# USS MINNEAPOLIS - SAINT PAUL (SSN 708) Command History for 2003

## 1. Command Composition and Organization:

Ship's Mission:

USS MINNEAPOLIS-SAINT PAUL (SSN 708)'s primary mission is to hunt down and destroy enemy surface ships and submarines. The ship is capable of tactical Tomahawk cruise missiles strikes against land-based targets. USS MINNEAPOLIS-SAINT PAUL (SSN 708) performs Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance as well as Indication and Warnings. The ship is fully capable of supporting Special Forces missions.

### 3. Narrative

The year began with three weeks at sea. During this time the USS MINNEAPOLIS-SAINT PAUL (SSN 708) focused on operational proficiency and acclimating the new Executive Officer, LCDR Mike Lewis, to the ship and her crew. sea period culminated in a successful Tactical Readiness in Evaluation reinspection the of Navigation. area Following the January underway, the ship prepared for a major maintenance period in the Northrup Grumman Newport News Shipyard.

In February, the ship was dry docked and intensive maintenance began. For four months, the crew endured the rigors of shipyard life, tirelessly spending countless hours away from home in the pursuit of quality maintenance. Finally, the light at the end of the tunnel appeared in June, as the boat and her crew began to come back together, and innumerable retests were completed. At the end of June the warship SSN 708 left the dry dock and returned to the sea, her rightful home.

Successful sea trials were completed in early July. The crew's proficiency was a testament to her dedication to training during those long shipyard days. Following sea trials, the boat once again prowled the sea, stopping in Port Canaveral, Florida for a VIP cruise and a Tiger cruise. The USS MINNEAPOLIS-SAINT PAUL (SSN 708) returned to Norfolk at the end of July for one week in port.

August began with a successful Supply Management Inspection, followed by a return to sea for operational proficiency. An unscheduled Operational Reactor Safeguards Examination was conducted at the end of the month, with the ship once again performing at a level beyond that expected of a boat that had just left the shipyard.

September started with a maintenance availability, then the ship went to sea to evade the path of Hurricane Isabel. During this underway, the crew turned its attention to tactics.

Returning from sea at the beginning of October, the ship began two months of intense maintenance designed to prepare her for her upcoming deployment. In December, the ship once again returned to sea for three weeks to prepare for and conduct a Tactical Readiness Evaluation. The TRE was completed successfully with the ship demonstrating, once again, that she is ready to perform any operational mission. The USS MINNEAPOLIS-SAINT PAUL (SSN 708) then returned to Norfolk, Virginia for a well earned Holiday Stand-down.

The sustained superior performance of the men of the MINNEAPOLIS-SAINT PAUL (SSN 708) throughout the year was awarded with the Battle "E", which recognizes the best submarine in the squadron for that year. The ship also received the Supply Blue E. The self-sacrificing nature of the crew was further demonstrated by its raising almost \$27,000, for the Combined Federal Campaign, exceeding her goal by over 250 percent.
