

Experiencing Operation Homecoming

Johanna Heimerl joined the Navy in June of 1963. Since an early age, Johanna aspired to enlist in the Navy and be on the front line. However, during the 1960s, women were not allowed to serve on the front line unless they were nurses. In 1973, Johanna handled administrative work for Operation Homecoming, which welcomed the return of prisoners of war (POWs) back to United States.

Questions to consider:

- 5. Do you think Johanna's participation in Operation Homecoming helped to make up for her inability to go to Vietnam? Why or why not?
- 6. How are job opportunities for women in the Navy different now than they were in the 1960s?
