1. Command Composition and Organization.

A. Mission. USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71) is tasked with maintaining open sea lanes of trade and communication by projecting air superiority to all points on the globe. Maintaining her equipment and men in the highest state of readiness enables her to carry out a wide variety of missions including anti-air warfare, anti-surface warfare, antisubmarine warfare, and electronic warfare. She also shares, with other Navy ships, a mission of replenishing ships at sea and performing various non-combat missions such as rescue at

sea of vessels in distress and transport of refugees and others in need of help, enclosure (1).

B. Organizational Structure and Home Port. Captain Dayton W. Ritt is Commanding Officer. Enclosure (2) contains his biography and photograph. Commander Alan M. Gemmill is TR's Executive Officer, his biography and photograph are enclosure (3). USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT's organization, including Heads of Departments, staff members and collateral duty assignments, is shown in enclosure (4). USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT (CVN-71) is homeported in Norfolk, Virginia and assigned to Commander Carrier Group Group EIGHT.

C. Chronological Listing of Significant Events. Enclosure (5) is a chronological listing of significant events and enclosure (6) contains a chronological list of visitors to TR.

2. Narrative.

TR was underway almost half of 1988. Much of the year was spent taking part in two and three week fleet carrier qualifications and operational training exercises. January and most of February was spent in homeport. On 13 January the Honorable Pratap K. Kaul, Indian Ambassador to the United States toured TR and had lunch aboard. RADM James E. Taylor, Commander, Fighter Medium Attack Airborne Early Warning Wings Atlantic was flag host, enclosure (6). The Honorable Dennis R. Shaw, Deputy Under Secretary of the Navy for Policy, plus 90 guests, toured TR and had lunch aboard on 19 January.

On 23 February TR put to sea for the first time since Shock Trials in October 1987. Fleet carrier qualifications were conducted off the Virginia Capes from 23 February to 3 March. After four days in homeport, TR started Fleet Carrier Qualifications off Jacksonville, FL before proceeding to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. This was the first time TR and all the squadrons of Carrier Air Wing EIGHT operated together. Additional information on this underway period is in enclosure (7).

On Sunday morning, 13 March Airman (E-3) Ronald Edward Krauss became the first fatality aboard USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT. Airman Kraus, a plane captain assigned to Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron One-Twenty-Four (VAW-124), was killed by a C-2 propeller during flight operations.

During the last weeks in March hard work and training paid off as TR successfully completed shakedown cruise in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Following evaluations, Captain A. P. Johnson, Commander Fleet Training Group, stated TR's crew had set new standards for Navy and Coast Guard ships in the important area of damage control, enclosure (8).

TR made a port call to Fort Lauderdale, FL from 31 March to 4 April before heading home with 1500 dependents aboard during her first Tiger Cruise 5 and 6 April. Airman Patrick J. Heslin drowned while on liberty in Fort Lauderdale on 3 April. He was assigned to Air Department's V-3 Division which is responsible for hangar bay operations aboard TR.

While underway for fleet carrier qualifications in Virginia Capes from 18 to 24 April, TR hosted His Excellency Eigil Jorgensen, Ambassador of Denmark to the United States and Mrs. Jorgensen on 22 April, enclosure (6).

Standardization and deceleration trials were conducted with David W. Taylor Naval Ship Research and Development Center observers at HECTOR RANGE on 23 and 24 April. Resulting data determined maximum speed for CVN-71 and filled in tactical data for NIMITZ class carriers, enclosure (8).

On May 19th one-hundred twenty participants of the Fourteenth Inter-American Naval Conference embarked TR as guests of Admiral Carlisle A. H. Trost, Chief of Naval Operations. Fifty-two Flag Officers from 17 nations saw the Navy's newest carrier in

action, with Carrier Air Wing EIGHT providing an air power demonstration, enclosure (6) lists participants. The following day, eighty-four members of the Inter-American Defense College boarded TR in port Norfolk to see carrier life first hand.

