NARRATIVE

Ship's History for 1968

After returning to the United States from WESTPAC in November 1967 the USS WAINWRICHT spent the first weeks of 1968 in her homeport, Charleston, South Carolina in a period of leave and upkeep. On 19 January the WAINWRICHT departed Charleston for Newport, Rhode Island where she acted as Destroyer School ship for two weeks. February 5 found WAINWRICHT back in Charleston where she continued her never ending job of maintaining constant readiness.

On 7 March, the WAINWRIGHT got underway to rendezvous with the Blue Forces in connection with the fleet exercise "Rugby Match". Rugby Match entailed a wide assortment of Missile shoots, gunnery exercises, ASW drills, and formation steaming. During this three week exercise, the WAINWRIGHT fired six Terrier missiles which included a successful surface missile shoot against the decommissioned destroyer KILLEN. For a short breather during Rugby Match, the crew enjoyed two days of liberty in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Following Rugby Match the WAINWRIGHT again returned to Charleston to begin her preparations for another Western Pacific Cruise. On the fourth of April, Captain Garrett E. LOCKEE was relieved by Captain Ivar A. JOHNSON as Commanding Officer of USS WAINWRIGHT in an impressive ceremony. With their new Captain, the WAINWRIGHT continued preparations for the Western Pacific including Administrative Material inspection, local operations, and constant drills. Then, on 24 June, the USS WAIN-WRIGHT embarked on her long journey to South East Asia.

After passing through the Panama Canal, and short stops in Pearl Harbor and Guam, the WAINWRIGHT arrived in Subic Bay, Phillipines. Here she received her final WESTPAC outfitting. The WAINWRIGHT then departed Subic and made her first voyage of 1968 into the South China Sea and Gulf of Tonkin. After a one day stopover in Danang, the WAINWRIGHT proceeded to PIRAZ (Positive Identification Radar Advisory Zone) Station where she relieved the USS STERRETT (DLG-31).

On station, WAINWRIGHT was responsible for the identification of all aircraft over the Tonkin Gulf and immediate coast line. This area of responsibility consisted of over 50,000 square miles of friendly, North Vietnamese and Chinese Communist Air Space. WAINWRIGHT's northern geographic position made her a navigational reference point for friendly aircraft and patrol aircraft.

During the first line period, 4 August to 14 September the WAINWRIGHT received a visit from Charles F. THOMAS, former Secretary of the Navy, VADM William BRINGLE, COMSEVENTHELT and a CBS News Team. Also, during this period the WAINWRIGHT left station for typhoon evasion. Finally on 14 September, the WAINWRIGHT was relieved on station by USS HORNE.

The month that followed was both rewarding and enjoyable. Not only did WAINWRIGHT visit Hong Kong, Subic Bay, and Yokosuka Japan; but also conducted a successful missile shoot and maintained constant readiness. On the passage to Yokosuka the WAINWRIGHT received an SOS from the SS LINDENWOOD VICTORY who was drifting helplessly toward shoal water. The WAINWRIGHT arrived on the scene and managed to take the merchant vessel in tow thus averting her grounding. For her effort the USS WAINWRIGHT

received many laudatory messages.

On 19 October the WAINWRIGHT relieved the USS MAHAN (DLG-11) for another tour on PIRAZ. During the second line period the Engineering Department was awarded its second consecutive "E" for excellence. On 15 November, the WAINWRIGHT again departed the line for four days upkeep in Sasebo, Japan.

After this very short rest, the WAINWRIGHT began its last line period on 28 November. At the end of the year, WAINWRIGHT was still on PIRAZ, finishing a busy but successful year.
