Early in 2006, CURTS was extremely busy preparing for deployment. In January the ship conducted CMAV for much needed repairs and parts. In February the ship conducted Week One Work Up with its Helicopter Detachment, HSL 49. Also, CURTS sent 18 personnel to Visit Board Search and Seizure School in preparation for deployment.

In March, the ship conducted Week Two Work Ups with HSL 49 and started its predeployment standdown. In conjuction with this standdown was a CMAV to repair any last minute equipment before deployment.

On 27 April 2006, the ship departed for deployment. CURTS in-chopped to CTF 40 and embarked a Coast Guard Detachment to support a counter narco-terrorism deployment to the Eastern Pacific.

During the deployment, CURTS participated in several COMREL (Community Relations Events) Projects. The accomplishments of these COMRELs are listed below in the Published Document section.

CURTS deployment was extremely successful. The ship handled and detained over 45 detainees. CURTS also handled and transfered over 3 tons of contraband.

The ship returned from deployment on 27 October and went into a post deployment standdown period until 29 November. For the rest of the year, CURTS participated in the Nimitz Strike Group C2X and Scientist to Sea.

CURTS earned honors as a 2006 Battle Efficiency Award Winner.

USS CURTS MAKES PORT VISIT TO LIMA, PERU - 14-19 SEPTEMBER 2006 Callao, Peru – The USS CURTS (FFG-38) pulled into Lima, Peru on 14 September 2006, commencing a four-day port visit to the country. During their visit, the CURTS participated in several foreign relations activities, including a Community Relations (COMREL) event, a Project Handclasp donation and a dinner reception with the Peruvian Navy and US Embassy.

The USS CURTS hosted a dinner reception with the US Embassy and Peruvian Navy on 14 September at the restaurant La Rosa Nautica . The reception afforded an opportunity for the officers of the CURTS to liaison with key personnel from both organizations, thus building and strengthening diplomatic relations with Peruvian regional maritime forces. During the reception, Commander DeBow, Commanding Officer, USS CURTS, presented numerous gifts to the Peruvian Navy, including an encased American Flag that was flown onboard USS CURTS. Accepting receipt of the gifts on behalf of the Peruvian Navy were CALM Manuel Perez and CALM Raul Vasquez.

On 15 September 2006, 19 sailors from the USS CURTS (FFG-38) volunteered to clean and re-paint a local boys and girls club in Callao, Peru. Brother Thomas Helm Center is a social concern center that promotes the fundamental development of children and teenagers who are in situations of extreme poverty and street risk. Established 11 years ago to serve as a safe haven for the youth of Callao, The Brother Thomas Helm Center uses a non-formal education program to strengthen the character of the children as well as to reintroduce them back into the school system. Over 150 children, ranging from ages seven to eighteen, take refuge in the center.

A Project Handclasp donation was also made on 15 September. Numerous humanitarian assistance items were donated to the Associacion Stella Maris, a charity organization that works closely with the Peruvian Navy and US Embassy. The Handclasp goods were transported by CURTS from San Diego and included medical and hygiene supplies, as well as athletic equipment. Boatswain Mate First Class **Maria**, who helped spearhead both the COMREL and Project Handclasp events, had this to say about his experience, "Interacting with these children, who have been exposed to grave circumstances, is a very rewarding experience. Helping clean up the school and donating goods to Asociacion Stella Maris will make a big difference in the lives of the children in Peru".

USS CURTS (FFG-38), home ported in San Diego, California, along with its embarked SH-60B helicopter detachment, HSL-49, is deployed under the operational control of U.S. Naval Forces Southern Command as part of a Joint/Inter-Agency Task force conducting counter-narcotics trafficking operations in the Caribbean and Eastern Pacific. This was the seventh Community Relations Event for the USS CURTS during its sixth month deployment to the Eastern Pacific.

