2010 was focused on the 2010-2011 deployment aboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN (CVN 72). The squadron spent the entire year preparing for and conducting predeployment training exercises, which led up to the deployment in September of 2010. On deployment, VAW-116 spend the last 2 months of 2010 flying combat missions In support of Operations NEW DAWN and ENDURING FREEDOM. During this time period the squadron had a 100 percent sortic completion rate, and acted as an important link in the command and control chain for the Carrier Strike Group as well as the Joint Forces Air Component Commander. Overall it was a safe and successful year for VAW-116. It was operationally intensive, but was executed according to plan. There were, of course, day to day maintenance and operational challenges that the squadron faced, but they never rose to the level that they had any negative impacts to mission accomplishment. For the Commander's classified assessment of the Squadron's participation in Operation ENDURING FREEDOM, please see the End of Cruise report submitted in section 4 of this report.

o 2010-01-12 to 2010-01-21: Participated in HARP (Hawkeye Advanced Readiness Program) at Naval Base Ventura County, Pt. Mugu; which involved three weeks of various tactical lectures given from the Hawkeye WTU (Weapons and Tactics Unit) and elaborate simulators for all the Hawkeye mission sets including Defensive Counter Air, Strike Warfare, Surface Surveillance Coordination and Maritime Interdiction, Airborne Command and Control Coordination, and Combat Search and Rescue.

- o 2010-02-05 to 2010-02-12: At sea onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN for deck certification after the ship's flight deck was resurfaced in the yard, along with a Carrier Qualification for Carrier Air Wing TWO pilots.
- o 2010-02-24 to 2010-03-19: Participated in SFARP (Strike Fighter Advanced Readiness Program) at Naval Air Station Fallon, in Fallon, Nevada; comprising of all fixed wing assets from Carrier Air Wing TWO. Aircraft and crews from VAW-116 supported training evolutions for Carrier Air Wing TWO's strike fighter squadrons through their various mission sets, including Defensive Counter Air, Offensive Counter Air, Strike Warfare, Close Air Support, and Combat Search and Rescue.
- o 2010-04-20 to 2010-05-13: Embarked aboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN for TSTA (Tailored Ship Training Availability), again training with Carrier Air Wing TWO in various mission sets/scenarios.
- o 2010-06-05 to 2010-07-02: Squadron detachment to NAS Fallon for Air Wing Fallon exercises. Air Wing Fallon is a more advanced training evolution that built on the training previous underwent during SFARP several months prior, this time involving the entire air wing, including helicopter squadrons.
- o 2010-07-23 to 2010-08-12: Participated in COMPTUEX/JTFEX (Composite Unit Training Exercise/Joint Task Force Exercise) again aboard the USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN, this time including external assets to CSG 9 (Carrier Strike Group NINE), such as USAF and USMC units. Large Force Exercises such as Carrier Air Defense and Maritime Interdiction missions were carried out, along with several Large Force Strike exercises.
- o 2010-09-11: Departed home station at Point Mugu, CA for a six month deployment, onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN. The ship left from San Diego, CA and transited through 7th and 5th fleets. Carrier Strike Group NINE, consisting of USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN and Destroyer Squadron NINE, spent five months supporting 5th fleet operations, participating in both OND (Operation NEW DAWN) and OEF (Operation ENDURING FREEDOM).
- o 2010-10-08 to 2010-10-12: USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN port visit in Kuala Lumpar, Malaysia.
- o 2010-11-09: Airborne Change of Command from CDR Sean Fitzpatrick to CDR Robert Duong.
- o 2010-11-13 to 2010-11-15: Participated in Exercise Shamal, a Joint Exercise consisting of US Navy and USAF units conducting Defensive Counter Air and Maritime Interdiction simulations in the Arabian Gulf.
- o 2010-11-17 to 2010-11-20: USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN port visit to Bahrain.

o 2010-12-19: Participated in cross-deck training with FS Charles De Gaulle, the French Navy's aircraft carrier. An E-2C from VAW-116 conducted a series of touch-and-go landings on the deck of the Charles De Gaulle.

o 2010-12-20 to 2010-12-28: Participated in an exercise in the Persian Gulf, working with allied nations followed by a four day port visit in Dubai, U.A.E.
