2. Commander's Assessment

The week of 12-16 January saw the success of FORREST SHERMAN's Aviation Certification (AVCERT) and Aviation Readiness Qualification (ARQ), spearheaded by the First Lieutenant, ENS , and made possible by the tireless efforts of Deck and "R" Divisions. The ship was officially certified for helicopter operations after

completing Helo Day with HSL 46 in the Jacksonville OPAREA on 22 January. FORREST SHERMAN stayed underway until the 28th, playing as the opposing force to the USS EISENHOWER Strike Group. We had the unique experience of participating in elaborate battle group exercises all while tied to the pier in Norfolk, when we took part in the IKE Strike Group's FST-J from February 3-5. On February 9, we transited to the Naval Weapons Station in Yorktown, VA for a self-defense onload, where we remained until the 13th.

The ship got underway again the next week to travel to New Orleans for Mardi Gras. While pierside at the Gov. Nichols wharf from February 20-25, the crew enjoyed a long, relaxing weekend of sightseeing and revelry in the storied French Quarter. The commanding officer had the opportunity to ride on the Navy float in the Krewe of Tucks parade along with a handful of other crew members, and attended the annual ball hosted by the Krewe of Rex with the executive officer on the evening of Fat Tuesday, the 24th. The ship returned to Norfolk on 28 February, ready to meet our next challenge – FPEX, to be held over 3-4 March.

After successfully demonstrating her ability to defend herself, FORREST SHERMAN passed a critical evaluation of the supply department readiness during SMC in the month of March. In addition, the Surface Warfare team was engaged in training on how to conduct the Naval Gun Fire Support mission. Once concluded the entire Combat suite attended the Wallops Island team trainer where once again we successfully exhibited our ability to conduct sustained combat operations from CIC.

As we entered the training cycle for our upcoming deployment, the ship was also engaged in a series of real world tasking. Upon completing escort duties for SUBLANT, FORREST SHERMAN was detached to perform Operation Noble Eagle off the coast of New York City in April. Once detached she continued her training by completing Ultra-S, FST-GC, and an ISIC Nav-Check ride. The culmination of these events led to the ship attending Fleet Week in FT. Lauderdale, FI.

While at Fleet Week, the crew received some much needed rest and relaxation. Everything from sporting events, cooking challenges, and dignitary visits enabled FORREST SHERMAN to show her spirit and drive to the gracious hosts.

Shortly after, the crew had to set sail for the Baltic Sea in May to participate in BALTOPS 09. A series of multinational events at sea to train a NATO force to conduct combat operations as a singular unit. Navies from 8 European countries participated to include the host nations of Germany and Sweden. While in the Baltic, the ship visited ports in Sweden, Estonia, Latvia, and the host nation, Germany during the month of June. Germany hosted all the navies during their annual celebration known as Kiel Week, in Kiel Germany. The weeklong celebration of the seas included music, food, and festivities.

Upon returning from the Sixth Fleet, FORREST SHERMAN would not rest as she prepared to enter the intermediate phase of her training cycle. Damage Control would start the cycle off during DC RIP in which they displayed their ability to fight the ship during a damage control environment. The USW team would display their tracking and

engagement capability during IAC I and II. Ultra E then took center stage as the engineers once again flexed their ability to operate the engineering plant. All of this would culminate during the COMPTUEX with the NASSAU Amphibious Readiness Group. During this exercise, the entire ARG would demonstrate the ability to deploy as a singular unit.

Upon successful completion of COMPTUEX, the ship settled in for a series of grooms and maintenance periods such as SBTT and C5RA. During this time she received upgrades to systems and equipment to keep her on the cutting edge.
