and ALFA Company, and BRAVO Company.

DISCUSSION: The full time services of a Yeoman were required for assignment to the Operations Department because of the many and varied tasks. ALFA Company had a Seaman assigned to assist in the office during the deployment. During the mid-part of the deployment another Seaman was assigned to BRAVO Company to assist in the record keeping and office to relieve an occupational 13 for another assignment.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: Battalions deploying to Rota should ensure they have the full complement of Yeomen and Seamen in order to ensure full support in these clerical areas. Time must be allocated to properly train these personnel in their duties in support of operational functions.

B. PROBLEM/ITEM: Copy/reproduction facilities.

DISCUSSION: Copying and reproduction facilities were satisfactory. An excessive amount of reproduction is done with no thought to cost savings, I. E., a memo is produced for dissemination. Along with posting on bulletin boards and reading at quarters a copy for each man is run off. Standard FSN forms are continually reproduced instead of submitting a requisition through supply system. To properly monitor, a man would have to be assigned full time to do nothing but ensure compliance with proper office procedures in using the copying machine and to run the machine.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: One person should attend appropriate school/indocrtination and be assigned as a permanent operator. An offset printing machine should be purchased as Camp equipment and/or as battalion equipment to produce more economical and higher quality copies of instruction, notices, POD's etc. This would reduce the cost of reproduction/ copying by 50% or more over a deployment cycle.



C. PROBLEM/ITEM: Watchbill

DISCUSSION: In order to make the watchbill fair and equitable the CMAA balanced the number of duty days each duty section would have to stand. This precluded one duty section standing both Christmas and New Years, as well as other battalion activities. The companies further submitted the watchbill coordinators with information of personnel going on leave and exchange of duties. These action reduced dissatisfaction and allowed the duty sections to operate smoother.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: Continue balancing the number of duty section days by duty section and company interaction with watchbill coordinators.

D. PROBLEM/ITEM: Hashish/Drugs

DISCUSSION: To combat drug usage random canine inspections were conducted in the BEQ's, job sites, and office spaces. The chain of command and battalion investigators also conducted walkthrough inspections.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: Continue random canine and chain of command inspections.

E. PROBLEM/ITEM: Rotted photo processing sink.

DISCUSSION: In the print room the sink was constructed of galvanized material not designed to withstand photo chemicals thus the severe rotting and corrosion resulted. Also the design of the sink was not conducive to developing prints. It was of the deep sink type found in Galleys.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: A surveyed photo processing sink was acquired from the Base Photo Lab minus the legs. ALFA Company MR Shop built stainless steel legs for it. BRAVO Company replaced the existing plumbing and installed the new sink.

F. PROBLEM/ITEM: Finishing room needs a finishing table.

DISCUSSION: Lack of a finishing table was awkward.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: One was built from excess materials.

G. PROBLEM/ITEM: No heated film drying cabinet.

DISCUSSION: Lack of a film drying cabinet required excessive drying time.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: The storage cabinet that was serving as a film drying cabinet was wired with 110 volts and a thermostatically controlled space heater with an external control installed to expedite film drying. It also enabled the Photo Lab



to dry the new R. C. Based papers.

H. PROBLEM/ITEM: No heat in finishing room or film processing room.

DISCUSSION: Small space heaters proved useless in heating finishing room.

ACTION/RECOMMENDATION: Install window air conditioner with heat pump.

## 2. NARRATIVE:

A. ADMIN/PERSONNEL: During the deployment personnel serving in these capacities dedicated themselves to support the battalion in all its endeavors and to the completion of their assigned tasking during deployment on Rota.

### B. CAREER COUNSELOR:

During NMCB-62 Rota, Spain deployment from July 1979 through March 1980, the Career Counselor's office was successful in meeting retention goals and in some cases exceeding goals. The greatest problem when deployed was communicating with the Detailers in Washington, D. C. and with Training and School Quotas Office in Gulfport. By maintaining good working relations with the Base telephone operators, much of the communications problems were eliminated. The Career Counselor and Company Career Counselor efforts as well as the enthusiastic support of the members of the Retention Team made the deployment to Rota, Spain a great retention success. The results are as follows, first term; 33%, second term; 94%, career; 93%.

C. CHAPLAINS OFFICE: (1) Provision for worship for all faith groups:

DISCUSSION: The command worship program, the services, available at the NAVSTA, Rota Chapel, and the civilian-sponsored services available in the city of Rota, provided ample variety of worship opportunities to fulfill the worship needs of all faith groups represented in the Battalion. About 4 1/2 percent of those claiming a Protestant denominational affiliation attended SEABEE Chapel services, and almost 7 percent of the Roamn Catholic population.

### (2) COUSELING:

DISCUSSION: 47 percent of all situational-stress couesling dealt with family and marriage problems. This is moderately lower than the prior deployment.