USS CURTS MAKES PORT CALL TO FREEPORT, BAHAMAS - 16-19 AUGUST 2006 Freeport, Bahamas – On 16 August 2006, the USS CURTS (FFG-38) pulled into Freeport, Bahamas to begin a four-day visit to the island. The port call served as both a liberty port for the sailors onboard CURTS as well as an opportunity to strengthen ties between the United States and their Caribbean neighbors. Several events were scheduled during their stay, including the CURTS' sixth Community Relations Event (COMREL) while deployed to the SOUTHCOM AOR.

On 17 August 2006, 13 volunteers from the USS CURTS and its helicopter detachment, Helicopter Anti-submarine Squadron Light 49 (HSL-49), set out to lend their services to two local schools at Eight Mile Rock, a small community located just outside the city of Freeport. Half the volunteers re-painted two bathrooms at Eight Mile Rock High, while the others helped clean the school grounds at Martin Town Primary. Both schools were extremely grateful for the aid the volunteers provided. The Bahamas were hit last year by a massive hurricane that left the island torn and battered. Martin Town Primary was actually forced to close the school and hold classes at a local church for several months. One year later, rebuilding efforts are still in effect. ENS **MARKET**, the Navigator and Public Affairs Officer onboard CURTS had this to say about the COMREL event. "To be able to come to the Bahamas and help the people rebuild their lives is a great honor. Looking around at the hurricane damage one year later, I can only image the hardship the people of the Bahamas had to endure."

The CURTS also participated in several other events to improve community relations with the people of the Caribbean. The Commanding Officer of the USS CURTS, Commander William DeBow, met and participated in a forum with Assistant Commissioner of Police, Mr. Ellison Greenslade and other various local law enforcement authorities to strengthen relations between the US and Bahamas. Also, the local police department hosted a softball game between CURTS sailors and policemen. USS CURTS (FFG-38), home ported in San Diego, California, along with its embarked SH-60B helicopter detachment, HSL-49, is deployed under the operational control of U.S. Naval Forces Southern Command as part of a Joint/Inter-Agency Task force conducting counter-narcotics trafficking operations in the Caribbean and Eastern Pacific.

USS CURTS SAILORS HELP CLEAN UP LOCAL IN MAYPORT, FLORIDA Mayport, Florida – On 1 August 2006, volunteers from the USS CURTS set out to assist teachers at Finnegan Elementary School inventory new schoolbooks for the upcoming school year. Finnegan Elementary consists of primarily Department of Defense (DOD) students and the start of the new school year was only seven days away. CURTS volunteers helped in cleaning and servicing the property as well as inventorying over 1200 new school books.

When the ten volunteers arrived at the elementary school, they were greeted by several teachers and served a delicious breakfast consisting of coffee, juice, muffins and yogurt. Once breakfast was done, the volunteers quickly set out to inventory the numerous textbooks. The volunteers inventoried the books by placing the school stamp on several pages and loading the books onto carts. The books were then taken to various classrooms throughout the school.

After all the books were stamped and taken to their respective classroom, the volunteers set out to clean the school grounds. The volunteers quickly learned that a large tree had recently broke and fallen in front of the school. The volunteers quickly cut the fallen tree into several smaller parts and carried them to the dumpster in the back of the school. The project was coordinated through Elementary School Principle, Mr. Pinter. Mr. Pinter, along with the teachers, were extremely grateful for all the hard work and efforts the volunteers gave, allowing them to spend more time preparing lessons and activities for the new semester.

The USS CURTS pulled into Mayport, Florida for a two-week availability to conduct repairs and maintenance. USS CURTS (FFG-38), homeported in San Diego, California, along with its embarked SH-60B helicopter detachment from Helicopter Anti-submarine Squadron Light 49 (HSL-49), is deployed under the operational control of U.S. Naval Forces Southern Command as part of a Joint/Inter-Agency Task force conducting counter-narcotics trafficking operations in the Caribbean and Eastern Pacific. This was the ship's fifth COMREL event of their deployment.

