VAW-116 SQUADRON HISTORY 1971 NARRATIVE

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COMMAND ORGANIZATION

Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron ONE HUNDRED SIXTEEN (VAW-116) is an Airborne Early Warning Squadron in the sense of article 312 of NWP 32(D), Anti Air Warfare and as defined in chapter 2 of NWIP 10-3(A), Naval Warfare Terms, to the extent implied by the radar, radio, and data link capabilities of the E-2B aircraft.

VAW-116 is a self-supporting squadron under the administrative control of Commander Carrier Airborne Early Warning Wing Wing ELEVEN (CCAEW-11), Commander Fleet Air San Diego (COMFAIRSDIEGO), and Commander Naval Air Force Pacific (COMNAVAIRPAC). VAW-116 is charged with the operational training, organizing, and equipping of a combat ready Airborne Tactical Data System (ATDS) equipped AEW squadron for deployment with and service to any Pacific Fleet Attack Carrier Air Wing (CVW). A more in depth analysis of the role of the E-2B command and control aircraft is contained in the squadron purpose narrative in this section.

PERSONNEL

1971 was VAW-116's fifth calendar year as a commissioned squadron. A short historical synopsis of the first four years is contained in this section. Commander Donald O. Knerr, USN, was Commanding Officer from 24 April 1970 until 23 April 1971. Commander James G. McIntyre, USN, became Commanding Officer on 23 April 1971 and continued as squadron CO throughout the remainder of the calendar year. Commander McIntyre was the squadron's Executive Officer under Commander Knerr until 23 April 1971. Following the squadron's Change of Command ceremony, Commander Robert L. Watkins, USN, assumed the duties of Executive Officer. Commander Watkins continued in this billet for the remainder of 1971.

HISTORICAL CHRONOLOGY

On January 1st the squadron was homebased at NAS North Island. The entire air force consisted of SUNKING 012 (BUNO 151717). Following the holiday weekend, the now-traditional post holiday season "Back in the Saddle" Aviation safety program took place on 4 January. On the 5th the squadron worked with Japanese self-defense force representatives to test a buffer system capable of linking the Navy's tactical data systems with the Japanese air defense network.¹ Normal training flights² were conducted throughout the remainder of the month.

The beginning of February brought FCLP's⁶ and Carrier Qualifications from the fifth through the seventh. The later part of February was devoted to participation in the First Fleet exercise; "Admixture".⁸ March turned out to be an especially slow period. Normal training flights emphasizing Link 11 exercises with the Fleet Aircraft Surveillance Facility San Diego, the USS CONSTELLATION (CVA-64), and the USS BLUE RIDGE (LCC-19) were conducted during March and the first week of April. The squadron air force doubled in number on 30 March when SUNKING 011 (BUNO 151712) reported for duty.

If March and early April can be classified as slow, then the pace began to pick up markedly starting on the thirteenth. On that day CNO Project

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F 0252, E-2B/F-4J Effectiveness Against Anti-Ship Missiles,⁴ really got underway. As far back as the beginning of the year experimentation with video recording devices had begun as a prelude to this project. However, the first radar tracking flights, phase 1 of the original project, began on 14 April. The flight schedule was tailored to conform to this project's requirements. The SUNKINGS interrupted the cycle only long enough to execute a Change of Command ceremony at which time Commander James G. McIntyre succeeded Commander Donald O. Knerr as Commanding Officer.⁹ Cdr Knerr left the squadron to become the Defense Attaché for four coastal African nations centered around the American Embassy in Monrovia, Liberia, W. Africa.

In addition to Project F 0252 flights and Link 11 exercises with various Naval Tactical Data System units, the squadron participated in an Attack Carrier Air Wing NINE organized Alpha Strike simulation at China Lake. This was one of the first active endeavors which the Air Wing had undertaken to prepare for the upcoming deployment. On the 12th day of May, VAW-116 received its third aircraft from North Island's Rework Facility.

It's now late May and early June. More radar tracking and experimentation flights for the Anti-Ship Missile project were conducted. Link 11 exercises, FCLP's,⁶ and Carrier Qualifications were again the order of the day. The Fallon Weapons Exercises¹⁶ arrived on 20 June and the squadron began shutting men, material, and airplanes to the fragrant oasis of the central Nevada wilderness, Naval Air Station Fallon. The entire deployment lasted 14 days. By the time it was over, the squadron was four aircraft strong.

Only just recovering from the previous two weeks, FCLP's and available deck time for Car Quals continued to demand a 120% effort from the men and the machines. Taking a day off on July 23rd, the squadron's officers traveled to Litton Industries' Data Systems Division for briefings by engineering and production supervisors on current Data Systems projects and programs.¹⁹

When August began so did the initial at-sea-periods. VAW-116 moved aboard the USS CONSTELLATION (CVA-64) on 31 July. The CONNIE departed North Island for the first Ship-Air Wing exercises on Monday, August second. At sea for four days, the CONNIE returned to port Friday afternoon. Come Monday morning the CONNIE put back to sea, conducted another week of build-ups, and returned to San Diego for the weekend. After repairing some of the engineering casualties suffered during the previous week, the CONSTELLATION sailed again on the seventeenth. By noon of the 19th, she was tied up to the Quay Wall at the island. In spite of the breakdowns and the subsequent loss of training opportunities for both the ship and air wing, the Operational Readiness Inspection²³ commenced on schedule the 26th of August. When the ship returned to port on September 3rd, she was destined to remain there until October 1st when she would leave for a WESTPAC deployment.

