Sailor Spotlight: Chief Gunner's Mate Bob Feller



Bob Feller was already a legendary pitcher for the Cleveland Indians when World War II broke out. He took a break from his Major League career to enlist in the United States Navy. Infuriated by the attack on Pearl Harbor, that same day of December 7, Feller told the Indians he was enlisting. Two days later, he was in the Navy. After completing basic training in Norfolk and serving as a fitness instructor there, Feller advocated for the opportunity to serve in combat missions. He was assigned to the USS Alabama as a gun captain. By war's end in 1945, Feller had joined the ranks of Navy chiefs.

Reflecting on his naval service Feller wrote, "Serving in the military is almost always a defining moment for any young man or woman... But it makes a difference when you go through a war, no matter which branch of the service you're in. Combat is an experience that you never forget."

COLLECTIONS AND RESEARCH

Artifact Spotlight: MCPON Black Uniforms, ca. 1968

One of the most significant changes to the chief system was the creation of the Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) position in 1967. As the most senior enlisted member of the Navy, the MCPON serves as the eblisted representative to the Chief of Naval Operations, addressing the needs and issues of the Navy's enlisted sailors. Master Chief Delbert Black was selected as the first MCPON.

The National Museum of the American Sailor holds several artifacts from MCPON Black's service, including his dress uniform (right). Black, a World War II veteran with two decades of naval service at the time of his appointment as MCPON, set the standard for the MCPON role. Among his many achievements were the creation of enlisted representation on boards, the establishment of CPO screening boards, the creation of the Ombudsman program, and a clear focus on family. MCPON Black continues to be a role model for MCPONs today.



Rank and Rate is Coming Soon!

If the terms "enlisted," "officers," and "chief petty officers" have your head swimming, you're not alone! The Navy's rank and rate system are confusing for anyone, but especially for civilians. To better explain the way Navy combines sailor's hierarchical status and occupation, the museum is creating a new interactive element.