USS CURTS SAILORS VOLUNTEER TO HELP REPAIR LOCAL SCHOOL IN EL CHORRILLO, PANAMA

El Chorrillo, Panama. On 20 July 2006, sailors from the USS CURTS volunteered to help repair and clean Escuela Estados Unidos de America, an elementary school located in the city of El Chorrillo, Panama. Volunteers helped in repairing the ceiling, repainting walls and cleaning both inside and outside the school. Last year, the school was actually two separate learning facilities, Escuela Estados Unidos de America and Escuela Presidente Valdez. The mission for the volunteers was to repair the dilapidated classrooms of Escueal Presidente Valdez so the two schools could merge into one, Escuela Estados Unidos de America.

When the twenty-six volunteers from the CURTS arrived at the school early Thursday morning, they knew they were going to be busy. From cleaning dirt and dust from the classrooms to repairing the ceiling, volunteers worked non-stop throughout the day to get the school back in shape for the children. After only a few hours, the CURTS sailors had made a vast improvement to the school, which serves 764 students and has 42 teachers. Numerous trash bags had been filled with dirt and trash and, thanks to the handyman and carpeting skills of many of the volunteers, little more than half of the roof had been repaired.

"Having to be away from my family, I could not think of a better and more productive way to spend my off-time than helping people in need. I have a whole new sight of appreciation for the things I have and am able to share with my family", says MA1(SW)

who spearheaded this Community Relations Event (COMREL). MA1(SW) has been an active leader in community relations events and continues to motivate others onboard to participate.

MA1(SW) worked with Mrs. Walleska Wagner to help set up the event. Mrs. Wagner recently relieved Mrs. Martina Hand at the US Embassy in Panama as the People-to-People Coordinator. Lunch was once again provided by the Association of Veteran Spouses, lead by Mrs. Mariela Lord. US Naval Forces Southern Command provided both the tools and supplies used to repair and clean the schoolhouse. Many of the schools in Panama depend on the help of others to support education programs. Working with a limited budget, schools just don't have the access to funds to properly facilitate their buildings. The sailors onboard the USS CURTS realize this and sacrificed their off-duty time to lend support. This is the third COMREL the USS CURTS has done in Panama and the fourth in their six-month deployment to the Eastern Pacific.

USS CURTS SAILORS RE-VISIT SCHOOLHOUSE IN ARRAIJAN, PANAMA Balboa, Panama – On 23 June 2006, volunteers from the USS CURTS and HSL 49 Air Detachment set out to finish repairs on Escuela Monte Claro, an elementary schoolhouse located in the rural community of Arraijan. The first time CURTS visited the schoolhouse, volunteers worked on sealing a newly constructed two-foot addition to the height of the schoolhouse and aided in cleaning and grooming the surrounding property. During this visit, CURTS was allotted \$500 from US Naval Forces Southern Command, which they used to buy paint supplies, school supplies for the children and athletic equipment.

Twenty-five volunteers mustered early Friday morning armed with 5 gallon buckets of paint and numerous brushes and rollers. When they arrived at the schoolhouse, the children were let out of school early so the volunteers could begin their work. While some of the volunteers were busy repainting the building, others spent time playing soccer and

other such games with the children. The children showed their appreciation by drawing Thank You cards and giving them to the volunteers.

Once again, Mrs. Martina Hand, the People-to-People Coordinator at the US Embassy in Panama, worked in setting up this follow-up COMREL event. Sadly, this was Mrs. Hand's last day working with the US Embassy in Panama as she will soon be heading back to the United States. Her genuine concern and efforts in supporting COMREL events will be missed and the CURTS crew would like to wish her all the best in the future. Similarly, the Association of Veteran Spouses once again volunteered their services by providing lunch for the CURTS crew. Mrs. Mariela Lord and four other individuals treated the CURTS volunteers to a tradition Panamanian lunch consisting of chicken, rice and fruit.

