2. Commander's Assessment

The outstanding accomplishments documented in regards to IWO JIMA's performance during Calendar Year 2009 are astonishing. The ship's numerous maintenance successes are even more impressive considering the fact that IWO JIMA was deployed from home port 187 days during Calendar Year 2009. The entire ship's maintenance effort was the catalyst in IWO JIMA meeting and overcoming a variety of unique challenges while flawlessly supporting every operational and training evolution with consistently outstanding results. The dynamic and extensive Intermediate Level maintenance support provided by IWO JIMA's AIMD, Combat Systems, Deck, Engineering, Weapon's and various other departments enabled the embarked Air Combat Element to sustain an unheard of 83% aircraft mission capable rate for contingency tasking and 99% combat mission completion rate while supporting Operation Enduring Freedom, Theater Security Cooperation, and the Global War on Terrorism.

At the beginning of 2009, IWO JIMA was on deployment. IWO JIMA returned to its homeport March 22, 2009. The following day, the MEU and Air Combat Element HMM TWO SIX FOUR off-loaded their personnel and gear from IWO JIMA. From 20 to 27 May, USS IWO JIMA was underway again, to lead the U.S. Navy presence during Fleet Week New York in New York City, hosting over 40,000 visitors and more than 200 dignitaries. Immediately following Fleet Week, IWO Jima transited to Naval Weapons Station, Earle New Jersey for ammunition offload, removing over 1,000 tons of explosives consisting of more than 700 different types of IWO returned to Norfolk on 12 June and immediately left Norfolk 11 days later on 23 June for a five week short notice deployment to provide support for the President of the United States' historic visit to Ghana, Africa. IWO's Medical Department was ordered to expeditiously provide liaison and planning expertise for operation JUPITER SENTINEL in direct support of White House Military Office/White House Medical Unit for the President of the United States' visit to Ghana. Medical Department provided critical medical support for the President's first official visit to a Western African nation, paving the way for continued relations with regional leaders;

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receiving noteworthy post-mission comments from White House Military Office/White House Medical Unit leadership.

Maintenance availabilities were conducted from return of deployment in March 2009 to May 2009 and during a home port visit August through September 2009. USS IWO JIMA went through a successful CNO Availability at BAE Systems Shipyard from October-December 2009. USS Iwo Jima scored high marks during the Light Off and Assessment November 23-25 2009. IWO left BAE December 7, 2009. After leaving BAE, IWO went through a successful Sea Trials from December 7-9, 2009. For the remainder of 2009, IWO remained in port at Naval Station Norfolk.

4. Effective Use of Maintenance Resources.

- a. AIMD has processed over 4,226 Maintenance Actions including the fabrication of hydraulic/air lines, wiring cords, and supportive attachment surfaces in support of IWO JIMA Strike Group support/testing equipment, squadron aircraft, and ACU-4 Landing Craft-Air Cushioned (LCACs).
- b. AIMD assisted the USS SAN ANTONIO Air Department in the development of a ship board Support Equipment Repair Division, ensuring all aviation support equipment assets was physically and administratively maintained within CNAF directives. AIMD completed an audit of SAN ANTONIO's maintenance programs, assisted in the procurement of aviation particular tools, and trained/licensed over 30 SAN ANTONIO personnel to operate 12 different types of support equipment.
- c. During maintenance periods 9A1 and CNO Availability 9C1, Air Department has identified, tracked, and supervised the replacement of 46 flight deck nets, 19 pad-eyes, flight deck non-skid, the complete refurbishment of flight deck lighting, and the cleaning of six JP-5 fuel tanks. USS IWO JIMA had such a successful non-skid quality assurance program that it has been implemented by LHDRON as the fleet standard. Additionally, Air Department consistently scores well over 90% during quarterly 3M evaluations.
 - (1) The C5I Department's extraordinary repair talent

enabled them to accomplish maintenance repairs that went beyond their normal scope of duties, including:

