### 2. Commander's Assessment

The crew enjoyed holiday stand down until January. LEYTE GULF then proceeded to Naval Weapons Station Yorktown for Ammo Onload. On February 19, LEYTE GULF got underway for Deployment. USS LEYTE GULF'S VBSS (VESSEL BOARDING SEARCH AND SEIZURE) TEAM discovered 400 pounds of contraband on board a suspect dhow near the Horn of Africa / Gulf of Aden. LEYTE GULF seized the contraband, and turned it over to the Pakistani authorities. While conducting operations in the Northern Arabian Gulf, USS LEYTE GULF was assigned to Oil Platform Defense of ABOT (AL BASRA OIL TERMINAL) and KAAOT (KHUR AL-AMAYA OIL TERMINAL) performed Maritime Interdiction Operations (MIO), and boarded 150 dhows. LEYTE GULF became the floating Texaco station, refueling various small ships including Patrol Coastal (PC), Mine Sweepers (MCM), MK V Seal Boats, and the first and only Cruiser to LCAC refueling. The ship provided hot meals "MEALS ON KEELS" to the Marine and Navy personnel assigned to oil platform security. Personnel were accommodated with trips to the ship to enjoy showers, meals, and e-mail on a rotating basis. The crew enjoyed port visits in Civitavecchia, Italy, and Rota, Spain enroute to homeport. On 13 August, LEYTE GULF returned home for a well-deserved leave and stand down period. On September 12, LTJG R. S. O'Connor was struck and killed by a motor vehicle in South Bend, IN. From October 3 to December 2, LEYTE GULF was inport MHI (Marine Hydraulic Industries) Shipyards for SRA (SELECTIVE RESTRICTED AVAILABILITY). On November 19, Captain M. J. Turner assumed command of USS LEYTE GULF. On November 19, SK3 P. V. West was found dead at his apartment. His death was ruled as a suicide by the Norfolk Coroner's Office. On December 12, while inport NOB, flooding took place in FWD 5in/54 magazine, FWD 5in magazine, CIWS magazine, .50 cal magazine, and dome equipment room. Cause of flooding was failure of the pneumatic remote pilot (prp) valve in magazine group eleven.