From 23 May to 28 June TR was underway for advance phase training in Virginia Capes, Jacksonville and Caribbean operations areas. An Operational Reactor Safeguards Examination (ORSE) was conducted from 31 May to 3 June with an overall grade of Above Average, enclosure (8). Enclosure (9) contains additional information on propulsion operations from 3 June through 3 September 1988.

Airman Apprentice William Howard Berry III was lost overboard during flight operations 163 miles northeast of Jacksonville, Florida on 30 May. Berry was a crewmember of Air Anti-submarine Squadron Twenty-Four (VS-24), enclosure (10).

Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Shipbuilding and Logistics) Keith Eastin spent two days, 10 and 11 June, underway with TR. During his visit he was given an indoctrination flight in an F-14 Tomcat flown by CDR H. G. Standbridge, Commanding Officer, VF-84.

The Honorable William L. Ball, III, Secretary of the Navy, arrived in an F/A-18 Hornet and departed in an A-6E Intruder on 7 July. Later that day international attention was focused on TR. The top Soviet military officer, First Minister of Defense and Marshal of the Soviet Union Sergei F. Akhromeyev, and a dozen top-ranking Soviet military officers embarked. The Marshal's visit was the first time a Soviet military leader had been aboard one of America's sophisticated nuclear-powered aircraft carriers. Guests of the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff, Admiral William J. Crowe, the Soviets were given a tour of TR, from galley to the bridge. Ship operations were explained by TR crewmembers. On the flight deck they observed aircraft being launched and recovered and Carrier Air Wing EIGHT's air power demonstration. A month later President Reagan remarked on the historic event to the 70th Annual National Convention of the American Legion. "We took Marshal Akhromeyev to visit our newest supercarrier, USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT. We thought it would be a valuable education for him. And so he saw that magnificent ship go through its paces. He watched our superb aircraft perform. All in all, he spent a day on one of the technological wonders of the world, a floating airfield his Navy had nothing to equal; and yet, you know what he said he was most impressed with when he was through with the visit? Our enlisted men and women. I was told that he couldn't get over the fact that we had them doing work that the Soviets would reserve exclusively for officers, in many cases, very superior officers. And he couldn't believe that our enlisted people were so self-assured in speaking up when asked a question, so articulate in giving their replies, and so ready to add their opinions." Enclosure (6) contains a complete list of participants.

From 11 through 15 July a Supply Management Inspection was conducted aboard TR. OPNAVINST 5040.7J provides that overall evaluation for inspections be either "Satisfactory" or "Unsatisfactory". In this context, mission performance and the adequacy, quality and management of personnel, facilities and resources assigned to TR's Supply Department were evaluated as "Satisfactory." Of special note were: a "High Excellent" received by Stock Control, the highest grade awarded to any COMNAVAIRLANT Logistics Division in four years; a "High Excellent" received by Aviation Stores, the highest grade awarded to any COMNAVAIRLANT Aviation Stores Division in four years; Automated Data Processing, Food Services, Ship's Store/Services, Disbursing, Wardroom and Chief Petty Officer's Mess all were awarded "Outstanding," the highest possible grade.

Master Chief Jack L. Breedlove relieved Master Chief Duane R. Bushey as TR's Command Master Chief on 15 July. Master Chief Breedlove reported to USS THEODORE

ROOSEVELT Precommissioning Unit in March 1986 as Weapons Department Leading Chief Petty Officer. Master Chief Bushey left TR to become the seventh Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy. A Master Chief Avionics Technician, he reported to TR's Precommissioning Unit as Command Master Chief in October 1985. Bushey's selection as the Navy's senior enlisted person was made by Admiral Carlisle A. H. Trost, Chief of Naval Operations while TR was successfully completing three weeks of Advance Phase Operations in the Caribbean, it was the only time TR had been underway without Master Chief Bushey.

Underway in Virginia Capes operational area for fleet carrier qualifications from 20 to 24 July TR had several distinguished visitors, enclosure (6). On 21 July six members of the FBI and Naval Investigative Service including the Bureau's Executive Assistant Director, enclosure (6), embarked to learn first hand about carrier operations. Also that day, during an indoctrination on carrier operations Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Technology Transfer and Security Assistance) Richard Levine toured TR and made several traps (landings) and cats (take-offs) from the flight deck in an F-14 Tomcat.

