COMMAND COMPOSITION

1. Mission. CAPE ST. GEORGE is a Ticonderoga Class guided missile cruiser, equipped with the most advanced technology and weaponry put to sea. The twin screw, twin rudder, gas-turbine powered, 9,600 ton combatant features the AEGIS Combat System with Cooperative Engagement Capability (CEC). The AEGIS system integrates and automates in real time the functions of detection, control, engagement, and command in the three basic warfare modes: Air Warfare (AW), Undersea Warfare (USW), and Surface Warfare (SUW). With its designed mission capabilities, CAPE ST. GEORGE is able to operate effectively in the presence of air, surface, and subsurface threats.

2. Organizational Structure.


a. CAPE ST. GEORGE is part of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet under the administrative command of Commander, Cruiser-Destroyer Group EIGHT (Rear Admiral John B. Foley, III). Operationally, CAPE ST. GEORGE is part of the USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) Battle Group (IKEBATGRU) under operational control of Commander, Second Fleet. Operational control of CAPE ST. USS CAPE ST. GEORGE (CG 71) 1998 COMMAND HISTORY NARRATIVE

During 1998, CAPE ST. GEORGE maintained the standard of excellence which has characterized the ship's performance since commissioning. While recent years have seen CAPE ST. GEORGE focused primarily on Cooperative Engagement Capability (CEC) development and air defense training, 1998 was a year of operations, centered around EISENHOWER Battle Group's Joint Task Group 98-3 deployment. During deployment, CAPE ST. GEORGE operated in the Mediterranean and Adriatic Seas and Arabian Gulf, participating in numerous joint and multinational exercises, Operations DELIBERATE FORGE and SOUTHERN WATCH and Maritime Interception Operations.

1998 began and ended in a holiday leave and upkeep period. In between, CAPE ST. GEORGE completed the Interdeployment Training Cycle (IDTC), made final preparations for deployment, and deployed. After leave and upkeep in January, the ship participated in IKEBATGRU's Warfare Commander Board. As Air Defense Commander, CAPE ST. GEORGE was responsible for IKEBATGRU Theater Air and Missile Defense (TAMD). The ship began to make ready for deployment, conducting Combat Systems Readiness Review (CSRR) and Technical Assessment Repair, Groom, and Evaluation Team (TARGET) visits.

In February CAPE ST. GEORGE departed Virginia with the rest of IKEBATGRU for the Puerto Rican Operating Area (PROA) and COMPTUEX 98-2. The Intermediate phase of the IDTC, COMPTUEX challenged and tested the ship and battle group in all warfare areas. As part of COMPTUEX, CAPE ST. GEORGE conducted FIREX 1 at the Atlantic Fleet Weapons Training Facility (AFWTF) at Vieques Island, Puerto Rico. There, CAPE ST. GEORGE achieved a perfect score: 106.33 out of 106 (extra points were awarded for time). Winners of the James F. Chezek Memorial Gunnery Award in 1996, CAPE ST. GEORGE gunners continued their unmatched tradition of excellence at Vieques, and again won the Chezek Memorial gunnery award for 1998.

As Air Defense Commander, CAPE ST. GEORGE orchestrated a battle group Surface-to-Air Missile Exercise (SAMSLEX), which pitted a variety of antiship missile simulating drones against the battle group, who fired a total of 8 Standard SM-2 and NATO Sea Sparrow missiles against these targets. CAPE ST. GEORGE herself fired three SM-2s, achieving success with all three. As CAPE ST. GEORGE proceeded back to homeport with USS ANZIO (CG 68) and USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) at the end of COMPTUEX, RADM Fry visited the ship to brief the wardroom and award several medals to the crew.

Back in Norfolk, preparations for deployment continued. CAPE ST. GEORGE received a three-week Fleet Maintenance Availability (FMAV) from SIMA, a second phase CSRR visit, as well as numerous briefings and installations. The ship sponsored the return of USS SOUTH CAROLINA (CGN 37) from her final deployment. Changes appeared in the deployment schedule as the original deployment date of 10 June was moved forward and back several times, ultimately settling at 27 April.

On 27 April, the ship departed Norfolk for Joint Task Force Exercise (JTFEX) 98-2 and Fleet Battle Experiment CHARLIE (FBE-C). The crew also expected to be departing for deployment, but CAPE ST. GEORGE returned to homeport on 6 May, having successfully completed JTFEX and FBE-C. JTFEX was conducted by Commander, Second Fleet and was designed to test the Battle Group's ability to operate effectively in a joint environment. During the exercise, IKEBATCRU conducted the range of expeditionary missions, from naval presence to simulated combat operations. As Air Defense Commander for IKEBATCRU, CAPE ST. GEORGE directed the Battle Group's ships and aircraft in the defense of the force against all air threats, including aircraft and anti-ship missiles.

FBE-C was a two-phased, concept-based experiment designed by Commander, Second Fleet and the Navy's new Maritime Battle Center. The first phase of FBE-C, focused on future operational capabilities and tactics, techniques, and procedures (TTP) for force protection through joint, integrated theater air and missile defense (TAMD) capabilities. Phase II, conducted ashore, examined TTP for force protection through network-centric strike operations using modeling and simulations utilizing the Navy Simulation System (NSS).

Shortly after returning from JTFEX, CAPT Denis V. Army assumed command as CAPE ST. GEORGE's fourth Commanding Officer, relieving CAPT John C. Harvey, Jr. during a ceremony held onboard 1 June. CAPT Harvey moved on to duties in the Office of the Secretary of Defense. The ship then conducted a Preparation for Overseas Movement (POM) leave period through 9 June.

