

HE NAVAL HISTORY OF WISCONSIN



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USS Milwaukee (LCS 5)

USS Milwaukee (LCS 5) is the fifth ship to be named for the city of Milwaukee, the largest city in Wisconsin. Wisconsin has a long history of ship building dating back to the 19th century. USS Milwaukee (LCS 5) is the fifth Littoral Combat Ship (LCS) and the third of the Freedom variant. She was commissioned Nov. 21, 2015. The primary missions for the LCS include countering diesel submarine threats, littoral mine threats, and surface threats.

Marc A. Mitscher Admiral

Marc Andrew Mitscher was born in Hillsboro, WI on Jan. 26, 1887. He was a naval aviation pioneer and served as commander of the Fast Carrier Task Force in the Pacific during World War II. Mitscher was captain of USS Hornet (CV 8) during the Battle of Midway. During his service, he was awarded the Navy Cross with two gold stars.



James H. Flatley, Jr. Vice Admiral

James Henry Flatley, Jr. was born in Green Bay, WI on June 17, 1906. He was a U.S. Navy aviator and tactician who served prominently in the Battle of the Coral Sea and the Guadalcanal campaign of World War II. For his service during the war, Flatley was awarded the Navy Cross and Distinguished Flying Cross.



Abraham DeSomer **Medal of Honor Recipient**

Born in Milwaukee, WI on Dec. 29, 1884, Abraham DeSomer enlisted in the U.S. Navy as a gunner and was later commissioned as an officer. He was awarded the Medal of Honor for his heroic actions and extraordinary heroism during the American intervention at Veracruz, Mexico, April 21-22, 1914.

Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps

The purpose of the NROTC Program is to educate and train qualified young men and women for service as commissioned officers in the Navy's unrestricted line, the Navy Nurse Corps, and the Marine Corps. University of Wisconsin-Madison, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Marquette University, and Milwaukee School of Engineering offer an NROTC program.







A Navy Operational Support Center, or NOSC, is a facility used to provide operational support for training and administrative services to Navy Reserve Units. There are three NOSCs in the state of Wisconsin: NOSC Milwaukee, NOSC Green Bay, and NOSC Madison.
