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1984 HISTORICAL NARRATIVE

USS CARL VINSON started the year pierside at Naval Air Station, Alameda, California and ended at Leyte Pier, Naval Air Station, Cubi Point, Republic of the Philippines.

1984 proved to be a big year for the Navy's newest aircraft carrier. USS CARL VINSON was awarded the Admiral Flatley Memorial Award for overall contributions to aviation safety and operational readiness. The annual award is selected by the Chief of Naval Operations and recognizes the aircraft carrier with the best safety record in the Navy.

Carrier Air Wing FIFTEEN, embarked on board USS CARL VINSON, consisted of nine squadrons. They were Fighter Squadrons (VF) 51 and 111, Attack Squadrons (VA) 52, 27 and 97, Air Anti-Submarine Squadron (VS) 29, Air Anti-Submarine Helicopter Squadron (HS) 4, Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron (VAQ) 134, and Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron (VAW) 114. Also embarked during WESTPAC 84-85 was one C-2 aircraft from Fleet Logistics Support Squadron (VRC) 50 and one EA-3 aircraft from Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron (VQ) 1.

The 363 days between Alameda and the Philippines were full of activity for the ship. It went from the middle of an extensive \$18 million work package during its three-month Ship's Restricted Availability period to carrier qualifications in February. This was followed by a Command Inspection by our type commander, work-ups, participation in RIMPAC-84, extensive training and testing, and a Ship Manning Document Review prior to departure on 13 October for its first deployment to the Western Pacific. Commencement of deployment saw USS CARL VINSON's participation in FLEETEX-85, and port visits to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii; Yokosuka, Japan; and Hong Kong prior to arriving at Cubi Point on Christmas Eve.

On 14 February, USS CARL VINSON completed its Ship's Restricted Availability period. From 14 through 19 February, independent steaming operations commenced in the Southern California Operating Area. USS CARL VINSON was the first CV to certify the F-14 MODE I approach. Refresher Training in the Southern California Operating Area began on 19 March and finished on 6 April. A Weapons Training/Composite Training Unit Exercise took place in the Southern California Operating Area from 14 to 23 May. This was the initial at-sea period for the Battle Group Charlie units with major CV/CVW team emphasis on the operational employment of all ship/airwing weapons systems.

USS CARL VINSON participated in RIMPAC 84 from 31 May to 18 June. This two Carrier Battle Group multi-nation exercise was conducted in the Southern California and Mid-Pacific Operating Areas. All major warfare areas in blue water/no divert operations were exercised. During this time the ship completed a Nuclear Technical Proficiency Inspection (NTPI) and received a grade of satisfactory; the USS CARL VINSON was the only ship to pass on the first look in the last five years.

READIEX 84-4/Operational Readiness Examination (ORE) commenced on 31 July and was completed on 22 August. USS CARL VINSON received the highest grade of any aircraft carrier in this evaluation period.

The USS CARL VINSON Dependent's Day cruise was held on 23 August and from 28 August to 2 September the ship held CVW-15 Refresher Operations and the Pre-Operational Reactor Safeguards Examination (PRE-ORSE). The Operational Safeguards Examination was completed on 18 September. On 13 October, the ship departed NAS Alameda for an extended Western Pacific deployment and was in port Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on 2 November. From 1 through 4 December, dual-carrier operations were conducted in the Sea of Japan with Battle Group Alpha and USS CARL VINSON arrived in Yokosuka, Japan on 10 December. This was followed by operations in the South China Sea with a port call to Hong Kong on 17 December. USS CARL VINSON was underway again on 22 December and arrived at Naval Air Station, Cubi Point, Republic of the Philippines on 24 December.

USS CARL VINSON officially became "San Francisco's Own" on 2 March during ceremonies conducted in the office of San Francisco's Mayor Diane Feinstein. She authorized the formation of a 33-member USS CARL VINSON Committee in her continuing efforts to bring the City of San Francisco closer to the Navy and USS CARL VINSON.

