## USS ANNAPOLIS (SSN 760) COMMAND HISTORY 2001

III. Narrative.

USS ANNAPOLIS (SSN 760) celebrated the New Year of 2001 alongside the submarine tender USS EMORY S LAND (AS 39) in La Maddalena, Sardinia. During the holiday stand-down period many ANNAPOLIS sailors received visits from spouses and children and several traveled to the Italian mainland to visit historic Italian cities like Naples and Rome.

On January 2<sup>nd</sup>, the ship got underway for a period of Independent Steaming Exercises (ISE), during which time the ship prepared for an Operational Reactor Safeguards Examination (ORSE) prior to return-to-port from its six-month Mediterranean deployment. In mid-January, the ship completed its sixth and final submerged transit of the Strait of Gibraltar and pulled into Rota, Spain for its final liberty port.

On January 21<sup>st</sup>, ANNAPOLIS left Rota and formally out-chopped from Commander Task Force (CTF) 69. Seven days later, the ship conducted a brief stop for personnel (BSP) in Bermuda to pick up the Nuclear Propulsion Examining Board (NPEB) for the ORSE.

For the next three days, ANNAPOLIS participated in a series of inspections, written and oral examinations, and simulated casualties designed to test their knowledge and skills as technicians and plant operators. On January 31<sup>st</sup>, ANNAPOLIS returned to its homeport of Groton, CT.

During the month of February, the crew enjoyed a welldeserved 30-day stand-down, returning in early March for a short upkeep and a period of inport type-training. On the 18<sup>th</sup> of March, the ship got underway for its first post-deployment atsea exercises, transiting to the Cherry Point Operating Areas to serve as the opposing force in a Joint Fleet Exercise held as part of the pre-deployment certification process for the USS ENTERPRISE battle group. After handily 'dispatching' all hostile combatants within weapons range, ANNAPOLIS returned to homeport in early April for a month-long upkeep availability (A-24).

In May, the ship and crew transited south to the Port Everglades (PEV) Operating Areas and the Atlantic Underwater Training and Evaluation Center (AUTEC) for its annual torpedo proficiency and to provide cooperative services for the USS BOISE Fire Control Certification and USS TOLEDO Tactical Readiness Evaluation. Following these exercises, ANNAPOLIS made

its first domestic port-call of the new year, pulling into Port Canaveral (PCAN) for a few days of rest and relaxation in the vicinity of Orlando and Cocoa Beach. The ship departed PCAN on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of May and conducted a Tiger Cruise during the transit home. Several sailors got the chance to introduce friends and relatives to the daily routine of a submarine and its crew and show them how the ship conducted warfare operations and responded to casualties.

After spending the weekend in port, ANNAPOLIS sailed to the Narragansett Bay Operating Areas (NBOAs) for a brief ISE period, returning to port on the 6<sup>th</sup> of June for a summer-long upkeep (A-25). During this period, the ship conducted several major infrequent Preventative Maintenance (PM) actions including primary relief valve and steam generator safety valve testing. The forward compartment also saw major changes with the installation of the Acoustic Rapid COTS Insertion (ARCI) Phase IV sonar system and the replacement of the BLQ-10 ESM suite with the WLR-8/BRD-7 system.

In late August, the ship was underway for four days for an initial shakedown of the new sonar system, returning to the NBOAs in early September to employ the system against another 688-class submarine, the USS ALEXANDRIA. Following a BSP, ANNAPOLIS transited south to the Northern Virginia Capes Operating Areas (NVCOAs) to continue ARCI testing with the USS TOLEDO. The latter half of this testing, which was to have included an open ocean torpedo firing exercise, was cancelled following the events of September 11<sup>th</sup>.

ANNAPOLIS arrived in homeport on the 14<sup>th</sup> of September to repair it's TB-23 towed array and departed on the 17<sup>th</sup>, heading north to the Canadian Operating Areas to participate in Undersea Warfare (USW) fleet exercises with the Canadian Navy. Immediately following these exercises, the ship turned south, picking up the COMSUBLANT Tactical Readiness Evaluation (TRE) team in PCAN and returning to AUTEC for an evaluation of the ship's tactical prowess and for an additional torpedo proficiency.

After a successful TRE, the ship returned to Groton for another month-long upkeep (A-26) during which the Advanced Process Build (Tactical)-01 (APB(T)-01) fire control and tracking system was installed on the ship for development testing. In early November, ANNAPOLIS got underway to test this new system and continue evaluation of the ARCI Phase IV suite. Along the way, the ship supported POM certification for the USS SPRINGFIELD prior to commencing APB(T)-01 testing with the assistance of the USS PHILADELPHIA. An emergent HUMEVAC in PCAN led to an early termination of testing but program developers reported getting excellent data to assist with the evaluation and improvement of the APB(T) system during the development process.

During 2001, USS ANNAPOLIS was visited by the following VIPs:

On 14 August 2001, COMSUBLANT (VADM Grossenbacher) escorted the Royal Navy Flag Officer Submarines (FOSM) on ANNAPOLIS, displaying the AN/BVS-1 Photonics Mast and the Acoustic Rapid Cots Inertion Phase IV Sonar Suite. FOSM and VADM Grossenbacher were impressed by the state of the art technology and the responsiveness of the crew.

On 26 July 2001 ANNAPOLIS' duty section was served a gourmet meal by the 5-star chefs of the Four Seasons restuarant of New York City. Owner Alex Von Bidder and World-Class chef Fred Mero prepared a three course meal in New York and transported it to Groton, serving ANNAPOLIS watchstanders. The event was covered by numerous Connecticut newspapers and television stations.

On 26 April 2001, ADM James Watkins, USN(Ret), former CNO, toured ANNAPOLIS.

On 15 December 2001, Representative Michael Capuano (D-Mass) toured ANNAPOLIS with his family.

During the week of 17-21 December, COMSUBGRU TWO (RDML Mike Tracy) rode ANNAPOLIS.
