2. Commander's Assessment:

The year 2006 was an eventful year onboard CARNEY. After the holiday period, CARNEY went to Tampa, FL for a celebration honoring the Navy. CARNEY opened up the ship for tours and a dinner with the Tampa Governmental Officials as guests.

The first half of the year, CARNEY was thoroughly involved in training exercises for certification of her Combat Systems and Engineering departments. Soon after completing her Final Evaluation Problem, CARNEY went through a shipboard INSURV-an inspection directed by the Senate that occurs every four years, ensuring our ship is fully operational.

CARNEY recertified her Navigation team in April in anticipation for her Southern Command Deployment. CARNEY also certified her Search And Rescue and Visit Board Search and Seizure Teams in May and June, prior to setting sail on her surge.

CARNEY kicked off the month of June with a Leave and upkeep period. CARNEY invited all her friends and family onboard in the end of June for a Family Day cruise as well. Everyone enjoyed a day on the high seas.

In July, CARNEY commenced her two month surge deployment to Southern Command. Her South American voyage took her through the Panama Canal and as far south as Valaparasio, Chile. CARNEY conducted exercises with South American Naval Forces, to include Peru, Chile, Ecuador, Columbia, Argentina and Panama. Additional NATO representation was present with the Spanish and Canadian navies.

CARNEY's first exercise during her South American surge was a Submarine Exercise with the Peruvian Navy based out of Callao, Peru. CARNEY participated in a crew swap, sending several crew members to a Peruvian Submarine for the exercise. The exercise proved that the Peruvian Submarine Forces are a very capable opponent for any surface warship.

At the end of July, CARNEY participated in a Final Battle Problem in vicinity of the Chilean Coastline. This multinational exercise was very extensive, but united the American Forces. CARNEY paved the way in uniting international forces by demonstrating gun fire support that resulted in the certification of a Chilean Range. CARNEY's team successfully landed 5 inch rounds on target with 98% accuracy. This proved that United States warships could adapt to combined calls for fire.

CARNEY ended her time in South America with a Panama Canal Exercise. This exercise established the forces and coordination required to deter vessels smuggling illegal goods from transiting the Panama Canal. Our forces practiced detection, interdiction and deterrence.

In the beginning of September, CARNEY received deployment orders to proceed to the Eastern Mediterranean to provide support and deterrence in the conflict between Lebanon and Israel. On her transit across the Atlantic, CARNEY's orders were cancelled and she returned to homeport.

In just under a month from returning to the United States, CARNEY was underway enroute Mobile Bay, AL to engage with the local community during their annual Bayfest music festival. CARNEY enjoyed the time to relax and be celebrated while in Mobile Bay.

In early December, CARNEY participated in a submarine detection and engagement exercise off the coast of Jacksonville FL. The participating units included a German Frigate and a Chilean submarine.

With December came new orders for an October 2007 deployment with the Harry S. Truman Carrier Strike Group. Due to this requirement and new Surface Force Training Manual requirements, CARNEY started preparing for an extremely shortened training cycle. With less than a month to prepare, and the holiday season looming, CARNEY was hard charging in order to pass the ULTRA-C and ULTRA-E.
