

USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69)
COMMAND COMPOSITION AND ORGANIZATION

I. Mission of USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69)

The mission of USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) is to provide sea-based tactical air power for the defense of America's right to freedom of the sea as well as the protection of United States sovereignty. As part of this mission, IKE is capable of projecting tactical air power over sea and land, as well as providing tactical air defense, anti-submarine and anti-surface capabilities.

II. Background

Named after the 34th president of the United States, USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) is the third nuclear-powered aircraft carrier ever built. Originally named EISENHOWER on Feb. 21, 1970, the ship was renamed DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER on May 25, 1970.

The keel of the ship (designated hull 599 by Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Company) was laid on Aug. 15, 1970, and was authenticated by the late president's grandson, D. David Eisenhower II. Five years later, on Oct. 11, 1975, Mrs. Mamie Doud Eisenhower, widow of the former president and the ship's sponsor, christened the ship during launching ceremonies at Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock Company.

USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) was commissioned Oct. 18, 1977 at Pier 12, Naval Station, Norfolk, Va.

NARRATIVE OF OPERATIONS - 20 MARCH - 31 AUGUST 1990

JANUARY 1990

- 4 Players from the Hampton Roads Admirals semi-pro hockey team visited IKE while in port. Members of the IKE Icers hockey team escorted the players on a ship tour.
- 6 Sign up weekends for "IKE Tikes" begins. IKE Tikes is a program for children and young friends of IKE sailors where they visit the ship during weekends to tour and learn about life aboard ships.
- 9 Mr. Larry Prior, a professional staff member of the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence and CAPT Robert Juengling, USN, General Defense Intelligence Programs Staff, visited IKE while in port to tour operational spaces.
- 13 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemorative Service was conducted on board. Mr. Mervin McCoy, principal of Jacox Elementary School in Norfolk was the guest speaker and the school's choir provided music.
- 22 IKE hosted several distinguished visitors, media and members of the general public during a two-day port call in Port Everglades, Fla. Distinguished visitors included members of the local Navy League chapters, Broward County judges, and students from the Dwight D. Eisenhower Elementary School in Lake Park, Fla. Media coverage of IKE's visit included television from Miami and Fort Lauderdale, Sunshine Network cable channel and area newspapers.
- 24 Wings of Gold editor, retired CAPT Zip Rausa, embarked IKE while underway to gather information on a series of articles highlighting carrier life. During his one-week stay, he researched stories on Grapes, Mess Management Specialists, the Captain, and off duty life. His desire was to present reading that will educate young aviators on areas away from the ready room and flight deck.
- 25 The IKE Battle Group formed in the Puerto Rican Operating Area to participate in FLEETEX 1-90. A second carrier battle group, led by USS John F. Kennedy, also participated. FLEETEX 1-90 tested the battle groups' ability to fight and counter the full range of threats that Navy units can expect. FLEETEX concluded on Feb. 10.

First employment of the TACRAL communications pod aboard IKE occurred during FLEETEX 1-90. Employment continued through MED 2-90.

IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.

FEBRUARY 1990

- 2 A series of distinguished visitor embarks began with the arrival of Secretary of the Navy H. Lawrence Garrett III, Undersecretary of Defense for Acquisition John A. Betti and ADM P.F. Carter, CINCLANTFLT. The three leaders toured IKE and visited other ships in the battle group. Secretary Garrett addressed the crew on SITE-TV and met with ship's company and airwing officers for discussions on current Navy plans.

Between Feb. 2 and 5, several U.S. and allied military officials visited IKE and other battle group ships, including ADM Sir Benjamin Bathurst, RN, CINCEASTLANT and RADM L.G. Mason, CF, Deputy Chief of Staff, SACLANT.

- 7 Burial at Sea of MM3 William E. Martens and Grace L. Spencer.
- 12 The Supply Management Inspection Team from COMNAVAIRLANT came aboard for a four-day inspection of IKE's Supply Department. The inspection resulted in an overall grade of "Outstanding." The department received "Outstandings" in 10 of the 11 areas inspected.
- 21 Deployment briefings for families conducted in Hangar Bay 2. Featured speakers from Norfolk Family Services, IKE's disbursing, personnel and legal offices.
- 22 IKE personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 27 The annual IKE Gala was held at the Virginia Beach Pavillion. The "Bon Voyage Gala" was coordinated by Dental Department and subsidised with \$75,000 from the Morale, Welfare and Recreation Fund. One thousand crew members and guests attended.
- 28 Avionics Division was acclaimed "the best in AIRLANT" following a Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance/Supply Effectiveness Evaluation.