LT **Matrix**, the Public Affairs Officer at US Naval Forces Southern Command, was a key member to making this COMREL event possible. He was the driving force behind supplying CURTS with \$500 to purchase paint and school supplies. LT **Matrix** has taken an active role in ensuring successful COMREL events for CURTS while they are deployed on their six-month deployment to the Southern Command AOR. The efforts of the CURTS volunteers resulted in a more positive learning environment for the children of Escuela Monte Claro. And the much needed school supplies will greatly help the children in their studies and classroom activities.

# SCHOOLHOUSE IN ARRAIJAN, PANAMA GETS MUCH NEEDED REPAIRS FROM USS CURTS SAILORS

Balboa, Panama - On 28 May 2006, over 30 sailors from the USS CURTS and HSL 49 Air Detachment, volunteered to help out the local community of Panama in repairing a school house for elementary children. The support effort included sealing a newly constructed two-foot addition to the height of the schoolhouse, insulation of the roof, and general cleaning and grooming of the property.

Located in the rural community of Arraijan, Escuela Monte Claro is a single, one room schoolhouse that facilitates approximately 15 students. There is only one teacher for all grades, ranging from first to sixth grade, with several "special needs" students. With the next nearest schoolhouse several miles away, most of the children will spend their entire elementary school education at this schoolhouse.

Mrs. Martina Hand, the People-to-People Coordinator at the US Embassy in Panama, worked in setting up the COMREL event. Mrs. Hand has been working for several years in coordinating events such as this with US Navy ships as they visit Panama. She helped set up a prior COMREL event for the same location with the USS MCCLUSKY, who raised the roof of the building two additional feet.

NC1 (SW) , the Command Career Counselor onboard the USS CURTS, organized and assembled the 31-man working party. NC1 has been a strong supporter of community relations' events, volunteering and spearheading such events as Christmas in July and Silver Strand Beach cleanups in San Diego, CA. Also volunteering were the Association of Veteran Spouses, a local organization supporting the military, lead by Mrs. Mariela Lord. Mrs. Lord, along with four other volunteers, provided lunch and refreshments.

As with their last port visit to Puerto Vallarta, the CURTS crew was awarded only 3 days of liberty in Panama. The 31 volunteers chose to sacrifice a half-day of much needed, and much deserved liberty, to reach out and make a difference in the local community. "I think when you look at what these people go through on a daily basis, it really makes you

USS CURTS' SAILORS VOLUNTEER TO REPAIR CENTER FOR DISABILITIES Puerto Vallarta, MX - On 2 May 2006, USS CURTS sailors, working together with the Puerto Vallarta Navy League, volunteered to repair a service center for the disabled. Fifteen members of the CURTS crew and wardroom painted and overhauled the service center (DIVAC) located in the downtown area of Puerto Vallarta.

DIVAC is a civil association formed by people with disabilities, working for their complete inclusion into society in an active and productive way. Along with receiving donations from various charities, DIVAC patients make and sell various gifts to keep their program running.

The DIVAC premises are large. They provide training facilities for people with disabilities. Among the activities are computer operation, arts, silk-screening, weaving, English courses and more. DIVAC also provides warehousing facilities for storing goods that are donated to various charities in the Puerto Vallarta area. The Navy League makes use of this space when medical and school supplies ware-housed in San Diego are brought down here by Navy and Coast Guard vessels.

Ensign **Mathematic**, the Main Propulsion Division Officer onboard CURTS, worked with Puerto Vallarta Navy League Representative Bill Clark in organizing the event. The oneday event resulted in a clean, well-preserved service center to help people overcome their disabilities and become more functional in society.

With only a few days of liberty available to them, CURTS' sailors volunteered their offduty time to help support the Navy League and their mission to help the unfortunate. "It was my pleasure to give back to the local community by helping to restore life in the DIVAC center," said STG1(SW)

The USS CURTS (FFG-38) recently departed for a six-month deployment to the Eastern Pacific. Puerto Vallarta was their first liberty port and first community relations event. Helping others has always been a major focus onboard CURTS and the ship plans to participate in several more events during their deployment.
