0300 NARRATIVE

A. The following information describe and explain the events listed in the chronology:

BOXER began the year with a Restricted Availability (RAV) in San Diego with over 200 scheduled jobs. Following the observation of Martin Luther King's Day, BOXER successfully completed her first Light-Off Assessment (LOA) with the Engineering Department receiving a grade of outstanding.

In preparation for sea trials, BOXER successfully conducted her first dock trials and fast cruise. Following an extremely successful sea trial, BOXER returned to homeport to complete its Restricted Availability.

Despite BOXER's high tempo of operations, the first Alcoholics Anonynous Program was established and the Command Religious Ministries held its first Pentecostal Jubilee in an attempt to care for the crew's spiritual needs.

BOXER continued to undergo Command Assessment and Readiness Training (CART). Following CART II, BOXER moved to Long Beach Naval Shipyard for a Post Shakedown Availability (PSA). There BOXER received major systems, and equipment upgrades as well as space alterations to accommodate Women at Sea. Additionally, the ship renovated the messdecks, library, barber shop, personnel and ship's office, medical spaces, magazines and weapons sponsons for the 25mm chain gun. BOXER completed PSA in 44 days and headed for San Diego. The ship conducted a dependent's day cruise enroute.

Immediately upon the ship's return to San Diego, she began her Tailored Ship's and Training Availability (TSTA II). The ship conducted Damage Control Training in combating main space fire, improving and maintaining ship's watertight integrity, battle problems, medical

casualty drills, flying squad reaction drills and man overboard drills. BOXER passed TSTA II with an overall mark of satisfactory.

Following that training, BOXER was selected to host the waterfront memorial service for Admiral Boorda. Military personnel from various afloat units and shore commands participated in the ceremony to mourn the loss of the CNO.

The ship then began TSTA III. Commander Amphibious Squadron SEVEN embarked BOXER to oversee the ARG's overall training in preparation for deployment. BOXER successfully completed TSTA III and did so well the ship validated the Final Evaluation Problem. The first ship on the west coast to so validate.

Immediately following the completion of TSTA III, BOXER was selected to host the U. S. Ambassador to Mexico's reception in Puerto Vallarta. BOXER with embarked Marines from the 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit held a diplomatic reception for the US Ambassador to Mexico, Mayor of the City of Puerto Vallarta, the Commandante of the Mexican Naval Operations and several members of the Mexican Navy in the ship's hangar bay. Additionally, BOXER crew members conducted Community Relation (COMREL) activities in the city of Puerto Vallarta. We passed out dry goods and clothings and helped repair the buildings at a local orphanage.

After the short port visit, BOXER completed the Dental Readiness Technical Assist Visit with an overall score of C-1 and C-2 in equipment management. Later that same week, BOXER underwent a Logistic and Material Assessment (LMA). The Supply Department received an "excellent" grade in the General Stores, with an overall score of 95.09 %; an "excellent" in Food Service, with an overall score of 97.78% and "good" in Retail Operations, with an overall score 90.56%. The overall score received in stock control management was 95.93%, and 100% inventory and location accuracy for surface DLRs, AVDLRs, MAMS.

In addition, the organization of the DLR storerooms was graded "outstanding."

Following the conclusion of the LMA, BOXER sailed for Hawaii inorder to conduct a DEPERM. In DEPERM, over thirteen miles of cables were wrapped around the ship by over 700 personnel utilizing over 30,500 manhours.

BOXER completed DEPERM ahead of schedule. While import Pearl Harbor, on 7 September 1996, 34 years after the erection of the USS Arizona Memorial, Captain Robert E. Annis, BOXER's Commanding Officer and 90 other Sailors revisited the site and took part in the largest reenlistment ceremony ever held on the memorial. Additionally, it was the largest reenlistment held at one time by a commissioned officer.

Following that significant and historical event, BOXER deployed to conduct COMPTUEX 96-24M. This was an exercise with the Marines Helo Squadrons assigned to Wahiawa, HI.

After the MIDPAC deployment, BOXER held her first Change of Command on 2 October 1996 at Naval Station, San Diego where Captain James Kevin Moran, the former Executive Officer "fleeted up" to assume command. Captain Robert Earl Annis transferred to Commander, Amphibious Group THREE as Chief of Staff.

At that same time in San Diego, the BOXER Association, consisting of more than 2,000 members held their annual reunion. The Association graciously donated \$2000 annually to BOXER's Learning Resource Center which was dedicated in their honor.

The next significant exercise BOXER participated was the COMPTUEX 96-27T, which culminated in a port visit to San Francisco for the Fleet Week '96. During Fleet Week, BOXER conducted tours for over 12,000

visitors. At the conclusion of the Fleet Week, BOXER conducted DLQ's prior to her return to homeport.

Our next at sea period was COMPTUEX 96-18M, where BOXER completed joint exercise with the Amphibious Ready Group. The training varied from small arms qualifications, Damage Control and battle problems to SAR training, and DLQ's.

In December 1996, BOXER was selected to host the Trilateral Forum, which included the Under secretaries of Defense for procurement from Australia, Canada and the United States.

Finally in 1996, BOXER completed her final Dental Readiness Evaluation with an overall score of C-1 in all categories.