On 10 June 1998, CAPE ST. GEORGE as a member of Joint Task Group 98-3 departed for a six-month deployment. Quickly crossing the Atlantic Ocean, CAPE ST. GEORGE transited the Strait of Gibraltar on 19 June 1998 enroute to the Adriatic Sea. Shortly after joining SIXTH FLEET, CINCUSNAVEUR VADM Lopez visited CAPE ST. GEORGE, welcoming CAPT Army and the crew.

The early part of July provided the crew with well-deserved liberty. A port Visit to Golfe Juan, France for July fourth and a visit to Taormina, Italy afforded an opportunity for relaxation. A few miles down the road from Cannes, home of the international film festival, Golfe Juan offered spectacular beaches, exquisite cuisine and fantastic nightlife. Taormina, a resort town on the coast of Sicily, offered similar fare.

The remainder of July and August would see CAPE ST. GEORGE participate in a number of complex and fast-paced exercises beginning with SHAREM 125. An exercise focused on undersea warfare, SHAREM tested CAPE ST. GEORGE's submarine hunting abilities. Next was Matador '98, a joint, multi-national exercise conducted by Commander SIXTH FLEET in the Tyrrhenian and Ionian seas. Designed to increase multi-national and task force interoperability, Matador brought together a broad cross-section of participants, ranging from an LHA to Air Force F-16's. Each day, the participating NATO forces demonstrated their abilities in a multi-warfare environment. The EISENHOWER Battle Group was subjected to simulated attacks from submarines, surface ships and aircraft. The exercise culminated with CAPE ST. GEORGE providing air defense for a simulated non-combatant evacuation operation of a U.S. embassy. Lastly, CAPE ST. GEORGE

participated in Exercise Eagle Arena, a joint US Navy/Egyptian exercise. As CVW-17 operated with Egyptian F-16's, Mirage F-1's, and Mirage 2000 fighters, CAPE ST. GEORGE maintained Battle Group air defense, deconflicting air space and controlling aircraft.

After a port visit to Thira, Greece CAPE ST. GEORGE returned to the Adriatic and OPERATION DELIBERATE FORGE. Unexpectedly, CG 71 was ordered to the Arabian Gulf. Within days, CAPE ST. GEORGE had transited the Suez Canal for the first time in the ship's history and was operating the FIFTH FLEET area of operations. After several days of operations in the Arabian Gulf, CAPE ST. GEORGE assumed duties a Regional Air Defense Commander and Arabian Gulf Redcrown. CAPE ST. GEORGE was rapidly assimilated into the Pacific-fleet based USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN (CVN 72) Battle Group's operations. After the departure of the LINCOLN Battle group, CAPE ST. GEORGE maintained the Navy's forward presence and was subsequently joined by fellow EISENHOWER Battle Group ships USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) and USS ARLEIGH BURKE and then later by USS ANZIO in November.

In the Arabian Gulf, CAPE ST. GEORGE participated in Operation SOUTHERN WATCH and Maritime Interception Operations (MIO). SOUTHERN WATCH is a joint, multi-national operation conducted to enforce United Nations resolutions against Iraq. Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force aircraft enforce the no-fly zone, while ships and land-based sensors maintain continuous surveillance over the region.

CAPE ST. GEORGE also conducted Maritime Interception Operations in support of United Nations Security Council Resolution 986 as part of a multi-national force enforcing economic sanctions against Iraq. The multi-national force which has included the forces of 15 different countries, has conducted over 25,800 queries, 11,600 boardings, and 600 diverts of shipping since the operation's inception.

CAPE ST. GEORGE's operations in the Arabian Gulf culminated in OPERATION DESERT THUNDER, the narrowly averted strike operations against Iraq on 14-15 November.

While in the Arabian Gulf, CAPE ST. GEORGE made several port visits. In Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates (UAE), the crew participated in the Home Cooked Meal program which brought together American families living in Abu Dhabi with thirty CAPE ST. GEORGE sailors. CAPE ST. GEORGE also visited Dubai, UAE on two occasions. During CAPE ST. GEORGE's second visit to Dubai, the crew participated in the International Law Enforcement Games.

Throughout the deployment, CAPE ST. GEORGE embarked two SH-60B Seahawk helicopters form Helicopter Antisubmarine Squadron, Light Four Six (HSL-46) Detachment 8. During deployment the two SH-60B's flew over 300 sorties for over 1,000 flight hours.

On 19 November, CAPE ST. GEORGE commenced her voyage home by transiting the Strait of Hormuz. Enroute to the Suez Canal the ship celebrated the anniversary of the Battle of Cape St. George and then anchored in Port Suez on 25 November to celebrate Thanksgiving.

CAPE ST. GEORGE continued her trip home by transiting the Suez Canal, crossing the Mediterranean Sea and then navigating the Strait of Gibraltar. The ship then set sail for Bermuda in support of Operation Tiger '98,

Operation Tiger '98 was the name given to CAPE ST. GEORGE's tiger cruise form Bermuda to Norfolk VA. CAPE ST. GEORGE embarked over 30 tigers, family and friends of crewmembers, for her return to homeport trip.

On 10 December, CAPE ST. GEORGE returned to her homeport of Norfolk, VA. The remainder of 1998 was spent in a holiday leave and upkeep status.
