## STRIKE FIGHTER SQUADRON 22 NARRATIVE FOR 1991

1991 began with Strike Fighter Squadron 22 in El Centro, California participating in Advanced Attack Readiness Program (AARP) 1-91 conducted by Strike Fighter Weapons School, Pacific. The squadron had its Conventional Weapons Technical Proficiency Inspection (CWTPI) test for pilots on 24 January and then began intensive preparation for the CVW-ll detachment to Fallon. Most of the month of February was spent in Fallon, Nevada, training with the Air Wing during the detachment. The squadron finished out the rest of the month in Lemoore preparing for a unit evaluation and upcoming at sea period in March.

Additional information to that listed below can be found in enclosure (4) and (5) supporting documentation and statistical data. Especially noteworthy in enclosure (4) is the submission package for the 1991 CNO Aviation Safety Award which is a comprehensive listing of VFA 22's achievements in 1991. Statistical data, including flight hours and missions flown, can be found in enclosure (5) under weekly and monthly training reports.

Highlights of the year include:

#### January

VFA 22 started the month of January at NAS El Centro participating in AARP 1-91. Inclement weather hindered training but the squadron was still able to complete the detachment. The squadron returned to Lemoore on the 12th of the month and the pilots began preparing for the CWTPI on the 24th.

# February

February saw VFA 22 deployed to Fallon, Nevada in support of the CVW ll detachment. Numerous multi squadron Airwing coordinated strikes were flown and the squadron was able to captive carry an AGM-65F IR missile for the first time. Returning to Lemoore on the 20th, the squadron began preparations for a unit NATOPS evaluation and upcoming at sea period in March.

#### March

On the 5th of March the squadron passed its NATOPS exam and evaluation with a grade of 3.985. Additionally, an intensive FCLP build-up was conducted for the pending at-sea period. The squadron embarked personnel on the USS Abraham Lincoln on the 10th of March and finished with the arrival of the last aircraft on the fifteenth. Cyclic Ops began on the 16th and continued on through the end of the month in preparation for the Advanced Tactical Assessment (ATA) and pre-Battle Group Exercise (BGE). On the 23rd of the month the squadron received its predeployment Aviation Maintenance Evaluation (AME) with an overall grade of 92%, top in CVW-ll and in the top 8 of 160 AIRPAC squadrons. The Electronic Warfare Technical Proficiency Inspection (EWTPI) was conducted on the 25th and graded satisfactory with no discrepancies.

## April 1991

From the 1st to the 4th the squadron participated in the Advanced Tactical Assessment (ATA). During the ATA the squadron flew a total of 52 sorties for 103 flight hours, part of a record setting effort by CVW-11. The squadron returned to Lemoore on the eleventh for a short three days off, with preparations for the next at sea period beginning on the following Tuesday. On the 29th the squadron boarded the USS Abraham Lincoln to participate in the Battle Group Exercise (BGE).

## May 1991

The beginning of the month found the squadron at sea for BGE. The at sea period ended on the 8th and the squadron returned to Lemoore on the 9th. The command ADMAT Inspection commenced on the 16th, and was concluded on the 22nd with no major discrepancies, 14 minors and 17 commendatories. On the 26th the squadron began loading aboard the Lincoln and on the 28th the ship pulled out of Alameda headed for WESTPAC/IO on its first operational cruise in the FA-18. Eight aircraft flew aboard the 28th and the other two arrived the 29th. Lincoln/CVW-11 departed U.S. coastal waters on the 30th for it's extended deployment.

# June 1991

The squadron began the month in transit from the Southern California Op area to the Hawaiian Islands. After the squadron left the Hawaiian Op area, it commenced a 10 day transit to the Philippines. Enroute the squadron conducted daily flight ops consisting of bombing and air combat maneuvering. Upon arriving at NAS Cubi Point, the USS Abraham Lincoln onloaded 2,000 refugees and their pets due to the volcanic eruption of Mount Pinatubo. It was an experience that each and every sailor in the squadron will never forget. After the last refugees offloaded in Cebu, it was back to routine business. The squadron commenced normal flight ops in the South China Sea with some well deserved liberty in Singapore in the closing two days of the month. It was hot and humid, but relaxation was enjoyed by all. YCBAR!

## July 1991

The 3rd month of cruise for the squadron consisted mainly of training flights to keep the pilots combat ready and on call at a moments notice. The FA-18C proved itself to be the most formidable aircraft on the flight deck, providing multi-role strike and fighter capabilities. This could not be done without the whole Redcock team going above and beyond assigned duties in the unbearable heat of the Arabian Gulf. The Strike Fighting Redcocks rose to meet every task. YCBAR!

## August 1991

August found the squadron intensifying Strike Training in support of Iraqi contingency planning. Air-to-air training detachments to Shaika Isa as well as joint operations with the USAF assisted in the effort. LT

successfully ejected from aircraft 304 when it was launched with insufficient airspeed. He suffered no injuries and the squadron was absolved of blame in the accident.

## September 1991

September was a month of high readiness and endless training, including combined coalition force and live ordnance operations, and a successful Beacon Flash 91 exercise. Extremely hot temperatures prevailed throughout the month. A two day anchorage off Bahrain and a one week liberty call to Dubai provided rest and recreation to all hands.

#### October 1991

Another month of intense training and readiness, October was the last month in the Arabian Gulf. The USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) Battle Group turned over Arabian Gulf presence responsibilities to the USS Eisenhower Battle Group. After inchop to Seventh Fleet, the transit eastward saw many opportunities to conduct passing exercises with the Omani and Malaysian Air Forces. Two port calls were made during the month, one to Dubai, United Arab Emirates prior to leaving the Arabian Gulf, and one to the Philippines on the transit homeward.

#### November 1991

November started with an outstanding port call to Hong Kong. The intensity of flight operations is diminishing as the ship/airwing begins it's transit home. The culmination of the month occurs on the 24th and 25th as the squadron returns home from deployment with all hands. YCBAR!

#### December 1991

The month of December found very light flying as the squadron commenced it's post cruise stand down. Twelve December saw the command of the squadron pass to CDR C. R. Rondestvedt. Oncoming Executive Officer is CDR J. T. Knight.