Back in Norfolk, TR hosted the Carrier Group FOUR change of command ceremony on 28 July when RADM W. A. Dougherty Jr., relieved RADM J. L. Johnson as Commander.

Commander Alan M. Gemmill relieved Captain William V. Cross as TR's Executive Officer on 5 August. CAPT Cross left TR to become Commanding Officer, USS INCHON (LPH-12).

On 12 August His Excellency Thorsteinn Rafnar Palsson, Prime Minister of Iceland became the first head-of-state to visit TR. His Excellency Ingvi Ingvarsson, Icelandic Ambassador to the United States; the Honorable Nicholas Ruwe, American Ambassador to Iceland and other members of the official party, enclosure (6), were guests of ADM Lee Baggett, Jr., Supreme Allied Commander, Atlantic.

TR sailed on 25 August to join her battle group for the first time as part of an operational exercise in the North Atlantic. For twenty-eight days TR and over 200 other ships, 500 aircraft and 45,000 personnel took part in the NATO exercise TEAMWORK 88. Two American carriers (TR and USS FORRESTAL) were part of the nine nation maritime and amphibious exercise. TR moved along the east coast of the U. S. and Canada before heading through the Greenland, Iceland, United Kingdom Gap and into Norway's Vestfjord. FORRESTAL moved into the Norwegian Sea from the south. Enclosure (11) is Commander, Carrier Striking Force's First Impression Report on TEAMWORK 88.

TR also completed her mission of showing the flag during TEAMWORK 88. His Excellency Dr. Manfred Woerner, new Secretary General of North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO); permanent NATO representatives from eleven nations, two ambassadors, three ministers, eight members of national parliaments and over twenty-five flag and general officers toured TR and watched flight operations. Among those embarked were the Honorable Mr. Thomas Niles, US Ambassador to Canada; the Honorable Mr. Nicholas Ruwe, American Ambassador to Iceland; the Honorable Mr. William L. Ball, III, Secretary of the Navy; Admiral Lee Baggett, Jr., Supreme Allied Commander Atlantic; General, Sir Geoffrey Howlett, KBE, UKA, Commander in Chief North; General Vigleik Eide, Chief of Defense, Norway and General Paul D. Manson, Chief Defence Staff (Canada). A large number of TEAMWORK 88 news stories centered on America's newest carrier. Over forty reporters from twelve nations visited TR during the exercise. At the end of TEAMWORK 88, TR hosted a twenty-five member media pool during a news conference featuring five flag officers who led TEAMWORK 88. Enclosure (6) contains a complete list of TEAMWORK 88 distinguished visitors and media. Enclosure (12) is the SACLANT media release on TEAMWORK 88.

On the last day of TEAMWORK 88, September 21st, Commander Carrier Group

FOUR, RADM William Dougherty, Jr. departed and Commander Cruiser-Destroyer Group EIGHT, RADM David B. Robinson embarked.

TR made her first overseas port call in Wilhelmshaven, Federal Republic of Germany on 25 September. The port call was a major event in northern Germany. Over thirty media attended a news conference and toured TR that first day, enclosure (6). Konteradmiral (RADM) Hein-Peter Wehyer, Commander Germany Naval Bureau flew out to meet TR and returned to port aboard. The Honorable Dr. Rupert Scholz, Germany's new Minister of Defense and Lord Mayor Menzel of Wilhelmshaven had lunch aboard the following day. Dr. Roland Meklinger, Vice President of Messerschmitt-Boelkow-Blohm toured the ship on September 27th.

On her return home TR transited through the English Channel on 30 September. Back in Norfolk, preparations for TR's first operational deployment started. A "We Care Predeployment Fair" on 23 October provided TR's families with information on agencies and resources available to dependents when the ship is deployed. The fair included a special program to help couples understand how to deal with separation and homecoming from a deployment. Three television stations covered the fair.

