1993 was an active and exciting year for the Pearl Harbor, Hawaii based USS SAFEGUARD (ARS-50). A Rescue and Salvage ship, she performs a wide variety of missions, to include: towing, offship firefighting, salvage, and surface-supplied diving. These missions are accomplished on a regular basis, in addition to emergency situations. The ship kept fully occupied during the year with an EASTPAC deployment, operations in the Arctic and various local exercises.

After a well-deserved leave and standdown period at the beginning of January, the SAFEGUARD and her crew were underway to Maui on January 12th. Anchored off Lahaina, the divers conducted surface-supplied diving operations in preparation for their upcoming Diving Operational Readiness Assessment (DORA). The remainder of the crew enjoyed liberty on the scenic island. An awards ceremony and personnel inspection was conducted on the fourth day in Maui, prior to the ship's return to Pearl Harbor. DORA commenced on the 19th and continued through the 21st, the final day anchored at Reef Runway for diving operations. The notable display of the diver's proficiency during DORA was followed by a successful Aviation Readiness Evaluation (ARE) at the end of the month.

Preparations for the upcoming EASTPAC deployment began with a Supply/3M assist visit by the Logistics Management Assessment Team and an extensive upkeep period. The pre-deployment family picnic was held on February 12th at Honeymoon Beach on Hickam Air Force Base. Representatives from the Family Service Center, Chaplain's Office, and Legal were on hand to answer questions and provide guidance to the crew and their dependents. SAFEGUARD was underway on the 22nd for a final shakedown and practice run prior to her voyage east.

After eight days underway on the Pacific, SAFEGUARD pulled into Alameda on 03 March. An availability was conducted while tow preparations began for the Ex-USS WICHITA (AOE-1). A tow inspection of the WICHITA was conducted on 09 March, exhibiting her outstanding preservation and seaworthiness. On March 13th in San Francisco Bay, the largest tow in SAFEGUARD's history began as the 10,000 pound tow bridle of the WICHITA was successfully passed to the SAFEGUARD's fantail.

The winds and seas cooperated well with the SAFEGUARD's voyage north. The ship's speed exceeded pre-tow calculations, allowing for an earlier arrival in Bremerton, Wa. on 19 March. SAFEGUARD berthed nearby at the new strategic homeport, Naval Station Everett, Wa. on the 20th and 21st. Victoria, British Columbia, was the first foreign port visited by SAFEGUARD on this deployment. The SAFEGUARD moored outboard of the HMCS PROVIDER, a Canadian oiler, at Canadian Forces Base Esquimalt. Fantastic spring weather allowed for excellent sightseeing in downtown Victoria and the surrounding area.

On 29 March, SAFEGUARD transited through the scenic Georgia Strait and seventeen miles up the Fraser River to moor at City Quay, New Westminster, British Columbia, a suburb of Vancouver. Vancouver's museums, zoo, aquarium, parks, and shopping allowed for unlimited entertainment. SAFEGUARD was underway on 05 April for her return to Pearl Harbor.

The remainder of April and the month of May were spent primarily in an availability. A Navy Occupational Safety and Health (NAVOSH) inspection was conducted 26-28 May to determine the overall safety of the ship and its crew. On 07 June SAFEGUARD departed Pearl Harbor for Port Allen, Kauai to conduct diving operations and provide assistance to the Hurricane Iniki victims of the previous year. She returned to Oahu on the 11th and began preparations for TSTA IV (Tailored Ship's Training Availability).

The first portion of TSTA IV consisted of a salvage and debeaching exercise in East Loch, Pearl Harbor on 21-24 June. The ship successfully laid and retrieved two legs of beach gear, demonstrated the execution and use of a Liverpool bridle, and displayed her ability to conduct the debeaching of a grounded ship. She exhibited her proficiency of off-ship firefighting, another TSTA exercise, on 29 June in the waters south of Oahu.

The month of July consisted of inspections and pre-deployment activity. The 3M inspection on July 8th received a grade of 96.8. The engineering department was kept busy by a Diesel Inspection 12-15 July and an ISIC Engineering Readiness Assessment (IERA) 14-22 July. The ship's pre-deployment picnic was held at Barber's Point on the 23rd of July. A Command Inspection on 03-05 August completed the excitement prior to the ship's journey north.

Personnel from Underwater Construction Team (UCT) Two in Port Hueneme, Ca. joined the ship in Pearl Harbor for the transit to Adak, Alaska on 13 August. After less than eighteen hours in Adak to refuel and reprovision on 21 August, SAFEGUARD was underway for the Bering Sea. Upon arrival in the Bering Strait, UCT divers commenced cold weather diving and scheduled underwater maintenance and inspections.

Rough weather and seas suspended diving operations on the fifth day, enabling the crew to weigh anchor and head north to cross the Arctic Circle and the International Date Line. SAFEGUARD took temporary refuge in the bay at Port Clarence, Alaska to wait out a severe arctic storm. Members of the crew were graciously welcomed ashore by the personnel of the Coast Guard LORAN Station at Port Clarence.

Once operations were complete in Bering Strait, SAFEGUARD proceeded on 08 September to the Kodiak, Alaska, Coast Guard Air Station. UCT personnel disembarked to make room for members of Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Mobile Unit Seven from San Diego and U.S. Customs Service representatives. After the exchange of personnel and gear, preparations were made to conduct joint operations in the Gulf of Alaska with EOD and the U.S. Customs Service.

After a few days on station in the Gulf of Alaska and the adjoining Icy Bay, the ship was directed to onload additional equipment and personnel. Cordova, Alaska, a small fishing town located in the western portion of the Prince William Sound, was the destination. Once again, violent storms prevented SAFEGUARD from getting underway, and two days were spent in the protected waters of Cordova. Operations in the Gulf of Alaska recommenced on 22 September. After another five days in the area, SAFEGUARD returned to Kodiak to top off fuel and provisions prior to it's return to Pearl Harbor.

SAFEGUARD arrived in Pearl Harbor on the 8th of October and was again underway less than a week later to Kailua-Kona, Hawaii, promoting the Navy's 218th birthday and local Navy presence. Family and friends joined the crew on the twelve hour transit to the neighbor island. After a very deserving weekend of rest and leisure, SAFEGUARD weighed anchor on 18 October, returning to its homeport.

In support of Limited Team Training (LTT), SAFEGUARD was underway on 20-21 October. LTT was the first of many evaluations prior to the ship's Operational Propulsion Plant Examination (OPPE) the beginning of December. IERA was conducted on 25-29 October while inport. Surface Line Week coincided with the pre-OPPE preparations. SAFEGUARD placed second in the competition, ahead of many ships with crews three or four times in size.

Upkeep and pre-OPPE readiness continued through November. Ammunition was offloaded on 01 December prior to the ship's Planned Maintenance Availability (PMA) during the first three months of 1994. OPPE was conducted on the 6th and 7th of December, the latter day spent at sea south of Oahu. The engineering department displayed their intelligence and superb abilities as the ship was awarded it's first two year certification since 1988.

The achievements of a successful 1993 were celebrated at the ship's annual Christmas Party on December 10th. A much needed holiday standdown commenced on 17 December after a long, demanding year. The crew, knowing what awaits them in 1994, took advantage of the precious time off to relax and anticipate further adventures.
