History

Fighter Squadron Composite TWELVE was originally commissioned VC-12 on 06 October 1943, at NAS Sand Point, Seattle, Washington. The squadron operated F-4F "WILDCAT" fighters and TBM-1 "AVENGERS" off the west coast aboard the USS CARD (CVE-11) until 28 February 1944. VC-12 saw action against German U-Boats in 1944 and after relocating to NAS Norfolk was decommissioned 7 June 1945.

On 6 July 1948, Carrier Air Early Warning Squadron TWO was commissioned at NAS Norfolk, Virginia. The squadron was redesignated Fleet Composite Squadron TWELVE on 1 September 1948. VC-12 operated TBM-3 "AVENGERS" from most of the Atlantic Fleet carriers active at that time and saw action in Korea aboard the USS BON HOMME RICHARD. Following the Korean Conflict, VC-12 was again decommissioned on 29 September 1953.

On 1 September 1973, at NAF Detroit, Michigan, VC-12 was recommissioned as the first Reserve Fleet Composite Squadron in Naval history. VC-12 moved to its current location at NAS Oceana in 1975. In June 1988, VC-12 was redesignated VFC-12 to better reflect its adversary role.

VFC-12 was instrumental in training the East Coast Fleet/Fighter Squadrons for the Desert Shield/Desert Storm War with Iraq.

On 30 September 1991, VC-0686 (VFC-12's Augment Unit) was decommissioned.

Chain of Command

The fighting OMARS are under the administrative and operational control of Commander, Fleet Logistics Support Wing at NAS Dallas, TX who reports to the Commander, Naval Air Reserve Force, New Orleans, LA. Commander, Tactical Wings Atlantic through Commander Fighter Wing One at NAS Oceana, VA provides logistics support and scheduling authority.

Mission

The mission of the Fighting OMARS is to provide Fleet services and training to Regular and Reserve Aviation and Surface units in order to maintain combat readiness. Specific services include:

Flight Hour Program

VFC-12 is funded to fly 5,000 hours annually. Historically this flight time has been distributed as follows:

Manning

The total manpower is $\underline{44}$ Officers, $\underline{17}$ Chief Petty Officers and $\underline{192}$ Enlisted personnel. This includes $\underline{133}$ full-time Training and Administrative (TAR) personnel and $\underline{126}$ Selected Reserve members.

Aircraft

VFC-12 maintains and flies a total of 13 McDonnel-Douglas A-4 series aircraft including seven A-4F "Superfox's" and six TA-4J's. TA-4J's now have the P-8 vice P-6 engine for better thrust to weight. FA-18's are tentatively slated to replace the Skyhawk by 1994.

Achievements and Awards

VFC-12 has logged more than <u>78350</u> hours in the A-4. These hours have been flown in the most hazardous and demanding of all peacetime aviation environments: Air Combat/Tactics Maneuvering and live fire exercises for aviation and surface units.

VFC-12 has been awarded the Chief of Naval Operations Aviation Safety Award in 1978, 1980 and 1981. In 1980, 1984, 1985 and 1988, VFC-12 was awarded the Noel Davis Trophy for outstanding squadron readiness. The OMARS received the Meritorious Unit Commendation in January 1989 for sustained superior performance.

The Fighting OMARS are testimony to the "One Navy" concept and stand ready to train and support Naval Aviation and Surface Combat Units throughout the Continental United States.