### (3) Family Involvement Program:

DISSCUSSION: Began in the home port, the program attempted to reduce the numbers of family problems while on



deployment. Some of the actions taken were: more specific guidelines provided the Ombudsman program, regular communication with Ombudsman and Wives Club leaders, continued updating of Ombudsman and Wives Club address rosters, channeling of known problems to Chaplain, Wives Club and Ombudsperson resources, and an increased and updated address list for the battalion newsletter.

(4) CIVIC ACTION:

The Battalion civic action/self help program was coordinated by the Chaplain. The major project involving interface with the host peoples was completed for the Salesiano's Father's school in Rota. One hundred four mandays were used to remove and replace a deteriorating concrete pad level and recompact the schools soccer field and running track, and rewire the outdoor electrical lighting system. See enclosure (6) page 6-84. Numerous self help projects were completed for the base and seabee camp. One hundred four mandays were used to remove a deteriorated press box and construct and install a new one for the base little league field. See enclosure (6) page 6-97. An outdoor chapel was constructed for the Catholic worship services held at the Silver City Chapel. See enclosure (6) page 6-87. A barbeque pit was constructed for the station's Tactical Support Center. See enclosure (6) page 6-89. A boat ramp was constructed out of mo-mat for small boats. See enclosure (6) page 6-91. A moped shed was constructed for the use of Spanish Nationals working in the galley. See enclosure (6) page 6-93. The station's moto cross track was graded, making the existing bike track more useable. See enclosure (6) page 6-95. An existing weight lifting room was dismantled and relocated to make room for the new laundry. New weight lifting equipment was purchased and installed. See enclosure (6) page 6-99.

(5) LIBRARY:

DISCUSSION: The Camp Library was wholly adequate in size and quality of books. Potentially, a lack of storage space for books exists. Rather than reduce the facility open space by expanding shelf space, number of books was controlled by sending major detail sites and extra copy and purged-from-shelves books.

(D) CHIEF MASTER AT ARMS:

(1) During the Rota deployment the CMAA Battalion Investigator maintained Battalion Watch Bill along with the reactionary force assignments. The CMAA maintain and enforce uniform regulations and control Camp security. Additionally, maintains Battalion transit barracks, monitor field phone switch board, and motorola radio base station located on quarterdeck. CMAA/Battalion Investigator worked very closely with Rota Station Security Department, and the Naval Investigative Resident Agency. Through the outstanding support of this agency the CMAA/Battalion Investigator was able to monitor battalion personnel on and off



base liberty activities. During Rota deployment CMAA/Battalion Investigator set up random canine inspections to control illicit drugs within camp.

**E. COFFEE HOUSE:**

Upon arrival in Rota a "Coffee House" was already in operation. This establishment was under the cognizance of the command DAPA, managed by the command CODAC, with watch-standers assigned by the Battalion. Free coffee was available and soft-drinks were sold for 25 cents each. A non-alcoholic environment was offered for personnel to read, write letters, play table games or just listen to radio programs. This facility was utilized by approximately 200 people monthly and is strongly recommended at each deployment site.

**F. DENTAL:**

(1) Aside from the normal dental care carried out on battalion personnel throughout the deployment, we have had some other accomplishments during the Rota deployment:

- (a) A workable dental system has been achieved.
- (b) A more efficient check-in system has been created.
- (c) The dental supplies in Rota have been thoroughly inventoried.
- (d) Needed shelf space has been added to the dental trailer.
- (e) A new sterilizer, electro surgery unit, and automatic X-ray developer have been added to the trailer.
- (f) The dental TOA equipment has been field tested at two detail sites and has been found to be functional.

**G. EDUCATION:**

During the deployment to Rota, Spain, thirty-one members of the battalion attended college utilizing the Tuition Aid program in undergraduate course study. Eighty credit hours were accumulated from three institutions, the University of Maryland, Los Angeles Community College and the City College of Chicago. In addition thirty-eight members of the Battalion participated in a local six week course in conversational Spanish offered by Rota Community College. At the High School level five members of the Battalion



participated in the pre-test for GED. Five other members took the General Equivalency Diploma Test, offered by the City College of Chicago, in another testing area, five members took the SAT/ACT battery. One member participated in the Graduate Record Examination.

