National Museum of the American Sailor Youth Activities

Thank you for your interest in bringing your students to the National Museum of the American Sailor! In addition to a guided or self-guided tour, youth groups may add an additional activity to their visit. Please see below for the activities currently available. Activities are divided by recommended age group.

Pre-K

For our littlest sailors, Navy-themed **coloring pages** are available, along with crayons and colored pencils.

Lower Elementary (K-2)

Explore the "Sails Unfurled: The Dawn of the U.S. Navy" exhibit with a **scavenger hunt.** Scavenger hunts invite students to look closely at the artifacts and images on display in the museum's exhibit about the Navy's earliest days. For pre-readers, a picture scavenger hunt is available.

Upper Elementary (Grades 3-6)

Option 1: Take an **Inquisitive Tour** of the "Sails Unfurled: The Dawn of the U.S. Navy" exhibit. Using artifacts from the museum's education collection, compare and contrast them to the artifacts on display in the exhibit. Are these artifacts from the Revolutionary War or later? What may they have been used for?

Option 2: Become pen pals with sailors from the past with **In Their Own Words**. Read two Civil War era letters and then choose one person to write a letter back to.

Middle School (Grades 6-8)

Become museum curators with an **Object Exploration.** Working in teams with artifacts from the museum's education collection, students can infer and hypothesize the use and story behind an artifact. After presenting their findings to the group, the museum educator shares the real story behind each artifact.

High School

Option 1: High school students can opt for an additional presentation from our **Speaker's Bureau program**. Topics include The Battle of Midway, Pearl Harbor, and local Naval Station Great Lakes history. This option is particularly popular for classes learning about a particular era in social studies or history courses. Option 2: Instead of the standard gallery tour, high school groups may wish to book the **Active Duty Military Tour**. Although this tour was designed for active duty military, the themes it focuses on are also appropriate for high school students. This tour focuses on the values of honor, courage, commitment, leadership, and teamwork. Each value is shared through the story of a particular sailor or group of sailors.
