## Part 1. Command Composition and Organization

A. MISSION: To provide Anti-Submarine Warfare (USW), Anti-Surface Warfare (SUW), Strike Warfare, and support Naval Special Warfare (NSW) for the U.S. Submarine Force. USS PHILADELPHIA is equipped to carry MK-48 ADCAP torpedoes and all variants of Tomahawk cruise missiles. In 1998, PHILADELPHIA was altered to support a Dry Deck Shelter (DDS) platform to carry Special Operations Forces and provide Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicle (DSRV) support. The DDS and DSRV capability were removed in the summer of 2006.

C. NARRATIVE:

In January 2010, the USS PHILADELPHIA began the last month of a seven month MEDITERRANEAN and CENTCOM deployment. USS PHILADELPHIA completed missions vital to national security and theater interests. Additionally, PHILADELPHIA conducted theater security cooperation events with the United Kingdom in Gibraltar. During the transit across the Atlantic, PHILADELPHIA provided Anti-Submarine Warfare exercise support for multinational assets. PHILADELPHIA ended her final deployment with an Operational Reactor Safeguards Examination.

After a post deployment stand-down period, PHILADELPHIA underwent a four week availability period to remove deployment installs, conduct necessary post-deployment repairs, and prepare for the upcoming Change of Command and period of Submarine Command Course operations.

On the 23<sup>rd</sup> of April, USS PHILADELPHIA had a Change of Command where CDR John D. Spencer was relieved by CDR Dave S. Soldow. The ceremony was held on Pier 17S in Naval Submarine Base New London.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> of May, the USS PHILADELPHIA left Groton to support Submarine Command Course Class 24 during their at-sea evaluation period. This underway offered the submarine an opportunity to prove its ability to manage high contact density environments, submarine tracking and prosecution, and other missions of the submarine force.

On the 25<sup>th</sup> of June, the USS PHILADELPHIA conducted a Decommissioning Ceremony commemorating 33 years of service to the country. The ceremony was held on Pier 32N and the guest speaker was Rear Admiral Douglas J. McAneny, Commander Submarine Forces U.S. Pacific Fleet. The week prior to the ceremony included several activities coordinated in association with the Philadelphia Naval Submarine League and PHILADELPHIA Sailors Association. A total of 500 former sailors and family members were given tours of PHILADELPHIA prior to her final underway.

On 9<sup>th</sup> of July, USS PHILADELPHIA left Groton for her final underway to Norfolk Naval Station. PHILADLEPHIA transferred Immediate Superior In Command (ISIC) to Commander Submarine Squadron Eight upon mooring at Pier 3T of Norfolk Naval Station on 12<sup>th</sup> of July.

On 27<sup>th</sup> of July, PHILADELPHIA was towed to Norfolk Naval Shipyard and moored at Pier 5. On 10<sup>th</sup> of September, PHILADELPHIA was moved to Drydock #3 for tow package preparations and defueling operations.

On 24<sup>th</sup> of June, USS PHILADELPHIA completed its Inactivation Availability and the crew was released from duty in a formal ceremony held on Drydock #3. In this ceremony, CDR Dave Soldow, Commanding Officer, lowered the ensign for the last time and turned over custody of the ship to Commander, Norfolk Naval Shipyard, RADM Joseph F. Campbell. The ship's crew was released to resume service to their country on various afloat and shore commands.