#### H. HUMAN RESOURCES:

The Battalion's attack on people problems reached out in two directions: personnel of the Battalion, and the dependents of those personnel. Beginning in the home port period prior to deployment, the battalion searched for fresh approaches to developing the potential of the human resources available to us. A wholly new Command Action Plan was developed, which emphasized personal relatedness to the Command and achievement recognition. The collateral duty role of Family Involvement Awareness Officer was assigned in the attempted to instill in families the feeling that the Battalion considers them full-fledged members of our "family". Some specific events to convey the above attitude were the Battalion picnic with a workshop tour and portrayal of the husband's role in the Battalion; Command assistance in the activities and definition of goals of the Wives Club and the Ombudsman Program; circulation of information of the already existing support-system for families, and foundation laying of a Family Services organization at CBC; a family-focused deployment guide; a color-book for children of the Battalion; and education of the Wives Club members in recognition and solution resources of common family problems. With the awareness that 42% of the Battalion have dependents, and that over 1/2 of the personal-life problems encountered by Battalion personnel were dependent related, the Family Involvement Awareness program was continued during the deployment. Relationships were maintained with the home ported wives through regular correspondence with the Wives' Club and Ombudsman, continuous updating of their mailing lists, referral to specific elements of the CBC support system when problems became known, and an updated and broadened mailing list for the Seabeacon. In preparation for return to home port a home port information guide was developed and all Battalion personnel attended the "Reentry" program; which provided information about common marriage and family problems and the resources available at CBC to assist in resolving them. Goal attainment of the Command Action Plan was continuously monitored while deployed, and elements of it were incorporated into the Command brief. It was recognized that the Human Relations Committee had goal identification problems, which led to the development of a new Command Equal Opportunity program and the institution of a revitalized Affirmative Action Plan. To meet an increased drug abuse problem, a special Task Force was constituted to aid in strengthening the Command's efforts in Education, Enforcement and Rehabilitation. Special training was provided for all officers and CPO's to meet problems encountered in official and personal problem counseling of personnel, and in drug and alcohol awareness and assistance counseling. 26% of Battalion personnel received the required Military Rights and Responsibility and Cultural Expressions training by the Command Training Team. 25% of the



Main Body personnel were given more intensified drug and alcohol education by the Battalion CODAC and DAES. "The House", a non-alcoholic recreation area, functioned throughout the deployment with an average program attendance of 200/month.

**I. LEGAL:**

The Naval Legal Service Office, Rota was always able and willing to support the battalion for legal assistance.

**J. MEDICAL:**

The Medical Department had no significant problems during this deployment. Consultation to orthopedics, surgery, internal medicine, and Psychiatry subspecialties were readily available from Naval Regional Medical Center, Rota. Otolaryngology was available on a limited basis and was used appropriately. Dermatology and urology were not available locally; however, services of these specialities could be obtained in Europe through the use of the MEDEVAL System. An outstanding report was established between Battalion Medical Department and Hospital Medical Supply, Departments and Pharmacies. Plant improvements were limited to the addition of a storage room to the emergency and treatment room along with routine upkeep. This was due to plans for a new clinic to be built in March 1980. The entire TOA, with exception to the X-Ray equipment and Pharmaceuticals requiring temperature control or frequent inventory, were housed in three CONEX boxes behind Medical Supply. A recommendation was made that the new plant was equipped with a permanent X-Ray machine and an automatic Film Processor. In this way better diagnostic X-Rays could be obtained on a routine basis and the Field X-Ray unit, that is currently in use, could be stored as TOA Equipment.

**K. PHOTO LAB:**

The Photo Lab provided photography in the following categories, accidents; damaged parts and materials cruise book and command



newspaper; reenlistment and awards, external news release photos, command briefs and PAO briefs both internal and external, construction progress photos, restricted and roster photos, plus support was provided to Dets. The Base BUPERS photos and some slide duplication.

L. POSTAL AFFAIRS:

Postal Service in Rota, Spain was outstanding but there with some delay of letter mail through the gateway, New York. Letters were known to take up to 15 days to Gulfport and other areas in CONUS. Fleet Mail Center, Rota has and will give outstanding support in all and any areas in the Postal Field. First Class and priority mail are received daily, PAL and SAM on the average of 4 times a week, via commercial truck from Madrid and Parcel Post on the average of every 10 days via sea land containers. The only recommendation would be for a larger area for the Camp Post Office. There is a need for a separate Money Order window and a bigger lobby space. The lobby is too small for patrons to wrap packages and to serve others at the window. The selling of money orders in the payline on pay days helped to take care of about 65% of the money order business and kept the traffic down in the Post Office for other postal business being a convenient for everyone.

M. PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICE:

In a democracy, the public has a right to be informed on the major issues of national defense policy, including a clear presentation of both sides of the argument in complex questions, so that there may be a concensus of confidence in the final decision. The public affairs office of NMCB-62 serves to inform the citizens concerning the Battalion as an instrument of national policy and security, the operations of the Battalion (as much as is compatible with military security), and the responsibilities and activities of its personnel as U. S. citizens. The public affairs office dispenses public information to the media, as well as keeping good community relations with the people who have an interest in the command. See PAO statistics in enclosure (4) page 4-14.

N. SPECIAL SERVICES:

(1) Recreational opportunities were offered the Battalion members in multiple areas. Intrabattalion tournament program included ping-pong, darts, pool, bowling, softball, and a ten-mile race. Trophies were awarded to the winning teams/persons. U. S. Naval Station programs in which NMCB-62 participated were coordinated jointly through the Special Services offices and included volleyball, football, basketball, racquetball and wrestling.

(2) The Battalion Movie Theater was manned by Special

Services personnel, with the addition of volunteer projectionists near mid-deployment which allowed better access to check-out recreational gear while the movies were in progress.

(3) Special Services also coordinated a dinner show at the galley, which featured a flamenco dance group from Jerez, Spain, and the Mid-deployment picnic and New Years' Eve party, both with live entertainment.
