### 2. Commander's Assessment

2011 was an extremely busy year for the Sun Kings. The first two and one half months were spent completing the 2010-2011 combat deployment aboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN (CVN 72). The beginning of February was the conclusion of an extremely successful 4 month period of support for OEF operations in Afghanistan where the squadron achieved a 100% combat sortie completion rate. Homecoming was in mid-March which provided a brief yet extremely welcome period for post deployment leave. However, there was no stand down as the Sun Kings began the transition to the most advanced E-2C, the Communication Navigation Surveillance / Air Traffic Management (CNS/ATM) variant. This upgrade provided our pilots with completely redesigned cockpit instrumentation that replaced legacy 'steam gauges' with a glass cockpit that provides much better situational awareness. One of the most important benefits of this modification is that it allows the aircraft the ability to take advantage of precision instrument approaches that were previously unavailable in the aircraft. It also replaced several of the aircraft's radios, allowing for more reliable communication capabilities. This transition was the first conducted by a fleet E-2C squadron and was successfully completed by the Sun Kings in 3 months. VAW-116 was the first to conduct carrier qualification with CNS/ATM, and also employed the new platform at Joint Exercise NORTHERN EDGE, Air Wing Fallon and COMPTUEX. 2011 concluded with the Sun Kings once again on deployment onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCLON for the first CNS/ATM E-2C deployment. Overall it was a safe and highly successful year for VAW-116. For the Commander's classified assessment of the squadron's participation in Operation ENDURING FREEDOM from January to March 2011, please see the End of Cruise report submitted as section 4 of this document.

- 2011-01-01 to 2011-03-18: Deployed onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN
- 2011-03-19: Returned to home station at Point Mugu, CA from a six month deployment, on board USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN. VAW-116, as part of Carrier Air Wing TWO, supported Carrier Strike Group NINE during 4 months of OEF (OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM) missions in the 5th fleet AOR.
- 2011-04-02 to 2011-06-01: Transitioned from Hawkeye 2000 to Hawkeye 2000 CNS/ATM variant. Transition was carried out through detachments to NAS North Island for simulator events and flights in the local area around home station of Point Mugu, CA.
- 2011-06-06 to 2011-06-26: Participated in Exercise NORTHERN EDGE, a joint air defense exercise hosted by the United States Air Force at Elmendorf Air Force Base, Anchorage, AK.
- 2011-07-17 to 2011-08-02: At sea onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN for Carrier Qualification with Carrier Air Wing TWO pilots, followed by participation in Los Angeles Navy Week.
- 2011-08-01 to 2011-09-07: Squadron aircraft modified to incorporate Iridium Chat system and capability.
- 2011-08-12 to 2011-08-27: Squadron detachment to NAS Fallon for Air Wing Fallon exercises.
- 2011-09-19 to 2011-10-12: Participated in COMPTUEX (Composite Unit Training Exercise) again aboard the USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN. Large force exercises such as Carrier Air Defense and Maritime Interdiction missions were executed, along with several large force strike exercises.
- 2011-12-10: Departed home station at Point Mugu, CA for deployment, onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN. The LINCOLN left from San Diego,CA and sailed through 7th fleet as part of Strike Group NINE, consisting of USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN and Destroyer Squadron NINE, on its way to 5th fleet in support of OEF (OPERATION ENDURING FREEDOM).
- 2011-12-11 to 2011-12-31: Deployed onboard USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN.