MARCH 1990

- 1 Retired LTJG Robert Arter, special consultant to the Secretary of Defense for commemorative events, visited IKE while in port to discuss plans for the IKE Centennial Cruise program.

IKE wins the 1989 COMNAVAIRLANT "Quality of Life" award

- 8 IKE departed Norfolk for its sixth Mediterranean Sea deployment. In honor of the 100th anniversary of Dwight D. Eisenhower's birth, the deployment was named the "IKE Centennial Cruise." Mrs. Donna Pope, director of the U.S. Mint, visited the ship to present special edition Eisenhower Centennial Silver Dollars to RADM Thomas Lynch, CCDG-12; CAPT J.J. Dantone, CO; and CAPT Mike Luecke, CAG. The ceremony was also the official introduction of the coin to the Hampton Roads area.

MARCH 1990 (Cont.)

- 13 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 17 More than 1,000 IKE and CVW-7 sailors gathered on the flight deck for "Operation SPELLEX." The crew members formed five stars and the numbers "1890-1990" in honor of the centennial celebration. Photos of the event were widely published.
- 19 USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER battle group inchopts the Mediterranean Sea under the command of Commander, U.S. Sixth Fleet.
- 20 Battle group conducts its first in-theater exercise, National Week 90B. The exercise presented all types of maritime threat scenarios, with the USS FORRESTAL battle group opposing. National Week 90B ended 27 March.
- 23 A group of Swedish media embarked in IKE to cover CV operations. The resulting reports centered on the importance a U.S. Naval presence in the Mediterranean, noting the forces are a symbol of stability in an era of unpredictable change in Eastern Europe.
- 24 VADM Williams, COMSIXTHFLT, embarked in IKE for conferences and to address the crew over CCTV.
- 28 IKE and FORRESTAL battle groups dropped anchor in Augusta Bay for battle group turnover. All ships were again underway on 29 March.
- 29-30 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 31 An F/A-18 aircraft from VFA-136 crashed into the water at 1610 during routine operations in the Western Mediterranean Sea. The pilot, LCDR [REDACTED], was rescued within 10 minutes of the crash by an SH-3 Sea King from HS-5. The rescue was unique in that LCDR [REDACTED] held radio contact with a VS-31 S-3 operating in the vicinity, which vectored the helicopter into position. The crew on the S-3 never saw the downed pilot, but was able to use voice communication and aircraft maneuvering to accurately guide the helicopter. LCDR [REDACTED] suffered minor injuries.

APRIL 1990

- 2-10 IKE visited Toulon, France. More than 550 visitors toured IKE.
- 6 IKE hosted an Evening Review for 350 guests. The guest of honor was ADM Tripier, Military Prefect.

Volunteers from IKE painted exterior portions and an attic room of the Toulon USO office. Second team of volunteers completed renovation of rooms; painted decks and rooms of Little Sisters of the Poor Old People's Home in Toulon.

APRIL 1990 (Cont.)

- 10 VFA-136's "Gunstar 302" launched from IKE's flight deck at 1415 and into aviation history, logging the one-millionth flight hour for the Hornet. The jet was piloted by LCDR [REDACTED] who also recorded a personal milestone by completing his 1,000th hour in the strike-fighter jet.
- 11 ADM Jonathan Howe, CINCUSNAVEUR, embarked IKE for briefings with RADM Lynch, CAPT Dantone and CAPT Luecke. He also addressed the crew on SITE-TV.
- 14 Battle group units participated in the joint exercise Distant Thunder. U.S. and Turkish naval and air forces participated. The exercise concluded 21 April.
- 15 Easter Sunrise Service celebrated on the flight deck.
- 18 A group of U.S. and Turkish army officers embarked IKE for a daylight visit. The visiting party included MGEN Rigg, Deputy Commander 6ATAF and MGEN Dalkilic, Chief of Staff 6ATAF.
- 20 Commander of the Israeli Air Force MGEN Avihu Ben-Nunn and three other Israeli Air Force officers embarked IKE for a daylight visit. MGEN Ben-Nunn also flew in a VF-143 F-14.
- 21 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 22-29 IKE called on Haifa, Israel. During the visit, sailors toured historic areas such as Jerusalem and The Dead Sea. Several dignitaries visited IKE, including: RADM Ram, Commander of the Israeli Navy; E. Strod, honorary Thailand Consul; Haifa USO Council; Israeli National Defense College students; RADM Rafi Appel, Israeli Director of Naval Intelligence. During the stay, more than 2,100 citizens embarked for formal tours.
- 24 Volunteers from IKE painted and provided general maintenance assistance to the Mental Health Center in Tirat Carmel, Israel.

