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## 2. Commander's Assessment

The Commander's Assessment briefly tells the story of the command's role in national defense and should highlight any general and specific lessons-learned. In the reporting period of 1 March 2006 - 28 February 2007, the Fighting Redcocks of Strike Fighter Squadron TWO TWO (VFA-22) participated in one scheduled deployment

to the Fifth and Seventh Fleet AORs, two major training/sustainment exercises in support of the Fleet Response Plan (FRP) and an unscheduled Surge deployment to the Seventh Fleet AOR.

In early March 2006, VFA-22 was operating in the Northern Arabian Gulf flying combat missions in support of Operation IRAQI FREEDOM. Redcock aircrews routinely flew six to seven hour missions over Iraq amassing over 2,000 flight hours a month. The Redcock maintenance department produced a 95 percent sortie completion rate with twelve FA-18E Super Hornets.

In late May, USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76) outchopped from the Fifth Fleet AOR and started the transit home with port calls in Kuala Lumpur, Hong Kong and Hawaii. Prior to returning to homeport, the squadron participated in Operation VALIANT SHIELD off the coast of Guam. Carrier Air Wing FOURTEEN conducted coordinated operations with the USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN (CVN 72) and USS KITTY HAWK (CV 63) Strike Groups, as well as numerous U.S. Air Force and Marine Corps units. Commander, Carrier Air Wing FOURTEEN awarded VFA-22 the CVW-14 Strike Fighter Excellence Award, an award given to the air wing squadron that demonstrates the highest sortie completion rate and consistently provides the most mission capable aircraft.

On 5 July, the USS RONALD REAGAN returned to San Diego and VFA-22 flew home to NAS Lemoore, CA. In mid August the Redcocks sent aircraft and support personnel to support a flight deck certification onboard USS NIMITZ (CVN 68). At the end of September and into October, VFA-22 sent eight aircraft and most of its personnel to NAS Key West for a two week fighter detachment. While in Key West the Redcocks conducted numerous training flights devoted to developing and implementing tactics to increase proficiency and lethality.

The squadron was back aboard REAGAN in November for a two week sustainment exercise to maintain the RONALD REAGAN Carrier Strike Group's ability to surge if called upon. After returning home, the squadron made preparations for its Change of Command. On 7 December, Commander Nicholas Mongillo was relieved by Commander Randall Tashjian. Commander Christopher Chope was welcomed as the Redcock's Executive Officer.

The holiday season brought many changes to VFA-22 as the squadron began the acceptance phase for two FA-18F aircraft as part of its transition to a two seat Strike Fighter Squadron. The Lot 29 Super Hornets are equipped with the new APG-79 AESA radar, greatly increasing the Redcock's combat lethality.

In early January, VFA-22 received orders to deploy aboard REAGAN as a surge to the Fleet Response Plan. Preparations were made on short notice to ready the squadron for deployment. REAGAN's maintenance capability did not support the new aircraft and the squadron was forced to exchange their new jets with two lower lot F models from VFA-122.

In the days immediately preceding deployment, Commander, Strike Fighter Wing Pacific, awarded VFA-22 the AOC Scott F. Kirby Ordnance Proficiency Award for demonstrating the best ordnance practices in the Pacific Fleet.

On 27 January 2007, VFA-22 embarked aboard REAGAN for the short-notice deployment to the western Pacific. As of 28 February, the Fighting Redcocks were still deployed in the Seventh Fleet Area of Operations conducting regular flight operations.