USS CARL VINSON continued to uphold its tradition of strong support for community relations. Examples of this in 1984 included the hosting of over 1,000 Boy Scouts for a weekend in April for its annual "Order of the Arrow" Conclave; sponsoring a USS CARL VINSON-San Francisco Bay Area Special Olympics day in July, and special Christmas programs at two orphanages in Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines. Civilian and military distinguished visitors, as well as major media representatives, continued to visit USS CARL VINSON on a regular basis to see the ship and Carrier Air Wing FIFTEEN in action.

Captain Thomas A. Mercer, USN, was the Commanding Officer, USS CARL VINSON for all of 1984. Commander Doyle J. Borchers, II, USN, was the Executive Officer.

SIGNIFICANT DEPARTMENTAL ACHIEVEMENTS

USS CARL VINSON'S Operations Department was awarded the Battle "E" and the Weapons Department the Black "W" representing the best Operations and Weapons Departments of aircraft carriers on the West Coast. The ship conducted nine Alpha strikes in 1984. Embarked aircraft strength in December 1984 consisted of 85 total aircraft (83 aircraft assigned to CVW-15; 1 C-2 aircraft from VRC-50 and 1 EA3 aircraft from VO-1).

USS CARL VINSON's Air Department was one of many excellent departments on board with notable accomplishments. These included 14,461 arrested landings in 1984, bringing the ship's total arrested landings to 33,319 at the end of the year. V-3 Division made 4,357 aircraft moves, and ended the year with an overall crunch rate of 11 per 10,000 (.0011); a 34% improvement over 1983 with no reportable mishaps and no personnel injuries. V-4 Division received over 19.2 million gallons of JP-5 from tankers and pumped over 16.2 million gallons of JP-5 to embarked aircraft. 278,000 gallons of JP-5 were pumped to other ships. CARL VINSON received the highest recorded Operational Readiness Evaluation of any aircraft carrier, V-4 Division, in the Pacific Fleet with a score of 96.45%.

USS CARL VINSON's Engineering Department performed in an outstanding manner in 1984 enabling the ship to steam 53,000 nautical miles. It completed its portion of the Ship's Restricted Availability period in February. In 1984, the Engineering Department completed a hydroblast of all shipboard CHT piping. Completing Refresher Training in April, the Department performed excellently in all areas. The Engineering Department successfully passed its Nuclear Technical Proficiency Inspection from 20 through 29 June. USS CARL VINSON was the only Pacific Fleet aircraft carrier to pass an NTPI on its first The ship completed the Operational Readiness Evaluation on 16 August receiving the only Damage Control Central grade of "excellent" ever awarded to a Pacific Fleet aircraft carrier. The Engineering Department established a Habitability Division to perform head and berthing habitability repairs and vent cleaning. This resulted in a dramatic improvement in head reliability and sanitation.

USS CARL VINSON's Supply Department won the COMNAVAIRPAC Food Service Excellence Award for 1984. S-5 Division was a runner up for the Dorrie P. Miller Wardroom Excellence Award for 1984. The Supply Department carried an inventory of 105,000 parts on hand which enabled it to exceed the 90% goal of inventory validity issue effectiveness established by COMNAVAIRPAC. It was through such work and operations that enabled USS CARL VINSON to become known as the aircraft carrier with the best supply support in the fleet.

USS CARL VINSON'S Aircraft Intermediate Maintenance Department is another arm of the ship that set itself above the other aircraft carriers on the West Coast. An example of this was the Aviation Management Inspection completed in September with an overall grade of 94%. This was the highest grade ever awarded a Naval Air Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet aircraft carrier. Support equipment availability exceeded normal operational levels and directly contributed to the high sortie success rate enjoyed by CVW-15. In 1984, CARL VINSON'S AIMD documented a total of 274,717.2 manhours. It inducted 20,194 items and processed 18,918 items. Its annual efficiency was 78.5%.