In October 1988, USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT became the first aircraft carrier to successfully implement both SUADPS-RT and Intermediate Maintenance Management System (IMMS-RT) Common Release III and Disk Journaling. TR currently provides the fastest response time for system users of all NIMITZ class carriers.

TR got underway for the last time in 1988 on 7 November for the Puerto Rican operations area with members of her battle group. Together they launched strikes against enemy targets while defending against attacks. TR executed her part of the exercise with what VADM Johnson, Commander SECOND Fleet called, "superior professionalism." One of the most important parts of the exercise was training in a concept called Force Over-the-Horizon Coordinator. The Battle Group Commander must track enemy and friendly forces for hundreds of miles around the battle group. During FLEETEX 1-89, TR was Force Over-the-Horizon Coordinator. By the end of the exercise VADM Johnson said he had never seen it done better, "The performance by TR is going to be used as a bench mark for evaluating others using the procedure." Enclosure (13) contains additional information on propulsion operations from 3 September through 3 December 1988.

November 15th TR started for home. Two messages arrived that day, the first one announced the ship had won Commander Naval Air Force U.S. Atlantic Fleet (CNAL) "Silver Anchor" award for retention and was a finalist for the Golden Anchor award.

The second message said TR was nominated by CNAL as a finalist in the carrier category for the Captain Edward F. Ney Memorial award for food service excellence.

Returning home on 18 November TR continued preparations for her first operational deployment. On 22 November a Single Sailor Predeployment Brief to advise TR sailors how to prepare for a deployment, including the need for single sailors to have wills and powers-of-attorney prepared was held.

TR's Maintenance and Material Management Inspection took place from 28 November to 2 December. TR finished her 3M Inspection with an overall score of 92, one point higher than any other Atlantic Fleet carrier.

1988 was the first year TR could compete for the Commander-in-Chief Atlantic Fleet Golden Anchor Award. On 15 December the announcement was made, TR had won. This annual award recognizes excellence in career programs and leadership involvement in retention.

TR started her first "Great Adventure" on 30 December 1988. She was underway for the Mediterranean and her first extended deployment. Enclosure (14) contains a media

release on the TR Battle Group getting underway.

At the start of business 1 January 1988 USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT had an enlisted crew total of two-thousand eight-hundred ninety-seven (2,897), at close of business on 31 December 1988 there were two-thousand nine-hundred and twenty-four (2,924) enlisted crewmembers aboard. On 1 January 1988 one-hundred sixty-six (166) officers were assigned to TR and at close of business 31 December 1988 there were one-hundred seventy-two (172) officers assigned.

During 1988, one-thousand five-hundred fifty (1,550) enlisted crewmen graduated from two week School of Ship courses held bi-weekly for newly reporting personnel. Five-thousand (5,000) people were sent TAD during 1988.

During 1988 there were twelve-thousand three-hundred thirty-five (12,335) catapult launches and twelve-thousand four-hundred nine traps (12,409). The following is a listing of traps, touch & goes, bolters and total flight hours from TR in 1988:

During 1988 thirty-six (36) Ship Alterations (SHIPALTS) were accomplished by VRT. Changes for the Visual Landing Flight Aid system, Arresting Gear system and Catapults system totaled two-hundred seventy three, two-hundred twenty seven by VRT and forty six by Ship's Force. Two-hundred sixteen controlled jobs were accomplished by ship's force:

Four-hundred seventy nine (479) Interdepartmental Work Requests were completed expending nine-thousand five-hundred forty (9,540) man-hours. Enclosure (19) contains additional equipment and space modifications and installations.

Expenditures of ammunition in 1988 were approximately 850 line items. Four surface-to-air missiles, sixteen air-to-air missiles and over 25,500 rounds of small arms ammunition were expended during the year.

3. **Supporting Documents.** Enclosure (20) is forwarded as a record of daily operations and training for 1988. Enclosure (21) is a photograph of USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT taken by PH2 Scott E. Norr on 27 March 1988 near Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. This was the first time photographs were taken with all ten squadrons of Carrier Air Wing EIGHT aboard TR.
