USS HENRY M. JACKSON (SSBN 730 BLUE) NARRATIVE (1996)

- * In March 1996, the Blue crew conducted a refit including 30,000 man-hours of Trident Refit Facility (TRF), Bangor maintenance. The ship responded to a short-notice berth shift for a Recovery Vehicle On-Site Inspection. Seawater maintenance was completed in less than 24 hours to meet this operational commitment.
- * During Patrol 39, the ship responded successfully and without errors to two Weapons Systems Readiness Tests, two Retargeting exercises, and one Command and Control exercise. Also, the ship participated in Polo Hat and Global Guardian exercises, and conducted a Kilo-ex with an attack submarine.
- * The Blue crew completed a successful TRE in May 1996, highlighted by an ABOVE AVERAGE grade and designation as a "TRE Top Performer" for 1996.
- * At the end of Patrol 39 the Blue crew conducted a successful Defense Nuclear Surety Inspection. The command received excellent grades in 6 of 7 areas.
- * The Blue crew completed Patrol 39 with 100 percent Navigation Subsystem and Strategic Weapons readiness.
- * The Blue Crew commenced a complex drydocking period during September 1996 by completing an efficient docking and tank entry evolution. Over 100,000 man-hours of Trident Refit Facility and Puget Sound Naval Shipyard work was completed.
- * In October 1996, reporters and photographers from the Bremerton Sun Newspaper and KIRO News station were onboard to gather data for stories on Trident submarines. Both groups generated informative coverage of life at sea on a Ballistic Missile Submarine.
- * During Patrol 41, the ship responded successfully and without errors to two Weapons Systems Readiness Tests, two Retargeting exercises, and one Command and Control exercise. Also, the ship participated in Polo Hat 96-3 and Global Guardian exercises.
- * In November 1996, the Supply Department completed a very successful Logistical Readiness Exam (LRE), scoring an overall grade of EXCELLENT. The Food Service Division was specifically mentioned by the inspectors as the best food service operation in Submarine Pacific Fleet. The Squadron Commander sent the Commanding Officer a message congratulating the department on its performance and designated the ship as the LRE top Squadron performer for 1996.

- * In December the ship conducted a very successful Mini-Demonstration and Shake Down Operation, which provided oustanding training for the ship's strategic weapons, navigation, and ship-control personnel.
- * A Tiger Cruise for 35 male family members of the crew was conducted in December. A late lunch was ready for the Tigers upon their arrival. Each Tiger was given a a simplified qualification card to assist him in acquiring submarine knowledge. Each Tiger was allowed to go on the bridge, look out the periscope and operate the helm and fairwater planes. In addition, each observed fire drills and simulated torpedo and missile launches. In the evening and well into the early morning hours, the Tigers watched movies and ate Scoop's famous pizzas. In total, the family members spent approximately 18 hours on board.
- * The Blue crew completed Patrol 41 in December 1996 with 100 percent Navigation Subsystem and Strategic Weapons readiness.

The USS HENRY M. JACKSON (SSBN 730) is the fifth powerful OHIO class TRIDENT submarine of the class. The ship is named after the late Henry M. Jackson, a proponent of the TRIDENT submarine program. The HENRY M. JACKSON was built at General Dynamics, Electric Boat Division in Groton, CT. Following new construction, the ship successfully completed sea trials and Demonstration / Shakedown Operations (DASO) in Florida. The ship transited through the Panama Canal to it's current homeport of Bangor, WA arriving in June 1985.

TRIDENT submarines are undersea intercontinental ballistic missile launching platforms whose primary mission is strategic nuclear deterrence. The submarine is under the operational control of Commander Submarine Group Nine while inport and under the operational control of Commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet and the United States Strategic Command while deployed at sea.

The ship has completed 42 strategic deterrent patrols to date and has participated in successful Operational Tests of the Trident I missile system.

Awarded the Battle Efficiency "E" as the outstanding submarine in Squadron 17. Awarded the Strategic "S" for superior performance of strategic mission, the Supply "E" for outstanding supply operations, Navigation "N" for superior performance of navigation, and Medical "M" for superior performance medicine on board.

And it won several departmental awards, including the Strategic "S" (for superior performance of its strategic mission), the Supply "E" (for efficient stewardship of taxpayers' dollars), the Navigation "N" and the Medical "M".

To be eligible to win the Battle "E", a submarine must have sustained superior day-to-day performance, pass all inspections with flying colors and demonstrate overall readiness to carry out its assigned wartime tasks, according to official Navy instructions.

In addition, the ship must maintain high morale and retention of sailors in the Navy.

But what it really boils down to is the crews' resourcefulness and self-reliance while operating alone out there 100 fathoms under the sea, said Stewart and Donahue.

"We didn't have any way to influence this other than through good performance," said Stewart.

"E award doesn't stand for easy"

About 400 feet below the surface of the North Pacific, a fierce but silent competition is taking place that few people know about.

As the Navy's eight Bangor-based Trident missile submarines carry out their stealthy undersea mission, their crews try each year to out-perform, out-navigate, out prepare and generally out-do each other to earn the coveted Battle "E" - for efficiency.

The winner for 1996: USS HENRY M. JACKSON, namesake of the late U.S. senator from Washington state.

The winning submarine is considered the best in the Bangor squadron, known as Submarine Squadron 17. And the two alternating Blue and Gold crews that man the ship get bragging rights for a year, a ribbon to pin on their chests and an entry in their service records. Plus they have to try and keep an edge so they can keep the title a second year while all seven of the other subs' crews are gunning for them.

"It's like winning the Super Bowl two years in a row," says Capt. Frank Stewart, commanding officer of HENRY M. JACKSON's Gold crew.

"There's a responsibility that comes with this award, to do better in the coming year, to try and repeat... You're the standard, and in order to be competitive you have to lift your standards even higher."

All squadrons in the Navy have a Battle "E" competition, including surface ships, but few are as keen as the one among Bangor-based subs, says Capt. Conrad J. Donahue, commanding officer of the HENRY M. JACKSON's Blue Crew.

"This squadron here in Bangor is one of the most competitive in the Navy, and all of these ships are in top readiness," said Donahue.

As a result, the winning margin is usually "razor-thin," says Stewart. "We're dealing in margins here, and its due to the efforts of the entire crew... You set yourself apart."

Capt. Stewart said he was at home on New Year's Day when he got a call from the squadron duty officer informing him that his sub got the "E."

His first phone call afterward was to Capt. Donahue.

The award was a fitting climax to Donahue's tour as commanding officer, which ended a week after the sub won the award. He now will report to a new job at the Pentagon, working for the chief of naval operations.

Relieving Donahue was Capt. Dave Mericle, who must now try to keep up the sub's winning performance in 1997.

It's the HENRY M. JACKSON's first Battle "E" in 12 years of commissioned service.

During 1996, the 18,700-ton HENRY M. JACKSON made four patrols in the pacific, with it's 24 nuclear-tipped missiles at the ready to deter an attack against the United States. The sub also underwent four maintenance periods at Bangor.
