1. In accordance with reference (a), the following Command History is submitted for the period of 1 January 1980 through 31 December 1980.

a. Command Organization. Commanding Officer: CAPT Dudley L. CARLSON, USN, from 1 January 1980 through 19 July 1980. CAPT J. D. CHAMBERLAIN, USN, from 19 July 1980 through 31 December 1980.

b. Summary of Operations. BLUE RIDGE began her first full year as the Flagship for Commander Seventh Fleet moored at Berth 8, Naval Station, Yokosuka, Japan, completing a four week upkeep period which began on 12 December 1979. During this period BLUE RIDGE had minor work performed by the Ship Repair Facility Yokosuka, Japan, (SRF), several Japanese Contractors and ship's force. On 9 January the ship departed Yokosuka enroute to the Philippine Islands to conduct the first port call of the new year. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Manila, Republic of the Philippines, on 14 January to begin a five day visit during which numerous dignitaries were hosted and over 1,500 guests toured the ship. On 19 January the ship got underway for Subic Bay with over 400 guests embarked for a "GO NAVY" Cruise. Arriving in Subic on the afternoon of the 19th, the ship remained inport until completion of the Seventh Fleet Scheduling Conference. At 0800 on the 28th, the ship was underway enroute to Yokosuka making a four hour stop at the ammunition pier in Subic to offload ammunition. BLUE RIDGE arrived Yokosuka on

2 February and commenced her second increment of a planned five increment overhaul. During this period BLUE RIDGE had major work performed throughout the ship by SRF and local contractors. On 14 February BLUE RIDGE hosted the Commander Seventh Fleet Change of Command Ceremony in which VADM C. A. H. TROST, USN, relieved VADM S. R. FOLEY, JR., USN as Commander Seventh Fleet. Numerous American and Japanese dignitaries and military officials were in attendance. The second increment overhaul ended on 17 March and on 20 March the ship got underway with the Mobile Training Team in preparation for her upcoming Operational Propulsion Plant Examination (MTT OPPE PHASE I). Enroute to sea the ship anchored briefly to onload ammunition in Yokosuka Harbor. On the afternoon of 21 March, the ship was forced to return to Yokosuka because of a mechanical problem with a forced draft blower. The ship remained inport until the 25th at which time she got underway for Inchon, KS. The ship arrived in Inchon on the 28th of March to begin a four day port visit and anchored in anchorage E-4. At 0356 on 30 March, FTG2 Craig E. FIEDLER was transferred by helicopter from BLUE RIDGE to the 121st Army Hospital in Seoul for treatment of injuries he sustained after falling approximately 20 ft. from the small boat landing. At 0035, 31 March FTG2 FIEDLER died from the injuries he sustained in the fall. On 1 April BLUE RIDGE was underway for Pusan, KS, and arrived on 2 April commencing a four day visit. The ship departed Pusan on 6 April to conduct Engineering Casualty Control Drills (ECC) in the vicinity of Chinhae, KS. On the morning of 9 April the ship anchored in Chinhae Harbor and participated in the Korean Naval Academy graduation exercises. The ship was again underway at 1630 to complete ECC Drills. On the evening of 11 April BLUE RIDGE departed the Chinhae vicinity for Kagoshima, Japan. The ship anchored in Kagoshima Harbor on 13 April for a three day port visit and departed for Yokosuka, Japan, on 16 April. Enroute Yokosuka, the ship conducted MTT OPPE PHASE II training. Prior to entering port on 18 April, RADM FRUDDEN, COMNAVSURFGRU WESTPAC, embarked and conducted an Operational Readiness Evaluation (ORE) which the ship successfully completed. BLUE RIDGE moored at Pier 8 in Yokosuka on the afternoon of 18 April for an upkeep period. The ship remained in upkeep until 6 May when she got underway for three days of local operations. The ship returned to Yokosuka on 9 May. On 15 May the ship was scheduled to visit Shimoda, Japan, for the Black Ship Festival but the visit was cancelled due to inclement weather conditions. The ship remained in port Yokosuka through the 3rd of June. On 4 June the ship got underway for her second trip of the year to Subic Bay. Enroute Subic, the ship conducted a token underway replenishment and missile firing exercise. The ship arrived in Subic Bay on 11 June for a short upkeep period before departing on 16 June for the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Hong Kong on 18 June and in honor of the host country fired a 21 gun salute, while making her approach to the pier. The ship moored at HMS TAMAR for a five day port visit and departed Hong Kong on 23 June for Sasebo, Japan. Enroute to Sasebo, on 25 June, BLUE RIDGE embarked members of the Propulsion Examining Board (PEB) off Okinawa, Japan, and began her Operational Propulsion Plant Examination (OPPE). The ship also rendezvoused with HMS SWAN on