- (a) During the return from an extensive deployment IWO JIMA's Electronics Technicians restored both of the ship's primary and secondary navigational radars, which had suffered major casualties. Identification and restoration of these radar faults were instrumental to safe navigation, completion of several training exercises, and return of the IWO JIMA from deployment.
- (b) IWO JIMA's ET's assisted SPAWAR during the removal and installation of the aft WSC-6 antenna, which ultimately supported shipboard satellite communications prior to the short notice mission, Operation Jupiter Sentinel, and facilitated support during the POTUS visit to Ghana, Africa.
- (c) Radar Electronics Technicians were instrumental in the restoration of IWO JIMA's TACAN which suffered a catastrophic loss of both Primary and Secondary Beacons. The ships Electronics Technicians quickly identified the faulty tubes and repaired the Primary beacon, ultimately restoring Safety of flight to the USS IWO JIMA and facilitating the successful completion of operation Jupiter Sentinel.
- (d) IWO JIMA's Information Technicians and Electronics Technicians frequently accomplished corrective maintenance well outside the normal scope of their duties. This included repairs normally accomplished at the intermediate or depot level. The refurbishment of 3000 square feet on two SHF platforms, and 1,000 square feet on the SMQ-11 platform, culminated with a savings of \$1,200,000 and \$20,000 dollars respectively.
- d. The Ships 3M Division's performance has been exceptional in obtaining the following achievements:

e. Engineering Department's Repair Division has completed over 1,500 ship's force level repair discrepancies in the crew and troop berthing areas, including 57 Formal Work Packages. Their efforts increased the moral well fare and living conditions of over 1,800 embarked Marines.

5. Innovative Management Accomplishments:

- a. Managers fully employed state-of-the-art technology to make significant advancements in ship self-sufficiency during 2009. Innovative management earned IWO JIMA the reputation as a leader in operational efficiency on the waterfront.
 - (1) AIMD Department accomplished the following:
- (a) IM-1 Production Control (PC) managed and processed 2,101 maintenance actions for 16 diverse work centers, screened and tracked 23 engine log books, ensured detailed verification of 275 custody cards, and coordinated 170 work requests. Quality Assurance performed 152 audits on all work centers, programs and DTPL libraries, and screen and routed over 368 technical directives on support equipment and aircraft squadron parts. Efforts of both work centers led to a reduction in department backlog by 40 percent, a 98.2 percent sortie completion rate for embarked commands, and allowed the ship to safely complete all tasking in support of exercises ESGINT and JUPITER SENTINEL.
- (b) IM-3 Division developed an aggressive calibration plan that identified 55 defective pressure and temperature gages/ switches in over 43 shipboard systems. IM03 Division calibrated and repaired all defective components, resulting in the Engineering Department obtaining full certification during Light-Off Assessment inspection.
- (c) IM-4 Division provided training and licensing to over 2,530 students on 45 assorted pieces of SE/MHE/AMP. Their efforts included over 7,500 hours of classroom and on-the-job training as well as countless hours of one or more instruction. They also developed and initiated an in-depth maintenance plan to overhaul over 200 major support equipment assets. IM04 mechanics exerted over 10,050 man-hours in the disassembly, corrosion treatment, and re-assembly of each asset, resulting in a 97.4 percent ready for issue rate during the training cycle and deployment.
- b. Engineering Department developed a fuel conservation plan that detailed ways to conduct single boiler and single

forced draft blower operations, as well as methods to utilize the acceleration/deceleration tables to more effectively save fuel. Their efforts led to an estimated fuel cost savings of over \$3 million dollars.

