COMMAND COMPOSITION AND ORGANIZATION

USS SAFEGUARD (ARS-50) is a diving and salvage ship based in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, under the operational control of Combat Support Squadron 5. Lieutenant Commander Donald J. Oswald, USN, assumed command 13 July from Lieutenant Commander Michael J. O'Moore, USN, . Lieutenant Andrew B. Clary, USN, relieved Lieutenant Mark T. Helmkamp, USN, as Executive Officer on 7 December. Lieutenant [REDACTED], USN, served as 1st Lieutenant the entire year. Lieutenant [REDACTED], USNR, relieved Lieutenant [REDACTED], USNR, as Auxiliary Division Officer 20 June. Lieutenant [REDACTED], USNR, relieved Lieutenant [REDACTED] of Operations Officer duties on 15 January. Lieutenant (junior grade) [REDACTED], USN, assumed duties as Diving and Salvage Officer and was relieved as Supply Officer by Lieutenant (junior grade) [REDACTED], USNR, on 04 September. NARRATIVE

USS SAFEGUARD'S (ARS-50) primary and secondary mission areas from her Pearl Harbor, Hawaii homeport involve operational support services for the combat fleet and emergent assists in the areas of diving, salvage, firefighting and towing. Most of 1990 was spent training and completing DPMF.

January started with local operations and training. On the 26th, SAFEGUARD steamed to Molokai and participated in the annual Makahiki Games, an event that celebrates Hawaiian heritage and culture. The port visit was cut short when SAFEGUARD left on the 28th for the emergent tow of the USNS TITAN which had suffered an engineering casualty.

After settling at A-7, SAFEGUARD received a CMS inspection. The ship then towed a target for a surface gunnery exercise with USS LYNDE MCCORMICK (DDG-8) on the 6th. The end of the month was used for diving and salvage training including underwater cutting and welding exercises. SAFEGUARD finished February with a Fire at Sea Exercise on the ex-TUNICA.

Moving into March, SAFEGUARD spent the 2nd-6th conducting an "outstanding" yellow gear pumping exercise. The workboats underwent an ISIC boat inspection and received a grade of "outstanding" with the comments "best boats in the squadron." SAFEGUARD summed up March with her ammunition offload, fuel offload, yellow gear offload and supply stores offload in preparation for DPMF.

April saw the shutdown of the galley and the beginning of the "R" Availability which led into DPMF.

By 9 June, SAFEGUARD had berthed in Drydock 4 and the overhaul had begun in earnest. Towards the end of July, the ship was readying itself to go back into the water. MTT was on board for pre-OPPE training and space turnover was completed.

Soon after the crew moved back on board, SAFEGUARD undocked and moored B-20. During August, the ship was refueled and in the next few days completed Light-Off Assessment, Equipment Optest, Dock Trials and Fast Cruise. Sea Trials marked the end of DPMF and SAFEGUARD geared up for steaming.

September started with an underway for precision anchorage and two-point moor. These two evolutions were completed in a timely and accurate fashion. After returning to port and unloading ammunition, SAFEGUARD went to sea on a special operations exercise

supporting USS SAM HOUSTON (SSN-609). Upon completion, the ship moored to commence another "R" Availability. MTT visited two times in order to prepare the ship for OPPE which was originally scheduled for the end of October.

In the middle of October, MTT was back aboard and EOCCs and a Main Space Fire Drill were evaluated while underway.

While underway for OPPE preps, SAFEGUARD was tasked to help the M/V STAR CONNECTICUT which grounded itself off Barber's Point. After MDSU-1 divers patched a hole in the hull, STAR CONNECTICUT was pulled off by tugs and SAFEGUARD was released from duty.

The final portion of the year was devoted to OPPE preparations. MTT arrived on board 27 November and departed 30 November after one underway on the 28th. December 3rd was spent underway conducting EOCC and Main Space Fire Drills. The deck plates and bilges were cleaned by all hands on the 6th-7th. Holiday leave and upkeep began on 17 December as well as Supply Management Inspection. SAFEGUARD received grades of "excellent" in three areas and "good" in one. Finally, SAFEGUARD was underway on the 27th for completion of the Diesel Inspection and Engine Op tests, after which holiday leave and upkeep started once again.