26 June and conducted tactical maneuvering exercises enroute Sasebo. On the afternoon of 27 June BLUE RIDGE successfully completed her OPPE and arrived in Sasebo, Japan, for a goodwill visit. During the Sasebo port visit the ship was open for general visiting for four hours on the afternoon of 29 June and over 500 guests toured the ship. BLUE RIDGE remained in Sasebo until the 1st of July at which time she got underway to return to her homeport in Yokosuka. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Yokosuka on 3 July to begin a 25 day upkeep period. The upkeep was interrupted on 16 July for a one day Change of Command cruise with the ship returning to Yokosuka on the same day. At 1125 on 19 July, CAPT J. D. CHAMBERLAIN, USN, relieved CAPT D. L. CARLSON, USN as Commanding Officer, USS BLUE RIDGE. The ceremony was attended by numerous American and Japanese dignitaries and military officials. The ship remained inport through the 29th of July. At 1000, 29 July, BLUE RIDGE got underway for her first Sister-Ship cruise with JDS AKIZUKI, the first port of call being Otaru, Japan. Throughout the twenty-one day cruise numerous exercises were conducted between the two ships and three Japanese ports were visited. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Otaru, Japan on 1 August and remained inport through the 4th of August during which time numerous Japanese dignitaries were hosted. On 3 August the ship was open for general visiting and over 11,000 guests toured the ship. On 5 August the ship got underway in company with JDS AKIZUKI for Maizuru, Japan. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Maizuru on 8 August and anchored in the East Harbor area. During the three day stay in Maizuru, BLUE RIDGE sailors hosted the crew of JDS AKIZUKI at a picnic on 10 August. BLUE RIDGE departed Maizuru with JDS AKIZUKI on 11 August for Kure, Japan, located on the Inland Sea. The ship entered the Inland Sea on the morning of 12 August via the Shimoniseki Straits and transited to the vicinity of Guncyu, Japan, where both ships anchored for the night. At 0500 on 13 August BLUE RIDGE was underway and moored at 0940 in Kure, Japan. Although the visit to Kure was relatively short, numerous Japanese dignitaries and military officials were hosted and on 14 August BLUE RIDGE conducted general visiting receiving over 4,000 guests. BLUE RIDGE departed Kure on 15 August for her return to Yokosuka arriving on 17 August. This marked the completion of a very successful Sister-Ship cruise. The ship remained inport Yokosuka until 3 September for a two week upkeep period. BLUE RIDGE departed Yokosuka on 3 September for a goodwill cruise lasting six weeks and including six ports of call. The first port of call was Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines, the ship arriving for a three visit on 7 September. The ship departed Subic Bay on 10 September and anchored on 15 September in Pattaya Beach, Thailand. BLUE RIDGE departed Pattaya Beach on 19 September enroute to Djakarta, Indonesia, and arrived in Djakarta on 23 September commencing a three day port visit. On 26 September the ship got underway for Singapore and moored at the World Trade Center pier on 28 September. The ship remained inport Singapore until the 1st of October at which time she got underway for Port Kelang, Malaysia, the sea port for Kuala Lumpur. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Port Kelang on 2 October for a short visit and was again underway on 4 October for Okinawa, Japan. During the transit of the Malacca Straits on the afternoon of the 5th, SA

██████, the starboard lookout spotted a man in the water. The ship immediately reversed course and called away the ready life boat. The man, a Malaysian citizen, was soon aboard and receiving routine medical attention in the ship's Medical Ward. Efforts to put the unexpected passenger ashore in Singapore failed and he therefore became a honorary crew member until the ship's eventual arrival in Subic Bay. BLUE RIDGE continued her transit enroute to Okinawa and on 6 October, while transiting the South China Sea, received a radio transmission from a P-3 aircraft operating in the area stating that a Vietnamese refugee boat was within 20 NM of the ship's position. BLUE RIDGE immediately diverted from track to close the position of the refugee boat and at 1134 the refugee boat was in sight. Due to the poor mechanical condition of the refugee boat, the refugees were embarked onboard BLUE RIDGE. When the last of the refugees were onboard (54 total) BLUE RIDGE continued her transit to Okinawa, Japan. The ship no sooner regained track when the ship's helicopter, on a routine flight, radioed the ship of another boatload of refugees. At 1600 the ship again diverted from track to close the second refugee boat. Upon arrival at the scene, a decision was immediately made to embark the refugees as they required immediate medical attention. Thirty-seven refugees in all were embarked from the second boat and at 1845 BLUE RIDGE was again underway for Okinawa, Japan. On 9 October after passing through the Luzon Straits, the ship reversed course and commenced typhoon evasion. This evasion resulted in a new destination, Subic Bay, Republic of Philippines, arriving there on the evening of 10 October. On 11 October the refugees and Malaysian Citizen were disembarked to the custody of the Republic of the Philippines. BLUE RIDGE got underway from Subic Bay on 12 October and arrived in Yokosuka, Japan, on 17 October. The ship remained inport Yokosuka in UPKEEP until 4 November when she got underway for Pusan, KS. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Pusan on 7 November and departed for Okinawa, Japan on 11 November. The ship arrived in Okinawa the 13th, embarked RADM Shick (CTF 76) and BGEN McClintock (CTG79.1) with their respective staffs. On the evening of the 13th the ship got underway for Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines, as a participant in the major fleet exercise VALIANT BLITZ. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Subic Bay on the 16th for the exercise presail conference and was underway again on the evening of the 17th for Mindoro, R.P., in support of the amphibious operation. On the evening of 23 November the ship completed its role in the exercise and returned to Subic Bay arriving on the 24th. The ship remained inport Subic for minor engineering repairs until 26 November at which time she got underway for Okinawa, Japan. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Okinawa on the morning of 29 November for a short stop to offload CTF76 and CTG79.1 staffs and was again underway at 1400 for her return to Yokosuka, Japan. BLUE RIDGE arrived in Yokosuka, on 2 December mooring starboard side to Berth 15. On 3 December the ship entered her THIRD INCREMENT OVERHAUL. BLUE RIDGE remained in overhaul in Yokosuka through the remainder of the year.