Holocaust Remembrance Services were conducted on the Forecastle while in port Haifa, Israel. Rabbi Cohen, from Haifa, was the guest speaker.
- 29 IKE battle group began Exercise Dragon Hammer 90, a NATO exercise that focused on joint and combined operations, coordinated air defense, maritime and amphibious training. This year's exercise was reduced in scope from the previous Dragon Hammers to provide maximum training in the minimum time. The training area was reduced to cut costly transit times, also. Exercise Dragon Hammer ended 15 May.

MAY 1990

- 2 Belgian Minister of Defense Guy Coeme and U.S. Ambassador to Belgium Maynard Glitman embarked IKE for an overnight visit.

Media representatives from Italy, Spain and France embarked IKE for a daylight visit to cover Dragon Hammer.

- 4 Deputy CINCSOUTH, GEN Gargioli and ADM Geraci embarked IKE for a daylight visit. The visit was hosted by VADM Williams, COMSIXTHFLT.

- 7 Vice President Dan Quayle embarked IKE to observe flight operations and meet crew members. His visit was part of an Eisenhower Centennial tour to England and Italy. He was joined by Italian Vice Prime Minister Claudio Martelli, former U.S. Secretary of State William Rogers, former U.S. Ambassador Max Rabb, Eisenhower Centennial Commission Chairman James D. Robinson, Ms. Susan Eisenhower, U.S. Ambassador to Italy Peter Secchia, Italian CNO ADM Ruggiero, and various U.S. and Italian media. The vice president addressed the crew in Hangar Bay no. 2 and re-enlisted 19 IKE and CVW-7 sailors.

London Daily Telegraph reporter Robert Fox embarked IKE to report on U.S. Navy operations in the Mediterranean Sea and the importance of NATO.

- 9 VADM Williams, COMSIXTHFLT, hosted a luncheon and ship tour for 20 distinguished visitors from Rome and Gaeta, Italy.

- 10 Media representatives from France, Italy and Spain embarked IKE for an overnight visit to report on Dragon Hammer.

VADM Williams, COMSIXTHFLT, hosted a luncheon and ship tour for 24 distinguished visitors from Cevinia, Italy.

- 11 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.

- 12 NBC Pentagon Fred Francis embarked IKE to report on the need of naval forces in a world after the cold war.

- 17 A group of 17 Cannes, France, municipal leaders embarked IKE for an overnight visit. The guests included the assistant to the mayor for maritime affairs; Cannes maritime administrator; and representatives from France/USA, USO and Navy League.

- 18-25 IKE called on Cannes, France. IKE's visit coincided with the last week of the International Film Festival. More than 800 visitors toured IKE.

- 19 During the visit, volunteers from IKE painted and cleaned "J'avais Faim," a basement in an apartment building set aside to help feed the hungry.

MAY 1990 (Cont.)

- 25 IKE hosted a daylight embark of 24 French mayors as part of the "Welcome U.S. Navy" program that hosts functions for visiting Navy ships. The embark was the such visit arranged to show appreciation for the communities' generosity.
- 25 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 26 FRG Navy RADM Christian Giermann embarked IKE and TICONDEROGA to observe CVBG operations.
- 28 Memorial Day Service was conducted in Hangar Bay 2. RADM Lynch and CAPT Dantone were the guest speakers.
- 31 Nine Spanish journalists embarked IKE and TICONDEROGA to observe operations during Exercise Poopdeck.