- (1) The C5I Department accomplished the following:
- (a) IWO JIMA'S 2M program saved the ship over \$125,000 by the organic repair of component parts for the HF, TACAN, EDGs, HYDRA, DAMA, SSTGs, TPX-42, CIWS, SPS-48, SPS-67, and the SPN-43 systems. A significant portion of these savings came from the repair of parts not normally repaired through the 2M program, especially those from the ship's HF suite.
- (b) As a more cost-effective measure, than that of repairing each individual part, the WSC-6 antenna was completely overhauled for a cost savings of over \$350,000.
- (c) ADP members redesigned the IWO JIMA's internal intranet web pages which improved overall accessibility and developed a more user friendly internet. Additionally, the ADP team dedicated over 1500 man hours towards personnel trouble calls ranging from simple user errors to giving advice and aiding in web designs.
- (d) ADP also conducted a network connectivity groom that involved Unclassified and Classified high level switches totaling 238 fiber and 282 Ethernet ports. This groom resulted in increased overall network speed, and the maximum performance of all resources.

6. Resource Management Innovations and Improvements

- a. Deck Department implemented a corrosion training program that introduced basic corrosion identification, treatment and preservation throughout the department. With in-depth training on the proper uses of numerous types of pneumatic tools the department was able to drastically decrease the hours and material required in the treatment and preservation of the ship's hull. This training was directly responsible for a savings of more than \$50,000 and over 200 man hours.
- b. Engineering Department seamlessly integrated a diverse group of 79 Sailors from 65 work centers into a superior Damage Control organization responsible for the maintenance and upkeep of over 13,000 pieces of portable DC equipment and climate control systems. The development of the ER09 work center assisted each shipboard department in completing operational

commitments without the additional responsibilities of upkeep and maintenance of damage control equipment. This process greatly improved the material condition of all damage control assets, leading to increased levels of DC readiness throughout the ship.

7. Training Program

a. Training Department established training teams as the primary agents for training self-sufficiency and assessing the ship's ability to conduct sustained combat operations. They brief, train, observe, and evaluate Condition I, II, III, and IV watch sections to improve war-fighting proficiency. IWO JIMA training teams are:

Integrated Training Team (ITT) De-conflict and integrate individual training teams providing valuable training teams providing valuable training scenarios to the entire ship. Combat Systems Training Team (CSTT-Technical) (9 teams total) Engineering Training Team (ETT) Evaluate operational warfare areas and combat systems casualty control. - h. Accidents and Injuries. Safety Department has developed a rigorous a rigorous Safety indoctrination course and strictly adheres to the safety afloat program. Our training assists newly assigned Sailors in identifying specific work place hazards. IWO JIMA has had a significant reduction of personnel accidents due to focused ORM, intrusive leadership, increased command awareness, and closely tracking safety discrepancies to correction.
- i. Safety Indoctrination course to train newly reported Sailors and Marines in identifying shipboard hazards and developed strategies to mitigate the risk. The course also includes the introduction to all safety afloat programs. The ship has experienced a 27% reduction of personnel accidents and mishaps since the introduction of this training. The Safety Department has also initiated a "Safety Professional" recognition program which promotes safety awareness throughout the ship.
- j. Mishaps. The commands total commitment to safety through the use of ORM, intrusive leadership, and a tracking mechanism to ensure all safety discrepancies are corrected expeditiously resulted in zero Class A or B mishaps for FY 09. The Safety Department also utilizes a Human Factors Council to provide a formal mechanism for human factors inputs to the CO. The CO utilizes this information for risk assessment and subsequent decisions regarding safety issues. Department also developed a leave and liberty risk assessment form, enabling supervisors to better assess hazards associated with holiday travel, driver experience, and personnel stressors while counseling subordinates. They also established a policy of posting crossing guards in crosswalks at the head of the pier during peak pedestrian traffic hours. IWO JIMA's consistent use of this safety measure has resulted in zero pedestrian mishaps.

- k. Mishap Reporting. IWO JIMA uses a thorough mishap-reporting program to track mishaps and establish trends. Information from mishap reports proved vital in tailoring safety training to meet ship-specific hazards and enhance awareness. WESS reports are submitted to the Naval Safety Center to assist in mishap abatement Navy-wide.
- 1. Ammo Offload Earle, NJ. Safely conducted Ammunitions post deployment offload of 1087 pallets (892 tons) of conventional ordnance valued at \$50,000,000 in a five-day period.
- m. In addition, the safety department and division safety petty officers attended COMNAVSAFECEN's Afloat Safety Seminar on September 2, 2009.

