## III NARRATIVE

1971 was another productive year for RVAW-120 with a total flight time of 1,847 hours for the E-1B and 2,005.5 hours for the E-2 aircraft. A total of 706 sorties were flown for the E-1 and 714 by the E-2. In order to keep the aircraft flying for this many hours, a total of 25,404 maintenance manhours were required for the E-1 and 30,349 hours for the E-2.

As a result of these hours of flying and maintenance, there were many students that completed the squadron training program. 30 students completed the E-1 Program (16 pilots and 14 NFO'S), and 13 students completed the E-2 program (29 pilots and 14 NFO'S). In addition to the officer programs, 19 Air-creamen were trained (7 E-1 and 12 E-2).