JUNE 1990

- 1 IKE and SCOTT began their transit to the English Channel to participate in the DOD-sponsored "Journey to Victory." JTV was one portion of DOD's year-long tribute to Dwight D. Eisenhower in the 100th year since his birth.
- 2 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 5 Journey to Victory celebration begins aboard IKE when Mr. John Eisenhower, Kansas Congressman James Slattery, U.S. Ambassador to France Walter Curley, CINCUSNAVEUR ADM Howe, former Ike cabinet members and Royal Navy D-Day veterans embark IKE. The guests were aboard while IKE transited the English Channel along the same track as the invading forces in 1944. The guests viewed flight operations, a Marine Parade and gathered in IKE's wardroom for a reception and briefing by naval historian John Rielly.
- 6 Tomcats from VF-142 and VF-143 flew a missing man formation over American Cemetery at Omaha Beach during D-Day ceremonies there.
- 6-11 IKE visited Portsmouth, England. More than 1,000 visitors toured IKE.
- 11 Nine guests of CINCUSNAVEUR embarked IKE for a daylight visit. The group included U.S. Air Force and British Air Force officers and Navy League members.
- 12 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 19 A pool of Spanish media visited IKE while in port Palma de Mallorca.
- 21 LTGEN Thomas Griffin, USA, Chief of Staff, Allied Forces Southern Europe, embarked IKE for a CVN orientation visit and F-14 FAMFLIGHT.

JUNE 1990 (Cont.)

- 23 GEN Sir Brian Kenny, U.K. Army, Deputy Supreme Allied Commander Europe; MGEN Alan Rogers, USAF, Assistant Chief of Staff, Operations Division; MGEN Albert Weber, FRG Air Force, Force Commander, NATO AWACs; and RADM Don W. Baird, Chief Operations and Readiness Branch, SHAPE, embarked IKE for a CVN orientation visit. GEN Kenny flew a FAMFLIGHT in the S-3B and MGEN Rogers and MGEN Weber flew a FAMFLIGHT in the E-2C.
- 24 A group of distinguished visitors and media from the Marseille, France area embarked IKE for a daylight visit. The DVs included the senator-mayor of Siant-Remy-De-Provence, several vice mayors from surrounding communities and business leaders. All three of Marseille's daily newspapers reported the embark on page one.
- 25-28 IKE visited Marseille, France. More than 350 visitors toured the ship.
- 27 Volunteers from IKE conducted general repairs and painting at the Monastery of St. Claire in Marseille, France.
- 40 members of the Austrian Militia Association of Vorarlberg visited IKE while in port Marseille, France, for a ship tour and lunch with CAPT Dantone.

JULY 1990

- 2-5 IKE visited Monaco. More than 600 visitors, including 55 8-12-year-old orphans, toured IKE.
- 3 LCDR [REDACTED], USN, CHC, conducted Baptism Services in Cannes, France.
- 10 ADM James Hogg, U.S. representative to the NATO Military Committee, embarked IKE and TATINALL to visit sailors and observe operations.
- MGEN Copin, Grench Air Force 4th Air Defense Region, embarked IKE while underway for an F-14 orientation flight with VF-142.
- 11 Mayor of Cannes Michel Mouillot headed a group of 21 French dignitaries who embarked IKE for a daylight visit.
- 12-20 IKE visited Cannes, France. More than 1,450 visitors toured the ship.
- 13 IKE hosted an Evening Review in Cannes, France. Approximately 500 guests attended, including ADM Jonathan Howe.
- 14 IKE and TICONDEROGA crewmen attended the annual USO Gala at the Palais de Festival in Cannes, France. The theme of the formal gathering was "America Celebrates Bastille Day - The Eisenhower Centennial." CINCUSNAVEUR ADM Howe, COMSIXTHFLT VADM Williams, Cannes Mayor Michel Mouillot and actor John Forsythe attended.

JULY 1990 (Cont.)

- 16 VADM Jack Ready, COMNAVAIRLANT, visited IKE while in port Cannes for discussions with RADM Lynch, CAPT Dantone, CAPT Luecke and squadron commanders.
- 16 The City of Cannes "adopted" IKE during a picnic hosted by the city on St. Marguerite Island.
- 19 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 23 RGEN Jay Blume, USAF, embarked IKE for a carrier orientation visit and E-2 familiarization flight.
- 24 A group of NATO flag officers embarked IKE for a daylight visit. The guests included flag officers from the Italian and Turkish air forces, Hellenic army and Royal Navy.
- 25 GEN Stelio Nardini, Chief of Staff of the Italian Air Force, embarked IKE with VADM Williams to observe carrier operations.
- 27 IKE visited Naples, Italy. More than 500 visitors toured the ship. During the five day visit, USS RECOVERY (ASR 41) was alongside to conduct a sea chest inspection.
- 30 CREDO retreat held for IKE personnel in Naples.
- 31 William Cardinal Baum, an American Bishop serving in the Vatican Cabinet as the Prefect of Apostolic Penitentiary, celebrated Confirmation aboard IKE on the Forecastle. 15 IKE crew members were confirmed.

