Narrative

The beginning of 2015 *Screwtops* were in a Maintenance Phase. During this Maintenance Phase *Screwtops* conducted Unit Level training, supported a detachment to Key West sending TAD personnel with VFC-111, participated in several "Strike of the Month" Large Force Exercises with Carrier Air Wing Three, and supported NAS Oceana fighter squadrons by providing Air Intercept Control.

April 2015, *Screwtops* began the Hawkeye Advanced Readiness Program (HARP). HARP is a turnaround training evolution, consisting of lectures and tactical simulator events focusing on the core Hawkeye mission sets. The purpose of HARP is to increase aircrew tactical proficiency in preparation for the pre-deployment work-up cycle. *Screwtops* completed HARP in October 2015.

On 20 August 2015, the World Famous *Screwtops* bid farewell to CDR Ray "Donger" Leung, welcoming Commander Jason "Chud" Chuderewicz as the new Commanding Officer and CDR Darryl "Cyclops" Martin as the new Executive Officer.

September 2015, *Screwtops* conducted Field Carrier Landing Practice (FCLP) at Wallops Flight Facility in preparation for carrier qualification. Following FCLPs, the *Screwtops* boarded USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) to qualify 12 pilots, flying 75 hours, totaling over 94 passes, 58 of which were arrested landings. VAW-123 also had an opportunity to conduct a day of cyclic-operations with

CVW-3 while onboard, which provided great training for the first ship and air-wing to begin executing the Optimized Fleet Response Plan (O-FRP).

October 2015 *Screwtops* departed for NAS Fallon where they conducted 38 sorties in support of CVW-3 Air-to-Ground Strike Fighter Advanced Readiness Program (SFARP) as part of CVW-3's Optimized Fleet Readiness Program (OFRP) in preparation for the 2016 deployment. The culmination of this critical phase included four sorties in support of live fire missile exercise off the California coast.

After the Fallon detachment, the *Screwtops* then conducted three weeks of Field Carrier Landing Practices (FCLP) at Wallops Flight Facility in preparation for USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER'S (CVN 69) Tailored Ship's Training Availability / Final Evaluation Problem (TSTA/FEP). In November, VAW-123 boarded USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) with CVW-3 for a 25 day underway period. The initial three days were dedicated to carrier qualifications (CQ) of ten squadron pilots flying over 37.5 flight hours while conducting over 20 day and 20 night traps. During this time, which tested the ship and air wing's interoperability, the *Screwtops* flew 69 sorties, encompassing 170 flight hours with 31 day and 38 night traps.