For most of September, the by-words were "Standown - Maximum Leave Authorized". On 28 September the squadron officially moved back aboard the USS CONSTELLATION. Despite threats and plans by anti war protest groups to prevent her sailing, the CONNIE departed the California coast, loved ones, and friends on October 1st at 8:30 in the morning.

Upon leaving CONUS, the ship set out for the Hawaiian Operating Area, beginning enroute flight operations on Sunday, the third. On 4 October we commenced a Soviet overflight posture²⁶ which remained in effect while underway until the 26th of the month. The CONNIE was in-port Pearl Harbor for one day on the eleventh. Leaving Pearl for a two day Operational Readiness Evaluation,²⁸ the big flat top returned to Pearl Harbor for last minute briefings and four days of liberty on Oahu.

On the 17th we departed the naval base and recommenced the overflight

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posture. The next few days were very slow, indeed. A great deal of time was devoted to training lectures and briefings to more effectively prepare the largely inexperienced crews for the upcoming first line period. With only a two day stop in Subic Bay, Philippines, the CONSTELLATION departed Subic on the 28th undergoing limited flight operations in the area before steaming for the Tonkin Gulf and Yankee Station. Air Wing NINE began air operations on-station on 3 November. Routine special operations³⁰ were conducted for the majority of the 19 day line period. On Monday, the 8th of November, a Bluetree photo-reconnaissance mission was flown against Vinh airfield in North Vietnam.³² On the 16th, CONNIE took a standown day and celebrated the mammoth carrier's tenth birthday with a flight deck cook-out. Immediately following the standown day, on November 17 and 18, the CONSTELLATION in conjunction with the USS ORISKANY participated in a "Beacon Tower" AAWEX.³³ After a day and one-half transit, the CONSTELLATION tied up at the Subic Bay carrier pier on 28 November. Departing Subic on the 28th, we were back on the line ready to resume air operations by the morning of 30 November. This second line period ended 33 days later. The ship departed the Tonkin Gulf for the last time in 1971 on December 31st, the last day of the year. With the exception of a photo-reconnaissance mission against Quan Lang airfield³⁶ on December 18th, standard operations prevailed until the morning of 26 December. On that day began the heaviest bombing raids against North Vietnam since the bombing halt in 1968. The operation known as "Proud Deep"³⁷ wrote another page into United States military history; another strong example of one nation's commitment to the value of human life, be it our allies or our fellow countrymen.

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1. Representatives from the Japanese Self-Defense Force came to San Diego to test the ability of a Tactical Data System buffer assembly to provide a viable link between the Japanese Air Defense network and the U.S. Naval and Airborne Tactical Data Systems. The Japanese buffer with its associated equipment was set up on San Clemente Island. The Fleet Anti-Air Warfare Training Center at Point Loma and Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron 116 participated in the experiment. The exercise was deemed successful and the buffer is now being installed operationally in the Japanese defense network.

2. Normal Training Flights include but is not limited to the following exercises: cockpit and CIC familiarization, tracking and reporting of contacts, Link 11 operating procedures, pilot training and navigation, airborne intercept control, and basic crew co-ordination drills.

3. Field Mirror Landing Practice whereby pilots practice carrier landing techniques at a land base equipped with a mirror landing system to simulate as near as possible the techniques required for carrier approaches.

4. See E-2B/F-4J Effectiveness Against Anti-Ship Missiles, CNO Project F 0252 in Section VI.

5. RAG stands for Replacement Air Group and in this case refers to RVAW-110 based at NAS North Island where all pilots, Naval Flight Officers, and most flight technicians going to an E-2B squadron are initially trained in the aircraft. The squadron occasionally donated flight time in its aircraft to assist the RAG with its mission of training crews.

6. Field Carrier Landing Practice whereby pilots practice carrier landing techniques at a land base utilizing a fresnel lens rather than the older mirror assembly.

7. During this award ceremony, squadron members received medals and letters of commendation based on their recent contributions and service to their country during the previous deployment. See Section VII.

8. During this exercise, the squadron provided control of simulated enemy aircraft as an element of the "Orange" forces. The E-2B crews, working in conjunction with the Fleet Aircraft Surveillance Facility San Diego, provided needed vectors and administrative record keeping to reconstruct the strike groups assault on the evaluated units. In addition, radio relay was provided between friendly forces and shore-based evaluators.

33. "Beacon Tower 10" was the code name for a two-day Anti-Air Warfare Exercise which took place on Yankee Station. It was designed to test the preparedness of Carrier Task Force 77 units to defend themselves against aerial attack.

35. Two E-2Bs provided range sanitation and contact reports for CONSTELLATION'S Combat Information Center one hour prior to the scheduled exercise. When VF-92 launched their first AQM-37 supersonic target, the E-2B crew positioned approximately 150 nautical miles from the Philippine coastline and at a 90 degree aspect angle to the AQM were able to paint the AQM through a short segment of its flight.

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36. On that day, an armed reconnaissance strike hit the Quan Lang airfield in North Vietnam. As the strike group proceeded to the target, the EKA-3B tanker/ Electronic Countermeasures aircraft attempting to rendezvous with the strike leader prior to the target area experienced Tacan navigation gear and IFF transponder malfunctions. The E-2B crew provided the necessary vectors and communications relay for the separate elements to insure the A-3's timely rendezvous despite its troubles. The EKA-3B was essential in jamming the automatic tracking capabilities of at least one Surface to Air Missile site vastly reducing the total effectiveness of the enemy's order of battle.