Captain Jeff "Amtrack" Amick is a native of Rushville, Ind., and a graduate of Pike Township High School near Indianapolis. He received his commission and a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from the U.S. Naval Academy in May 1982. After initial flight training at Whiting Field, Fla., and intermediate and advanced jet training at Naval Air Station Pensacola, Fla., he was designated a Naval Aviator in March 1985. He was selected to fly the EA-6B Prowler and completed training at VAQ-129 on Whidbey Island, Wash.

Captain Amick's initial sea-duty assignment was with the VAQ-131 "Lancers" aboard USS Ranger (CV 61), participating in Operation Earnest Will. He then volunteered to cross-deck to USS Midway (CV 41), joining the "Gauntlets" of VAQ-136, completing another six-month Indian Ocean/Western Pacific deployment in 1988.

Upon returning from more than one year at sea, Capt. Amick transferred to Medium Attack Weapons School Pacific, where he cross-trained in the A-6 Intruder and taught tactics to Intruder and Prowler aircrew. He was named "1988 Prowler Junior Officer of the Year." In 1990, he joined the VAQ-134 "Garudas" aboard USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70) for a six-month Western Pacific/Indian Ocean deployment.

In November 1990, Captain Amick joined the VAQ-130 "Zappers" aboard USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67), participating in Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm, flying more than 20 combat strike missions into Iraq. He served as Operations Officer and Maintenance Officer, completing a second

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Mediterranean/Arabian Gulf deployment and flying missions in support of Operations Provide Comfort and Provide Promise.

From June 1994 to June 1997, Captain Amick served at the Joint Warfighting Center, Fort Monroe, Va., where he trained joint regional command staffs in crisis action planning while supporting joint and combined exercises throughout the world. He then attended the Naval War College, earning a Master of Arts degree in national security and strategic studies. He was designated a joint specialty officer in 1998.

Captain Amick served as Executive Officer and Commanding Officer of the VAQ-139 "Cougars" from March 1999 to September 2001. Under his command, the Cougars completed a highly successful Western Pacific/Arabian Gulf deployment, flying in Operation Southern Watch and earning the 2000 Battle Efficiency Award from Naval Air Force Pacific Fleet.

Joining USS George Washington as Operations Officer in September 2001, he participated in Operation Noble Eagle and also a highly successful Mediterranean/Arabian Gulf deployment supporting Operations Enduring Freedom and Southern Watch. During his tenure, the ship's crew earned the Naval Air Force Atlantic Fleet Battle Efficiency Award, the Battenburg Cup, the Flatley Award, and the inaugural Rear Admiral J. D. Ramage Award as the outstanding ship-air wing team in the Navy.

After a short tour on the staff of U.S. 2nd Fleet in January 2004, where he served as the Air Operations officer for both 2nd Fleet and Striking Fleet Atlantic, Captain Amick reported as Executive Officer of USS Kitty Hawk (CV 63) in January 2005. During his two years as Executive Officer, KITTY HAWK excelled during two Western Pacific deployments, supporting Joint and Multi-national operations.

Captain Amick then served as Carrier Requirements Officer for Commander, Naval Air Forces from February 2007 until October 2008, where he provided Fleet inputs for the design of the FORD Class Carriers.

Captain Amick reported to his current assignment as Commanding Officer, USS IWO JIMA (LHD 7) in January 2009.

Captain Amick's decorations include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (three awards), Air Medal with Combat "V" (three individual and three strike flight awards), Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V" (two awards),

Navy Commendation Medal, Navy Achievement Medal (3 awards), Army Achievement Medal, and numerous unit awards and campaign medals. He also wears the Chairman Joint Chiefs of Staff badge. He has accumulated more than 3,500 Prowler flight hours and more than 850 arrested landings on 13 different aircraft carriers.
