

BASIC HISTORY

New years Day 1971 found the GRIDLEY at the North Search and Rescue Picket Station (NSAR) in the Gulf of Tonkin, acting as Commander Task Unit 77.0.1. With her was the USS T.E. CHANDLER (DD-717) as shotgun. On 6 January the CHANDLER was detached, having been relieved by the USS RICHARD B. ANDERSON (DD-786). On 11 January shotgun duties passed to the USS BUCK (DD-761). GRIDLEY departed North SAR 15 January and entered Yankee Station in the Gulf of Tonkin, where she operated with the USS KITTY HAWK (CVA-63), USS BUCK (DD-761), USS W.L. LAND (DD-703), and USS ROWAN (DD-782). The next day GRIDLEY departed, steaming independently for Yokosuka Japan where she arrived on 20 January for a 3 day layover before getting underway for Sasebo. After a week in Sasebo GRIDLEY was again underway, this time for special operations (SPECOPS) in the Sea of Japan. On 2 February 1971 GRIDLEY was exercising command of Task Unit 71.0.4 in the Sea of Japan with the USS JOHN R. CRAIG (DD-885). After a week of SPECOPS, GRIDLEY returned to Sasebo. By the 20th of February GRIDLEY was again on patrol in the Sea of Japan, this time accompanied by the USS HEPBURN (DE-1055). While on this mission several Russian ships were sighted including the ships NAKHODKA and KAHCK, and a KASHIN class DLG, which frequently operated in close proximity to GRIDLEY.

GRIDLEY returned to Sasebo on 28 February, departing for Yokosuka on 7 March. Brief stops were made at Yokosuka and Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines before GRIDLEY reached its destination of the British Crown Colony, Hong Kong on 18 March. A week later GRIDLEY was back at sea, steaming once more for North SAR where she would relieve the USS HALSEY (DLG-23) as Commander Task Unit 77.0.1. Shotgun during this line period, was handled by the USS O'BRIEN (DD-725), USS DEHAVEN (DD-727), and USS HEPBURN (DE-1055). On 22 April GRIDLEY was underway for home. As Commander Task Unit 70.0.5 consisting of GRIDLEY, the USS HOLLISTER (DD-788), and the USS CHANDLER (DD-717), she took on fuel at the U.S. Naval Station, Apra Guam on 30 April and got underway for Midway Island. On 3 May GRIDLEY inched to First Fleet and assumed command of Task Unit 15.9.3. Steaming past Midway on 5 May, GRIDLEY arrived at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on 8 May, and was steaming for Long Beach later the same day. On 13 May, 1971, GRIDLEY returned to its home port ending a six month deployment to the Western Pacific.

On the 2nd of June 1971, Captain Eugene J. REIHER, USN relieved Captain Robert L. THORSON, USN as Commanding Officer of the USS GRIDLEY.

GRIDLEY barely got its 30 day stand-down period. On 17 June she unloaded weapons at Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station in preparation for a Midshipman Cruise that commenced 21 June. On that day she got und

way for local operations in the Southern California operating area. The Schedule was a busy one, with multi-ship operations, missile s Anti-Submarine Rocket (ASROC) launchings, and firing of the 3 inch guns. An ASROC was fired on 22 June in exercises with the USS OZBO (DD-846), the USS CHANDLER (DD-717), and the USS WORDEN (DLG-18) w the Commander Destroyer Squadron 13 embarked on GRIDLEY as OTC. GR was back in Long Beach from 24-28 June and got underway on the 28t part of Task Unit 10.1.L. On the 29th and 30th of June a total of Terrier missiles were fired at targets and on 1 July GRIDLEY heade north for Monterey, Calif., where she arrived the next day. She an in Monterey Bay for 4 days to allow the crew liberty before steami north on 6 July for Everett, Washington, with a fuel stopover at Manchester, Washington. GRIDLEY was in Everett from 9-13 July and got underway for Pearl Harbor, Hasaii, and the Hawaii Local Operat Area. The 27th of July was a particulary eventful day as GRIDLEY f three Terriers, one ASROC, and one exercise toepedo. The missile droyed two targets. On the 29th of July and again on the 30th, the guns were fired at various targets. GRIDLEY returned to Long Beach on 4 August for a welcome period of leave and upkeep.

On 2 September, GRIDLEY once more took on weapons at Seal Bea preparation for fleet operations. GRIDLEY's Dependents Cruise was l on 7 September the day before she got underway for Ropeval 3-71, a major First Fleet exercise for Task Group 170.8. On the 16th of September GRIDLEY was on the pacific missile range and fired a tot of seven terriers before returning to Long Beach on the 17th.

All Weapons were off-loaded at Seal Beach on the 28th of Sept and the next day GRIDLEY entered the Long Beach Naval Shipyard for Restricted Availability (RAV) begin conversion to Navy distillate a cleaner burning fuel. On 21 December, GRIDLEY went out for local ations and equipment checkout. She returned the same day to the sh yard to continue the RAV. She remained there through the end of Dec 1971.
