## Command Composition and Organization

a. USS FORD (FFG 54) is the forty-eighth ship of the Oliver Hazard Perry class of guided missile frigates; the Navy's largest destroyer class built since World War II. Her mission is to provide in-depth anti-air, anti-surface and anti-subsurface protection for military and merchant shipping and to ensure continous use of the sea lanes of communication for the United States and her allies.

b. The Combat Systems aboard utilize a computer command and control system to integrate the ship's sensors and weapons. Her weapons include surface-to-surface and surface-to-air missiles, a 76mm rapid fire gun, a close-in weapons system, anti-submarine torpedoes and the LAMPS MK III helicopter.

c. The propulsion system is a computer controlled gas turbine power plant which utilizes jet engines similar to those found on commercial airliners. FORD'S propulsion system can be "brought on the line" in less than five minutes.

d. Despite the advanced systems aboard, the heart of the ship is the crew. Each member has been highly trained in his particular area of expertise so that he can either operate, monitor or repair all shipboard systems. FORD'S crew is composed of 15 officers, 14 chief petty officers and 177 enlisted men.

e. In March 1987, FORD was reassigned from Commander, Surface Squadron ONE to Commander, Destroyer Squadron NINE. While remaining under the administrative control of COMDESRON NINE throughout the year, FORD was assigned operationally to Commander, Middle East Force as a member of the Joint Task Force, Middle East from September - December 1987. On 23 May 87, CDR J.D. Price relieved CDR J.F. Eckler as Commanding Officer of FORD. A two plane LAMPS MK III detachment, HSL 45 Det 2 embarked in FORD on 17 August for a six month Persian Gulf deployment.

## NARRATIVE

FORD began the year having completed all basic test, certifications and inspections required of a new ship. Inport and at-sea training periods during the first half of the year concentrated on advanced training exercises required to achieve proficiency in all mission areas. Effective administration and organization was demonstrated in every area during a highly successful command inspection by Commander, Surface Squadron ONE. Operationally, FORD performed equally well as an Orange Force Unit during READIEX 87-2 and the subsequent Battle Group Evaluation. Her participation as on-scene commander and support platform for numerous air assets during an actual search and rescue mission drew praise from both Navy and Coast Guard commanders.

Major milestones were consistently achieved with professionalism and high standards. Aviation Facilities Certification was granted without the benefit of the normally scheduled Technical Assist. The exceptional Aviation Assist Visit was upgraded to a full Aviation Readiness Evaluation. Supply Department received its best evaluation ever in completing a no-notice Supply Management Inspection (SMI). FORD's performance during the SMI led to qualification for both the Ney and Best Ships Store awards. A port visit to Mazatlan, Mexico provided the crew with a much needed break during this period.

On 1 March 1987, FORD shifted from COMSURFRON ONE to Commander, Destroyer Squadron NINE. Command of the FORD changed on 23 May 87 when CDR J.D. Price relieved CDR J.F. Eckler. RADM R.A.K. Taylor, COMCRUDESGRU ONE was the principal speaker at the Change of Command ceremony.

In recognition of the growing Naval presence in the Persian Gulf, FORD was scheduled in mid-June to deploy on 17 August. The final two months were demanding as the ship completed a myriad of pre-deployment tests and Two successful standard missile firings were conducted at the preparations. Pacific Missile Test Center. A scheduled two week training availability in San Diego ultimately included a restricted maintenance availability, highly successful ISIC Engineering Readiness Assessment, completion of TMA and ASW Phase III team trainers as well as several pre-deployment threat and intelligence briefings. An extremely successful Combat Systems Readiness Test was marred only by the discovery of faulty elements in the sonar. Repairs to the sonar necessitated offload of all ammunition and drydocking at Todd Shipyard in San Pedro. The drydocking, repairs and subsequent ammo onload were professionally carried out and FORD deployed on 17 August with no CASREP's and M-1 in all mission areas.

For the deployment, FORD embarked two SH-60B helicopters with HSL 45, Detachment 2. The transit to the Middle East was completed in company with USS THACH (FFG-43). Port visits during the transit included: Pearl Harbor, for briefings by CINCPACFLT and NAVCENT staffs; Subic Bay, for a short maintenance availability and modifications to the helicopters; and Singapore for fuel and liberty. Following a brief stop for fuel in Columbo, Sri Lanka, FORD joined the Middle East Force, as a member of the Joint Task Force Middle East.

Following turnover with the USS JARRETT (FFG-33) in the Gulf of Oman on 26 September, FORD completed three months of near non-stop operations in support of the Middle East Force. Duties included patrols throughout the Persian Gulf, escort of reflagged Kuwaiti tankers and U.S. merchants, support of U.S. minesweeping efforts and surveillance of the Northern Persian Gulf. During this period which included 52 consecutive days underway, the crew stood port and starboard Condition I watches. Flight operations, involving embarked and other service helicopters, averaged nearly 10 hours per day. Highlights included FORD's participation in seven Earnest Will escort missions, the sighting and destruction of two mines by embarked helicopters and a visit by the Chief of Naval Operations, ADM Trost.

The year ended with FORD underway in the Northern Persian Gulf conducting surveillance of Iranian and Iraqi operations and supporting U.S. minesweeping efforts.
