27 January - 03 March, COBRA GOLD 2009

A combined exercise with the Royal Thai Navy and Marine Corps, COBRA GOLD serves to build interoperability and strengthen ties with Thailand as well as serve as a certification exercise for components of the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit. It consists of two major raids, a practice and actual event, and multiple smaller evolutions including small boat raids, Visit Board Search and Seisure team boardings, Maritime Interdiction Operation evacuations and formation steaming.

Following COBRA GOLD, HARPERS FERRY (HFY) pulled into Okinawa, Japan to offload Marines (03-07 March) before returning to homeport (09 March).

09 March - 10 May, Continuous Maintenance Availability

While in Sasebo, HFY completed a Continuous Maintenance Availability and Search and Rescue Certification.

15 May - 17 August, Cooperation Afloat Readiness and Training 2009

Cooperation Afloat Readiness and Training serves to strengthen ties with Southeast Asian nations through combined joint military operations, training, symposiums, and social events. During Cooperation Afloat Readiness and Training 2009, HFY served as flagship for Commander Destroyer Squadron 31 who was embarked for the duration of the exercise. HFY executed exercises in the Philippines, Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia, Indonesia and Brunei before returning to Sasebo.

05 October - 10 October, Foreign Humanitarian Assistance

HFY was dispatched from her anchorage in Manila Bay to proceed north in heavy seas generated by the passing typhoon, to Lingayen Gulf. The areas surrounding the gulf were severely impacted by multiple super typhoons in previous days and weeks. While on station in Lingayen Gulf, HFY and embarked Marine forces surveyed the area and provided limited relief to the immediate area.

01 - 07 November, Korean Interoperability Training Program (KITP) 2009

Following FHA and subsequent ARG reconfiguration, HFY departed the Philippines enroute to Pohang, Korea in support of Korean Interoperability Training Program. This exercise serves to reinforce US interoperability with Republic of Korea naval forces. This was accomplished through multiple events including naval surface fire support missions,

combined amphibious assaults, opposed formation steaming, Medical Evacuation Operations, and military symposiums.

Upon completion of KITP, HFY returned to Sasebo, Japan for Holiday Leave and Upkeep. From 01 January - 31 December 2009, HFY was out to sea 43% of the year, and away from homeport 57% of the year.
