



Command History for Calendar Year 1975 (OPNAV Report 5750.1)

Part I - Basic History

1. Command Organization

a. Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron ONE HUNDRED TWELVE Commanding Officers' during 1975 were:

CDR R. L. HARSHBERGER (1 JAN - 12 MAY 75)

CDR R. W. THOMAS (12 MAY - 31 DEC 75)

- b. No changes in missions, functions, or composition of the command occurred during 1975.
- c. On 23 July 1975 the command changed it's homeport from Naval Air Station, North Island, San Diego, California to Naval Air Station, Miramar, San Diego, California. Administrative control remained with Commander, Fighter Airborne Early Warning Wing, U. S. Pacific Fleet located at Naval Air Station, Miramar.
- 2. <u>Summary of Operations</u>. A brief chronological list of events for calendar year 1975 follows:

- 14 E-2B BUNO 151709 began retrofit for new Hamilton Standard Propellors

 - 27 Flew in support of Mobile Sea Range portion of FLEETEX 2-75

- 19-25 Deployed to NAS Fallon, Nevada for COMCVW TWO Weapons Deployment
 - 23 VAW-112 Beach Detachment at NAS North Island commenced move of squadron to NAS Miramar
 - 25 Returned from NAS Fallon, landing at NAS Miramar to complete change of homeport to NAS Miramar

DECEMBER

- 15-16 Flew EW Jamming Training Flights in conjunction with Fleet Electronics Warfare Support Group
- b. Command History Basic Narrative. The first three months of CY 75 were characterized by a slow tempo of operations and training due to a lack of aircraft assets. However, in late April the assignment of cruise assets commenced and aircrew training was vigorously pursued. At the same time a MRE/Command Inspection was conducted by COMCVW TWO with the squadron receiving an overall grade of 94.21. During May, maximum emphasis was placed on system flights and FCLP's to prepare squadron pilots for CQ in June. June brought REFTRA for squadron personnel aboard USS RANGER, CQ for squadron pilots and continued emphasis in system flights. Refresher Training resulted in 80 percent of squadron personnel becoming 100 percent qualified in Damage Control PQS. Special exercises conducted during June included several flights in support of the Mobile Sea Range portion of FLEETEX 2-75 and EW Jamming Flights with the Fleet Electronic Warfare Support Group.

July saw a deployment of the squadron to NAS Fallon for the COMCVW TWO Weapons Deployment and at the same time a relocation of the squadron's homeport from NAS North Island to NAS Miramar.

Special exercises conducted in July consisted of Data Link Interface Training with MTDS and flights in support of CNO Project O/S 197 (Radar Video Processor).

- 12-25 August brought VAW-112's first operational at-sea period since last deployment. During this work up period, VAW-112 flew 171.9 hours in support of USS RANGER/CVW-2 operations. Several days of CQ were followed by extensive SSSC, AAWEX, AIC and War-at-Sea operations. A 27 hour long ENDUREX culminated the at-sea period. The squadron won the CVW-2 Golden Tailhook Award for scoring the highest carrier landing proficiency in the airwing for the at-sea period.
- 23 September brought another at-sea period, including the ORE. Extensive SSSC, AAWEX, AIC and War-at-Sea operations were culminated by a 54 hour ENDUREX. The squadron accumulated 238.7 hours during this at-sea period.

Based upon VAW-112's high personnel reenlistment rate, COMCVW TWO submitted VAW-112 as airwing nominee for the COMNAVAIRPAC Golden Anchor Award for the competitive cycle ending 31 December 1975. Year end also marked the completion of 1739.9 accident free flight hours accumulated during 1975.
