- 1. Per reference (a), the calendar year 1999 Command History for USS TARAWA (LHA 1) and enclosures (1) through (7) are submitted.
- 2. Command mission, composition and organization.
- a. Command mission. The primary mission of USS TARAWA is to embark, deploy and land elements of a Marine Landing Force in an assault by helicopter, landing craft, or amphibious vehicles alone or in concert with other attached units of the Amphibious Ready Group and embarked Marine Expeditionary Unit. Other missions include service as flagship for embarked Amphibious Squadron, flag or general staff; casualty receiving platform; support of special operations; command and control ship; assault provisions carrier to sustain embarked forces ashore. TARAWA also renders extensive humanitarian assistance to civilian populations, foreign or domestic, at the discretion of the National Command Authority.
- b. <u>Command composition</u>. Ship's company included 62 officers and 970 enlisted.
- c. <u>Organizational structure.</u> Immediate Superior In Charge was Commander, Amphibious Group THREE.

4. Narrative.

On 5 July 1999 TARAWA achieved an overall grade of outstanding on the Aviation Readiness Evaluation (ARE) within 30 days of completing COH.

In July 1999 TARAWA began its first air operations of the year in support of a major reserve Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) assault during exercise "Summer Thunder." This largescale assault was conducted within 30 days of completing a 10-month Complex Overhaul. Embarking 17 helicopters (2 AH-1, 2 UH-1, 9 H-46 and 4 H-53), TARAWA conducted over 800 take-off and landing flight deck evolutions and 125 aircraft moves during the week-long exercise.

On 5 November 1999 the Medical Department was called upon to respond to an actual mass casualty due to a hydrogen sulfide fume leak that endangered the safety of the crew. Actions of the Medical Department contributed to all affected personnel being safely evacuated from the space and transported to medical triage for further care. Eight personnel were transported to local Navy medical facilities for further observation and later returned in good health.

On 27 August 1999 the Supply Department successfully completed a Supply Management Assessment by SURFPAC/ATG inspectors. Results were overwhelmingly positive and the SMA was upgraded to an SMI. TARAWA became the first ever West Coast large deck amphibious ship to achieve this teat.