More than 500 NATO military and Italian civilian officials were guests aboard IKE for an Evening Review. ADM Jonathan T. Howe, CINCSNAVEUR and CINC Allied Forces Southern Europe, was the guest speaker. The ceremony included a multi-national color guard, with flags from each NATO nation.

AUGUST 1990

- 1 IKE crew members travelled to Rome for an audience with Pope John Paul II.
- 8 IKE, TICONDEROGA, JOHN L. HALL, SURIBACHI and NEOSHO transited the Suez Canal to bolster U.S. forces in the Middle East after Iraq's 2 August invasion of Kuwait. The Red Sea Battle Group, along with USS INDEPENDENCE CVBG in the North Arabian Sea, were the first forces on station to help Saudi Arabia defend against a possible attack by Iraq. IKE's air wing was prepared for any contingency -- whether fending off an Iraqi attack or providing air cover for U.S. ground and air forces deploying to the region. During IKE's watch, the ship became the first modern carrier to actually set MOPP Level I.

AUGUST 1990 (Cont.)

- 14-17 IKE and CVW-7 personnel conducted a safety standdown.
- 16 The Red Sea Battle Group's mission shifted to maritime interception to support United Nations Security Council Resolution 51, imposing an embargo on shipping to or from Iraqi or Kuwaiti ports.

Sir Desmond Langley, governor of Bermuda; Enbersole Gaines, American consul general; and Sir John Swan, premier, embarked IKE for a daylight visit.

- 11 Radio personalities from Norfolk's WNOR, Henry "The Bull" DelToro and Les Wooten embarked IKE to broadcast the station's "Dawn Patrol" morning show live. Between 0530 and noon, the duo entertained their radio audience with sailor banter and interviews.

Homecoming Thanksgiving Services were conducted on the Flight Deck. RADM Lynch and CAPT Dantone were the guest speakers.

- 12 IKE moored at Pier 12S, Naval Station Norfolk at 1330 to a homecoming crowd of more than 7,000 family members and friends. Prior to arrival, the following media embarked to report IKE's return: Norfolk's television channels 3, 10 and 13, the Detroit CBS-TV affiliate; print representatives from Virginia Pilot, Newport News Daily Press, Navy News and UPI; and radio stations 2WD and WNVZ.

SEPTEMBER 1990 (Cont.)

- 28 CAPT William V. Cross relieved CAPT J.J. Dantone as Commanding Officer of USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69) in a flight deck ceremony. More than 500 military officials, family members and friends attended. Media from Norfolk television channels 3, 10 and 13, radio station 2WD and the Newport News Daily Press covered the ceremony.

OCTOBER 1990

- 1 Special Services Division moved from Executive Department to Training Department.
- 10 IKE personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 12 IKE got underway for the first time with the new Commanding Officer, CAPT Cross, for fleet CQ and shipboard training.

DECEMBER 1990

- 1 Operations Department reorganized to form the Command Direction Center, placing the ship's defensive weapons systems, as well as the warfare modules, under the direct control of the CDC officer.

DECEMBER 1990 (Cont.)

- 1 CS Division (Signalmen) moved from Communications Department to Navigation Department.

IKE joined forces with the Salvation Army and WEVC Channel 13 to bring Christmas joy to the needy in Hampton Roads. An "Angel Tree" was placed on the Hangar Deck. The tree was decorated with cards identifying a child (by age, sex and clothes size). More than 100 cards were taken from the tree and returned with gifts. IKE was the first ship ever to participate in the program.

- 7 More than 1,000 IKE crew members, families and friends gathered at the Virginia Beach Pavilion for the annual IKE Gala. The event was sponsored by IKE's Special Services and featured: Surf and turf dinner; live entertainment with the "Voltage Bros."; and door prizes ranging from free pizza to round trip tickets to Jamaica and Disneyworld.
- 12 Commander Cruiser-Destroyer Group Eight Classified Material System inspection team inspects IKE's CMS program. Program graded with 99 percent.
- 14 IKE Children's Christmas Party

IKE personnel conducted a ship-wide safety standdown.
- 18 IKE was named the recipient of the Golden Anchor, the Navy's award recognizing commands for exceptional retention programs. IKE was the winner in the aircraft carrier category.
- 19 E-2 Division's ship lighting display won first prize in the shipyard's annual holiday lighting competition. More than 2,000 colored light bulbs and nearly a mile of light strands were used to light the ship from bow to stern.
