- 1. In accordance with reference (a), the following report is submitted:
  - a. BASIC HISTORY
    - (1) Command Organization Fleet Composite Squadron TWELVE was commissioned 1 September 1973 at NAF Detroit, Mt Clemens, Michigan as the first reserve Fleet Composite Squadron in Naval History. In June 1975, the squadron was relocated to its present home, NAS Oceana, Virginia Beach, VA.

- (b) Missions and functions remain unchanged since previously submitted.
- (c) Composition of command VC-12 currently operates and maintains nine (9) TA-4J Skyhawk aircraft. Personnel assets consist of 18 officers and 115 enlisted members.
- (d) The location of the command remains unchanged since previously reported.
- (2) Summary of Operations During 1979 VC-12 continued to provide airborne training services to aviation and surface units of the Naval Reserve and Atlantic Fleet. These services have included radar tracking, air intercept control, air refueling, TDU and banner towing and Air Combat Maneuvering (ACM) Training. Dissimilar Air Combat training (DACT) has been provided to reserve fighter squadrons VF-201 and VF-202, to Reserve Attack Squadron VA-205 at NAS Atlanta, to Reserve Attack Squadron VA-203 at NAS Cecil Field, to Reserve Marine Fighter Attack

Squadron 321 from Naval Air Facility Washington, DC, to Air Force F-15's, and to various Atlantic Fleet Fighter Squadrons.

Exercises in which VC-12 participated were the Navy's SEABAT on 8 NOV and the Air Force's (NORAD) AMALGAM Chief on 7 JUN and 25 OCT. Dissmilar Air Combat Training was provided for Air Force F-15's during exercise Eagle Thrust in June. The squadron took part in the annual VF-31 Felix Invitational, and VF-14 TOP HATTER Fighter derbies held at NAS OCEANA. Additionally, tracking services were provided on several occasions for Combat Systems Engineering Development Center, Moorestown, NJ.

- (3) SPECIAL TOPICS
  - (a) VC-12 established a Navy first by dropping a CTU-2A supply container for the U. S. Army in support of an exercise with the Army Quartermaster Corps, Airborne Division at Fort Pickett, VA. The CTU-2A container is designed to supply forward area combat troops with food and medical supplies from a low flying high speed jet aircraft. This event, which took place on 1 NOV 79, marked the first time this container was dropped from a U. S. Navy aircraft. LCDR Charles E. Long, Officer-in-Charge of VC-12, flew the successful mission in one of the squadrons TA-4J aircraft.
  - (b) VC-12 completed calendar year 1979 with over 6 years, and 14,000 hours of continuous accident free operations.
  - (c) Congressman G. William WHITEHURST (DEM-VA) was the guest speaker at VC-12's change of command ceremonies on 10 MAR 79.
