Sailor Spotlight: MCPON James Honea



James Honea assumed the duties of the sixteenth Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy in September 2022. He comes to the position with an impressive service history. The son of an Air Force veteran, Honea began his military career in 1987, when he enlisted in the U.S. Navy. His first command was aboard the USS John A. Moore (FFG 19) where he was rated as a Boatswain's Mate. He rose through the ranks serving aboard USS Juneau (LPD 10), USS Dubuque (LPD 8), and USS Bonhomme Richard (LHD 6). In 2006 he was promoted to master chief and in 2009, he was selected to serve as a command master chief and completed tours aboard the USS Gridley (DDG 101) and later on USS New Orleans (LPD 18).

As MCPON, Honea's priorities are 1. Build combat teams, 2. Build teams that out-think our adversaries, and 3. Build stability in the lives of our sailors and their families.

COLLECTIONS AND RESEARCH

Artifact Spotlight: *New Acquisitions*


As museum staff continue research for the newest permanent exhibit about the Age of Steel, the collections team have been searching for artifacts from that era for potential use in the exhibit.

Among the recent acquisitions are a series of archival documents and photographs. Standing as the figurehead of the era, photographs of the USS *Olympia* and her crew are a given for any exhibit about this age of steel and steam. A ledger from 1903 provides a glimpse into the financial resources of sailors in that era, and a *Great Lakes Recruit* from the mid-1910s showcases the status of recruit training during this time. These items may be on display in the future, but as staff continues to source artifacts, only time will tell which objects make it to center stage.



We're Ready for a Facelift

The museum's largest artifact is actually the building itself and it's a constant work in progress to take care of this historic building. Built in 1942, the wood-sided structure has seen its share of changes. But one thing that hasn't changed over the last 80+ years is the siding! What was once a beautiful modern structure has become a favorite landing site for every woodpecker in

northern Illinois. As a result, the siding is in dire need of replacement. Over the next year, the original wood siding will be replaced with practical, sustainable cement board that mimics the look of the original wood siding. While this work is going on, the contractors will also switch out the square windows with rectangular transom windows, just like architect Gordon Bunshaft originally installed in 1942.

This project is expected to impact museum operations, so keep an eye on the museum's website and social media for any restoration-related closures.
