1982 found the Red Rippers on their first deployment embarked onboard USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67). Ten F-14A TOMCATS flown to USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) on January 4th and 5th. With all aircrews onboard we began our TRANSATLANTIC journey. During the passage we participated in WAR AT SEA EXERCISES with USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69). Aircrews conducted Air Combat Maneuvering, Combat Air Patrol, and Maritime Air Superiority Training, as well as maintaining alert 5 posture on non-flying days. On January 7th the first alert 5 was launched with the VF-11 TOMCAT getting airborne in 4 minutes and 30 seconds.

On January 17th the USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) arrived at our first liberty port, Malaga, Spain. Five days later the USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) weighed anchor and began Mediterranean operations. During this time VF-11 participated in Exercise National Week, a multiinternational exercise. Our main contributions were long range CAP missions utilizing Vector Logic concepts. During this period the squadron flew 46 sorties in 5 days and maintained a continual alert 5 and alert 15 commitment. This war at sea exercise ended on 28 January 1982, and the ship departed for the Suez Canal. On February 3rd the USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) transitted the Suez Canal into the Red Sea. On February 6th, aircraft 101 (159011) was lost in the Red Sea leaving the squadron with nine aircraft. The aircrew, LT , ejected safely and were recovered within an hour of the accident. Once in the Red Sea/Indian Ocean area, the squadron was required to maintain alert 5 and alert 15 posture during daytime non-flying operations. posture was downgraded to alert 15 at night except during times of increased threat postures.

On the 11 February USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) replaced USS CONSTELLATION (CV 64) on Gonzo Station in the Indian Ocean. During the first line period VF-11 participated in Beacon FLASH I, a two day exercise. Working south towards Diego Garcia the ship crossed the Equator on March 6th, and the entire day was dedicated to the Shellback Ceremony. VF-11 personnel became honored members of this royal order. Arriving in the vicinity of Diego Garcia on 8 March, a two day Gonzo Exercise against USS CONSTELLATION (CV 64) took place.

Defending Diego Garcia for 12 hours utilizing Vectgor Logic, the squadron received in-depth training in sustained outer air battle posture, as well as ECM, and FLEXDECK operations while in a multi-axis threat environment.

On March 11th, the USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67), while enroute to Perth, Australia, celebrated Beer Day signifying 45 continuous days at sea. Arriving at Perth on 19 March, the squadron enjoyed six days of liberty ashore. Weighing anchor on the 24th of March, the ship steamed to Diego Garcia for another Gonzo exercise with the USS CONSTELLATION (CV 64) on the 29th.

During the period 2-5 April, VF-11 successfully fired three (3) AIM 7E's and two (2) AIM 9L's. All five guided to kills. During the remainder of April, VF-11 continued Indian Ocean Ops consisting mainly of CAP, MAS, STRAFE and occasionally escort for the Soviet reconnaissance aircraft which routinely attempted overflights of USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67). Beacon FLASH II lasted for two days beginning on the 20th. Afterwards, USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) set course south towards Mombasa, Kenya. Leaving Mombasa on May 7th, the ship returned to Gonzo Station for more Indian Ocean operations. On May 9th the Rippers received A/C 111 (159438) to replace A/C 101. On 18 May, the third

and final Beacon FLASH Exercise commenced for two days of intense ACM and strike excort training. Blue-water operations continued for the remainder of May. After turnover with USS RANGER (CV 61) on the 31st, the ship returned to the Red Sea and prepared for the Suez Canal Transit on the 5th of June. On 6 June 1982 Israel invaded Lebanon and liberty ports of Hiafa, Israel and Izmir, Turkey were cancelled due to on-station requirements for USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67). For the next two weeks the ship maintained a posture of readiness off the coast of Lebanon. On 19 June USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) was relieved by USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) on Bagel Station, and arrived in Toulon, France on 21 June. USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) put to sea on 24 June and commenced Exercise Daily Double. Working with both the French Navy and Italian Air Force, VF-11 participated in Low Levels, Air Strikes, ECM Training, and Maritime Air Superiority exercises. The final port call to Malaga, Spain began on 28 June. On 4 July, USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) began the TRANSLANT back to the United States. On July 13th, all ten VF-11 TOMCATS flew off to Naval Air Station Oceana, and USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67) tied up at Pier 7, Naval Station Norfolk. The Rippers stood down for the next 30 days. Flight Ops continued but at a reduced rate for the rest of July with regular squadron training resuming the first week of August. Ground training included Weapon Systems and Radar Theory, Section Tactics, ACM Flights, Fleet Carrier Landing Practice and Carrier Qualification Flights aboard USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67). On 24 August the squadron polished its electronic countermeasure skills for two days in a SEABAT exercise. Squadron training continued throughout August.

Aircrew training continued in September with two major detachments highlighting the month. The squadron detached six aircraft to Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada on 6 September. Participating in an Aggressor ACM program for one week, aircrews were exposed to an intense training program in conjunction with the U.S. Air Force. Returning on 13 September, the squadron concentrated on Fleet Carrier Landing Practice and a CQ evolution from 22-24 September. The squadron fired three (3) AIM-9H missiles on 27 September with two sidewinders scoring kills and the third failing to guide. On September 30th, VF-11 detached eight aircraft to Puerto Rico for Orange Air Exercises with USS NIMITZ (CVN 70) and USS AMERICA (CV 66). Eighty-seven of ninety-one scheduled sorties were flown for a total of 391.4 hours. The squadron returned on October 27 and immediately began preparations for the Fleet Fighter ACM Readiness Program with VF-43. FFARP began on 1 November and on 5 November two aircraft departed for Naval Air Station Miramar for a TOPGUN detachment. The remainder of November was devoted to FFARP training. On 10 December the TOPGUN detachment returned and that same week FFARP training secured. VF-11 flew over 3,500 hours in 1982 with over 1,200 carrier landings. The command sailed over half the world in 1982 with a productive cruise onboard USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV 67). This effort paved the way for an even more challenging and successful year in 1983.
