The Redcocks of Strike Fighter Squadron 22 (VFA-22) continued their long-standing tradition of excellence by once again leading the way in every measure of performance throughout the turnaround training cycle. During the year, the Officers and Sailors of

VFA-22 conducted five major exercises in support of the Fleet Response Plan (FRP), while simultaneously training to meet today's threats and challenges.

In early March, VFA-22 began the FRP with the local portion of the Strike Fighter Advanced Readiness Program (SFARP) in Lemoore, CA. Following the local portion they traveled to Fallon, NV, to complete the final portion of SFARP. There, the squadron excelled in every facet of training and helped lead the Air Wing with an impressive 96 percent sortie completion rate. This focused training ensured 100 percent pilot completion.

In early May, VFA-22 squadron personnel and pilots embarked aboard USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76) to participate in a Flight Deck Certification. The squadron led the Air Wing by qualifying fifteen pilots.

In July, the Redcocks embarked aboard USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76) once again for an extremely successful Tailored Ship's Training Availability (TSTA). While aboard, the squadron flew over 300 sorties at an unmatched 95 percent sortie completion rate. TSTA also provided an opportunity for VFA-22 to take part in a Non-Combatant Expenditure Allowance (NCEA) by firing two AIM-9 Sidewinders and a HARM missile.

By August, VFA-22 was fully engaged in Air Wing training in the familiar skies of Fallon, NV. There, the Redcocks stood out by flying more than 230 sorties at a phenomenal 97 percent sortie completion rate. Furthermore, three squadron pilots qualified as Air Wing Strike Leads.

The squadron transitioned to the Joint Mission Planning Software (JMPS) in October in a "trusted agent" role. In this capacity, the Redcocks were able to identify issues with the program and correct them prior to incorporation into the rest of the Fleet. VFA-22 was also one of the first FA-18E squadrons to be 100 percent Joint Helmet Cueing System (JHMCS) capable. Due to the outstanding efforts of everyone in VFA-22, the squadron was awarded Carrier Air Wing FOURTEEN's Strike Fighter Award for Excellence during the workup cycle. Additionally, October brought a return to USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76) in support of the first-ever dual Carrier Strike Group (CSG) Composite Training Unit Exercise (COMPTUEX). Although the squadron was short on pilots, the Redcocks were still able to fly over 371 sorties totaling more than 500 hours, while maintaining a 96 percent sortie completion rate. The workups for deployment wrapped up in December with the Redcocks embarked on USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76) for one last underway period before cruise for a Joint Task Force Exercise (JTFEX). During JTFEX, the Redcocks maintained a 96 percent sortie completion rate while flying over 190 sorties totaling more than 330 hours.

The dramatic effect of VFA-22's ability to balance CVW operational commitments and squadron requirements can be summed up by the impressive fact that during the past year the Redcock team used limited resources to groom the most advanced FA-18E aircraft in the fleet. VFA-22 relentlessly continues to set the standard and aggressively raise the bar for other squadrons to follow. Our goal is to become the best Strike Fighter Squadron in the Navy. Each year the squadron faces new challenges and operational commitments that test the resolve of every Sailor within the command. The Redcock team not only meets these challenges head on, but also conquers them by consistently devising new and innovative ways to accomplish the mission. The Redcocks continue to strive for excellence and remain ready to execute any contingency operation when directed by the National Command Authority in support of national security.
