Sailor Spotlight: Personnelman Third Class Peggy Sue Griffith



Although the U.S. Navy had formally integrated women into the service in 1948, they were still barred from serving aboard ships until 1972. When war broke out in Vietnam, the Officer Personnel Newsletter specifically stated, "Numerous inquiries have been received regarding the assignment of women officers to Vietnam. There are no current plans to send women officers with 1100/1105 designators to this area. If at a future date the Navy deems it necessary to make such assignments, voluntary requests will be solicited." Although a handful of female officers served in Vietnam, it was the goodwill voyage of hospital ship USS Sanctuary in 1972 that finally opened ship duty to enlisted women. The first enlisted woman to step aboard Sanctuary was PN3 Peggy Sue Griffith. PN3 Griffith was among over 50 women aboard USS Sanctuary.



Artifact Spotlight: Letter, 1959

Although the Vietnam War era was a time of great change in the Navy, and in the United States more generally, opportunities for women in the Navy were still limited. The museum's archival collection holds several items from the service of Yeoman First Class Joan Marie Carlson. YN1 Carlson served with distinction for twenty years, from Great Lakes to Pearl Harbor.

However, in 1959, when YN1 Carlson was up for promotion, she was explicitly rejected based on gender. The letter from Carlson's commander stated, "There is imposed a limitation as to number of enlisted women absorbable in the area." In other words, although there were positions available for chiefs, there was no need for a *female* chief at that time. Despite Carlson's many commendations, she never made chief.
